The scientific farmer would then garher leaves, and burn, or pulverize them, and after digging around the tree so as to expose the roots, pur a half a bushel of bone dust, leaves and leached ashes in uqual per IF tions to each tree, and thus afford the terial for a perfect development of fruit.

If peach trees dwindle, the leaves crisp and curl up, in other words have the vellows, they need from. A man may as well live without breath, as a peach true without iron. If the ground does not naturally furnish it, the owner must, or be disappointed in his hope of fruit. In such case go to the smith shop, or machine shop, and get the scales, or what is better, the iron turnings, and after digging away, round the roots, so as to expose them, apply one quart of scoria, or scales, or turnings, each tree, a pint of salt, and a peck of leached ashes, and the curied leaves will give place to delicious fruit.
