Absentee begins October 16th

Voters will have the opportunity to express their preference on 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution in a November 5 election. Absentee voting begins October 16 at the office of County Clerk Debbi Puckett and will end November 1.

In a nutshell, the proposed amendments are:

Proposition No. 1 - To authorize issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control and other purposes.

Proposition No. 2 - To authorize the issuance and sale of \$200 million Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

Proposition No. 3 - To authorize the Legislature to pass laws permitting a city or town to make assessments for relocation or replacement of water lines on private property.

Proposition No. 4 - To authorize the use of proceeds from sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund.

Proposition No. 5 - To authorize the Legislature to regulate the providing of health care by hospital districts.

Proposition No. 6 - To permit state prisoners to be placed in prison facilities in other states subject to an interstate agree-

ment.

Proposition No. 7 - To authorize Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts.

Proposition No. 8 - Providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the state veterans housing assistance program and allowing the Legislature to define an eligible veteran for the program.

Proposition No. 9 - To protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations.

Proposition No. 10 - Authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for purchase of farm and ranch land.

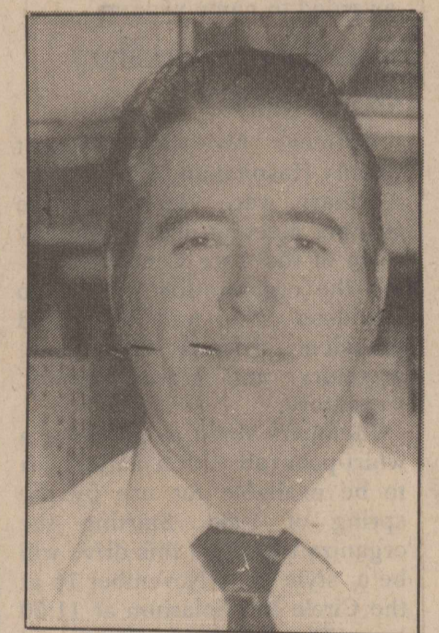
Proposition No. 11 - Changing the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense.

Proposition No. 12 - Granting the Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court.

Proposition No. 13 - Providing for reapportionment of judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board.

Proposition No. 14 - To provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews and El Paso Counties and abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson and Randall Counties.

Pre-kindergarten students learn in many areas

Teaching four year olds to socialize, to share and to be civilized is the primary goal of prekindergarten first year teacher Vickie Gonzales.

"Most of the students aren't proficient in English," Miss Gonzales, a 1984 graduate of Angelo State University, said recently. The class is structured for economically and educationally deprived students and is one of the programs set forth in House Bill 72. "Some of my students understand English completely, but don't speak it well."

"There are very fast learners in my classes. Those that know English well help the others. The program helps get children used to going to school."

"These students would be left behind if they did not attend. By the end of the year, they will have caught up with others that will be entering kindergarten next year," Gonzales said.

Miss Gonzales strongly en-

courages parental involvement. "I strongly recommend reading to young children, and simply taking time with them. Take them for walks, and show them a frog, a tree, the grass. You can tell which parents work with their children."

Many different activities are scheduled for the short five to ten minute attention spans of the children. There are 15 children in both the morning and afternoon classes. The three hour classes are from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m.

"They are four year olds. Some are not yet ready for school. This makes the job very challenging."

The children will learn to identify objects, follow simple directions, recognize familiar sounds, listen to music and stories, art, music, hand and eye coordination, count, self awareness, safety, and how to write their names.

Miss Gonzales teaches bi-lingually now, but hopes even-

tually to just teach in English. One feature of the class includes Mr. Pazzo, a puppet. "When it is time for Mr. Pazzo, everyone stops what they are doing and listens to him. Everyday he has something new in his pouch."

"The children have some free time each day, and they can go to the reading corner, play with the toys or do whatever they wish. Early childhood education is becoming very important," Miss Gonzales, a 1980 graduate of Ozona High School, said.

Miss Gonzales is the daughter of Lupe Gonzales, longtime employee of the Texas Highway Department, and Irene Gonzales, mother of six children. She is an active member of Templo Bautista. "It is nice to be independent. I want to become involved in other community activities."

In high school, Miss Gonzales was president of her Senior Class, band sweetheart and band member.

G.E.D. registration

Ozona Public Schools have announced that the district will offer a free G.E.D. class for Ozona adults who would like to prepare for their Graduate Equivalency Diploma Certificate. Cubs down Eagles

Both Cubs teams made their way to Eldorado last Thursday to try to extend their victory records.

On their first possession, the seventh grade Cubs, who would end the night with 375 yards total offense, rambled to within 23 yards of a touchdown, but failed to score. However, on their first play of their second possession, Ruben Borrego went 41 yards off a dive up the middle for the Cubs' first touchdown. Borrego, who had 63 yards rushing, drove his way in for the two-point conversion.

The only time Mingo Perez carried the ball, he shot 36 yards for the Cubs' next touchdown. The attempt for the extra two points failed, but the Cubs were still the only one on the scoreboard.

On a third and one, Lonnie Martinez, who led all rushers with 92 yards, crossed the goal line as the buzzer ended the first half for a 59 yard touchdown. The Cubs led 20-0 after the two-point conversion failed.

The first score of the second half came when Duan O'Neal scrambled 17 yards off a wing-back trap.

The Cubs' defense picked up in the second half and continued to drop the Eagles for a loss. The Cubs held Eldorado to only 34 yards total offense. Brad Bollier led all the tacklers with five. He was followed by Ruben Borrego with four, Lonnie Martinez, Urbino and Lee Galan each with three.

The Eldorado quarterback was pressured into throwing an interception that Anthony Vasquez returned thirty yards for a touchdown to give the Cubs a 32-0 lead.

On the next play from the line of scrimmage, the Eldorado quarterback threw another interception. This time, Mingo Perez returned it for a 45 yard touchdown.

Brad Bollier, who replaced Oscar Gutierrez as a quarterback and went three for six on the night, connected with Shane Pridemore for the two point conversion.

The eighth grade Cubs ran into some trouble in the first quarter when the Eagles recovered a fumble on the Cubs 36 yard line. This set up their first score of the game, and the Cubs found themselves behind 6-0.

The Cubs responded with a touchdown of their own on their first possession. Roger Martinez, who had an outstanding night with 107 yards rushing and two touchdowns, dropped the ball on a left sweep, picked it up and went eleven yards to the right for

Immediately following the attempt of the two-point conversion, which failed, the Cubs recovered a fumble on the kickoff. With 23 seconds left in the third quarter, Chris Denman, who only completed three of eight passes but two of the three were for touchdowns, connected with Luis De La Garza for a 46 yard touchdown pass. The PAT failed, and the Cubs led 33-6.

The Eagles added their second touchdown on a 86 yard pass play. The two-point conversion was successful, but Eldorado still trailed.

Roger Martinez, who started the Cubs' scoring, motored 47 yards for the last touchdown of the game. Lalo Rodriguez's kick was good, and the Cubs finished the game with a 40-14 victory.

Lalo Rodriguez led all tacklers with eight. Roger Martinez had seven, followed by Moe Cruz and George Ybarra, each with six.

The Cubs' next game will be here at 6:00 on October 17 against Colorado City.

Watson's Department Store marks 23 years

Watson's Department Store quietly celebrated 23 years in business Tuesday says founder and owner of the store, Bill Watson.

Though the store has never done the volume of business anticipated, it has afforded both Watson and his wife, Julie, the opportunity to feed, clothe and educate their two daughters, Janell Watson Ramsey of Arlington, and Doreen Watson Turner of Plano.

Watson was a young man on the move in the corporate world of Sears & Roebuck. The Texas Tech business administration graduate worked for Sears, the greatest department store merchandisers, for eight years. "I wasn't the corporate type -- I just wasn't tough enough. I didn't enjoy the big cities," Watson explained.

The Watsons had moved to Clovis, New Mexico in 1960 so that he could move up in the corporate structure. "When we moved to Clovis, we weren't told what house to buy -- just what type home we should have. My boss' wife helped Julie pick our home out. I worked 18-19 hours a day, trying to straighten up a mess that I inherited. We lived in Clovis two years. I realized that I had no time with my family, and there had to be something better someplace else."

After he quit working for Sears in 1962, Watson started looking for a business to buy in Stanton. A friend of his parents recognized Watson from a picture and offered him a partnership in a business in Ozona. Watson was not interested in having a partner, but was intrigued about Ozona, Watson, who had not been in Ozona since playing in the 1947 Ozona Invitational Basketball Tournament, decided to investigate. "I came to Ozona on September 14, 1962, stood on the sidewalk and visited with people."

"I called Stephen Perner at 4 p.m. about leasing this building. At 4:30 p.m., the lease agreement was finalized. I opened the store about one month later on October 8, 1962. I've never been sorry I came here, despite the lack of growth in the business."

"Fortunately, I have the most ideal mate. Julie was willing to do whatever I wanted to do. We did not enjoy the mandatory society structure being a Sears executive requires. We were excited to come to a small town and live a quiet life and work in the church," he said.

When the business first opened, Mrs. Watson worked at the store full time. "We soon realized that the girls needed her more than I did. You can hire help for a store, but you can't hire a mother."

At times, the store has been kept open "because of my bull-headedness, not because of its success," Watson said.

"It is so disheartening to hear customers say they shopped in San Angelo first. I recall one Sunday, three ladies at the Ozona Church of Christ all appeared in the same dress. My wife was one of the ladies. A lady from the church approached me and said that fear of imitation and lack of choice were some reasons the ladies did not shop in Ozona. I proudly informed him that none of the dresses had been bought in Ozona. The dresses had been purchased in San Angelo, Odessa and Iraan.



"The demand at our store limits our selection. We sit at the same market tables as do the larger stores. The quantity of things bought is determined by the sales of the previous year." Sue Borrego has been doing some of the buying for Watson the last one and one-half years. "She is younger and is more in tune with the times," Watson said of his valued employee.

One of Watson's biggest disappointments was opening day. Circulars were placed in all the area newspapers announcing the store's grand opening. "We did \$26.00 worth of business opening day. I had come from Sears, where that kind of advertising would have netted \$700,000 in sales. It has been uphill since that time."

Watson inherited some of his interest in the business world from his parents. His mother and father owned a grocery store for many years in Iraan. "At my insistence, they bought a piece goods store in 1959 in Iraan."

Community involvement are not just idle words to Watson. "For my personal satisfaction, this involvement is necessary. I want this community to be my home. I am interested in the future of Ozona. I look at other businessmen who are not involved in civic work. Some are more successful than I. I guess I'm just not very bright."

Though he has lessened his involvement recently, Watson has served as president of the Ozona Lions' Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He helped with the Fort Lancaster project of the Crockett County Historical Commission. Watson once traveled with Mrs. Brownie Harvick representing the Texas Wool and Mohair Auxiliary. He has also been active in the Scouting programs and Lions Booster Club.

"I have solicited funds for every organization in town and have been involved with the Ozona Youth Rodeo for 20 years. I served as a deacon in the Church of Christ for many years." Watson still serves on the maintenance committee at the Church of Christ and also enjoys woodworking in his limited spare time.

Future businessmen must be

very definite about the need for their type of business in a particular locale. "They should buy an existing business if possible. The ready made store traffic is worth more than one can imagine. Most new businesses take a minimum of five years before there is enough profit to support oneself. Above all, don't enter a business underfinanced." Watson advises.

When the store opened, Watson set his retirement date as October, 1992. "We have no retirement plans now."

Watson's success in the business world has continued into another field. He announces, with R. B. Babbitt, the play-by-play of Lions' games on KRCT. The games enable Watson to keep in touch with the youth of Ozona and help keep this Ozona Lions' booster young at heart forever.

Pierson worked in the grocery business all over Texas for 19 years. While in Lufkin, he and his wife were active in the Special Olympics organization. In his limited spare time, the Henderson native enjoys working with his children.

Firemen stress fire prevention

Ozona firemen will commemorate Fire Prevention Week by presenting programs at the Crockett County Primary and Intermediate Schools Thursday afternoon. Students will participate in fire drills and see fire department equipment. Some individual classes at the schools will make posters, and write stories and poems about fire prevention.

"The United States has the highest record of fire in the industrialized world," Fire Marshal Steve Kenley said recently. "Overseas, fire prevention is a vital part of regular school curriculum."

Since the Ozona Fire Department was established in 1947, there have been no major injuries. "This is due to the good training, education and luck," Fire Chief Dorris Haire said recently. "There is no way to fight fires without danger and risk. Firemen often get careless on little fires. With little fires, there is a greater chance of injury to the fireman."

There has been little change in the firemen's equipment since the 1800's. "The first radical invention was a leather fire hose in the early 1800's," Kenley said. Before this hose, a nozzle was attached to a pump cart. Men formed bucket brigades. Firemen really fought this change. The next innovation was the steam engine. Steamers could pump for up to 36 hours. "Firemen used to have contests to see who could pump the longest. These steamers were pulled by horses. When the gasoline engine was invented, the firemen resisted using it. They liked their horses. The newest modern advancement has been the citizen's band two way radio and the additional protective equipment that is now available," Kenley explained.

Fires have three phases: smoldering, open flaming and smoldering. If a fire gets no air, it will use up its available oxygen supply and eventually return to the smoldering phase. Haire said. Each fire must have an

ignition source. Some combustible materials will ignite on their own.

Haire said that many injuries are caused by flashovers. This flashover or explosion has been known to blow entire buildings down.

The key to keeping fires from starting is to keep ignition and combustion sources separated. "Homes sometimes have a lot of dangerous fire hazards, but this is the land of the free, and each man can live as he chooses. Each man's home is his castle," Assistant Fire Chief Bob Faulkner said.

Most fires are extinguished with water. Certain chemicals and flammable liquids are extinguished with foams and other fire fighting chemicals. The most fires ever responded to by the Ozona Fire Department was 165 fires in 1977.

Crockett County Commissioners have given us whatever we need in the department, Haire said. "We never ask for something unless we really need it."

Sirens signal fires during the daytime hours, but home radio alerts signal a night time alarm. One former member of the fire department once had a funny thing happen. His wife would get up and start his pickup so he could go to the fire. One night, she started the pickup and waited for a long time for the fireman to come fight the fire. She did not realize that the alarm had been cancelled, Kenley said. She never did start his pickup for him again.

McCalebs man station

Lowell and Minnie McCaleb were just looking for a job when he retired 12 years ago from Ozona Butane Company. By living at the fire station and dispatching Ozona firemen, they found more than a job - they found a sense of never ending responsibility.

Having driven a butane truck for many years, McCaleb knew "every road in the county". This job was a natural for him. Mrs. McCaleb really mothers the firemen. Coffee is always piping hot for the volunteers, and sometimes there is a tasty desert. She stays up, no matter what the hour, until the last man has come in the firehouse after a call. Fire Marshal Steve Kenley said.

The 48 year residents of Ozona make sure that the trucks and pumps are dusted each morning. McCaleb starts each of the trucks daily to ensure that it is in good running condition. "The firemen wash the trucks and we just try to keep them clean," Mrs. McCaleb explained.

There are more chemical fires, and the building material in the newer buildings is more hazardous than when we started 12 years ago, McCaleb observed. The county commissioners pro-

vide maintenance for the equipment and see that the firemen get updated equipment when it is needed. This year, 50 percent of the fires have been oil field related according to the McCalebs.

A fireman can be "almost any kind of person. They don't mind getting up and going and are dedicated to fighting fires and helping persons," Mrs. McCaleb observed.

There are three pumpers, three grass trucks, one van, which contains a "jaws of life", five fire trucks, which are continuously dusted and pampered by the McCalebs, so that they are ready to use on a moment's notice.

The emergency fire number is 392-2626 or 392-3751. The non-emergency number at the firehouse is 392-2544.

Fire department organized

As Ozona increased in size, the need for fire protection became apparent. A group of volunteers met in May 1947 and organized the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department.

Nineteen men became charter members of the fire department. Bill Cooper, then manager of the water and power department, was elected president; Alan Saunders, a local nurseryman who had considerable experience with the Sonora Fire Department, was chosen fire chief. Roy Thompson served as secretary-treasurer, and Frank James and Ben Williams were elected sub chiefs. Other charter members included Gene Williams, Charles Ratliff, Oscar Kost, Bill Bergfeld, Miller Robison, Dick Henderson, Arthur Kyle, Eddie Bower, Ted Doggett, Gene Ramirez, Ed Cranfill, V. O. Earnest, Beecher Montgomery, Bill Hannah, James Semmler, Jim Dudley, D. F. Brownrigg and Herbert Kunkel.

The first fire station was completed in May of 1950. Some years after the initial organization, a fire department band, under the direction of Ozona High School Band Director Corbett Smith performed at various civic functions for two or three years. Members of the band included: Doug Green, piano; Hartley Johnigan, bass fiddle; Aaron Bledsoe, Jr., drums; James Semmler, trombone; Oscar Kost, Jim Dudley and Al Fields, trumpet; Bill Carson, baritone; Arthur Kyle and W. L. Harrison, saxophone; and Bill Cooper, clarinet.

A Model T Ford fire truck served as the first equipment for the department. A vintage 1935 model fire pumper still remains at the fire station. Due to the inaccessibility of parts, this old pumper is no longer in use. One fireman stayed at the firehouse at all times. A second metal building was constructed behind the

primary fire station in 1979. A Ladies' Auxiliary of the Ozona Fire Department met briefly during part of the 1970's, but disbanded because of the decline in membership.

The fire department has been called to respond to major fires many times during its existence. A fire at the Ozona Primary School caused over one million dollars in damage.

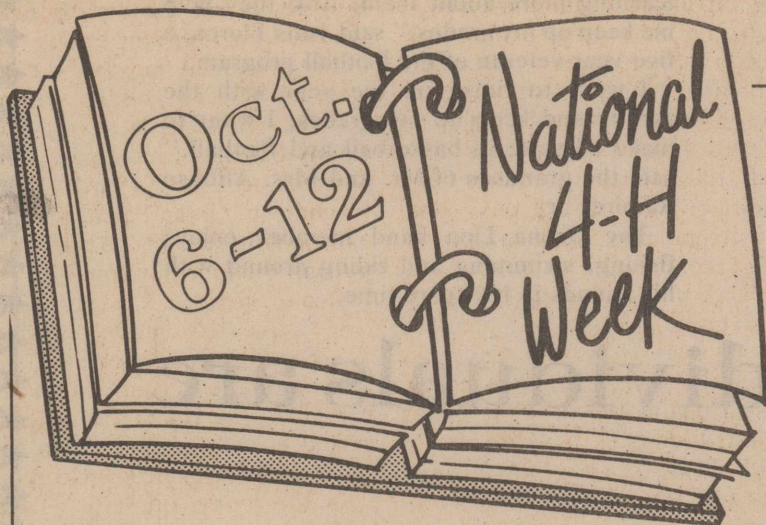
The radio home alert system was installed in July, 1973. Sirens no longer would waken Ozonans during the night, once this system was installed.

Membership in the present department cannot exceed 30. Those presently in the department include: Dorris Haire, fire chief; Bob Faulkner, assistant fire chief; Dick Kirby, assistant fire chief and 26 year veteran of the department; Steve Kenley, fire marshal and arson investigator; Dee Keilers, training officer; Bob Harris, president; Elliott Barrera, vice-president; David Cooke, secretary-treasurer; and Mr. and Mrs. Lowell McCaleb, dispatchers; Raymond Borrego, newest member of the department (April 10, 1984); Randy Branch, Al Galindo, Fernando Garza, John L. Henderson, a 26 year veteran of the department; Steve Hubbard, Larry McMann, James Montgomery, Doug Meador, Dub O'Bryant, Max Schroeder, Felix Trujillo, Billy Wagoner, Tony Wheeler and Vance Worthington.

The department provides protection to Ozona and to those who live in the 2600 square miles of the county, Sonora, Eldorado, Mertzon, Barnhart, Big Lake, Iraan, Sheffield and Del Rio all provide mutual aid for Ozona.

Bob Faulkner, a long time Ozona fire fighter, said he is uncomfortable with the word volunteer in the title of the department. "We are trained and

linger 20-12 earlier this season -- in the last two and one half seasons. The Bearcats defeated Brady 21-6 this week, to improve their record to 4-1.

Ozona continues to be plagued by nagging injuries. Lion defensive guard Brad Thompson suffered a shoulder separation and will not play this week. The large, enthusiastic homecoming crowd saw Ozona receive the opening kickoff on their own 22 yard line. Adams, who gained 41 yards in the game, scampered to the 36 yard line on the first play from the line of scrimmage. The drive was stopped on the 43 yard line by a quarterback sack.

The Eagles could not move the ball on their first possession because of a penalty. Both the

Eagles and the Lions had their next few possessions stopped by interceptions, fumbles and penalties.

A second quarter drive by the Eagles started on their own 35 yard line. A 55 yard pass from Eldorado quarterback Jimmy Turbeville to wide receiver Jesus Martinez moved the ball to the Ozona 10 yard line. The Eagles attempted a field goal, but it was no good.

The next Lion possession ended with a fumble on their own 27 yard line. The Eagles lost no time getting on the score board. Turbeville connected with Martinez on a 27 yard touchdown pass at the 8:26 mark of the second quarter. The PAT by Mike Moore was good, and left the score at halftime 7-0 in favor of the Eagles.

The second half started with fumbleitis by both teams. Ozona Lion Brad Thompson recovered an Eagle fumble on the Eagle 20. Clutch runs by Chuy Hernandez and Harvey Fierro set up a two yard touchdown dash by quarterback Steve Sanchez at the 5:35 mark of the third quarter. The two point conversion pass from Sanchez to Fierro gave Ozona an 8-7 lead -- their first lead of the season.

attend schools; the only difference between us and the members of a paid fire department is the salary issue. We are both professionals, trained and schooled in saving lives and property."

The fire department meets on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month. Each prospective new member is evaluated during a six month probationary period. The prospective member is then voted into full membership at one of the bi-monthly business meetings of the organization.

As fire chief, Haire, who has served in that capacity for the last 12 years on and off, has the final responsibility for the personnel and equipment. Bob Harris, as president, presides at the business end of the department.

The department averages 120 runs per year. All fires are investigated by Kenley, the fire marshal, who is also an identification officer of the Sheriff's Department. Kenley has training in the origin and cause of fires, is a certified peace officer and serves on various state arson boards.
