Texas cotton growers are being urged by a state committee on insect control to begin fighting crop pests early. Since dusting should be started when cotton plants are chopped and plawed, insecticide manufacturers have moved up Texas shipment dates. Production of one Texas-recommended insecticide, toxaphene, which had sales of more than 30,000,000 pounds over the nation last year, has been stepped up to meet all the farmers' needs in 1949, the makers report. This early dusting campaign is being watched with interest throughout the Cotton South. VISIT IN DENTON

Experiment Show **Best Tomato Strains** For This Area

Some of the commonly consome of the commonly considered "old stand-bys" in tomato varieties may not necessarily be best suited for the western Texas growing season mato varieties may not necessarily be best suited for the western Texas growing season and climate, experiments in tomato growing at Texas Tech reveal.

Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department, said he and Dr. W. W. Yocum have recently concluded statistics on department experiment proving four varieties, Sioux, Porter's, Triumph, Porter's Pride and Firesteel outstanding in early production and total production.

Tomato-wise gardeners are already getting their plant boxes for tomatoes, Dr. Young said, and warned the new gardener preparation of boxes and setting of plants should begin now. The tomato plants actually take places in the garden after the last danger of frost which is us-ually after April 15, Dr. Young

The ten varieties tested in the 1948 growing season include Marglobe Rutgers, and Break-O-Day, the common tomatoes, and several new varieties chosen for resistance to tomato wilt, include Firesteel, Grothanm's Globe, Matchless, Pan Ameri-can Porter's Pride, Porter's Triumph and Sioux.

Individual yields were: Sioux, 7,336 pounds per acre; Porter's Triumph, 6.681 pounds; Firesteel, 5,816 pounds, and Porter's Pride, 5,764 pounds. The variety Break-O-Day, averages 5,554 pounds. Porter's Triumph began production about two weeks earlier than the others, and by Sept. 1 had produced about 769 pounds per acre.

Three replications were made in trial garden. The growing season was extremely hot and dry. unfavorable to best growth and production of tomatoes.

Dr. Young said the other five varieties in this test are late tomatoes. They were seriously curtailed in production by the hot, dry weather which caused their flowers to drop without setting any fruit until very late. Practically no fruit was harvested from any of these five varieties before Sept. 1.

Nena Roberson, assistant extension clothing specialist of Texas A&M College, says that laboratory studies show that several things decide how long a buttonhole will last. The number of stiches per inch the type of thread, the kind and quality of fabric and the kind of stitch used all affect the length of life of the buttonhole.

Purl buttonholes, made with machine like that used in commercial clothing manufacture and whip buttonholes, made with a home type sewing machine, were compared. One of the first things the tests showed was that the number of stitches per inch is important in making buttonholes that resist friction.

Increasing the number of stitches per inch-up to a certain point-made the buttonholes last still longer. For instance, whip buttonholes lasted considerably longer when the stitch number was raised from But when 17 to 37 per inch. more stitches were added, the buttonholes lasted only slightly longer, and in some cases, not

Another item of great importance shown in these tests was that buttonholes made with unmercerized thread lasted quite a bit longer than those made with mercerized thread, says Miss

That was not all. want to know more than that about buttonholes. So other tests were made. The kind of fabric and the kind of stitch used for buttonholes also made a big difference in the life of a buttonhole. In fabrics, you might think the high quality ones would wear better. Such was not the case. Medium quality percale held buttonholes longer than either high or low quality percale.







Johnson Grass Leads Field For Forage Yield

Johnson grass is just an all-around good grass. It seems to of high-quality forage. This includes, of course, the cool-sea-son grasses and legumes that may be grown in Johnson grass

This information comes from Robert R. Lancaster, extension pasture specialist of Texas A. and M. College. Idle Johnson grass land throughout the blacklands and elsewhere needs only fencing and stock water to make it available for leasing as hay or pasturage. So you do not need to apologize to anyone for growing Johnson grass for pasture or hay, says Lancaster, except those whose fields become infested by seed from it. Six steers grazed 11 acres of

fertilized Johnson grass for 5 months at the Texas Agriculture Experiment Substation at Tem-ple, and gained 1.58 pounds a day. This indicates a yield of more than four tons of green forage to the acre, or one-fourth as much on a dry-matter basis. Results from these experiment station tests show that early-cut Johnson grass hay is richer in protein, phosphorus and total nutrients. In addition to a summer graze of Johnson grass equivalent to one ton of 10 per cent protein a cool-season crop of oats and sweet clover can follow. Lancaster says this would be expected to yield approximately two tons of 20 per cent protein on a dry-matter basis.

If you figure on leaving the Johnson grass for grazing, make a pasture out of it and fertilize with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 or 400 pounds of 6-10-0 of cemmer-cial fertilizer to the acre until a legume gets well established, suggests Lancaster.

Here is this pasture specialist's idea about seeding Johnson grass. If a field in an infested area already has too much Johnson grass to be farmed, but not yet a full stand, the bare spaces might as well be seeded to a complete pasture. Of course, in a clean-farmed area every plant

of it should be killed out. Summing it up, Lancaster says, if you have a good stand, use it, but if it's only scattered around, kill it out.
