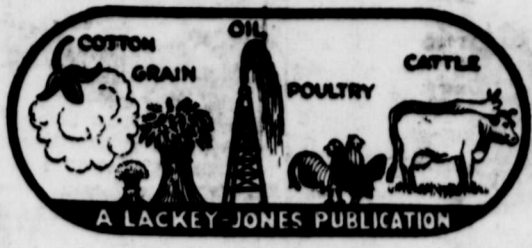

The ball and parade will be in connection with Fiesta-cade, the outdoor spectacle which will depict the highlights of the past century in the Ft. Worth area.

The parade, scheduled for July 15 at 2 p.m., will feature "then and now" floats winding through downtown Fort Worth. Antiquated methods of transportation, ox-carts, wagon trains, stage coaches, and surreys, will be mixed with the modern. Many Ft. Worth business firms and organizations and other from out of the city are planning their parade entries which will vie for \$250 in prizes. Two nights after the opening of Fiesta-cade in Farrington Field, the high school football stadium, the Century Ball will be held at Lake Worth Casino. Nine cities, Wichita Falls, Hillsboro, Albany, Bowie, Waco, Denton, Sherman, Graham, and Ennis, have accepted invitations to name special days at Fiesta-cade. Each will select a queen to reign over Fiesta-cade for one night, and several plan to bring bands for concerts prior to the spectacle.

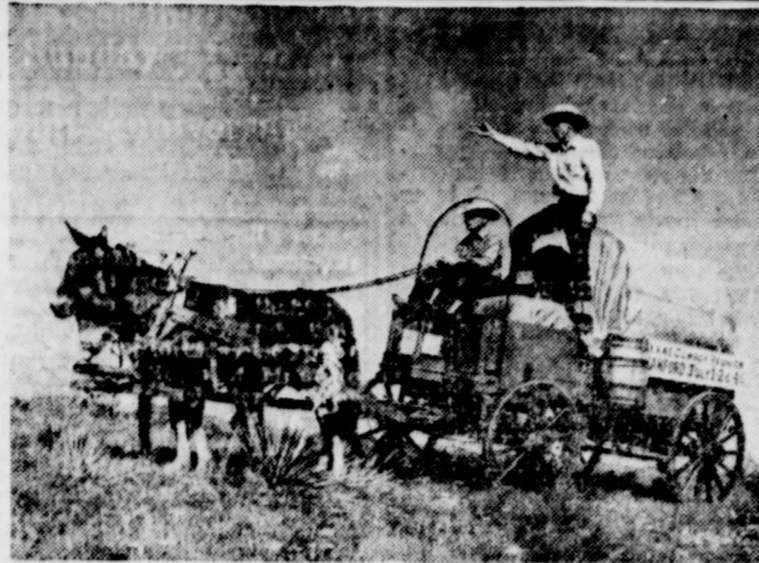

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

ment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for the retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

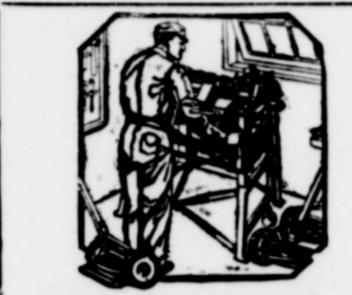

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may be provided for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballot shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. 25-4tc

lution recommending that any increase in the tax revenues from natural resources be used only to finance permanent improvements, such as rural roads, soil conservation, permanent buildings for Eleemosynary and other State Institutions not other wise provided for. "We intend to continue to press for the adoption of a 10-year plan, supplying 40 million each year, which is necessary to adequately serve the farms and ranches of Texas with low cost all-weather rural roads," said

Jim Cantrell, Collin County banker and President of the Texas Rural Roads Association. He added, "We firmly believe that our natural resources are our most valuable capital asset and that any additional tax revenues derived from this source, should be placed back into a capital investment to be expended only upon permanent improvements, such as rural roads, soil conservation and public and institutional buildings."

"The rural people of Texas are grateful to the legislature for the 15 million dollar per year appropriation, which will enable the Texas Highway Department to carry on the present Farm-to-Market road program, but we must bear in mind this appropriation is only for the next biennium and is not adequate for the purposes we have in mind," Cantrell said. "Regardless of our present abundant supply of natural resources, Texas is basically an agriculture State. When these irreplaceable resources are exhausted, we will realize the value of farming to our economy. The rural population of the important farming areas is constantly decreasing," Mr. Cantrell continued, "and the principal reason for this decrease is the deplorable condition of our country rural roads."

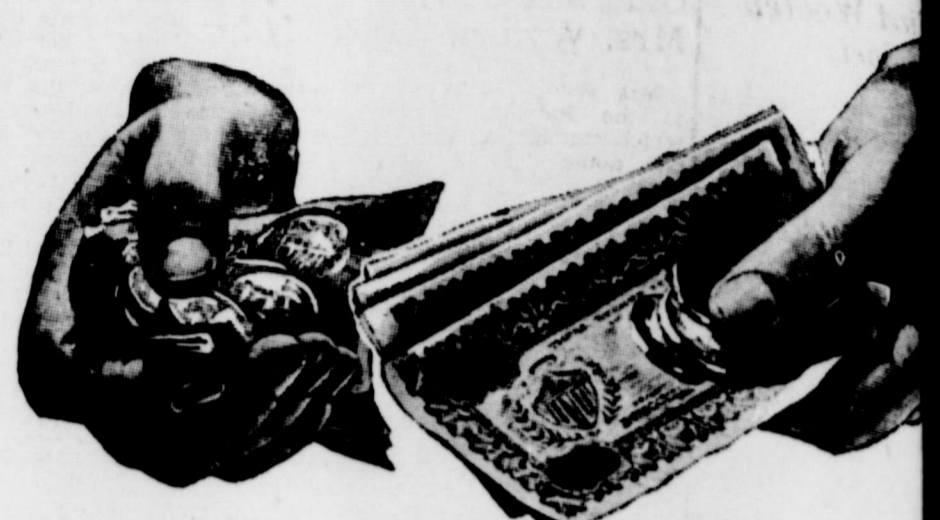

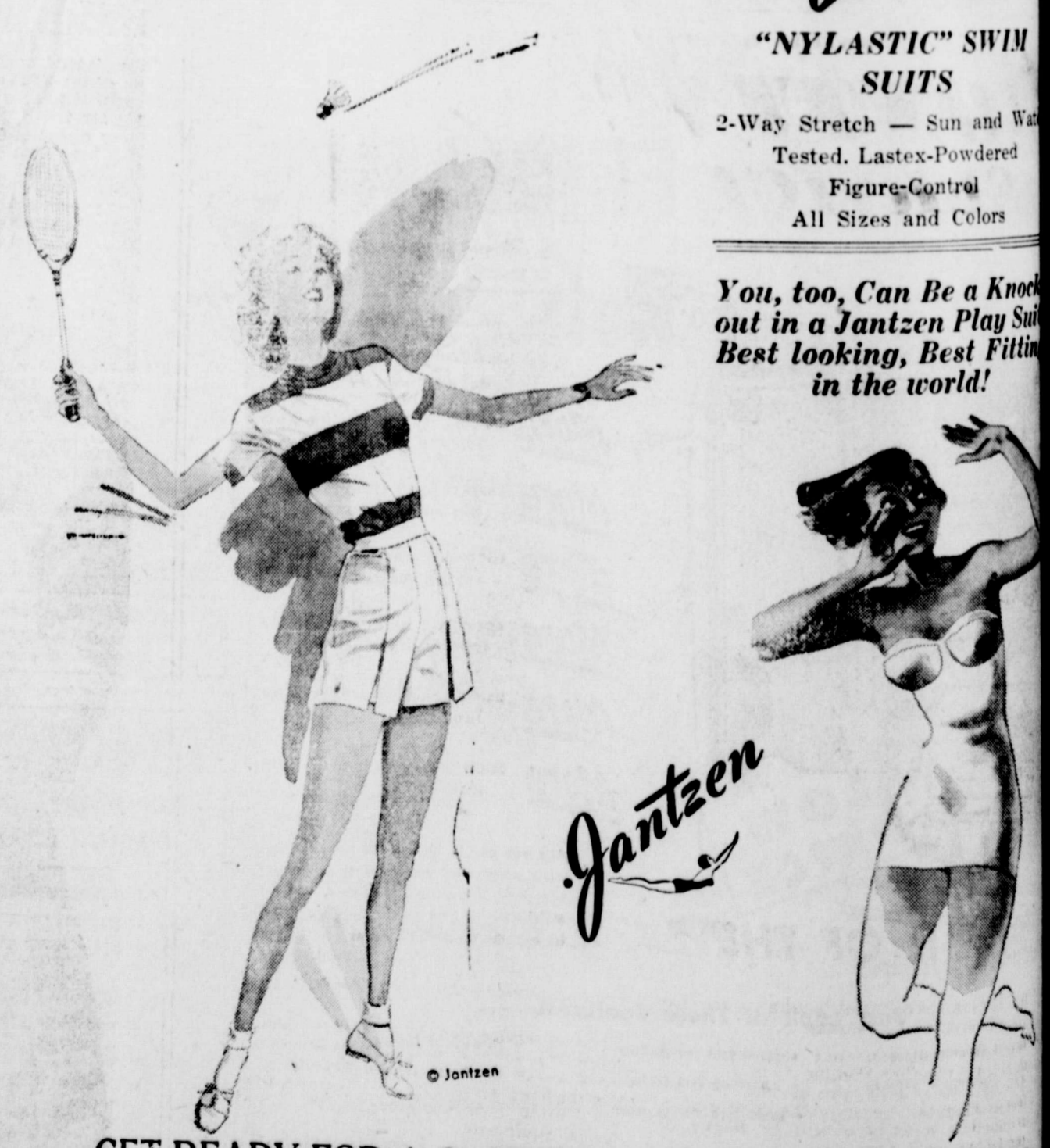

Stored Grain Is Subject to Damage From Insects

Those tiny insects in your grain bin may be small, but they do a tremendous lot of damage to stored grain. That's the word from the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. The first place to start getting rid of them is right inside the bin itself. By doing a good job of bin cleaning, and afterward spraying with 5 per cent DDT before the newly harvested grain is put in, you can go a long way toward killing out the hold-over infestation. Also you're giving the new grain a chance to escape damage. Dr. H. C. Johnson, head of the Texas A&M College department of entomology, says these tiny insects get one out of every eight bushels of farm stored grain in Texas. Missouri loses one bushel in ten, according to 1948 figures. But in that same year, the national loss average to insects was one in twenty. So, Texas is practically at the top of the "high loss" list. Entomologists point out that grain losses can be lowered quite a bit by harvesting the grain as soon as it's dry enough for safe storage and by storing it in wear-tight bins that have been made insect free by a thorough cleaning and spraying. Then after you've got all the grain in storage, check it now and then to see if the bugs are getting into it. If they are, fumigate with a mixture of ethylene dichloride and carbon tetrachloride at the rate of 3 to 6 gallons per 1,000 bushels, depending on how tight the storage bin is, Dr. Johnson says. Stored grain insects take 300 million bushels of the nation's total production every year. That much gain is worth a lot of today's prices. So Texas has a long way to go in cutting down her share of the 300 million bushels the insects get, he concludes.

False Notions Hinder Texas Cancer Control

False notions about the causes of cancer are hindering cancer control in Texas to a great extent. J. Louis Neff, executive director of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, said recently. "Unfortunately, we do not yet know exactly what does cause the dreaded disease," Mr. Neff said. "What we do know, however, is that certain old fashioned ideas about cancer are not true. It is a great misfortune that so much about cancer is cloaked in ignorance and fear."

The executive director stated, with emphasis, that cancer is not caused by a single severe injury, or by the use of aluminum cooking utensils, or by electric refrigeration, or by any particular food or combination of foods, or by the use of alcohol, or by kissing or by any other form of contact between persons or between persons and animals.

"These versions of what causes cancer are all old wives tales," and the more we of the American Cancer Society can do to discredit these false notions and bring the true facts about the disease to the people of the state, the sooner it will be that Texas conquers cancer.

"Cancer is not caused by a germ or infection. It is neither contagious or infectious. Nor is cancer necessarily hereditary. Evidence indicates that children may inherit a certain degree of susceptibility which would make them more alert to warning signals. But there is no reason to assume that children will inevitably die of cancer because one or more parents die of the disease."

The American Cancer Society official pointed out that cancer results when certain body cells rebel against the orderly process of growth and start off on a rampage of lawless expansion, destruction, and death. What causes this wild and destructive growth is not known. "Until we do find the causes of cancer and develop additional methods of treatment," he concludes, "we must fight cancer with what we now know."

Simple Rules Tell How To Fight Polio at Home

With polio a very real and possible danger to people of Haskell the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis lists the following easy to follow health rules for children:

- 1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food tightly covered and safe from flies or other insects.

Doctors have listed the following symptom of the dreaded poliomyelitis: headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, and unexplained fever. Should polio strike in your family, call a doctor immediately. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment by qualified medical personnel often prevent serious crippling.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

1. Are there any figures to show the effects of treating stock cattle with DDT?

Yes. Kansas State College has put out a bulletin giving actual results in test demonstrations using DDT to control the horn fly. More than two million cattle were successfully treated with DDT for horn flies during the 1946 grazing season. These cattle gained about 50 lbs. a head more than untreated cattle. According to this, horn flies were causing a loss of at least 10 million dollars annually to Kansas cattlemen.

2. What is a pedigree registry certificate, and how does it differ from a breeding certificate?

A pedigree registry certificate certifies that an animal is accepted as eligible for registration in its breed while a breeding certificate merely associates and is bred as stated, certifies that the signer's bull, stallion, boar or ram served the specified female on a certain date.

3. What is the proper age for breeding a Jersey heifer? Tests made over a period of years at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that it is better to breed heifers according to body size rather than age. A Jersey heifer weighing 900 lbs. is fully big enough to breed. Jersey heifers at the Purina Research Farm usually reach this weight by 12 months of age.

Texas Farmers Who 'Double Up' Increase Profits

Every farmer suspects that he "should be twins" to get all of his work done. It is a fact, says A. L. Ward, educational director, National Cottonseed Products Association, that the cotton grower who is a "twin," by being a livestock producer also, profits more.

"By using the feed products of his cotton crop — cottonseed meal, or cake, and hulls — the cotton farmer gets added value from his cottonseed, his grains and pastures, and his time and labor," Ward says.

Cottonseed hulls, which com-

pare in feeding value to average grass hays, can now be bought in many areas for less than it costs to put up hay, and cottonseed meal also is relatively cheap compared with other feeds or with the value of meat and dairy products.

"The abundance and low cost of cottonseed feed products offers an opportunity for many Cotton Belt farmers to increase their income through fattening livestock for home use and sale, and through dairy production," Ward continued. "It also is an opportunity for reducing costs of producing livestock and dairy products through wider use of these feeds in better-balanced rations."

New Drug Helps In Reduction of Blood Pressure

The University of Pennsylvania has announced the development of a new drug which doctors say has been used to bring about decrease in blood pressure. Penn's school of medicine said the drug, technically known as dihydroergocornine, was developed by four university physicians engaged in the drive to combat heart and circulatory diseases — the nation's number one killer.

For the first time, the university said, this "favorable combination of effects has been observed."

- (1) "The spasm of the brain blood vessels which accompanies high blood pressure can be released."
(2) "The blood pressure of the body is lowered."
(3) "There are no unfavorable effects on the patient."

The university announcement said the drug, developed from a fungus which sometimes grows on rye and other grasses, is injected into the muscles and temporarily lowers general blood pressure.

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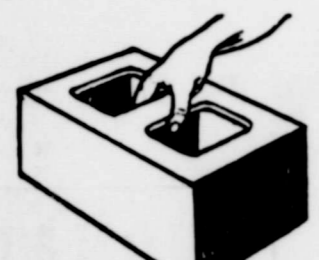

Texas Own Garner State Park Is Choice Spot To Spend Vacation

As you search for a vacation spot this summer, don't overlook the choice playgrounds right here in Texas.

Nestled in the wooded hills of South Texas, about twenty-six miles north of Uvalde, is Garner State Park. Travelers from New York to Los Angeles have made it their vacation destination, the visitors' register reveals.

This vast, 641-acre state park is a study in contrasts. The flat plains bordering the mirror-like Frio River abruptly become a rugged, forest-covered mountains.

You can scramble up and down slopes over narrow trails or you can drive over eleven miles of

excellent road that winds along the mountain sides and follows the river's edge.

You can fish or swim in the Frio, or if you want less energetic sports, a broad breezy concrete patio behind the headquarters building is made to order for lounging and dancing. Perhaps you like to "rough it." In that case you can roll up in a blanket on the banks of the river or cook your meals over an open fire.

For those who prefer their vacations with the comforts of home, there are rustic cabins complete with fireplace, kitchen and shower.

Varying in depth from ankle high to well over the head, the Frio River is rock-bottomed, spring-fed stream. In spite of its name the river is warm and boasts several good swimming spots. At one point about fifty yards wide, solid rock stretches across the river and forms a miniature falls.

Anglers claim that swimmers have no effect on fishing. With everything from cane poles with a worm on the hook to rods, reels and fancy gaiters, the fishermen go after the bass, bream, channel cat and perch in the river.

Though the river is the center of attraction, visitors may wander over the trails in the park either on foot or horseback. The trails are marked by orange painted symbols -- a horseshoe or a foot -- burned into blackened cypress stumps. The hiking and bridle paths twist up the mountains into dense forests.

The highest peak in Uvalde County, 2,008 feet high, is at the end of one trail. Another trail leads to the park cave -- sometimes called Barking Lizard Cave. The cave got its name from the odd creatures that dwell inside -- lizards that make a sound like a barking hound, are about four feet long and look like a Gila monster.

There are eighteen cabins with rates ranging from \$3.50 to \$6 a day.

You can rent horses at the riding stable and incase you can't ride, you can rent a bicycle.

The park headquarters are centrally located in a cool cypress grove. Playground equipment for children is there. Built of native white stone, the building contains the park office, locker rooms, a soft drink counter and restaurant. In the dining room a huge fireplace and rough cypress paneling add a rustic air. The mantel of the fireplace is made from a solid piece of cypress about fourteen feet long. Wrought iron chandeliers hang from the ceiling and the floor is inlaid with beautiful decorated tile.

At the rear of the building is the dance terrace. Thursday night is set aside for square dancing.

One area of the park is especially for campers. There is wood for your camp fire, picnic tables and water taps.

Land for the park was purchased from the private owners by Uvalde County. The work of building headquarters, maintenance buildings and cottages and in laying out and paving roads was begun by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1935, at the park, named in honor of Uvalde's John Nance Garner, was not opened to the public until May of 1941.

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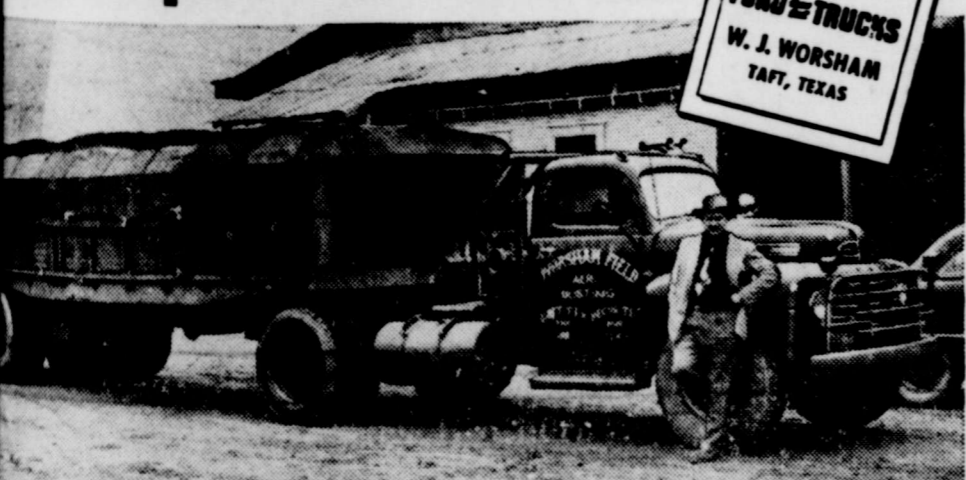

Former Sgt. Gordon Gilleland Re-Enlists In U. S. Army

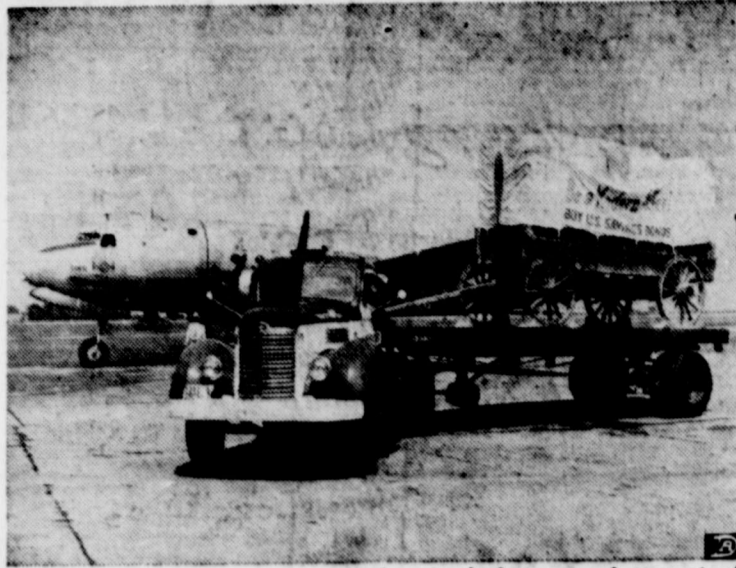

Mixture of Rising and Falling Prices Shown In Southwest Farm Markets

Southwest farm markets presented a mixture of rising and falling prices during the past week. The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports:

Sorghum grain prices dropped 10 cents a hundred pounds for the week, and wheat and barley about the same. Oats and corn advanced 3 to 5 cents. No. 1 wheat closed Monday at \$2.03 1/2 to \$2.11 1/2 at Texas common points. No. 2 white corn sold at \$1.73 to \$1.74, yellow corn \$1.62 to \$1.64, and milo \$2.25 to \$2.35.

Prospects of another large rice crop together with large remaining stocks from the last crop weakened rice markets again last week. Corn feeds and oilseed meals sold lower last week while most other feedstuffs prices advanced. Unfavorable weather last week held back haying and caused a great deal of loss and damage to hay. Peanut prices held steady, as planting of the new crop neared completion.

The Methodist Church of Weinert will begin its Vacation Bible School on Wednesday, June 22nd, and run through July 1st. Class time will be from 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. Mrs. U. P. Terrell, a teacher in the public school at Weinert and Superintendent of the Children's Division of the Weinert Methodist church will supervise the work. She will be assisted by Mrs. M. A. McMinn and Nadine Weinert, who will teach the beginners; Mrs. G. L. Walker and Emma Walker, the primary group; Mrs. L. W. Tucker, the juniors; and Mrs. E. D. Earles, the intermediates.

Eggs strengthened slightly at Denver during the week, and sold about steady in the southwest. Prices of hens declined 2 to 4 cents a pound at Denver and 1 to 2 cents at Dallas. Fryers lost 4 cents at Denver and 1 in north-west Arkansas.

Leading markets received fewer livestock of all kinds last week than the week before. A third less sheep arrived in Texas and Oklahoma than a week earlier and less than half as many as a year ago. Wholesale dressed meat prices declined mostly \$2 to \$4 for the week at New York. Pork hogs fell \$7 to \$8 and lamb \$5 to \$12.

Cows, calves and bulls recorded losses of \$1 to \$2 from a week ago at southwest markets, with fed classes unchanged to \$1 lower. Medium to good killing calves ranged from \$22 to \$23 at Denver, while good and choice grades brought \$24 to \$26 at Oklahoma City and \$23 to \$26 at Fort Worth.

Monday's strong hog market reduced the week's losses at Texas terminals to around 50 cents. Oklahoma City showed little change on butchers but sows and pigs lost \$1. Butcher hogs gained up to \$1 at Denver, but most sows sold unevenly lower. Top butchers closed Monday at \$29 at Denver and \$20.75 at Fort Worth.

Sheep and lambs closed Monday unchanged to \$1 lower compared to the very weak market the Monday before. Good spring lambs brought \$23 at Texas markets. Good and choice natives sold at \$27.50 to \$28 at Denver. Goats lost 25 to 50 cents.

This is the smallest summer enrollment in McMurry college since the close of the recent war. Of this group approximately 90 will complete their degree requirements for graduation September 2. Many others are teachers taking various types of refresher courses.
