ARANAMA COLLEGE.

The properties of this institution lately founded at Galveston, by the Presbytery Church of Western Texas, will be found in this day's paper. The location of the College is the result of several years preparatory investigation, and will doubtless give satisfaction to all persons who feel an interest in the matter. In a prospective point of view, Galveston is unrivaled in our portion of the State, as a site for an institution of learning, and we have no doubt that the College will become worthy of the Church and of the State—a nursery of learning and piety. In the choice of a name for this institution, however, we think decidedly bad taste has been displayed. In this Democratic State, it has long been a source of regret to many persons that so many of our beautiful towns and streams, here Mexican names, and the application of such a name to an institution of this kind, destined to train and develop the youthful mind of the State, unless for some special and patriotic reason, is certainly in bad taste, for the adoption of this name to such cause excited—certainly none such as should have influenced the Presbyterian Church. With the name of *Galveston*, however, the place of the location of the College, the case is very different. That name is famed in the history of Texas, as the scene of many patriotic deeds, and the martyrdom of many of our countrymen in the cause of liberty, and is thus endeared to the people of the State. Hence, had the institution been called the "College of *Galveston*," a sympathetic desire for its success, would have been awakened in the hearts of the people, and the name alone, would have given it honor and popularity besides the practical advantage of the name already known throughout the Union, making the *locality* of the College known wherever it should be read or spoken, which is an item of much importance. As citizens of Texas, we should feel a much greater desire for the prosperity of the institution were the name changed. *Aren't we*, in the name of the old Mexican buildings in which the Colleges to be opened, the remains of a part of that system of tyranny that has cast Mexico and Texas so much blood.

IMPROVEMENTS AT POWDER HORN.—The schooner Ariape, Shepherd, master, arrived at Powder Horn Bayou, on Tuesday, from Bayou La Fourche, Louisiana, with one hundred and eighty-five thousand feet of cypress lumber, for Messrs. Nodaffro, Spence & Co., designed for the wharf, warehouse and other buildings now commencing there.

The fine schooner has been purchased by these gentlemen, expressly to bring lumber for the works and improvements at that important point, and with another, will be constantly employed in that business alone. The necessary improvements will be completed to enable the largest vessels to discharge their cargoes directly on the wharves, this fall. We had these owners with satisfaction, and look upon them as the beginning of good things, that shall redound to the permanent glory of Western Texas. The improvement of that part of Indiana, will now go steadily forward.

A LAND OF CROWNS.—During the last week, not less than eight hundred strangers have been in Indiana, of these about four hundred soldiers, a fourth German emigrants, and the balance Americans. The soldiers left on the day of their arrival for the interior, but not until they had several *lively* meetings in the streets, and kicked up considerable of a noise, with a great but harmless flourish of sabres. Most of the German emigrants, too, (who like the troops) were in good health, found ready transportation to the interior.

Of the late new comers here, Indiana has retained a goodly number, as permanent citizens, embracing some twenty odd families.

CORRIES CAMPING.—The Xerxes Valley, published in Corries' *Advertiser*, has been sold by Mr. Bryant, to Capt. Gideon K. Lewis, so long, and so well known, as a partition chief on our frontier. Capt. Lewis will make the Valley a good paper. He is a printer, a good writer, thoroughly versed in the affairs and wants of Western Texas, liberal in his views, and a man who has won a good name by hard and dangerous service. We wish him well, and trust that he may be the means of doing much good for the West.

BAYA.—For the last two or three weeks, we have been visited by abundant rains, which have greatly protracted a continuance. The tides in the Bay for a few days past, have been better than formerly.

FOR THE SHIP ALBERT GALLOPIN.—The ship Albert Gallopin, which brought in troops from New York to Indiana, sailed on Friday last for Mobile.

Gen. Francis Pierce is in stature about five foot ten inches; temperament of the nervous sanguine; complexion ruddy; the sandy color. His address is remarkable for a kind of cordial agreeability, and general free and easy manner, which can hardly be claimed as characteristic of New England.

In character as a private citizen, he is one of those noble, generous, hospitable spirits with whom it is our fortune sometimes fortunate, in whose nature there is hardly enough of the feeling of self-interest for their own protection. His address is remarkable for a kind of cordial agreeability, and general free and easy manner, which can hardly be claimed as characteristic of New England.

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As a soldier, he is a man of great energy and decision, and a man of great force of character.
