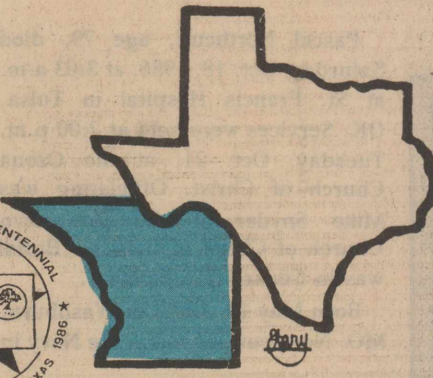

Airport Appreciation Day marks 29 years of service

Details for the Ozona Fly-In Saturday, Oct. 25, are in the final stages of preparation for "Ozona Airport Appreciation Day", according to Bobby Aycock, Ozona Chamber of Commerce coordinator for the event.

State Senator Bill Sims will touch off the fly-in when he presents a Texas flag which formerly flew over the state's capitol. Boy Scout Troop 153 members will raise the Texas flag as well as a U. S. flag sent for the occasion by U. S. Senator Phil Gramm. A flagpole has been erected especially for the event.

The highlight of the day's activities for many will be the 20 Confederate Air Force planes which will be on static display immediately following the flag raising ceremony. The World War II planes, belonging to members of the West Texas Wing

of the CAF, range in size from BT-13's to a multi-engine B-25 bomber.

The public will be allowed to examine the planes at close range and to talk with the pilots during the day.

Six civic organizations will man food booths, selling hamburgers, Frito pies, hotdogs, fajitas, barbecue sandwiches and baked goods by the slice. Iced tea, coffee and soft drinks will be available.

The Ozona Women's League will pre-sell their new cookbook while selling food.

The CAF Women's Auxiliary's PX, a trailer mounted shop selling T-shirts, pins, buttons and other souvenirs of the CAF, will be part of the program.

Model airplane demonstrations will be staged at several intervals

during the day with the last of these running from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m.

The Ozona Lions Club will serve barbecue plates, beginning at 5:30 p.m. Tickets are available from Lions Club members but may be bought at the dinner.

The fly-in, proclaimed by Crockett County Judge A. O. Fields as "Ozona Airport Appreciation Day," is a tri-fold celebration of the Texas Sesquicentennial, 29 years of aviation at Ozona Municipal Airport, and the 200th anniversary of David Crockett's birth, which occurred Aug. 17, 1786.

An admission charge of \$2 for adults and \$1 for children aged six to 12 will be used to defray some of the fuel costs of the CAF warbirds, some of which burn up to 50 gallons of fuel per hour.

4-H Food Show Nov. 1

The annual Crockett County 4-H Food Show will be held Saturday, Nov. 1, at the Civic Center. A schedule of activities for the morning includes: 8:15-8:45 a.m. - contestants arrive with food entries; 9:00-11:00 - judging; 11:00-11:30 - public viewing; 11:30 - presentation of awards and tasting tea.

Prior to the 4-H Food Show, 4-H'ers must complete a project record, menu and recipe form. Project records and menus are judged prior to the food show, while judge's interviews are held the day of the show. The various percentages of competition include: project record (10%), menu (20%), food (20%), and knowledge of nutrition (50%).

There are three age divisions this year: Junior I (ages 8-11), Junior II (ages 12-13), and Senior (ages 14-19). 4-H'ers may enter one of four categories: snacks and desserts, breads and cereal, main dish, and fruits and vegetables.

Co-chairmen of this year's 4-H Food Show are Sharman West and Janie Chandler. The following 4-H leaders have worked with 88 4-H'ers throughout their foods project: Debbie and Tammy Arrott, Cynthia Flores, Tanya Ramos, Judy Farris, Randi Thompson, Sharman and Trebie West, Nancy Vannoy, Evelyn Keith, Mary Lou Hayes, Kathy Mayfield, Cathy Carson, Carmen Sutton, Donna Snyder, Barbara Dominguez, Elsa Vasquez, Lou Whitley, Janie Chandler, Juanita Delgado, Becky Herring, Esmi Barrera, Betty Martin, Sandy Montgomery, Debbie Phillips, Alicia Perez, Sadie Davidson and Belinda Wilkins.

4-H'ers may participate in a foods and nutrition project and choose not to enter the food show. Objectives of the 4-H Foods and Nutrition Program include: helping 4-H members develop leadership talents and citizenship; understand the interrelation of science, nutrition and food preparation; understand signs of good health and food needs of different age groups; develop food buying skills; develop management skills in planning, preparation and nutritious meal service; insure food safety; and to understand the social and cultural roles of food in daily living.

Marching contest brings anticipation

Nervousness, tension, anxiety and high spirit, these are some of the words which describe the feelings of the members in the Ozona Lion Marching Band. The District 6-2A marching contest will take place this Saturday, Oct. 25, at Bulldog Stadium in Brady. The band is roaring and ready to go prove themselves to the three judges who will be sitting in the press box rating each band. They intend to also show the out of town audience what Ozona kids are really made of - the winning

stuff. A few of the bandmen had comments to make about this year's contest. Michael Glaze, a trombone player, said, "This band has what it takes to pull it off. If we keep improving at the rate we have been, we will get the 'I' we've worked so hard for." Another member of the band, Shannon Curry, said, "I know that we've got what it takes to get a 'I' and possibly advance to the regional marching contest in Temple." Jennifer Probst, head twirler, reiterated the views of the others. "I personally

am very nervous, but I know that if we put our hearts into it, we do have the ability to get a 'I.'" Amy Graham, a freshman tenor saxophone player, said also, "We've got what it takes to make this a super year. I just hope we get everything together and pull everything off." And last but not least, the man who holds this band together, Mr. Kelly Glaze, head band director, stated, "I am extremely optimistic about our possibilities for a first division. The band has been working hard, and the attitudes are better than ever."

There are several things which the contest judges take into consideration when rating a band. These areas include the music played, the marching itself, and band unity such as staying in step and alignment on the field. There are five possible ratings which a band can receive. A one, or first division, is the highest, and the ratings continue down to a five, of fifth division, which is the lowest a band can receive. From two of the first division ratings given in each district, the judges will select two bands to continue on at regional competition which is held in Temple.

The band's optimism is high, and there is a lot of anxiety this year. Ozona fans will get to see the band perform Friday night in Lion's Stadium before going to contest on Saturday. The band will be leaving Saturday morning at eight o'clock to travel to Brady. Anyone wishing to go and support the band is urged to attend the contest. The band will be performing at two o'clock in the afternoon. Band members really do appreciate the support they have been given this year, and they hope to bring home a first division trophy to emphasize their gratitude.

Baggett, Perry re-elected to board

Bill Baggett and Gene Perry were re-elected to the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. Baggett will represent Zone 1 of the district and Perry will represent Zone 2.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on

ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies and other organizations and has au-

thority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As members of the board of directors, Baggett and Perry will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

Texas has 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

The Crockett district was organized in 1950. The purpose is to further soil, water and plant conservation to the land within the district.

Detention Center Corp. buys Heights property

Crockett County Detention Center, Inc. gained control of 10 acres of Crockett Heights property Oct. 21. Corporation president Harry Sinclair and Burl Myers, secretary/treasurer of the organization, signed the papers in Midland Tuesday to acquire the \$131,000 property from John Conn of San Angelo.

Sinclair has also has options to buy acreage belonging to Linda Kramer and Huey Ingram.

The corporation plans to develop the former radar base at Crockett Heights into a 400 bed detention center to house minimum security prisoners. Sinclair estimates that the facility will eventually employ 50-60 persons, many of them local.

Once total financing is obtained for the \$1.3 million center, a three to six month time table will be required to be ready for occupancy. Inmates

are expected to be placed there by the Federal Bureau of Prisons, Immigration and Naturalization Service and the Border Patrol according to Sinclair.

Crockett County Detention Center,

Inc. was approved as a Sub-Chapter S corporation in late September. Sinclair, Myers and vice-president Clayton Robinson are joined on the board by Bill Thornton and Sandy Stokes.

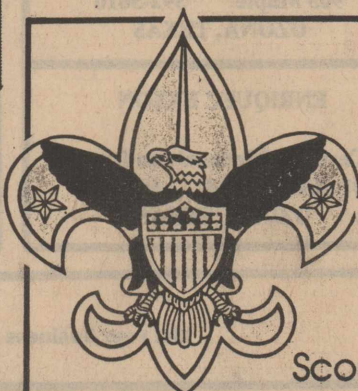

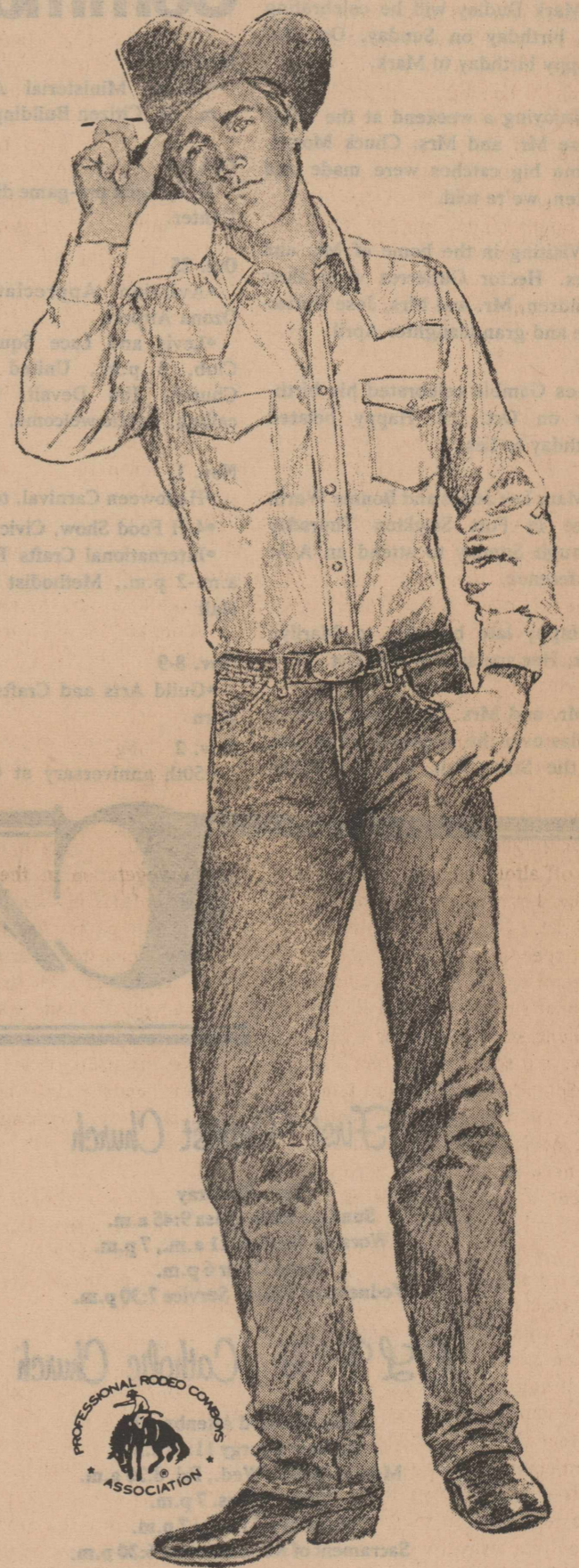
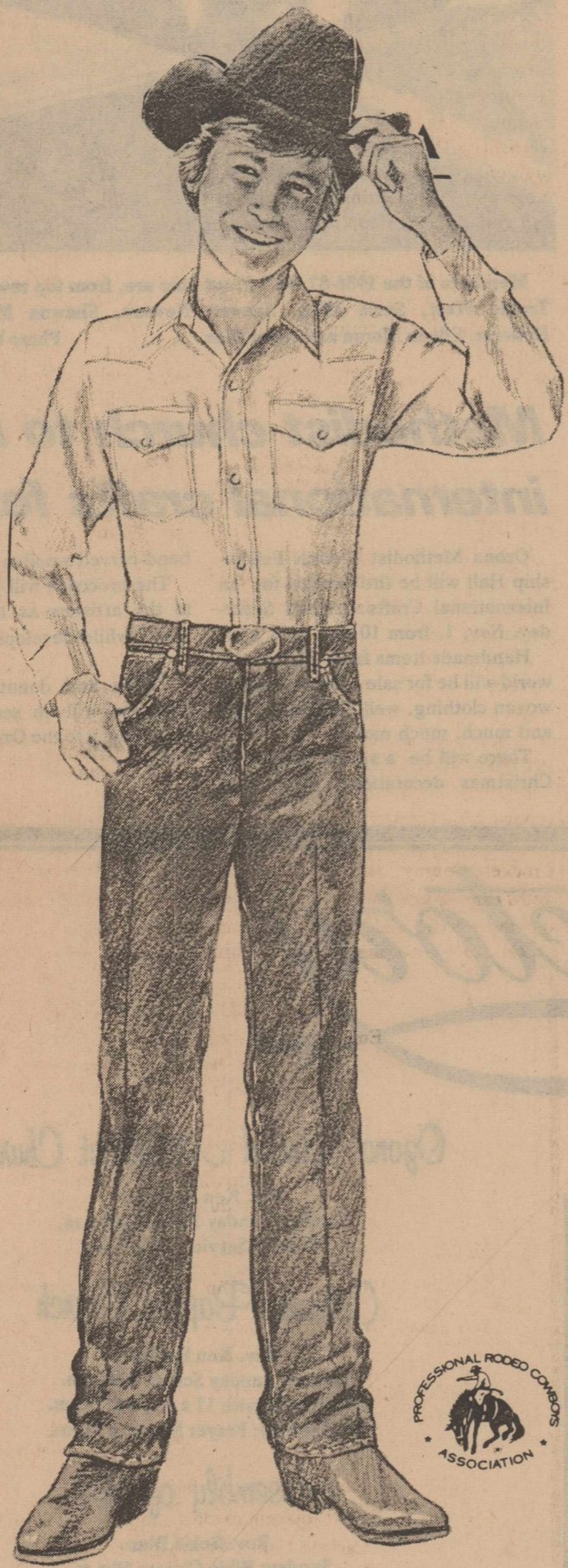

J.V. romps over Eagles

Split-end Robby Tambunga scored two of the Lions' three touchdowns Oct. 16 as the junior varsity gained the fourth win of the season in an 18-0 romp over the Eldorado Eagles.

The Lions' offensive attack was based on a strong running game that allowed Ozona backs to gain more than 200 yards on the ground. The Lions, led by Lalo Rodriguez who rushed for 73 yards on 19 carries with a touchdown, amassed 206 yards rushing on 47 carries for a 4.4 yard average.

Although the Lions limited their passing attack to just two completions on five attempts, quarterback Oscar Galindo teamed up with Tambunga on a 14 yard scoring pass on Ozona's first drive of the game. The PAT was no good, and the Lions took a 6-0 lead.

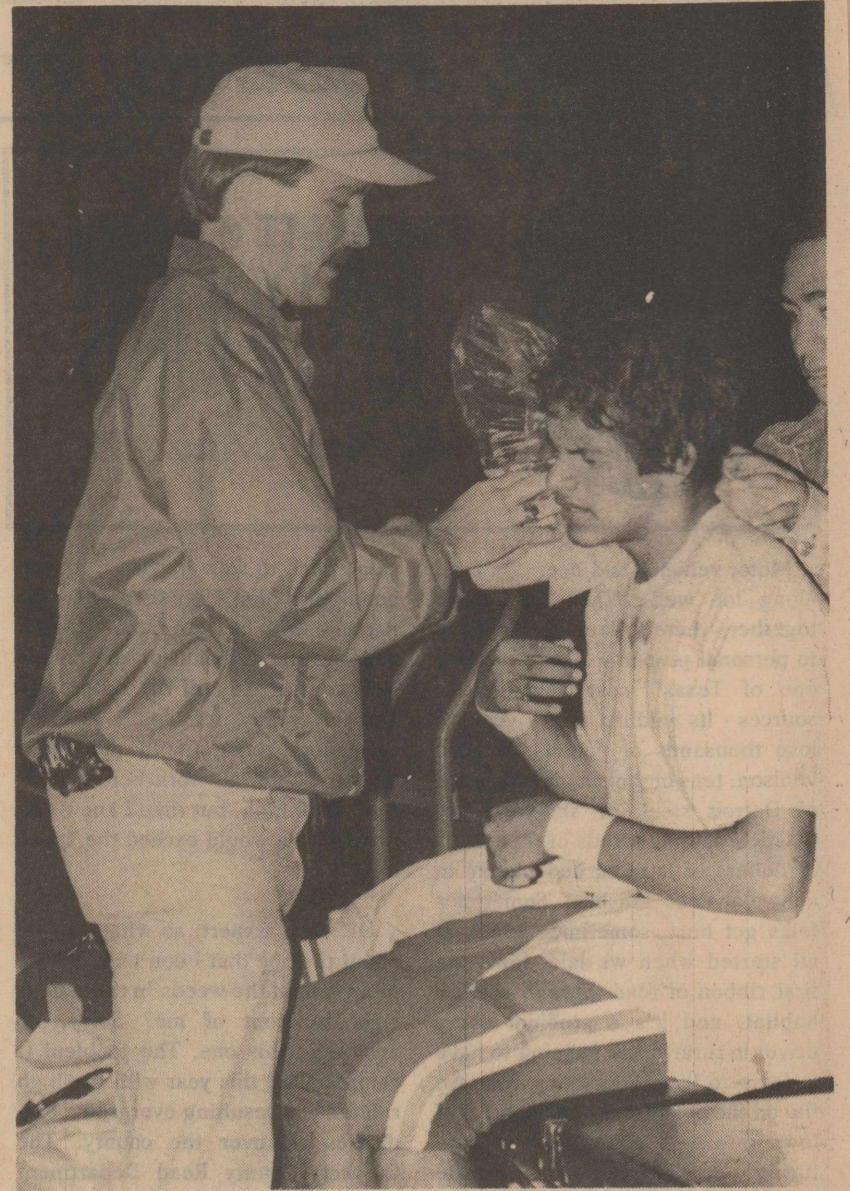
Eldorado couldn't break through the tough Ozona defense and turned the ball over to the Lions who promptly fumbled the ball back to Eldorado. The Eagles began a drive of their own on the Eldorado 24 and drove it to the Lion 41 before punting the ball to Ozona.

On fourth and long from his own 35, Tambunga faked a punt and raced 65 yards untouched into the end zone to end the first half with Ozona leading 12-0.

As soon as the Lions got their hands on the ball in the second half, George Ybarra cranked out an eight yard touchdown to give Ozona their final score of the evening and an 18-0 victory.

Defensively, the Lions gave up an unbelievable total of only four yards offense to Eldorado who gained minus 16 on the ground on 31 carries and 20 yards passing on one completion. This incredible defensive charge was led by middle linebacker Mark Fierro who had 10 tackles and four assists.

The J.V.'s next test will be to erase the memory of last year's 21-7 loss to Reagan County as they travel to Big Lake and take on the Owls this Thursday at 6:30 p.m.

Lions falter against Eldorado

The Ozona Lions lost their second district game Friday, Oct. 17, in a low-scoring battle. The Eldorado Eagles were able to make it into the end zone for the only score of the game, winning 7-0.

The main event during the game proved to be the battle between the teams' defenses. Even though the Eagles tallied 221 yards rushing, Ozona held several times during crucial drives.

Only two plays up-handed the Lion defense. Coming with five minutes left in the first half and both sides scoreless, Eldorado went to the air and almost had a touchdown, but Oscar Payne made the stop 43 yards down the field. However, on the next play the Eagles pushed the ball into the end zone for the six points. The extra point attempt succeeded, and Eldorado led 7-0.

The Lions responded with a beautifully executed run. On the kickoff after Eldorado's touchdown, Valdo Galindo fielded the ball then slipped it into Sub Fierro's grasp. Fierro quickly quieted the Eldorado fans with his 62 yard run to the Eagles' 25 yard line.

But the defensive struggle revived as the Lion's failed to move the ball much further toward the goal line. Then Ozona's attempt at a fake run on a field goal try was smothered by the alert Eagle defense.

Both offenses were unable to motivate any sort of drive during the remainder of the first half.

Eldorado took possession of the ball on their own 41 early in the

fourth quarter and moved to Ozona's nine after four plays. The Lion defense, led by Wolv Rutherford, Abel Lara and Butch Gonzalez, showed what they had up their sleeves in a great goal line stand. Eldorado was halted on the one yard line.

Within a few minutes, the Eagles would again knock on Ozona's door by moving within 14 yards of six points. But again, Ozona held.

Despite the strong showing of their defense, the Lions were never able to spark, other than Fierro's kickoff return, a drive into the end zone.

Quarterback Sam Hightower was sidelined due to a knee injury, but Copie Davis was capable of handling anything Eldorado threw at him and went to the air a few times for 46 yards passing.

Harvey Dominguez led Ozona rushers with 22 yards while James Sanchez followed with 20. Roger Flores caught two passes for 46 yards receiving.

The Lions come home for their third district game against rival Big Lake. The game will start at 8:00 on Oct. 24.

Cubs pound Iraan for 42-7 victory

But Iraan's score did little to discourage the Cubs as quarterback Brad Bollier connected with Gilbert Rico for a 47 yard touchdown pass play. Borrego bulled his way in for the two point conversion.

Board hears T.E.A.M.S. results

The regular monthly meeting of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees was held Tuesday, Oct. 14.

During the meeting, the members approved a budget amendment for Ozona Primary School teaching materials, and they approved the addition of Sandra Hearne, Benny Gail Hunnicutt, Brenda Pool and Nikki Sewell to the local substitute teacher list.

Two requests for leaves of absence were granted by the seven-member board. The leaves were requested by Mrs. Josie Mendoza and Mrs. Linda Sessom, school cafeteria employees.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton gave a report on a seven-year comparison of Ozona's Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (T.E.A.M.S.) results to state results. After reviewing the history of test results in reading, writing, and mathematics at the third grade level, Mr. Cotton stated that an analysis of these results revealed that Ozona's students had attained an 82% success ratio in equaling or surpassing the state average on comparable objectives. Fifth and ninth grade test results were also reviewed, and a 77% fifth grade success ratio and a 53% ninth grade


success ratio were reported for these two levels.

At the conclusion of his report, Mr. Cotton said that when third, fifth, and ninth grade test results were grouped together, the overall student success ratio in equaling or surpassing the state average was 72%.

Superintendent Garland Davis reported that the Ozona High School Library was now open each Monday from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. for students who needed to use the library after school hours. He also reported that satisfactory progress was being made on the Davidson Gymnasium Addition Project.

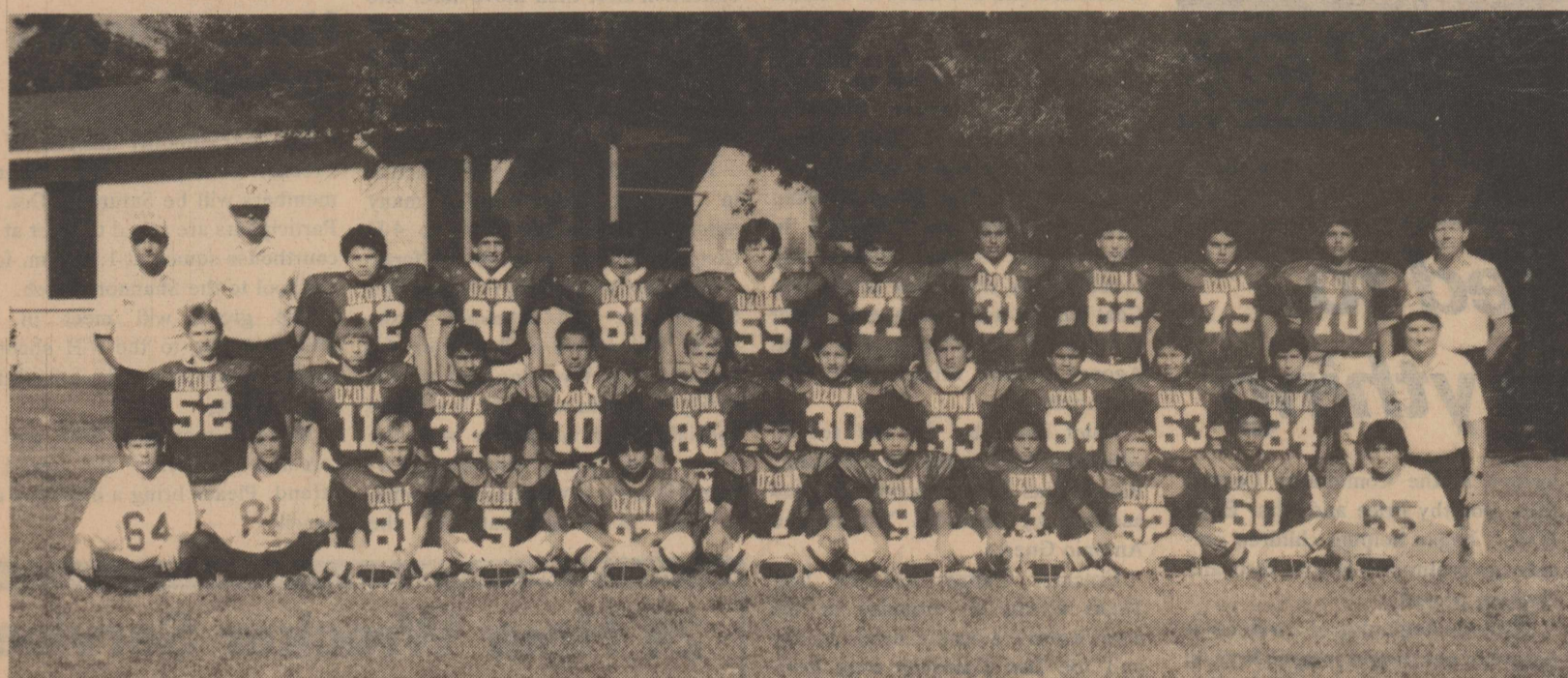

County agent expected to know how to do everything

October's annual National 4-H Week never fails to bring a host of memories to one Ozonan. Pete Jacoby, a county agent and 4-H leader for 23 years, enjoys an occasional round of reminiscing at the wool house with some of his former 4-H members. "Of course, most of those stories you couldn't print," says Jacoby of some of his kids' experiences.

Jacoby began his career as a county agent in Ozona in April of 1952. Prior to that time, he was affiliated with Kimble Veterans Vocational Schools in Junction for six years.

During his first year in Ozona, 25 4-H Club members fed out 153 lambs and attended three major stock shows. Erby Chandler had the grand champion at the Fifth Annual Crockett County Livestock Show that year. Tom Kincaid exhibited the reserve champion, and Tom Max Robison received the sheep production award.

The wool and mohair team placed ninth in state with Erby Chandler, Jody Jones, Brock Jones and Bobby Sutton as members.

The livestock judging team of Charles Garlitz, Graham Childress, Scott Hickman and Bill Schneeman won second at district in Lubbock. These teams were the forerunners of teams which would establish a record of four state judging championships in 1956, a record which still stands.

Carl Conklin, Roy Mann and Johnny Jones were the 1956 state champs in grass judging with Conklin, George Bünger Jr., Pierce Miller and Jacquelyn Williams taking the honors in wool and mohair.

Williams, Bünger and Miller were joined by Pleas Childress III in winning range judging.

Members of Ozona's state championship junior wool and mohair team were: Bill Jacoby, Jay Miller, Frank Childress and Bill Williams.

For about nine years, Crockett County produced every state winner in range management.

"Working with kids in range, grass and livestock judging, practical programs for the area," are what Jacoby enjoyed most about the 4-H program. Show programs were the least liked aspect of 4-H for Jacoby. "I felt they didn't give kids what they really needed," said the former agent. Together with parents, Jacoby and his 4-H'ers left the show circuit and built what has been described as one of the top county breeding sheep and lamb programs in the state.

A show barn for the club became a reality in 1958. "This is the way it happened," began Jacoby. Annual livestock shows were being held in such places as the tennis courts, hay barns, the fairgrounds, and finally the Smith Building downtown. "This time, about half the kids were sick after the show, and some of the leaders decided it was about time something was done for 4-H in Crockett County."

Tommie Chandler and Vicky Miller attended the next Commissioners' Court meeting accompanied by about 20 other mothers. After presenting their request for a 4-H Barn, the ladies refused to leave until a decision was made, said Jacoby.

The result - a 4-H Barn paid for (\$14,000) by the school system with county equipment used to haul dirt and build the foundation. The original structure has been expanded several times.

Jacoby worked with the total 4-H program in Crockett County for three or four years until a woman agent was assigned here. She was assigned to the county after "two energetic

women at the Community Center, Mrs. Dorothy Price and Mrs. Ethel Wolf," began helping children outside the realm of 4-H with food and clothing projects.

With the beginning of a wider 4-H program, enrollment jumped from 30 to 400 in one year, said Jacoby, earning Crockett County a plaque from the state.

The first food show held at North Elementary March 27, 1965, drew 68 contestants. The first dress revue was also held in 1965.

Chicago is the "top rung of the ladder" for 4-H'ers according to Jacoby. Twelve of his 4-H'ers earned trips to Chicago's National 4-H Congress with their record books.

Four of Jacoby's 4-H members have followed in his footsteps and become county agents. They are Donnie and Janie Edgerton, Tommy Everett and Pam Young.

4-H is the only area where many see the county agent, but there is much more to the job.

"I was hired because Ozona needed a vet," said the Menard ranch-raised Jacoby. When he applied for the Crockett County position, there were quite a few area cows with milk fever. Experience in tending range stock and a degree in agriculture from Texas A&M had prepared Jacoby for his job interview with Commissioners' Court.

In the course of questioning, Jacoby was asked if he knew anything about doctoring stock, about milk fever.

"Why, I probably killed more livestock trying to treat 'em than any vet in the State of Texas," he replied. "That kinda broke the ice," said Jacoby, and he was hired.

Two years later, after the flood of 1954, Jacoby joined others in the county in an effort to obtain a flood control plan for the area. A year later, seven dams on Johnson Draw watershed and two miles of channel improvement through town were completed. A cooperative effort of citizens, the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District, Commissioners Court and the Soil Conservation Service made it possible.

In 1958, the first sheep shearing school in Texas got underway in Ozona. The school, which was conceived by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, was a joint venture of the Texas Education Agency, Ozona schools and area ranchmen.

Chief instructor for the school, which was held on the Troy Williams Ranch, was Juan Sanchez. He was assisted by Leonides Vargas and Antonio Guerra.

Crockett County was the first Texas county to organize in the screwworm eradication drive. Jacoby and Joe Tom Davidson were instigators of the local screwworm control committee with \$5,000 in donations received on organization night. Wayne West headed the committee with Davidson as vice-chairman and Lowell Littleton as treasurer. The work of the committee and precinct chairmen W. E. Friend Jr., R. A. Harrell, Frank McMullan and James

Childress raised \$53,700 in Crockett County for screwworm eradication. "As far as I know, we collected from every stockman in the county," said Jacoby.

Two thick scrapbooks chronicle Jacoby's work in Crockett County and with its youths.

Jacoby received the Distinguished Service Award in 1972. He was selected by fellow agents as outstanding in his field and recognized at the annual Texas County Association meeting. The award was presented later that year at a national meeting of county agents in Atlanta, GA.

The former agent was also recognized by the Texas Section of the National Range Management Society as an outstanding agent in that field.

He served for two years as a director of the Texas County Agriculture Agents' Association.

"I had lots of help," said Jacoby of his 23 years as a county agent. Among the help is his wife, Jimmie. "She was a real good supporter."

The Jacobys raised their two sons, Pete Jr. (Bill) and David in Ozona, and Jimmie completed her college education after their move here. She attended classes on Saturdays and during summers to earn her teaching degree, then a master's. After 27 years of teaching, she retired in 1984.

Both the Jacoby boys were active in the 4-H Club, winning many honors. Each earned a trip to 4-H Congress in Chicago for their efforts.

After graduation from Ozona High School, the two attended Texas A&M. Bill earned a Ph.D from the University of Wyoming and is now living in Vernon where he is a range specialist and researcher with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He and his wife have two sons. David is a graduate of the

University of Texas Medical School in Galveston, and is an emergency room physician at Breckenridge Hospital in Austin. He and his wife expect to be parents by mid-November.

A 1972 trip to Hawaii and a recent trip to San Diego to a golf tournament have been major travels for the Jacobys. Devoted to each other, the two prefer spending their time together at home to retirement travels. Both are avid golfers.

7D Ranch Co. ships cattle to Taiwan

The 7D Ranch Company between Barnhart and Sterling City is in the process of shipping 500 Brangus heifers to Taiwan for breeding stock. Buyers were at the ranch Labor Day to look and buy.

The first load of heifers left Oct. 11 by truck for Chicago. From there the cattle will be flown to Taiwan.

The heifers weighed 450 average and were all very uniform cattle.

The group will meet in the afternoon due to the 4-H shooting sports competition to be held Saturday morning.

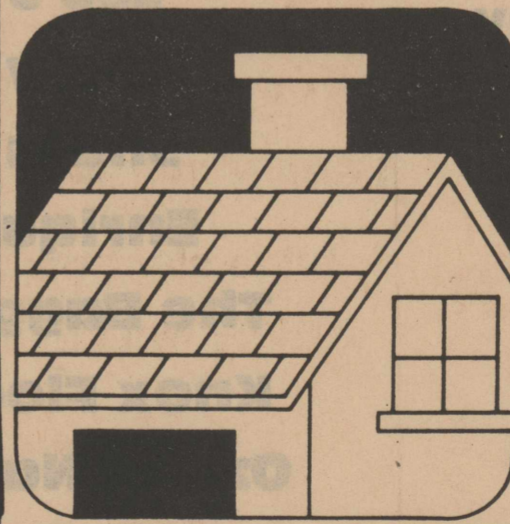

T.E.A.M.S. set for juniors Oct. 28-29

As a result of the passage of House Bill 72 by the Texas Legislature, juniors in Texas high schools will be taking math and English language arts competency tests on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct 28 and 29. Passage of both sections of the T.E.A.M.S. (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) test will enable these students to become eligible to receive a high school diploma at the end of their twelfth grade, provided that all graduation requirements have been met.

Students who fail one or both sections of the state-mandated examination will be required to retake the failed section(s) of the test in May, 1987. If successful mastery has not been accomplished by that time, students will have two additional opportunities during their senior year to pass the T.E.A.M.S. test before being denied a diploma in May, 1988.

The mathematics section of the Exit-Level T.E.A.M.S. will consist of 72 multiple choice questions covering eighteen objectives. These objectives are:

1. Selecting a set of numbers that are correctly ordered from least to greatest;

2. Rounding numbers to a particular place value;
3. Identifying equivalent fractions, decimals, and percents;
4. Converting numbers from exponential notation to standard notation;
5. Solving problems involving addition/subtraction/multiplication of fractions and mixed numbers;
6. Using the basic operations to solve decimal problems;
7. Solving problems involving addition of integers;
8. Solving word problems involving multiple operations of whole numbers, decimals, fractions and mixed numbers;
9. Solving word problems using formulas;
10. Solving word problems involving proportions;
11. Solving word problems involving percent;
12. Solving problems involving metric/customary measurements using the basic operations;
13. Solving word problems involving averages;
14. Solving word problems involving simple probability;
15. Using information from graphs and tables to solve word

problems;

16. Solving problems involving geometric formulas;
17. Using geometric properties to solve problems involving geometric shapes; and,
18. Solving problems to determine the value of a variable.

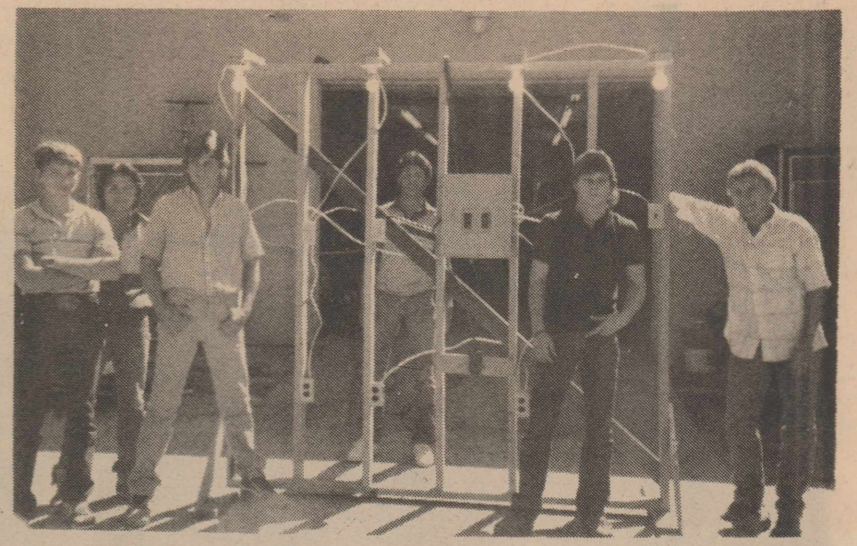
The English language arts section of the Exit-Level T.E.A.M.S. will contain 72 multiple choice questions over eighteen reading and writing objectives. These objectives are:

1. Identifying the main idea;
2. Using context to understand the meaning of words;
3. Using word structure to identify words;
4. Identifying specific details;
5. Identifying a sequence of events;
6. Drawing logical conclusions;
7. Identifying the appropriate reference source;
8. Using reference sources to locate information;
9. Distinguishing between fact and opinion;
10. Analyzing literary selections;
11. Demonstrating knowledge of standard uses of capitalization;
12. Demonstrating knowledge of

13. Recognizing the correct spelling of commonly used words;
14. Demonstrating knowledge of correct English usage;
15. Demonstrating the ability to distinguish complete sentences from fragments;
16. Recognizing sentences that best combines two related sentences;
17. Demonstrating the ability to organize written communication; and,
18. Demonstrating the ability to proofread written communication.

All juniors in Texas public schools are required to take the Exit-Level T.E.A.M.S. except those students who have been formally evaluated and determined to have a physical, mental or other impairment which entitles the student to receive special education and related services.

Ozona school officials expect to receive test results by the end of November, and students will be notified as soon as possible. Remedial instruction will be provided to those students who fail either the mathematics or the English language arts section of the state test.

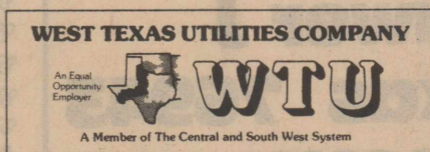

Letter to the editor

Dear Editor:

The following is borrowed from a "Dear Abby" column in a Houston newspaper. It is one of many articles we receive from our kids' grandparents to help us be better parents, but in this case I think it should be sent to the kids themselves - to make them better citizens. It was comments from a Judge Alfonso Sepe as he sentenced a 17-year-old Florida boy to one year in the county stockade and four years probation for possessing hallucinogenic drugs and assaulting a Miami Beach police officer.

Judge Sepe spoke directly to the youth and said: "Do you know who is going to serve that year? Not you; your mother and father will serve that year. Your body is in the stockade for a year, but their souls are tormented for a lifetime. Why? Because you are a selfish, spoiled boy, that's why."

"There is no punishment in the world that I could inflict upon you that could in any way compensate for what you are doing to your mother and father. I have not spent five cents raising you. I don't know you from Adam. But your mother and father have put their lives, their hearts, their sweat, their money and everything else they have into bringing you up. And now they have to sit in this courtroom and listen to a total stranger who had nothing to do with your upbringing scold you and put you in jail."

"This is at a time when phony kids your age are yelling, 'You adults have your alcohol, we want our drugs; you have polluted our water and our air, you have polluted this and that,' and all the rest of the garbage that comes out of your mouths. Meanwhile, you put yourselves above everybody else. I feel sorry for you."

"I want you to think of this for one year, and the reason why I say it: If you are sick, a doctor will treat you and he won't be on drugs. The lawyer who represents you won't be high on drugs, and the people in whose custody you'll be won't be on drugs. Your astronauts are not on drugs, and your president is not. And your engineers who build the bridges that you drive across and the tunnels that you drive through are not on drugs, and those who build the planes that you fly in and the cars that you drive are not. Neither are those who build the bathrooms that you stink up with your lousy, rotten drugs. None of them have been on drugs, and this is because of people like your mother and father."

"But in the world of the future the same may not be true. Teachers, doctors, lawyers, legislators - products of the new drug oriented generation - may well be high as kites. You won't know whom to send your child to, or whom to trust your life to."

Sepe sighed and closed the case

file. "Let's see what kind of world you leave to your children before you talk about the world that we left to ours."

This was in 1972. So here we sit, fourteen years later, and it appears the judge must have had some kind of crystal ball, because most of the judge's worst prophecies have been fulfilled. Our kids need to realize that if they are going to do something about the world they are going to bring their own kids up in, they have to start now by cleaning up their own backyard!

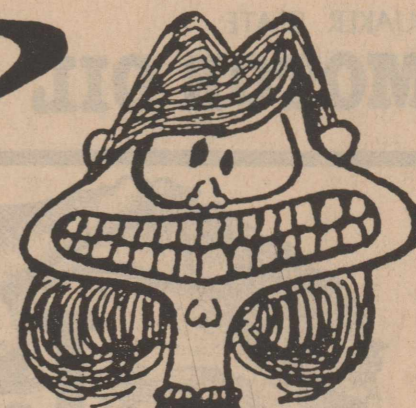

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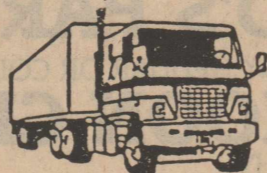
