FROM BROWNSVILLE AND THE RIO GRANDE.

We received yesterday a letter from a friend dated at Brownsville, April 7, with an extra of the Flag, and also the Flag of the 18th, giving in account of desperate outrages committed on the people of Reynosa, on the Mexican side, by lawless Americans.

Carabaja, Roudres and Dowd, three of the leaders and abettors in this nefarious business, were arrested in Rio Grande City and are now in the U. S. prison barracks at Brownsville, closely guarded.

THE TURNPIKE.—The route for the Indianola and Victoria Turnpike has been surveyed, staked and levelled to Mott St. Paul, at Killpatrick's, 21 miles. The road runs from the bridge on White's bayou, on a direct line to Tiger creek; thence on an air line, on the high ground between Green Lake and Chocolate to the mott.

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SABBATH SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY.

The sixth anniversary of the Gonzales Union Sabbath School was held in the Court House, Thursday evening, 14th inst. A large and highly respectable audience being present, the Rev. R. L. Weir was called to the Chair.
