### Conservation District Enters Competition

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has entered the 22nd annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts, according to S. W. Inman, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from January 1, 1968, through December 31, 1968, will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 districts selected nationally will be an all-expense paid, work-study trip to Arizona in December, 1969, for one member of the district's governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district. The 106 men selected will be guests at Goodyear Farms, a 14,000 acre general farm operation near Phoenix.

Blackwater Valley District supervisors are S. W. Inman, chairman and Lewis Scroggins, vice chairman, both of Muleshoe; E. N. McCall, secretary and W. L. Welch, member, both of Enochs and Carl Pollard, member, Stegall.

The district's outstanding cooperators will be selected from over 500 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally, over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2,950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

### Young Farmers To Hold Meet

A meeting of the Young Farmers will be held Thursday in the Lazbuddie School cafeteria at 9:30 p.m.

Guest speaker will be James Valliant of the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

Members of the Muleshoe Independent School Board met Monday with one of the major items on the agenda being the hearing of the directive from the Texas Education Agency that Article 6252-7, Vernon's Civil Statutes, the non-subversive oath law has been held unconstitutional and should not be required of school district employees.

The non-subversive oath reads:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am not a member of the Communist Party. (The term Communist Party) as used herein means any organization which (a) Soviet Socialistic Republics or its satellites, or which (b) seeks to overthrow the Government of the United States or of any State by force, violence, or any other unlawful means; and that I am not a member of any organization, movement, group or combination which the Attorney General of the United States, acting pursuant to Executive Order No. 9835, March 21, 1947, 12 Federal Register 1935, has designated as totalitarian, fascist, communist, or sub-versive, or as having adopted a policy of advocacy or approving the commission of acts of force or violence to deny others their rights under the Constitution of the United States, or seeking to alter the form of Government of the United States by unconstitutional means; and I am not a member of any 'Communist Political Organization' or 'Communist Front Organization' registered under the Federal Internal Security Act of 1950 (50 U.S.C.A. 781, et seq.) or required to register under said act by final order of the Federal Subversive Activities Control Boards."

Superintendent of Schools Neal Dillman had received the following letter from the Texas Education Agency: To Superintendent: SUBJECT: Non-Subversive Oath

"We have received several inquiries from local school districts concerning the status of Article 6252-7, Vernon's Civil Statutes, the non-subversive oath law.

"This is to advise the Article 6252-7 has been held unconstitutional by the Federal courts and the non-subversive oath stipulated in the statute should not be required of school district employees."

Also during the meeting, the resignations of three teachers were accepted. They were Mrs. Faye Chapman, sixth grade science teacher, who gave health reasons for resigning; Mrs. Rosemary Kendrick, Counselor, Senior High School, for personal reasons and Barbara Jean Milburn, EMR teacher in Junior high school who resigned to accept a position in Walsh, Colo. for higher salary.

The board approved the assignment of Wayland Ethridge to the position of part time assistant principal at Muleshoe High School.

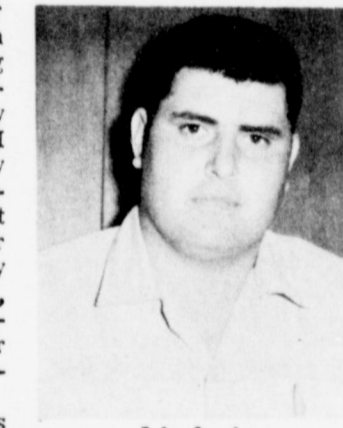
Approval was granted for membership fee for the Local School Board to join the Texas Association of School Boards. This qualifies boards to have a voting delegate at the State School Board Convention and each member will receive the Texas School Board Journal and news letter throughout the year.

Also in business, a request by Muleshoe State Bank to withdraw \$20,000 from pledged securities for School Depository was approved and signed. The bank has \$335,000 in pledged securities.

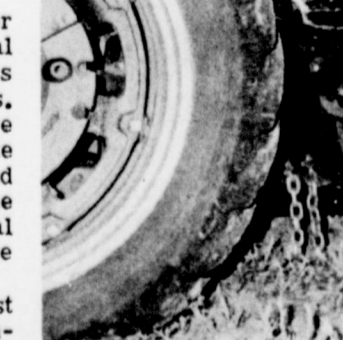
The antiques will be displayed in the show windows of downtown merchants beginning June 27 through July 8. The antiques will help tell the story

### Two Hangars Lifted During Freak Twister

#### Three Automobile Accidents Cause Injuries and Damage

Mother nature can produce some strange twists... especially when out of the sky there comes a small and unexpected twister, small in size, almost unnoticed as the length of time on the ground is brief.

But, yet in its small path it leaves behind the usual... destruction.

This was true when a small twister dipped briefly from the sky Sunday afternoon late and took two T-type hangars at the Muleshoe Airport and left the two airplanes hangared inside them unscratched.

It was all unexpected as the wind velocity was recorded at the airport at only 15 miles per hour at the time the twister struck.

Witnesses said "It was just there and gone."

Running true to form, not only did it leave the airplanes unscratched, but a child's chair was sitting at the corner of the hangars and remained in the same position, untouched, and the same native grass growing around the legs of it, proving it never moved an inch.

The planes are Tri-Pacers. One belongs to Delbert Watson and the other to Richard Bills, Earth.

From the roof of the old airport building, a 30-foot tower was lifted out of the roof, leaving a gaping hole.

Mrs. M. D. Locker was looking toward the hangar when the twister suddenly dipped down and lifted the sheet iron hangars apart and the twisted remains were strewn over a portion of the airport grounds to the side and in front of the hangar site toward U. S. 70.

Undiscovered while the initial inspection of the grounds and damage was underway Sunday, was damage to other hangar doors several hundred feet away.

The vacuum caused other hangar doors to be lifted out of the tracks and some of them were standing at an angle with the bottom standing several inches away from the sliding tracks. One hangar door was lifted upright, protruding several inches above the top of the hangar.

Several Muleshoe residents were at the airport shortly after the twister hit and another small one was sighted by the men while they were in the process of moving the two Tri-Pacers. This one was located southeast of the airport and estimated at about six miles away.

This twister was only visible three to four minutes, witnesses said, before it drew back into the clouds.

M. D. Locker, airport manager, said an unestimated amount of damage was done to the buildings, however, adjusters were expected. Locker said that the hangars had withstood winds clocked at 70 miles per hour on several occasions and peak winds clocked higher.

Several Muleshoe residents saw the twister swoop down at the airport.

Accidents and turbulent weather painted the weekend picture for this area.

From early Saturday evening when the first automobile accident occurred until the finale, a small twister which destroyed two airport hangars late Sunday afternoon, this condition existed.

The first accident resulted in minor injuries suffered by Viola Bell and H. L. Bell when the car in which they were riding was involved in an accident with a 1963 Chevrolet pickup being driven by George W. Raney, Muleshoe.

Driver of the 1960 Ford was James Bell, Albuquerque.

Reports show that the accident occurred when the pickup being driven by Raney crossed U. S. 84 and was hit by the oncoming vehicle driven by Bell.

The accident, investigated by

 securities and the present school balance is \$197,587.33. Two buses were sold to the Texas School Bus Center in Austin after sealed bids were opened, for the figure of the highest bidder. A 1960 Ford, 60 passenger, was sold for \$1000 and a 1962 Chevrolet, 48 passenger bus for \$950. Johnson - Nix Farm Equipment Co. was low bidder for a 12 horsepower lawn tractor and 48 inch mower. The board accepted this bid and purchased the International power equipment. A study of the average daily attendance report was studied with the daily average for the years 1966-67 being 1887.85 while the 1967-68 attendance was 1798.50 which averages 89.35 less than the previous year.

The loss means that the School District will lose four teachers from the State Minimum Foundation Program for the coming year, 1968-69. Tentatively, two teachers will be dropped from Richland Hills, two from Mary DeShazo and one from Junior High School. This is based on the membership report by schools and projected enrollment for the coming school year.

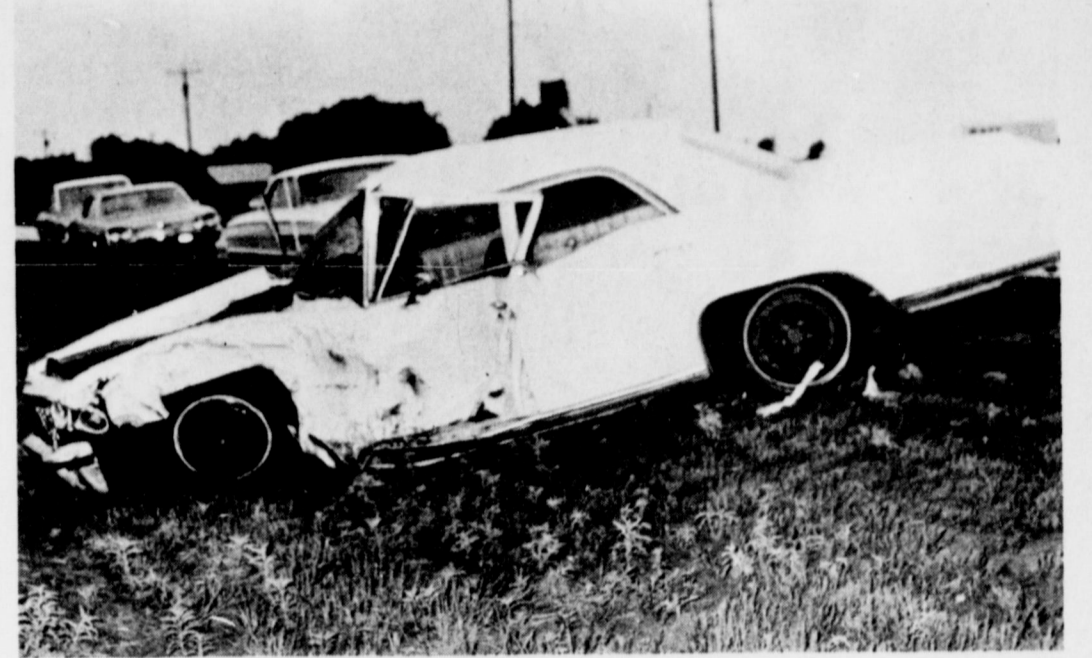

**Rep. Bill Clayton Reports Bill Passage**

In a telephone call to the Journal at noon Tuesday, Representative Bill Clayton said the Mini-bottles Liquor-by-the-drink bill had passed the House of Representatives by a small margin. Representative Clayton opposed the bill all the way and expressed that he felt it was demagogic and the legislation is unworkable. Rep. Clayton said "We fought heavy odds and lots of outside lobby influence and even though we were out voted, we felt it was our responsibility to continue to oppose the bill. Some amendments were added that will cause the senate to take a close look at the overall picture and perhaps vote "no" on the bill."

Clayton tried to convince members of the House that the legislation was bad, the report said, but in the end, the measure did receive enough votes to finally pass. The legislation now goes to the senate and its fate is in the hands of the Senate.

**MONDAY ACTION**  
 Gov. John Connally's mini-bottle liquor-by-the-drink plan won tentative House approval on Monday, 76-71, and came up for the final vote in that chamber Tuesday morning.

An Associated Press story Monday revealed that the final passage bill would send the measure to the Senate where it would face an uncertain reception. Bill sponsors say they

can't come up with an accurate count among the 31 senators because some will not say how they will vote.

**LOCAL OPTION**  
 The measure would allow restaurants, hotels and motels to sell both straight liquor and pre-mixed cocktails in miniature bottles of not more than two ounces in areas where voters approve in local option elections.

Representatives began the liquor debate at 10:24 a.m. and extended past 6 p.m., with one and one-half hours off for the lunch hour, when they reached a vote on the liquor measure. A total of thirty-eight changes were made in the already complicated bill before the House took the first legislative vote since the repeal of prohibition on liquor-by-the-drink measure.

Only one amendment, a "dram shop" provision, providing liability for damages in certain instances involving drunks, represented a defeat for bill backers.

Compared to past legislative debates on wet-dry issues Mondays deliberations were calm and businesslike. There was no oratory and no speeches for or against the bill after all the amendments were disposed of.

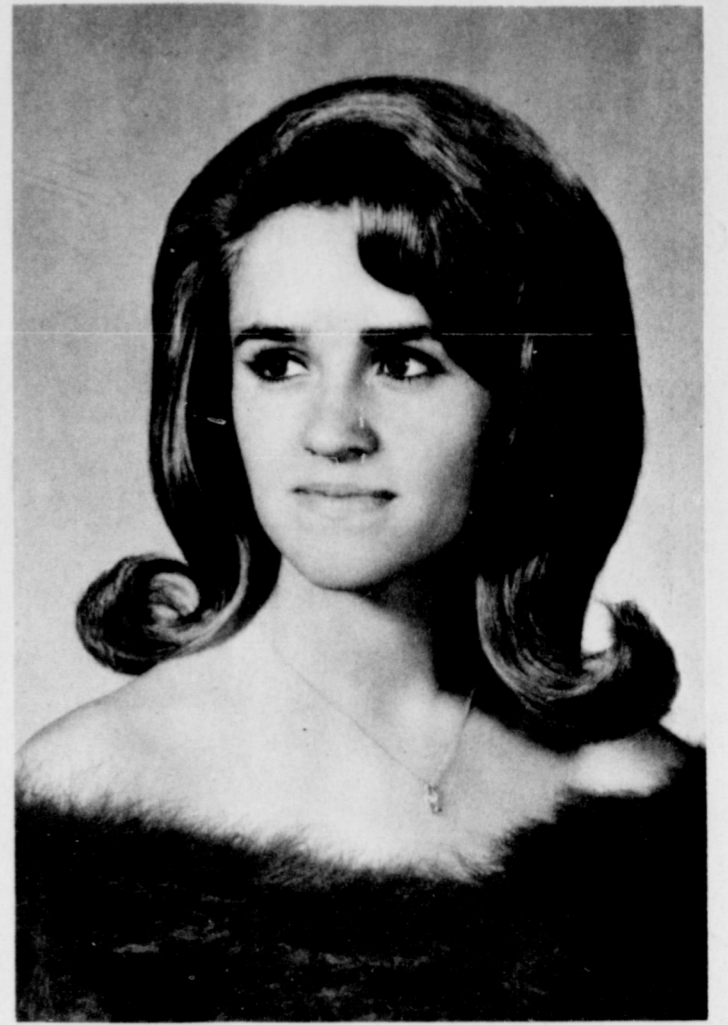
