

Most seriously injured was Tom largruder, 17, who was rendered anconscious for several hours with a near skull fracture; Bobby Jean Magruder, 14, arm and noulder injuries; O. B. Thomas,

Salt Deficiency

consequences, and for this reason, it's Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, advises every person whose work is such that it causes excessive perspiration to add a pinch of ordinary table talt to each drink of water taken during the day.

Farmers, mechanics, carpenters, onstruction men and all others whose work cause them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content seriously depleted, and as a result may suffer from heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat, and when the thermometer hits the high register, the human body may lose as much as 40 to 50 grams of salt during a single day.

In many industrial plants, workmen are furnished with and urged to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water Many find this a pleasant way of taking extra salt, but others prefer to add the needed amount of extra salt to their food and drink. "Take your extra salt in any

manner that is agreeable to yo says Dr. Cox, "but take it. Heat cramps are very painful and exhausting. They are characterized by cramps in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases there may be nausea and vomiting. Body salt losses occur
