**Trading Picks Up In Texas Cotton Markets**

More trading took place this past week in Oklahoma and Texas cotton markets than the week before, reports the PMA, U. S. Department of Agriculture. **Austin Review**

(By Rep. Clyde Whiteside)  
Dear Folks:  
We are soon approaching the half-way mark in the legislative session for the 51st Legislature of the State of Texas. Never before in the history of this state has such a multitude of bills with such a far reaching scope and tremendous importance to every nook and corner of this state been placed for the consideration and action of this Legislature.

1. A method whereby the counties may designate the location and type of roads to be built.  
2. That roads can be built by a county when that county has the equipment necessary, or by bid by private contractor.  
3. That all plans and specifications shall be furnished by the State Highway Department or an engineer approved by that department.  
4. That all construction shall be under the supervision of the State Highway Department or an engineer approved by that department.  
5. That roads which are cheaper to build than any heretofore undertaken may be built.  
6. That none of the funds can be used to build a road whose specifications are greater than the present Farm to Market specifications, yet authorizes the construction of durable type roads including roads surfaced with gravel, caliche or shell.  
7. That none of the Rural Road Funds can be used to purchase right of way or maintenance or for the purpose of any road, bridge or drainage equipment or machinery.  
8. That any county, to participate, must levy the thirty cent constitutional ad valorem tax which they were authorized to levy by the people in a recent election.  
9. That counties must maintain all roads built under this program.



**KITCHEN MEMO**  
BY JEAN CLARKE  
For that individual touch to a meal for guests or when you feel the family would especially appreciate your adding a decorative food, serve Orange Sweet Potato Baskets. Squeeze the juice from 6 large orange halves. Remove and discard the membrane. Cut the edges of the orange shells in a scallop design. Mash 2 cups cooked sweet potato, and beat in 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 tsp. brown sugar and 1 tsp. salt. Pile sweet potato mixture into orange shells. Dot with 1 tsp. melted butter or margarine. Place on broiler tray under a medium flame and broil 12 mins. Save time and gas by serving a complete broiler meal including thick ham slices and broiled grapefruit halves.

An 1890 cook book advised cooks to drop water on the oven bottom. If the water hissed, the oven was supposed to be hot enough for baking. Today the thermostat on modern gas ranges keeps baking temperatures at exactly the degree needed.

Yellow and light green celery tops combined with brown onion skins simmered in water over a low flame for about 20 minutes makes a nourishing and tasty drink. The liquid can be added to soups and gravies for flavoring.

All water has some sediment in it. To keep your automatic gas water heater free of this sediment, once a month draw off a quart or two of water until it flows clean.

When washing windows in cold weather add a little vinegar or household ammonia to the water to prevent it from freezing on the glass.

**Girlstown, U.S.A., Opens Its Doors at Buffalo Gap**

Girlstown, U.S.A., opened its doors Sunday for the girl who needs a home. Just as Boys Town, Nebraska, offered refuge for neglected boys, Girlstown, U.S.A., hopes to

become a haven for the girls who are neglected, wayward or homeless. The big two-story home stands in the middle of a little town of 300 population. It has 32 bedrooms, consultation and study rooms, an athletic field and stables. Its founder is Miss Amelia Anthony, formerly of El Paso, who has been engaged in welfare

work for 12 years. Its backers are those who have come from the wide open spaces with open hearts and open pocketbooks—West Texans. Girlstown will provide a haven for girls of West Texas first. Miss Anthony said. If we have space, then girls will be accepted from other sections of the state. We expect Girlstown to grow.

Miss Anthony continued: Girlstown has been established because of the need for such a project. There are many provisions for homeless boys, but the girls who need homes have been neglected. Boys' towns, boys' ranches and boys' homes abound over the nation. Havens just for girls are few and far between. Orange, Texas, opened a big home a year or so ago for neglected girls. Waco has a girls' club. The Catholic Church has three homes for girls in the state—at Dallas, Houston and San Antonio. And the state maintains at Gainesville the state training school for girls convicted of delinquency.

Girlstown is one of the first of its kind in the nation. Miss Anthony said girls would be accepted from homes where problems have arisen which would leave the girl homeless, from homes where the mother alone may be unable to provide for the girl and from homes where parents believe their daughters may need help in working out their individual problems.

The girls will be required to attend public school. Miss Anthony said that no public donations would be asked. However, individuals may make gifts whenever they wish. Now the home needs such items as a sewing machine, a large electric refrigerator, sheets, towels, tennis rackets, volley balls and saddles and bridles. Two riding horses already have been donated.

**Seymour Improving Municipal Water System**

Work is going forward on a \$40,000 improvement of the Seymour water system. Bonds for this were voted in 1947, and last year part of the improvement was made. The remainder will be spent within the next three months.

The town now has eight shallow wells about 42 feet deep, which sink into a water sheet in the northeast part of the city. One of the wells supplies the park. Two of the new ones will be equipped with pumps pulling 350 gallons per minute. The wells will have capacity of 1,750,000 gallons per day.

In order to take care of the peak summer load, a surfac storage tank is being built, to hold 210,000 gallons. Pumping will be out of this tank, 1,200 gallons per minute, during the late afternoon when lawns are pulling a lot of the water. The new storage tank will leave the regular reservoir full at all times, for use during a fire.

**Size Important In Selecting Home Freezer**

Is a home freezer on your list of home equipment to be bought during 1949?

If so, size is one of the important items to be considered in order to get the best returns for the money invested, according to specialists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Mrs. Bernice Clayton, extension home management specialist of Texas A&M College, says that an average of five or six cubic feet for each person in the family is a rough guide as to the correct size.

However, the right size depends a great deal on the way the freezer will be used, she explains. A city or suburban family may need only one to two cubic feet per person, since they usually store only commercially frozen food and ice cream. A farm family, on the other hand, freezes much of its yearly supply of home-produced food and may

need as much as 10 to 12 cubic feet per person. A cubic foot holds about 30 to 35 pounds of food.

It is better to over estimate on size, the specialists suggest, than to under estimate. For after a home freezer has been in use, families often find more uses for the unit than they might have planned at first. Larger units cost less per cubic foot than the smaller sizes.

Electric consumption by a home freezer varies with its size, use and location in the house, the specialists conclude. A 10 cubic foot freezer, under average conditions uses about 0 kilowatt hours a month. This figure, multiplied by the electric rate, will give you a rough idea of the monthly cost.

**Texas Farm & Home Egg Laying Contest Is Announced**

The Texas Farm and Home Egg Laying Contest for 1949 has made such an outstanding success that a new contest is being announced now for 1950, according to F. W. Martin, County Agent.

The contest will start Oct. 1, 1949, and will run until July 31, 1950. Closing date for receiving entries will be Sept. 15, 1949. Objectives of the contest are to get higher egg production on Texas farms; to demonstrate the value of keeping records in poultry production; to put poultry production on a sound business basis; to demonstrate the advantages of good breeding, feeding and management. The following rules and regulations will govern the contest: 1. Contest open to all poultry producers in Texas who own and manage 100 or more hens

of not more than two breeds or varieties, exclusive of ROP breeders. 2. Each contestant must certify to the number of chickens to be entered at the beginning of the contest. All pullets over four months old and hens on farm must be entered. 3. All entry blanks will be secured from the county agricultural agent or home demonstration agent by Sept. 15, 1949. Each contestant will be visited by the county agricultural agent or home demonstration agent within 30 days after Sept. 15, 1949. 4. All report forms will be supplied to the flock owner through the county agricultural agent or home demonstration agent's office. 5. All reports of contest must be submitted by the 5th of each month to the county agricultural agent or home demonstration agent of all eggs produced and number of hens culled, died, or disposed of in any manner for each month. The contestants' monthly reports will be sent to

the Extension Poultrymen, Texas A&M College, by the 10th of each month, where the state summaries will be tabulated. 6. Contest will be judged as to the number of eggs produced per hen. 7. Number of hen reported at the end of each month will be used in figuring eggs per hen for the following month. 8. A monthly summary of the contest will be broadcast over the Texas A&M College Farm & Home radio program. 9. Official contest will begin Oct. 1, 1949 and close July 31, 1950. During the month of July, a committee will visit each of the contestants in the first twenty places of the contest. 10. The prizes are: First—\$100.00. Second—\$75.00. Third—\$50.00. Fourth—\$35.00. Fifth—\$25.00. Sixth—\$20.00. Seventh—\$15.00. Eighth thru fifteenth—\$10.00 each.

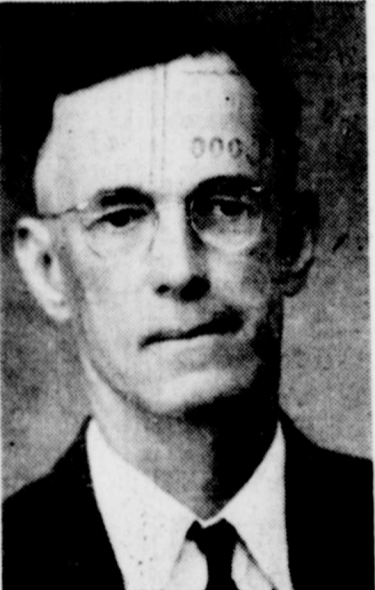

Proper Sowing of Seeds Produces Sturdy Plants With Minimum of Labor

Many gardeners in the Haskell area are already thumping their chests and boasting about "the best garden in the country."

Sunny weather the early part of last week enabled them to get their vegetable plots well under way. Adequate soil moisture, a distinct novelty for this area at this time of the year, has applied a rosy tint to gardening possibilities for the spring of 1949.

So, barring unforeseen weather or insect complications, the summer harvest of spicy green salads promises to break all records. Certainly the gardens are off to a good start.

A question which every home gardener should answer before he sows a seed this spring is: How many seeds should he sow for every plant he expects to grow.

It is not uncommon for a hundred seeds to be sown in space sufficient for ten plants. This means a crop reduced by crowding unless much work is expended on thinning out the excess plants. There is good reason for sowing more seeds than will be allowed to grow; but when this is overdone, there is a waste of seed and work. There is a proper way to plant them.

Seeds that germinate slowly such as carrots, parsley and parsnips, should be sown more thickly than others because the seedlings are feeble, and the force of many acting together helps break the soil crust and bring the sprouts to the surface.

Liberty H. Bailey, dean of horticultural teachers, expresses this opinion: Thinning is a process of selection, and the best are allowed to remain. It is evident the chances of securing the best are greater when the gardener sows one plant out of 10, rather than one plant out of three.

But real selection is impossible if seeds are sown so thickly the roots of the tiny plants become entangled and it is impossible to remove single plants without disturbing neighbors. The thickest sowing therefore should allow each seed sufficient space to develop as an individual.

The surest way with small seeds is to take a few in the hand and let them fall through the fingers into the drill which has been prepared. Get close to the ground and with a little practice you can quickly acquire control so that the seeds will be evenly distributed, each sufficiently distant from the next to prevent entanglement.

Keep the seeds in line as well as you can. It helps to let the garden line which was used in making the drill remain in place until the seeds have been dropped.

It helps also to mix the very small seeds with dry sand before you begin to sow, using two or three times as much sand as seed. This spreads the seeds out better.

Here are the vegetables you can safely plant at this time: Potatoes, asparagus, beets, cabbage, carrots, chard, lettuce, onions, peas, radishes and perhaps some varieties of beans.

Vegetables or any other crop can be produced only if the soil is fertile. Fortunately, most soils of this region are naturally quite fertile. To keep them that way and make them produce satisfactorily requires constant effort. Gardening being a rather intensive type of farming, naturally demands special attention to the fertility problem.

There are three general methods of acquiring soil fertility: (1) by the use of animal or poultry manures, (2) by using plant residues either through composting or by turning under green manures, and (3) by the use of commercial fertilizers.

Animal manures are, of course, by far the most satisfactory fertilizer material for this general section. For best results they should be well rotted and applied in the fall or winter. Generous applications up to 40 tons per acre or more, applied and turned under well in advance of the planting season, provides time for mellowing of the seed bed. In addition to this practice for the general garden, special crops respond to special treatments.

For example, the asparagus bed should be prepared with at least six inches of manure under the crown row to begin with and generous applications thereafter. Cucumbers and other heavy feeding vine crops respond to special applications of manure directly under each hill in addition to the general annual application.

Many Cases Measles And Chickenpox Reported In State

Measles and chicken pox have been widespread throughout the state during the past few weeks. In the week ending March 5th measles reached a total number of cases, 3909, that was the second highest in history. Chickenpox was almost twice the seven year median and Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer has stated that there is an unusual number of adults suffering from this so called "childhood" disease.

Both these diseases are extremely contagious, Dr. Cox said, and the strictest isolation and sanitation precautions are necessary to halt their spread. Dishes, toys, towels, or anything that has been around the patient can carry the germs to other members of the household, and all such articles should be thoroughly disinfected before handled by others susceptible to these diseases.

The State Health Officer recommended that a physician be called immediately when a child shows any beginning symptoms of chickenpox or measles, and that his advice be followed implicitly until complete recovery. Dangerous complications often accompany or follow measles, and a child may have his entire future health endangered unless

he receives competent care during his illness. It is not advisable to treat these childhood diseases too lightly, Dr. Cox said. They are sometimes responsible for nothing more than a few days discomfort, but we cannot count on that. They should be taken seriously, and receive a competent doctor's supervision and attention.

"Kill The Queens" To Rid Premises Of Cut Ants

The time to kill a colony of cut ants is when the colonies are weakest, when there aren't any young queens...

What ants are present are gathered in the central town, and the queens are found grouped together in a central cavity in the town.

The main town may be 15, 20 or even 100 feet in diameter, with many entrances leading from the surface to the underground cavities.

The smaller ant hills are connected to the main colony by underground passages, which may sometimes be a quarter of a mile long.

Another good method is to dig up a shovelful of dirt at the surface opening to the passage-way into the interior, then pour a barrelful of water down this passage-way.

In either case, whichever way you decide to kill the queens, the treatment may have to be repeated in three or four weeks.

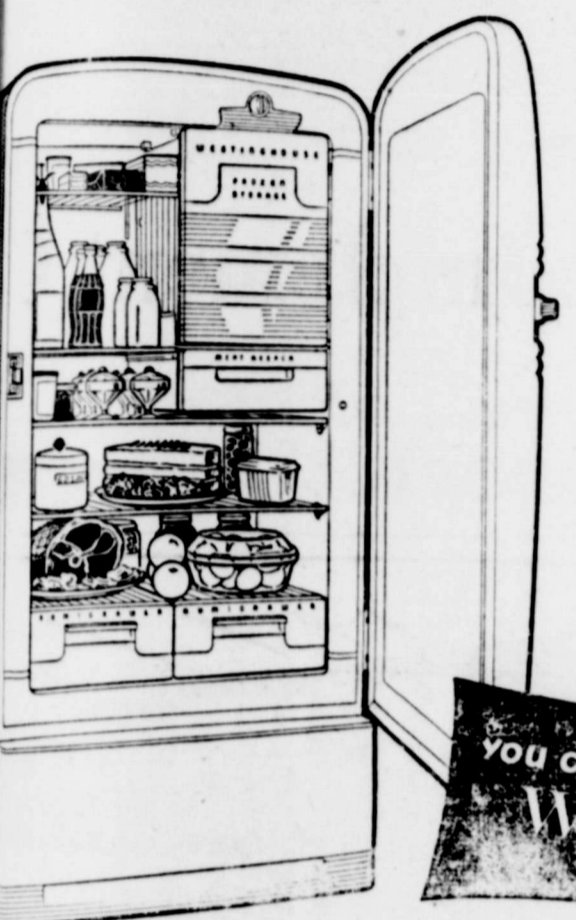

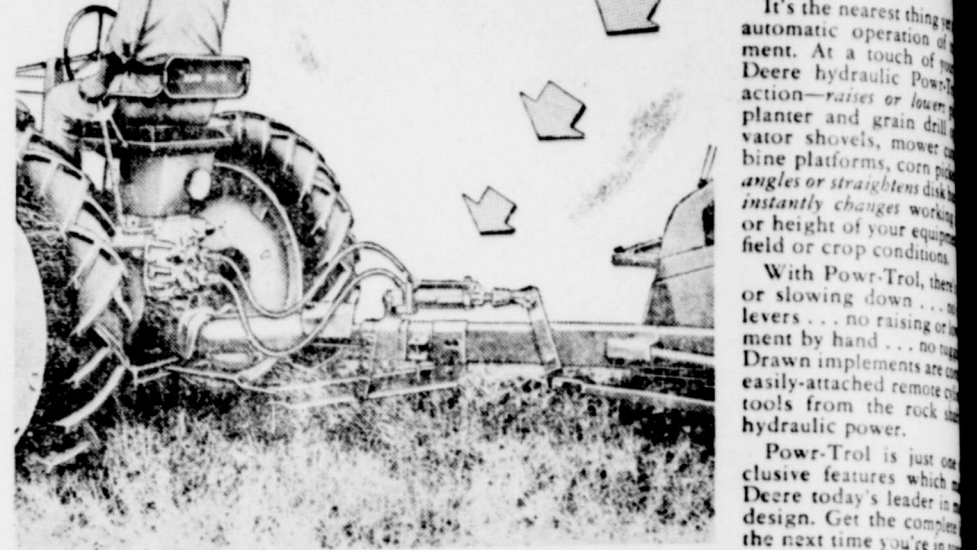

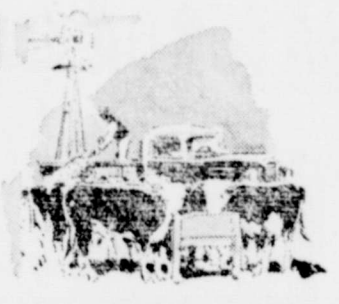

**Despite Passing of Its Founder, Famed Wichita Mountain Easter Sunrise Service Will Be Presented This Year**

LAWTON, OKLA.—The year has come which many persons have foreseen and dreaded—that in which the famed Wichita Mountain Easter Sunrise Service must be presented without the direction and inspiration of its founder, the late Mark Wallock.

Rev. Wallock, the quiet little minister whose spirit possessed more power than many combined purse, and intellects, passed away a few weeks ago—just as time was at hand to begin thinking of the 1949 Easter Service to be held April 17.

Rev. Wallock left such well-laid plans and such a definite idea as to how he conceived the service, no one doubts that it can be continued. But whether the citizens of Lawton can be brought together again under a united leadership of the type afforded by the "little minister" is the question which causes much shaking of the head.

Nevertheless, the many trained lieutenants which Mark Wallock designated are facing the task with great energy. Jimmy Hysaw, co-director of Lawton's Easter personnel association, states his belief that this year, and for a few years to come, the service can be continued as if Mr. Wallock were here.

To Hysaw and his fellow-director, Mayor George Hutchins of Lawton, fall the duty of training and supervising the activities of approximately 1,000 persons who will take part in the 1949 service. To Fred Larrance, former mayor and new president of the Easter Sunrise Service Association, falls the burden of leading the organizing of the finances and physical production of the massive spectacle. Dozens of other equally important names might be listed.

"The Prince of Peace" is the theme and title of the 1949 service, which as always depicts the life, death and resurrection of Christ. This year's production, automatically, has been dedicated to the memory of the founder of the service.

Several events connected with the Easter service this year might be pleasing to Rev. Wallock as he watches from above.

"The Lawton Story," a Hollywood production featuring the Wichita Mountain Service, will have its world premiere in Lawton, April 1. Proceeds from the premiere and subsequent showings promise to go far toward putting the great religious service on a sound financial basis—something which it has never as yet enjoyed. During all of Rev. Wallock's 25-year career with the service, it lived only a

hand-to-mouth existence.

Organ music, long a desire of the late director, will be heard from the mountainside for the first time this year. An Oklahoma City firm has offered to provide both an organ and an accompanist for the event.

Choir music, always impossible because of limited housing and sound facilities at Holy City, site of the service, will become a reality in 1949. An Easter choir, under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Bell and Morgan Roberts of Lawton, will soon begin rigorous practice. Rainbow girls from various cities in Southwestern Oklahoma have volunteered to take part in the 1949 service.

"The Prince of Peace" will contain 59 scenes. A music hour will begin at 12:00 midnight. The service proper will last from 4:00 a.m. until sunrise. From above a very special person will be watching. His spirit will be felt among all the participants and in the hearts of thousands of the hillside crowd. "Be with us Mark Wallock," they will all be hoping as they pray to their Maker that Easter will be the resurrection of Christ-like living.

**Junior Gardeners Will Compete For \$6,000 In Awards**

A new production for Texas junior vegetable gardeners, with \$6,000 in awards, has been announced by Chesley Hines, extension horticultural specialist, Mississippi State College, southern regional chairman of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association.

In announcing the NJVGA's 9th annual production-marketing contest, Hines pointed out that all Lone Star State boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 21 are eligible to compete for A&P Food Stores' \$6000 in agricultural scholarships. He added that such a program should be of particular value and interest to youthful gardeners of Texas where more than 364,000 farms in 1948 marketed crops valued at approximately \$1,082,200,000.

The NJVGA regional chairman also pointed out that such activities among the young farmers of the state are becoming increasingly important in view of the evergrowing population resulting in demands for more and better foods. He cited recent estimates indicating the nation has 148,000,000 people to feed now, as compared with 130,000,000 in 1940. He also pointed out that the average American is eating about 15 per cent more food than in pre-war years.

In view of the above, Mr. Hines said, it is more and more important that our young farmers learn as much as possible about improved production and more efficient marketing methods. The program of the NJVGA provides them with that opportunity.

All youths can enroll through their local 4-H Club leaders or agents, their instructors in vocational agriculture, or by writing directly to Mr. Hines at the Mississippi State College, State College, Miss.

Besides the production-marketing project, the 1949 NJVGA program again will include the annual national demonstration contest with trips and cash prizes offered by the W. Atlee Purpus Seed Co., of Philadelphia. These awards include trips to the annual NJVGA convention for those who score highest in the state contests, plus cash prizes to top performers in the national finals.

Texas winners in the 1948 NJVGA production-marketing contest were: Doris Marie Prater of Lubbock; Sally Jane Fitzgerald of Chireno; Myrlis Waters of Rio Hondo; and Margie Fogle and Josie Slaughter, both of Marshall.

**Questions and Answers**

Q.—Last year I got a GI loan on which VA made a 4 percent payment. I would like to know if I have to report the payment made by VA as income in my income tax report?

A.—No. While this VA payment is not taxable as income of the veteran, the amount of interest thereby paid may be listed by him as a deduction for tax purposes.

Q.—What is the deadline for starting a course of institutional on-farm training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, (Public Law)?

A.—You may apply for institutional on-farm training under Public Law 16 at any time after your discharge or separation from the armed services, but in time to complete your training by July 25, 1956.

**Bulletin On Home Buying Available To Veterans**

To furnish basic guidance to veterans buying or building a home, a 22-page leaflet "For the Home Buying Veteran" is available from the Dallas office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, 1114 Commerce St. at 5c per copy.

The new publication on veterans' housing was issued jointly by the Federal Housing Administration, the Office of the Housing Expediter and the VA. Ray L. Miller, regional director of the Department of Commerce said.

Home buying is a subject of vital concern to millions of veterans, Miller said. In this new publication, veterans are offered valuable information as to all phases of government assistance and are offered, as well, self-help suggestions for any purchase transaction.

We feel that this timely publication should be placed before as many veterans as possible in order that they may benefit from its information on government assistance and sound advice on purchasing homes, Miller said.
