WEEVIL IN CORN-THEIR PREVENTION.

Some three menths ago we called upon the farmers of the country for the result of their experience in preventing the ravages of the weevil in corn-an insect that destroys vast amounts of our annual corn crop after it has matured.

Col. Hodges of Goliad gounfy, through the San Antonio Ledger, gave the opinion that the best plan was to leave the corn on the stalk till cold weather, thereby destroying the insect. This idea has prevailed with some; but we object to it, on three (whig.) and R. N. Goode of the up sides live stock are liable to commit depredations on the exposed field. 2ndly. Because, during wet autumns, corn is liable to suffer great injury by standing in the field, and Srdly, Because, it is no unusual occurrence for the weevil to materially damage corn as it stands on the stalk, especially in sandy soils, as we have ofte | seen. This plan only lessens, but does not overcome the evil.

A gentleman of Matagorda county writes us a dissertation on the generation of the weevil. He says the cut-worm of spring, the silk worm in roasting ears and the bud worm in the ripening stage of the corn, are one and the same, in different stages of being, and the latter deposites the egg that produces the weevil. Ergo, says he, kill the cut worm of the spring, and you prevent weevil. That is as plain es that the destruction of the egg will exterminate the large red onts; messages.
