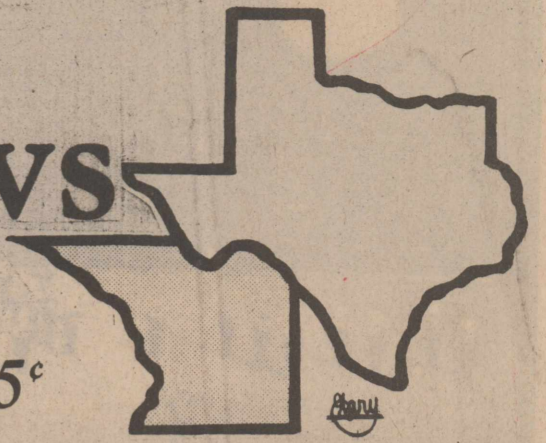

Crockett County named Sesquicentennial community

Crockett County joined more than 2,200 other communities, which will be celebrating the state's 150th birthday in 1986, when it was officially sanctioned as a Sesquicentennial community last week.

Lee Storie of Austin was here October 22 to present a proclamation declaring Crockett County a Texas Independence County. He also presented a colorful Sesquicentennial flag in recognition of Crockett County's planned participation in the year-long celebration.

Sandy Stokes, local Sesquicentennial Committee co-chairman with Geniece Childress, was

on hand at the Civic Center to accept the articles on behalf of the committee.

As West Texas program director for the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission, Storie has traveled through much of the state on behalf of the commission since it was created in 1979 by the 66th Texas Legislature.

Storie told listeners that the state sanctions Sesquicentennial communities, but it does not tell them how to celebrate during the year.

One of the highlights of the year will be the passing of the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train through Barnhart March 21.

Local riders are expected to link up with the wagon train for a portion of the trip, and Storie urged everyone to make the drive to Barnhart to see the impressive procession.

A group of 17 students from Mrs. Jim Dudley's fourth grade class entertained the audience with patriotic songs of Texas. Under the guidance of Mrs. John Hignight, music teacher at Ozona Intermediate School, the costumed youngsters led the audience in singing the state song, "Texas, Our Texas". A trio composed of Ryan Morris, John Tijerina and John Ramirez performed "Ol Texas", followed by

the group singing "I'm a Texas Cowboy" featuring Jennifer Evans twirling a rope. "Strawberry Roan", "The Eyes of Texas" and "Deep in the Heart of Texas" finished out the selections.

A year filled with Sesquicentennial events is planned for Crockett County beginning with the annual 4-H Stock Show in January.

New library becomes reality

Saturday, October 26, was a momentous day for the Crockett County Public Library. The long-awaited move to the new facilities at 705 Twelfth Street was accomplished in less than six hours. About forty people packed, moved and unpacked the approximately 8,000 volumes so that the library would be ready to open on Monday morning.

Patrons are encouraged to visit the new building between the hours of 9:00 and 12:00 and 1:00 to 5:00, Monday through Friday and on Monday and Thursday evenings between 6:00 and 9:00 p.m.

Grand opening festivities are planned for Sunday, November 17, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. with a brief ceremony scheduled at 2:00. The entire community is invited to participate.

A reference service is offered at the library, and patrons are urged to call 392-3565 with their questions. Library personnel will do their best to find the answers quickly. An interlibrary loan service is available to supplement the permanent collection of reference books. A film service is available and is currently being used very successfully by the Care Center.

The reading room is stocked with the latest magazines and newspapers and offers a comfortable retreat for reading or studying.

"We offer the latest best-sellers, a children's library and an extensive non-fiction collection that includes many books on Texas and the West, and a large selection of biographies," says Louise Ledoux, librarian.

Television cable system has new owners

The original three channel Ozona Cable System, Inc. was officially sold Friday, October 25, and is operating under the new name, Circle Bar Cable Television, Inc.

The sale, which had been negotiated over several months, had been delayed by government regulations.

The original system made its first connection February 9, 1955. Antennas provided television service from San Antonio, Midland and San Angelo, Oscar Kost, 30-year stockholder and manager of the system, said recently.

Microwaves, which relay signals from one point to another, have increased the system to a 23 channel capacity, Kost explained.

The original stockholders in the system included Evert White, Kost, Sherman Taylor, W. E. Friend Jr. and Bill Cooper, who dropped out of the agreement many years ago.

New owners of the system are Tom Mitchell, Lisa Mitchell Wagner and Gary Buck Mitchell.

with Jamey Sawyer serving as manager.

"We decided to sell because of our ages. I have no definite plans for the future," Kost said.

Kost will continue installing and selling satellite dishes, which he sees as no threat to the cable system.

Everything changed with the system in 1970 when it went solid state. There are continuing changes in the equipment all the time.

The system, which serves approximately 1,400 households, costs \$12 per month for the basic cable channels. Premium channels including The Disney Channel, HBO, The Movie Channel and Gala, can be obtained for an additional fee.

The rare times the system goes out are usually caused by an equipment malfunction or weather disturbance up the road, Kost said.

He will continue as an interim advisor to the system for one year.

KRCT will be airing five hours of scary stories beginning at 6:00 with the broadcast to be heard at the carnival.

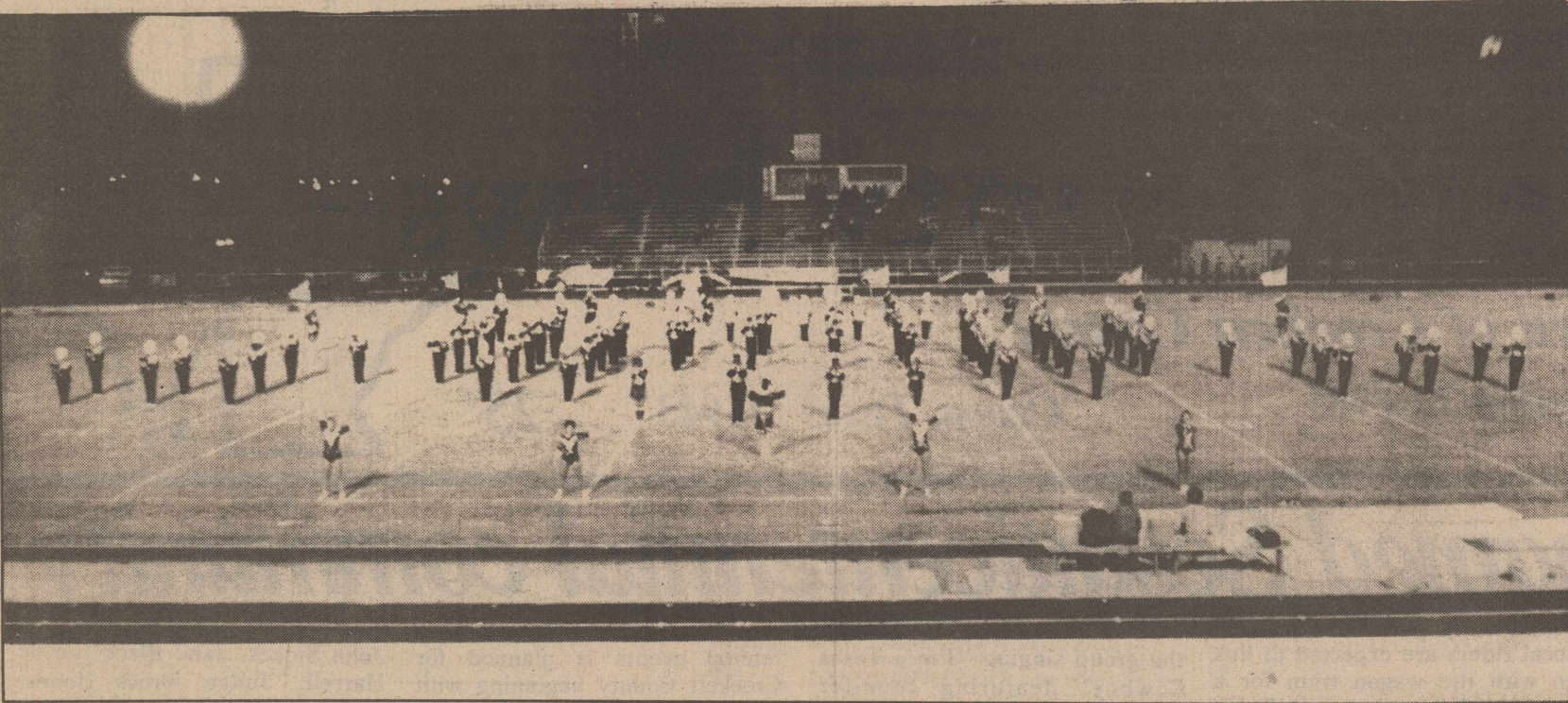


Amanda Carson, 18-month-old daughter of Billy and Cathy Carson, lights up the Halloween Festival at

Fighting Lion band gets division one rating



The Ozona Fighting Lions High School Band, under the direction of Kelly Glaze and assistant band director, Eric Wharton, received the highest Division I Superior rating at a district University Interscholastic League band contest in Brady Saturday.

The 85 member band received division I ratings from three UIL judges, David Pennington of Temple, Norman Deiser of Mineral Wells and Warren Thaxton of Abilene. These judges are outstanding high school and college band directors, explained an ebullient Glaze.

Ozona band members were among the 2,000 marchers from 28 schools, ranging from Class A to 4A, that participated in the contest.

The judges have a statewide norm by which the bands are judged. The judge's evaluation is based "on that norm, not a comparative evaluation

with the other bands," Wharton said. This is an evaluative, not a comparative competition.

Division I winning songs by the band included "Entry of the Centurions" by Mike Story, "Sloop John B", a British drinking song, a percussion ensemble number, "Grandfather's Clock", and "Tangerine".

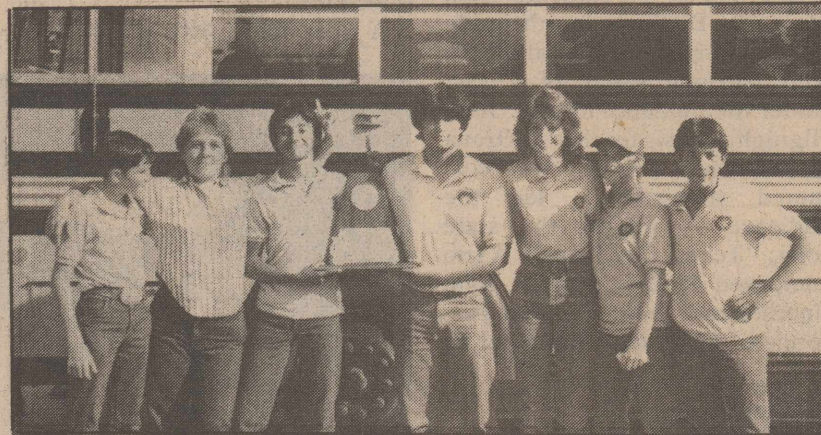
The Division I rating represents an improvement over the 1984 Division II rating the band received.

"I promised, if we got a Division I rating, I would do a cartwheel on the parking lot near the band hall when we got home. I had to fulfill that promise," laughed a happy Glaze.

Those who competed in the Class AAA division included: Llano I, Brady I, Comanche II and Sonora I.

The ratings range from Division I, Superior; Division II, Excellent; Division III, Good; Division IV, Fair;

and Division V, Poor. Those bands selected to compete in the Region D marching contest in



Temple included Irion County, Goldthwaite, Eldorado, Glen Rose, Llano, Sonora, Stephenville and Brown-

wood. "We were extremely pleased with

the band's performance and their dedicated, hard work," Glaze and Wharton said.

"We will be assisted by our daughters, Selena and Selma, on Saturdays," Mrs. Galindo said.

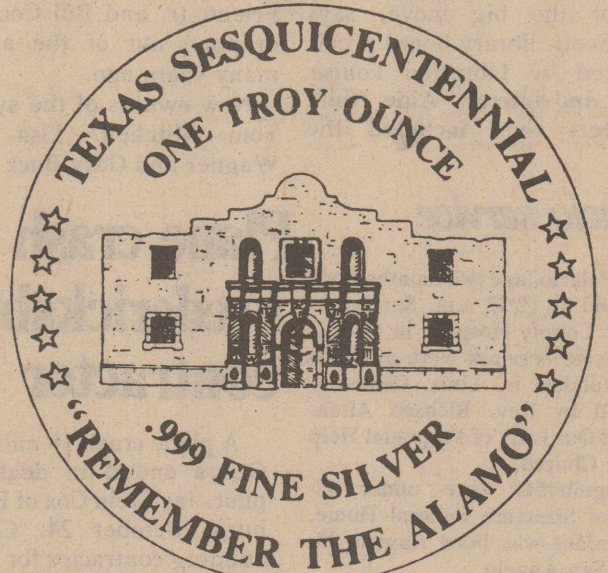

Scripture: Psalms 51:17

This passage of scripture says the only sacrifices the Lord will not despise are those that come from a broken spirit and a broken and contrite heart.

A broken spirit is one that is in complete submission to the Lord and His will. Much like a horse that has been broken, he is in submission to his rider. A broken spirit says, "Not my will, but Yours, Lord". It says, "I'll go where You want me to go, do what You would have me do, and say what You would have me to say".

A broken and contrite heart is a heart that is crushed by the weight or feeling of sorrow or remorse because of sin or evil within your life. 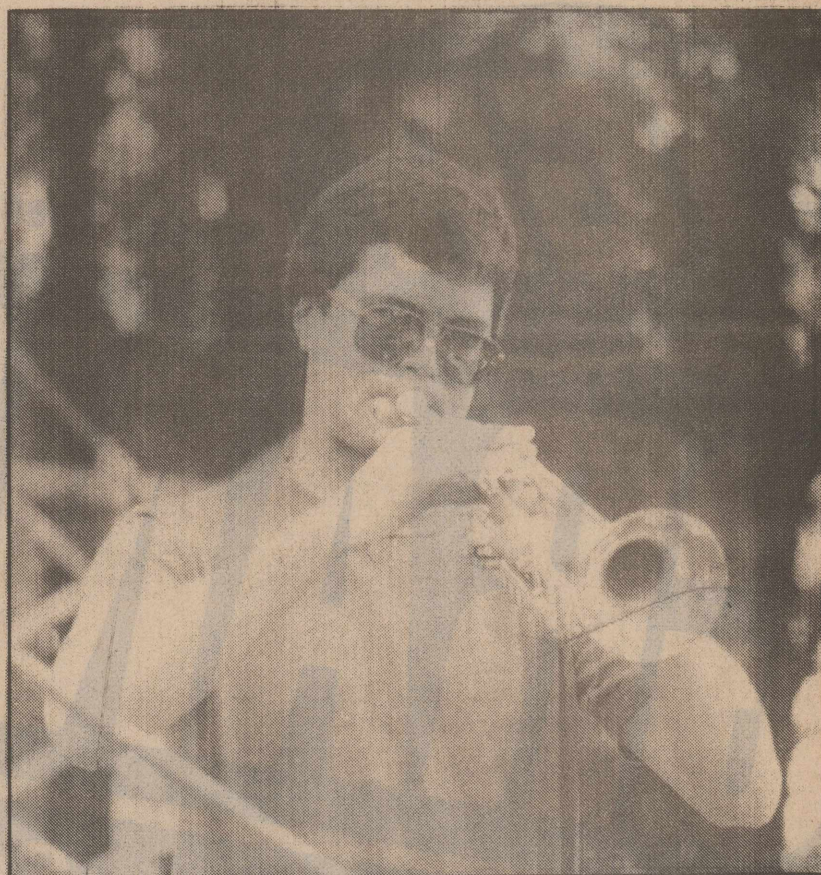

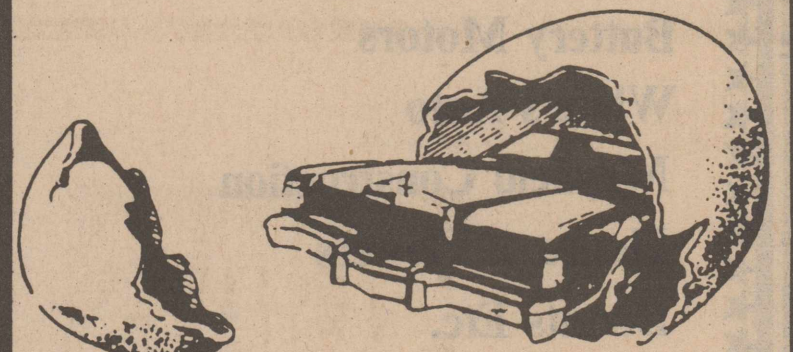

Galindo, who hopes to graduate next year with a high average, enjoys listening to loud music, collecting rock star's posters and being with friends.



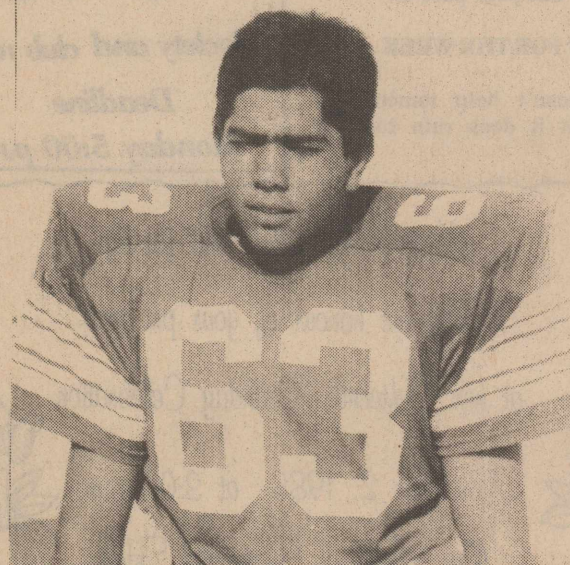

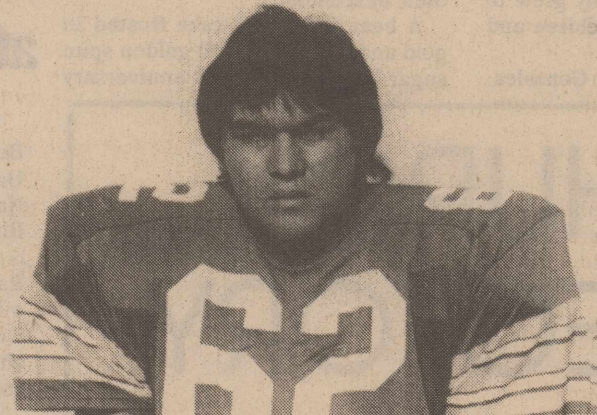

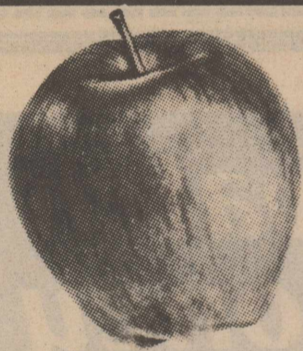

Sheriff's report

Officers descended on the Village Shopping Center Monday night in response to a report of a possible burglar.

Several merchants came to check their stores while Sheriff's Department personnel were at the scene.

An hour-long search of the ten store center by Sheriff Billy Mills, several deputies and a DPS trooper turned up no suspects. In other excitement around town, a blue El Camino belonging to Evert White was stolen Thursday morning from downtown Ozona. A suspect in the case was stopped on Highway 290 at Mitchell Black Top by Sgt. Hill assisted by Sheriff Billy Mills and B. B. Ingham.

Charged in connection with the incident was Jerome F. Hardie of Detroit, Michigan. Bond was set by Judge Raymond Davee at \$5,000 on a charge of unlawful use of a motor vehicle.

An accident 31 miles west of Ozona on I-10 Thursday was investigated by an officer of the Texas Department of Public Safety. A truck/tractor, semi-trailer blew out a left front tire at 2:30 p.m. causing the vehicle to strike the median and jackknife into the westbound lane. Some damage was reported to the back left portion of the truck. Driver Daryl Camron was not injured. Officers investigated three reports of theft during the week.

On October 22, the theft of \$135 from a residence in the 100 Block of Ave. H was investigated.

Tools and equipment valued at \$400 were taken from a pickup parked at Wool Growers Storage Co. on October 26.

The theft of a lawn mower, chain saw and hedge trimmer from a residence on Avenue C is still under investigation. The items have been missing over the last month.

A routine traffic stop October 23 resulted in the arrest of Al D. Walker of Louisiana for probation violation. He was released to Louisiana authorities October 25.

During the week, officers made five arrests on charges of public intoxication and one arrest on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

Extension service to reduce staff

Faced with a \$4.5 million budget shortfall for the next two years, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is reducing its statewide staff while continuing to pursue top quality programming.

The shortfall resulted from a \$3.2 million reduction in general revenue appropriations coupled with unfunded salary increases and estimated increases in such operating expenses as utilities and postage.

"With a budget shortfall of this magnitude, we basically had two choices," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the state educational agency that is responsible for agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H programs.

"We could maintain our present level of staffing and drastically reduce programming, or we could reduce our staff and direct funds from these positions into high quality educational programs for clientele."

"We chose the latter because we felt the citizens of Texas should not be deprived of quality educational programs," Carpenter emphasized. "Our goal, as always, will continue to be to address the needs of the state's citizenry within the resources allocated."

Cuts were made straight across districts in the state. The only places cut in the district which includes Crockett County were in Big Spring and Fort Stockton. The position eliminated in Big Spring was that of an assistant in Home Economics. In Fort Stockton, the assistant to the agriculture agent position was eliminated.
