The couple spent most of the day Saturday unraveling the red tape connected with the new requirements, they related to O'Neal when they presented the required certificates at his office about 11 o'clock Saturday night. The clerk had obligingly agreed to come to his office at the late hour, after the couple had told him their plans earlier in the day. Next on their schedule was a trip to the office of Justice of the Peace C. K. Jones, who performed the ceremony for the determined young couple.

During the first four days of October, before the new law became operative, County Clerk O'Neal issued five wedding licenses, he reported. Ordinarily in the past, his office issued an average of around 20 licenses each month, he said.

## INDIANS KEEP RECORD INTACT WITH 14-12 WIN OVER STAMFORD BULLDOGS FRIDAY NIGHT

Extra point kicks by Tommy Rhoads, dependable Haskell center, turned the tide in favor of the Haskell Indians over the Stamford Bulldogs Friday night when the Warriors invaded the Stamford stadium and won 14-12 over the traditionally strong Bulldogs squad, always a nemesis to the Indians in the district race.

Although there was no question as to the best team on the field, as proven by game statistics, doubts as to the final winner were kept foremost in the minds of an estimated 2800 fans during sixty minutes of playing time. And the game will go into the books as a classic exhibition between two determined teams who played for keeps. The win left the Indians undefeated for the season and leading District 6-A East with two conference wins. It was the fifth straight loss for the Bulldogs.

Statistics of the game showed the Indians with 15 first downs to 9 for Stamford; Haskell gained 200 yards rushing to Stamford's 156; the Indians completed two passes for a total of 66 yards in

## Programs Arranged for Observance of Oil Progress Week In Haskell, Oct. 16-22

Extensive plans for observance of Oil Progress Week from October 16 to 22 in Haskell as part of the nationwide observance of the week, are being made by oil products distributors and oil companies here, it was disclosed today by Thos. B. Roberson, distributor for Magnolia products and chairman of the committee in charge of oil industry activities for the week in Haskell.

Highlighting the program will be the showing of films dealing with oil discovery and production, and talks before civic groups, high school students, and the general public by L. J. Hardin of Fort Worth, an executive of a major oil company.

Mr. Hardin will be guest speaker at the Tuesday noon meeting of the Haskell Lions Club, and he will show color films of deep sea drilling for oil, and a feature short, "The Last 10 Feet", which depicts the final stages of "bringing in" an oil well.

Mr. Hardin will also make two appearances before science students in Haskell high school Tuesday morning and Tuesday afternoon, illustrating his talks with film.

Tuesday night in the high school auditorium, colored films will be shown in a program arranged for the general public. Various phases of the search for oil, and the many related activities connected with the industry will be depicted in an interesting and educational way by Mr. Hardin.

"In as many ways as possible oil men will tell their friends and neighbors, the citizens of Haskell, how the oil industry has contributed to our high standards of living," said Mr. Roberson who is planning the program. "For example, the productivity of the individual American results largely from use of machines employing the energy contained in petroleum.

"It is significant that the 90 years of greatest progress in America coincide with the nine decades of petroleum history," he added.

"The discovery of oil at Titusville, Pr., in 1859, was like the opening of a treasure chest. Since that day we have all benefitted by a never ceasing flow of inventions which owe their development and use partially or wholly to petroleum. Today, oil, its 1,200 products and the machinery and goods which they make possible, contribute to the well-being and high living standards of citizens in this and every American community.

"Petroleum enters into virtually every form of transportation and the making or operation of almost every piece of manufactured goods we use. It enables American farmers to out-produce those of any other country. Oil means something good to every one of us every day."

## Ideal Weather Speeds Cotton Picking; 3,012 Bales Ginned

Gathering of Haskell county's cotton crop made progress this week, with producers favored by ideal weather conditions which permitted almost full time work by crews who have been prevented from getting into the fields in early morning because of damp weather during the past ten days.

The crop is reaching maturity fast, County Agent Martin reported Thursday morning, with a considerable amount of the late cotton beginning to open in the immediate Haskell territory.

Haskell's five gins have begun operating at almost maximum capacity and up to Thursday morning had turned out a total of 3,012 bales from the 1949 crop. Some of the gins have found it necessary to continue operations on a 24-hour schedule to handle the inflow of cotton, and all local establishments will be taxed to full capacity within the next week or ten days to handle the harvest.

Scarcity of pickers continued to be a growing problem with farmers, although more laborers are coming to this section daily, but the supply of workers is still far from adequate, farmers declare.

## Carnival Worker Found Dead From Heart Attack

Frank Baker, age about 65 years, an employee of a carnival company booked here during the Central West Texas Fair, was found dead about 6 a. m. Sunday, slumped on his cot in the fairgrounds. Other employees who were preparing to move the last of the show equipment from the grounds, noticed the lifeless body and notified officers. Sheriff R. M. Cousins investigated, and an inquest verdict of death from natural causes was returned by Justice of the Peace C. K. Jones, who assisted in the investigation.

Baker apparently had suffered a heart attack shortly after helping dismantle the shows on the fairgrounds after closing of the carnival at midnight Saturday, officers said. Earlier in the week, the showman had been admitted to the Haskell County hospital for treatment of a heart ailment, and had resumed work with the carnival company.

Fellow employees said Baker joined the shows in June of this year in the state of Colorado, but knew little else about the aged man, nor whether he had any living relatives. Papers in Baker's clothing indicated that he held membership in the Heart of Americas Showmans Club in Kansas City, but representatives of that organization when contacted, could furnish no further information.

The body was taken in charge by Holden Funeral Home, and funeral rites were conducted Tuesday at 3 p. m. in the Holden Chapel by Rev. W. T. Priddy, pastor of the East Side Baptist church. Interment followed in Willow cemetery.

## Rule Farmer Hurt Under Plow Dies From Injuries

Injuries received when he fell from a tractor and was run over by the machine and an attached disc plow, resulted in the death of C. M. Baird, 65, prominent farmer of the Pinkerton section. He died Monday at 6:45 p. m. in the Haskell County hospital, where he had been under treatment since the accident, which occurred Oct. 3.

Mr. Baird had farmed in Haskell county since 1921, coming to West Texas from his native Oxford, Miss. He is survived by his widow, a daughter, Fern Baird of Rule; three sons, Wynn of Amherst, Texas, Conrad and Boyd Baird, both of Haskell; four brothers, W. R. Baird of Abilene, Miss., G. H. Baird of Oxford, Tenn., and J. T. Baird of Santa Anna, Texas; two sisters, Mrs. B. V. Roberts of Oxford and Mrs. A. G. Freeman of Lambert, Miss.

The farm accident was discovered by a neighbor farmer, Bonner Ingram, who noticed the driverless tractor circling in the field. He went to the Baird home and was told by the daughter her father was plowing. He and the daughter went to the field and found Mr. Baird lying unconscious.

Mr. Baird later said the tractor hit a rock and pitched him off and ran over him. He then lay paralyzed with fear as he watched the machine circle and pass over his body the second time. The attached plow was not lowered into the ground or he would have been killed on the spot.

Funeral service for Mr. Baird was held Tuesday at 3 p. m. at the First Methodist church in Rule, with the pastor, Rev. W. B. Baker officiating. Burial was in Rule cemetery under the direction of Gaunt Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Thurman Lusk, Bonner Ingram, John Behringer, Joe Cloud, Bailey Miller, Leroy Casey, Claude Ashley and John Williams.

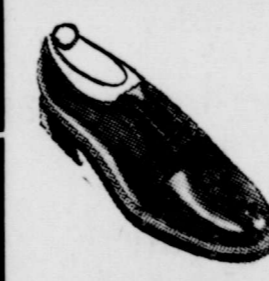

Accidental Injuries Carry Threat of Lockjaw Infection

Lockjaw or tetanus, is a very serious disease caused from a tiny germ that looks like a stick with a ball on one end—something like a microscopic lollipop, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This ball is called a spore and it is the seed of the germ. Lockjaw germs are found in soil, especially in manured soil of the barnyard or garden; in blank cartridges; etc.—in fact just about everywhere. These germs grow best in wounds where there is considerable tissue destruction and in which chips of glass, wood splinters, or grains of dirt have been embedded.

Every accident seen by the physician must be considered from the lockjaw angle; and whenever there is any question, tetanus antitoxin should be given, for it is the antitoxin that has helped to keep the incidence of lockjaw at its low level. Your physician will advise you as to its use. Its disadvantages are that it gives only temporary protection; it does not get rid of the lockjaw germs in the wound; and it does sometimes cause hives and other disagreeable symptoms for a few days,

particularly if the subject has had previous injections. Should lockjaw develop, it requires much antitoxin and entails great expense; and even then not all cases can be saved.

It is not possible to free the environment of lockjaw germs, but now there is a method of active immunization. The subject becomes his own manufacturing establishment for antitoxin to combat lockjaw poison.

One nice feature about the treatment is that it can be combined with diphtheria and whooping cough prophylaxis. The con-

current immunization is, preferably, carried out in infancy. Should a child already have had his diphtheria toxoid and whooping cough vaccine injections, he can take the lockjaw toxoid injections alone; and these can be given at any time with very little discomfort.

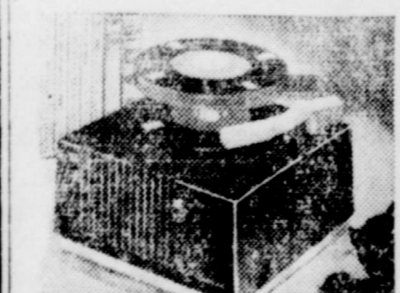

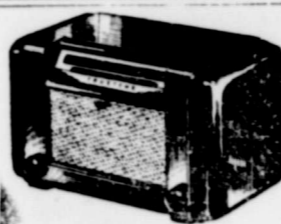

**USDA Offers Free Marketing Service Aids to Farmers**

There is available to Texas cotton farmers four services from the U. S. Department of Agriculture that should help them sell their crop for the highest prices, says John L. McCollum, manager of the Production and Marketing Administration office in Dallas.

Issued every week end is a cotton market review that shows the demand, mill activity, movement, parity price and price of Middling 15-16 inch in the principal southwest markets.

During the ginning season two other services also go out weekly, farmers cotton price quotations and a cottonseed review. The quotation sheet shows what the various grades and staple lengths are bringing at key Texas markets and helps a farmer figure what his cotton is worth, either for the open market or for the government loan. The cottonseed review shows high, average and low grades of seed by principal producing counties and the price farmers are being paid per on.

Mailed every two weeks during the ginning season is a quality report which shows the percentages of cotton in each grade and staple lengths ginned in the various cotton districts of the state. It also shows whether cotton was reduced in grade because of rough preparation.

McCollum says they are yours for the asking and buyers, shippers, ginners and others who handle cotton are also eligible to receive them.

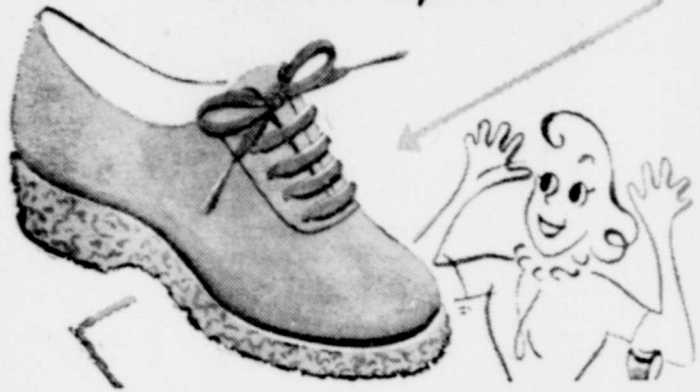

**VA Announces Health Waiver on GI Insurance**

World War II veterans with service-connected disabilities were reminded by Veterans Administration today of an important deadline in connection with their entitlement to National Service Life Insurance.

Prior to January 1, 1950, such disabilities actually incurred in Service between October 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945, if less than total in degree, are disregarded in determining eligibility under the health requirements for National Service Life Insurance purposes.

This means that veterans who might not otherwise qualify for life insurance for health reasons may reinstate lapsed National

Service Life Insurance or buy new or additional insurance up to the \$10,000 maximum if they apply before the end of the year.

A physical examination is required, however, for all insurance applied for under this special provision. Such examinations are made by Veterans Administration without cost to the veteran.

Retirement benefits are payable to the worker and certain members of his family when he reaches the age of 65 and is no longer working under Social Security. Survivors' benefits are payable to eligible members of the insured workers' family in case he died at any age. No benefits can be paid unless a claim is filed with the social security office.
