

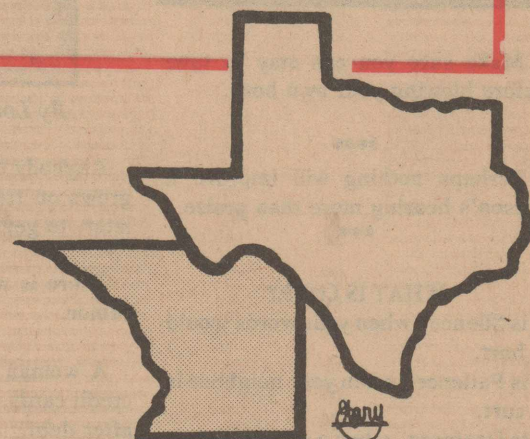

May primary ends in runoff June 7 for Pct. 2 and J.P.

Precinct 2 commissioner candidates B. W. Stuart and Jerry Hill are on the runoff trail after Saturday's Democratic Primary. A scant eight vote lead by Stuart with 105 votes and Hill's 97 will see the two hopefuls on a June 7 runoff ballot. Also seeking the Precinct 2 spot was Billy Carson who garnered 48 votes.

Jesus (Chuy) Castro was a shoo-in for Precinct 4 commissioner with 207 votes. Nearest opponent was Carlos Lopez with 105 followed by B. R. (Jody) Conaway's 81.

In the Justice of the Peace race, incumbent Raymond Davee received 582 votes followed by Jerry Lay with 366 and David H. Weant with 350. There will be a runoff between Davee and Lay.

Local uncontested races returned incumbents Judge A. O. Fields and District and County Clerk Debbi Puckett to office. Fields received 1,108 votes and Puckett 1,115.

District Judge Brock Jones received 1,055 votes in his home county.

Write-in slots for County Surveyor drew 59 voters. Paul Shacklette led with 39 votes followed by J. C. Schroeder, 17; and one vote each for Billy Reagor, Sammy Hester and Ben Ross.

The Democratic Party chairman write-in votes went to Steve Kenley, 3; Robert Longoria, 2; and one each for Sandra Childress, Johnny Childress, Elaine Bell and Johnny Jones.

The Crockett County choice for governor was Mark White with 349. Andrew C. Briscoe III drew 296 votes followed by A. Don Crowder 253, Bobby Locke 72, Shelia Bilyeu 44, and Ron Slover 21.

The familiar name of Pete Snelson was a vote getter in the District 21 race for U. S. Representative. Snelson pulled 609 votes followed by David Hunsicker's 264, 123 for Joe Sullivan and 71 for Terry M. Lowry.

Bill Hobby was top vote getter with 653 for lieutenant governor followed by David Young with 366.

Unopposed were Jim Mattox, attorney general, 839; Bob Bullock, comptroller of public accounts, 878; Ann W. Richards, state treasurer,

852; Garry Mauro, commissioner of the General Land Office, 796.

Crockett County went with Jim Hightower as the party nominee for Commissioner of Agriculture to the tune of 837 votes. Challenger Noel S. Cowling received 153.

John Sharp was the choice for Railroad Commissioner with 344 votes. Other candidates were: P. S. (Sam) Ervin 208, W. A. (Bill) MacNaughton 173, and John C. Poulard 105.

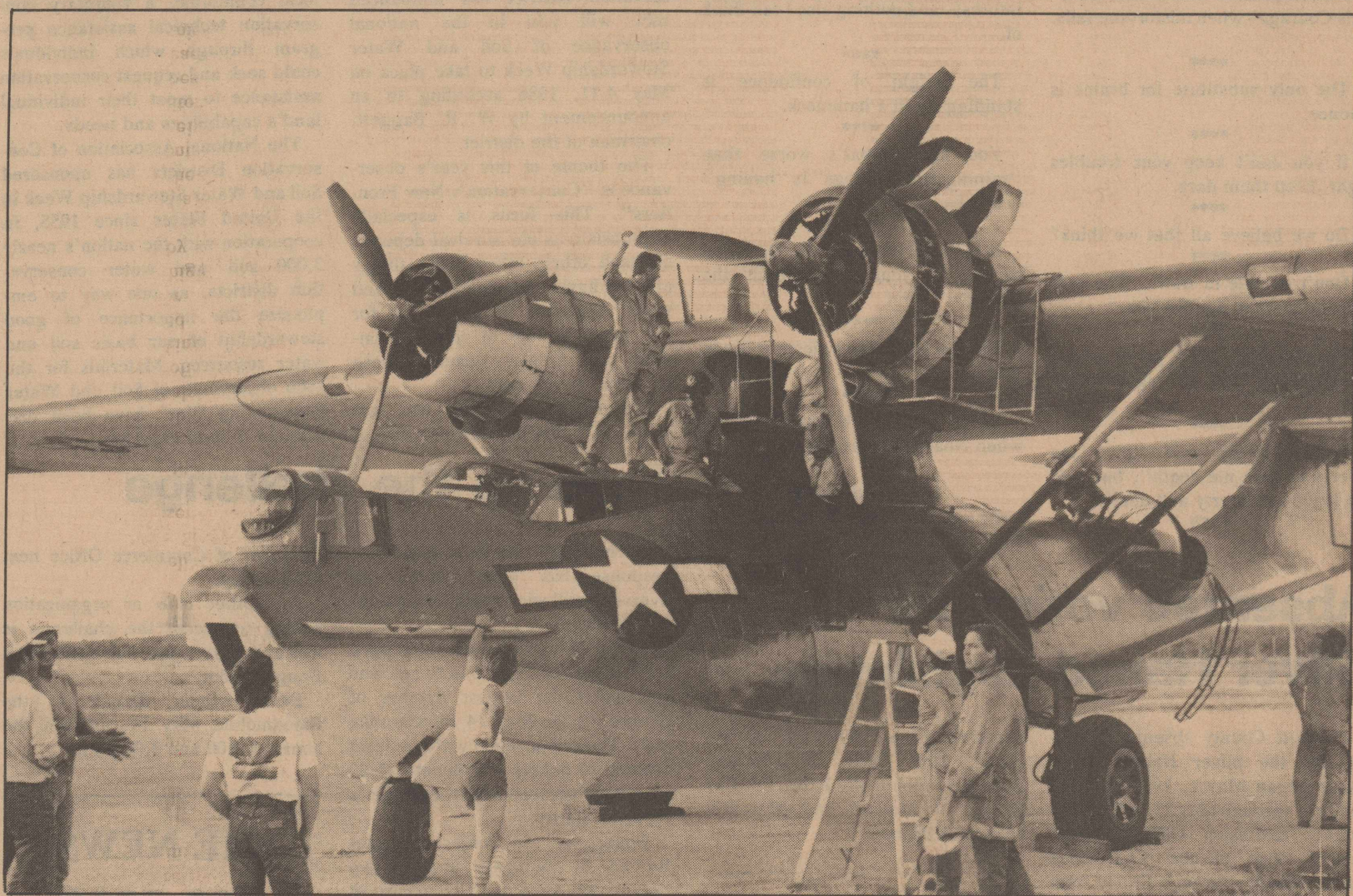

Wallace tenders resignation

During a called meeting May 5 of the Crockett County School Board, Intermediate School Principal Bob Wallace resigned from his position effective May 30. Wallace requested reassignment within the district in a classroom position. Further consideration on this request by Wallace will be considered by the board at their next regular meeting said Garland Davis, Superintendent of Schools.

In other business, newly elected trustees Sandra Childress and Dan Pullen were inducted into member-

ship. The school board was re-organized and officers were named for the 1986-87 school year. Jeffrey Sutton and Gary Buck Mitchell were re-elected to their respective posts as president and vice-president. Van Miller will serve as a newly elected officer of the board as secretary. Other board members are Hank Sellers, Pullen and Childress.

A lighting bid for the football stadium was rejected by board members as being too high.

Discussion of a cafeteria food

service program ended with no action taken. In a related area, use of the school cafeteria facility was granted for a two-day seminar.

Superintendent Davis was named to represent this school district on the Educational Service Center Joint Committee, an ongoing advisory education committee that studies available educational materials based in San Angelo.

Others present at the meeting included Ted Cotton, assistant superintendent, and Curtis Keith, maintenance supervisor.

Sanchez qualifies for state meet

Sophomore Danny Sanchez has qualified to compete in the state track meet in the 3200 meter race following a winning first place finish of 9:57.34 at the regional meet in Odessa May 3.

Sanchez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Danny Sanchez Sr., qualified in the 800m event last year at the state level, track coach Pete Maldonado said. "He is one of the top seven runners in the state at this distance. He has as good a chance as anyone to be among the top three finishers."

To prepare for the state track meet in Austin, Sanchez competed in five area meets, Junction, Eldorado, Sonora, Iraan and Ozona, as well as the district meet and the regional meet in Odessa. At the 3200m distance, Sanchez has won that event at each of the seven meets.

The fleet-footed teenager placed third in the regional meet in the mile. To compete in the state meet, tracksters must finish in the top two positions. Valdo Galindo finished fifth in the 200m dash at the regional meet.

heavier in last week's sale. Much of the wool sold had uneven staple lengths. Brian May, manager of Ozona Wool and Mohair, reported that 75,000 pounds of 12 month wool brought between \$.88-\$1.03 3/4, down slightly from a year ago. The 62,000 pounds of eight month wool brought between \$.85-.95 1/2, up from the price in 1985. Prices on the 240,000 pounds of graded 12 month wool ranged between \$1.10-\$1.25, roughly the same as the 1985 spring prices.

"We sold all we had," May said. "We still have approximately 50,000 pounds to sell, but this was brought in after the April 30 sale."

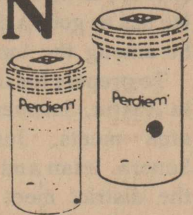
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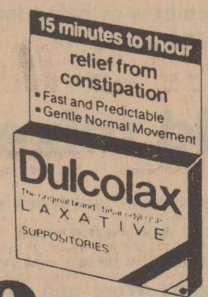

sold but two lots, Stuart explained. Prices received by buyers at Wool Growers ranged from \$.98-\$1.06 for 12 month paint free wool with 227,000 pounds sold. The 12 month paint in wool sold from \$.96-\$1.02, with 38,000 pounds sold. A small lot of eight month paint in wool brought \$.83, with 1,300 pounds sold. Prices on the eight month paint free 18,000 pounds ranged from \$.86-.93. All prices declined slightly from the spring of 1985, Stuart said.

Primary buyers at Wool Growers included: Burlington Industries, 90,000 pounds; Provost, 63,500 pounds; Wiley Hearne, 101,000 pounds; Anodyne, 11,000 pounds; and Forte, 4,000 pounds.

Potential fires averted

Volunteer firemen sped to the airport Monday evening after a Mayday call from a plane in trouble. Fortunately, the disabled plane was able to land with no damage. Repairs were made by the crew's mechanic to the World War II Navy PFY seaplane. The craft had been restored in California and was being flown to Pensacola, FL for a permanent home in a Navy museum when it developed left engine failure 9,000 feet over Ozona. The plane, which had also experienced mechanical failure over Wyoming, landed without incident at the Ozona airport.

Junior Umfrid has ample reason to believe that he is a lucky man after escaping serious injury last week in a welding accident. A Pool Company frac tank being repaired by Umfrid exploded as the welder worked Thursday afternoon.

Umfrid was knocked back several feet by the force of the explosion which blew out a seam of the large tank.

The only injury received by Whitley was a burned hand and wrist. The tank, which was being used to haul disposal water, had been okayed as free of fumes prior to the accident said Whitley.

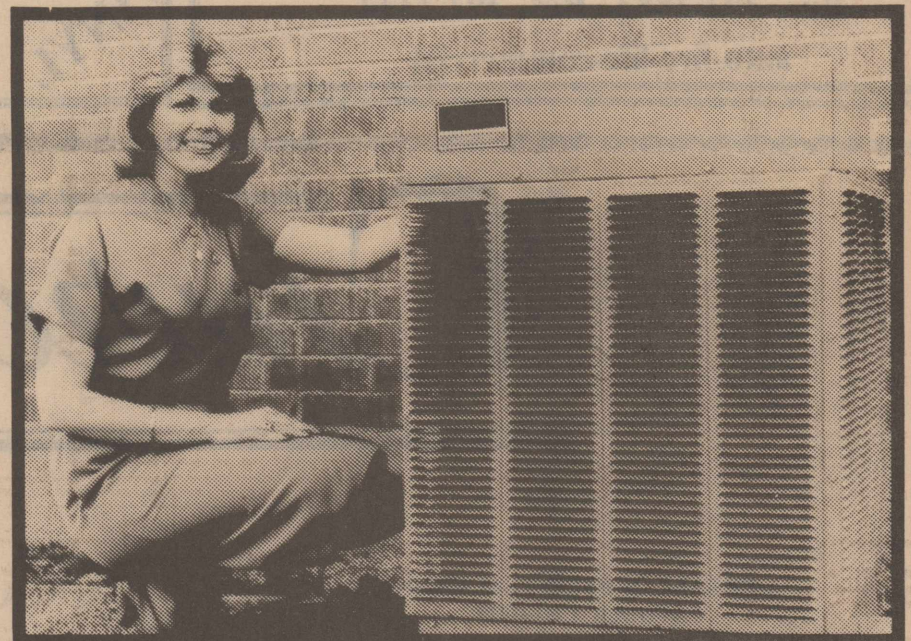
Firemen sprayed 300 gallons of water on the tank as a cool-down preventive measure.

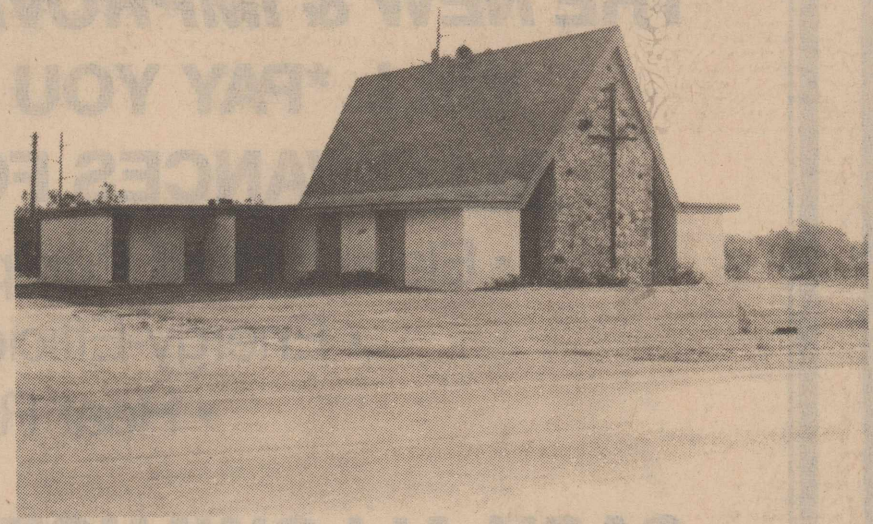

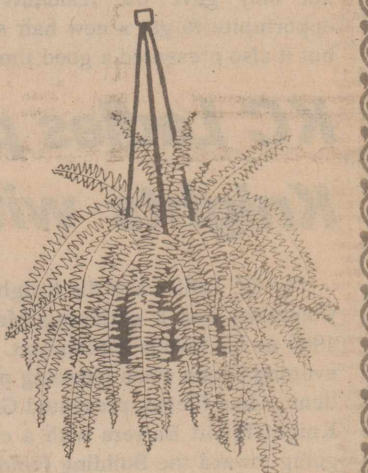

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Horses and art inspire Shorty Spurgers

A child's watercolor set marked the beginning of a new career following a heart attack for L. M. "Shorty" Spurgers.

Spurgers decided to spend his time recovering from his illness by combining his love of animals with his childhood love of painting. Despite never having had a formal art lesson, the former Ozona Butane employee enjoyed the freedom of painting. His first work was of two whitetail deer grazing in a forest.

His ability to capture horses on

canvas has won him many local fans since he started painting in 1970. "I enjoy painting. I must be completely in the mood to paint. I haven't painted during the last two years. I got stuck on horses, because they are hard to paint and I liked the challenge...they can move an ear and change the entire look of the picture. Horses are hard to draw for this reason."

Spurgers has expanded his art repertoire to include oil works, charcoal and pen and ink drawings.

"Charcoal is my favorite medium because you can add to it. Oil is too time consuming, and I'm too impatient to finish a painting. With ink work, you just can't make a mistake."

Art has been a long time interest. "When I was an elementary student, the teacher would call on me to do the art work for the class. It kinda comes to me."

Painting has given Spurgers discipline and patience. "I don't worry about selling my paintings. I just do it and give a lot away. I was once offered \$300 for a large oil canvas of a herd of longhorns. I had promised the picture to my daughter and had to say no to the offer. Through the years I have sold between 100-150 paintings."

The ideas for painting come from newspaper photos, pictures, imagination and magazines. Spurgers experimented several years ago with black and white oil works. The picture, with geese in the foreground, shows the Seattle skyline in the background. "According to an old Associated Press outline under the picture, the geese spend the winter in Seattle. This painting helped me learn to do grays and shadows."

Spurgers has learned to experiment by mixing two different art mediums. Charcoal and water color work may be combined if the charcoal is first sprayed with hair-spray to keep it from smearing. Then watercolors can be applied over the charcoal base.

Retirement has meant five years of solitude for the friendly man. Spurgers moved to Ozona following his marriage to Louise Casbeer. "Louise's father served as Crockett County treasurer for many years."

The late Mrs. Spurgers was ill during the last ten years that she lived. Because of her confining illness and because of an injury to Spurgers' arm, both stayed close to home. Occupying the many hours with something more than television and long distance visits by children and grandchildren caused Spurgers to attempt to combine his interest in horses with his artistic flair.

Spurgers now is content to simply have his paintings in art shows. "I have never entered an art contest, nor do I belong to the local art club. I may join eventually."

"I enjoy painting. It takes my mind off everything. I live alone and sometimes the quietness here becomes hard to bear. Then I can paint...With each painting, I learn something new. Every picture is a challenge."

Spurgers also enjoys visits from his growing family and fishing "anywhere I can". His daughter and son-in-law, Priscilla and Ronnie Shields, live in Ramah, NM with their children, Rhonda and Whelan.

A second daughter and son-in-law, Tommie and Diz Reeves, and their son, Tony, make their home in Boerne. The Reeves family has grown up and scattered. One grandson, Diz Jr., lives in Mason with his wife, Dee Ann, and their young children, Dana Coy, 2, and Danny, six months. The Diz Reeves' daughters, Michelle and Gayla, both live in San Antonio.

The artist hopes soon to return to the canvas and again express his talent for capturing the fleet-footed animals he loves. For now, his growing audience of admirers must be satisfied with his numerous works already finished.

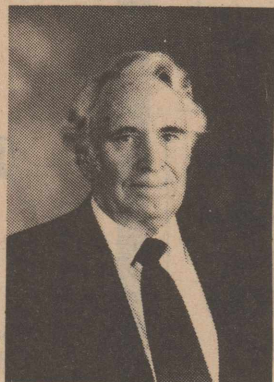

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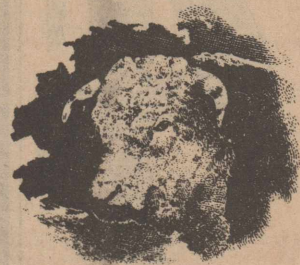
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
