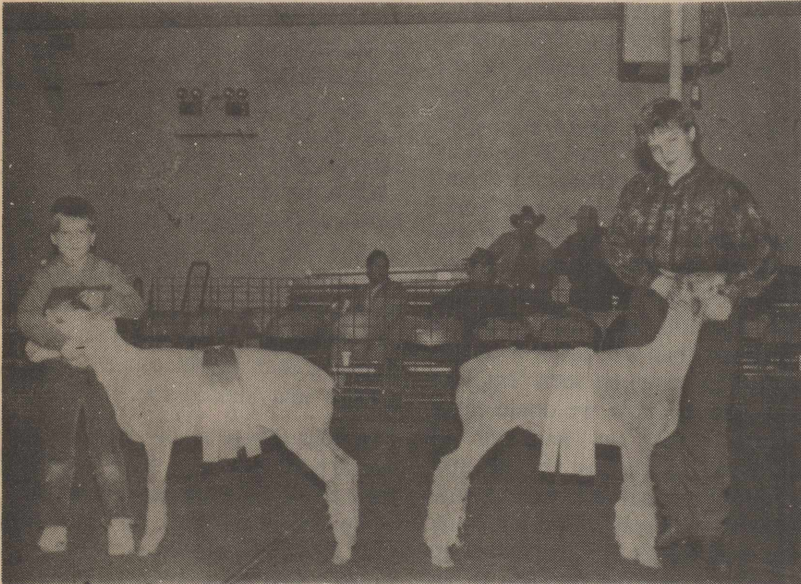

## Jr. Livestock Show provides stiff competition

A combination of correctness of finish, eye appeal, muscling and long body (particularly in the hind saddle) was what Sam Kuykendall was looking for in lambs during the 1991 Market Lamb Show held Saturday at the Clint Langford Memorial 4-H Center. Mr. Kuykendall has been the County Extension Agent in Menard for 21 years and is a highly qualified judge. He has already judged the Brown County show this year and is committed to judging the upcoming Tom Green County Show.

Saturday, the Jacoby brothers, Tom and Jason, exhibited lambs that must have had all the characteristics Kuykendall was looking for. Tom was awarded Champion Finewool Lamb and Jason received Champion with his crossbred lamb. Jason also won Reserve Champion with his Finewool and Crossbred Carcasses. All lambs were bred by Jacoby.

Challenging the Jacoby brothers for top awards was Amy Patton. With lambs bred by the Rousselot Ranch, she won Reserve Champion Finewool as well as Reserve Champion Crossbred. Amy also exhibited the first place Ewe Lamb Pair and placed third in the Lamb Showmanship contest.

Receiving Champion in the Finewool Carcass Class, with a lamb bred by the Rousselot Ranch, was Brad Mogford. His lamb had placed 4th in the live class. Champion honors were awarded to Scott Garrett in the Crossbred Carcass Class. His lamb was also bred by the Rousselot Ranch and had received 2nd place in the live class. The live classes were judged last Saturday by Jerry Swift of Eldorado and Dale Brandenberger of Junction. Judging the Carcass Class was Max Stabel with Ranch House Meats in Menard.

The Novice Lamb Class, held for 4-H or FFA members who have never won a champion or reserve in the market or carcass division of the Sutton County Livestock Show, was won by Jason Bounds. Brady

Lock followed him in 2nd place.

Bobby Joe Mogford came out on top in the Senior Lamb Showmanship and Hadley Smith won Junior Lamb Showmanship. Mr. Preston Faris, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, said, "Exhibitors did an excellent job of exhibiting their animals and the senior lamb showmanship class was particularly competitive. I felt like the showmanship judges did an excellent job of judging this class."

Goat Showmanship Awards were also presented Saturday evening. April Spiller received first place in the Senior category and Thomas Schenkel in the Junior competition.

Competition for the Champion Breeder's Award proved to be very stiff during the concluding weekend of the 44th Annual Junior Livestock Show and Sale. This award is presented to the breeder whose lambs accumulate the most points at the show. First and second place honors were divided by one point. In the end, Rousselot Ranch won the award with Jacoby following in 2nd place.

Thirty-six 4-H and FFA members exhibited approximately 190 lambs during the Market Lamb Show Saturday. County Extension Agent Preston Faris said, "though the lamb numbers were down slightly from last year, the quality was definitely stable with more depth per class." The show consisted of 5 Finewool Classes, 4 Crossbred Classes, 1 Ewe Lamb Pair Class and 1 Novice Lamb Class. Mr. Sam Kuykendall, who judged the event this year as well as last, said, "The quality of lambs was excellent and really close on the top end. Lots of these lambs could go anywhere and win. Generally speaking, they are excellently finished and I didn't find a lot of overfat, wastey lambs." He also added, "I enjoy the kids here because they are nice, polite and good showmen."

The sale and Chinese Auction garnered approximately \$30,000 this year. Auctioneer for the event was John Adams. Fifty-one lots

were sold and at the conclusion of the sale, enough money had been pledged to add \$100 to each sale lot. Lee Bloodworth, Agricultural Science Teacher for the Future Farmers of America, stated, "Sales were bigger than last year thanks to the generosity of local and West Texas contributors. They made a

wise investment in Sonora's youth." In reference to the FFA becoming part of the Junior Livestock Show, he added, "on behalf of Sonora I.S.D., in particular the FFA, we appreciate the acceptance of the program into the existing County show."

An information-sharing meeting concerning the possibility of having a Christmas-in-April project in Sonora will be held in Room C of First National Bank on Tuesday evening, January 22, beginning at 7:00 p.m.

developed in Sonora. Carole Thorp will discuss the conditions of certain dwellings which might be considered for repairs in the project, and Lewis Allen will discuss the steps to be considered in completing a Christmas-in-April project.

Alan decided to relocate to Sonora and began managing the local store in November 1989. Support of the community is what he credits to his success in Sonora.

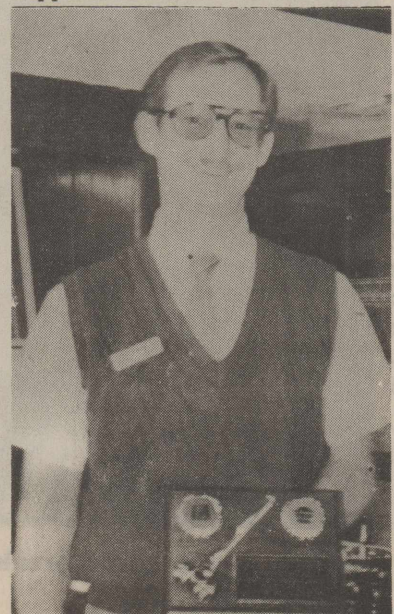

This was a very physical game as there were 44 total fouls and 19 total points from free throws.

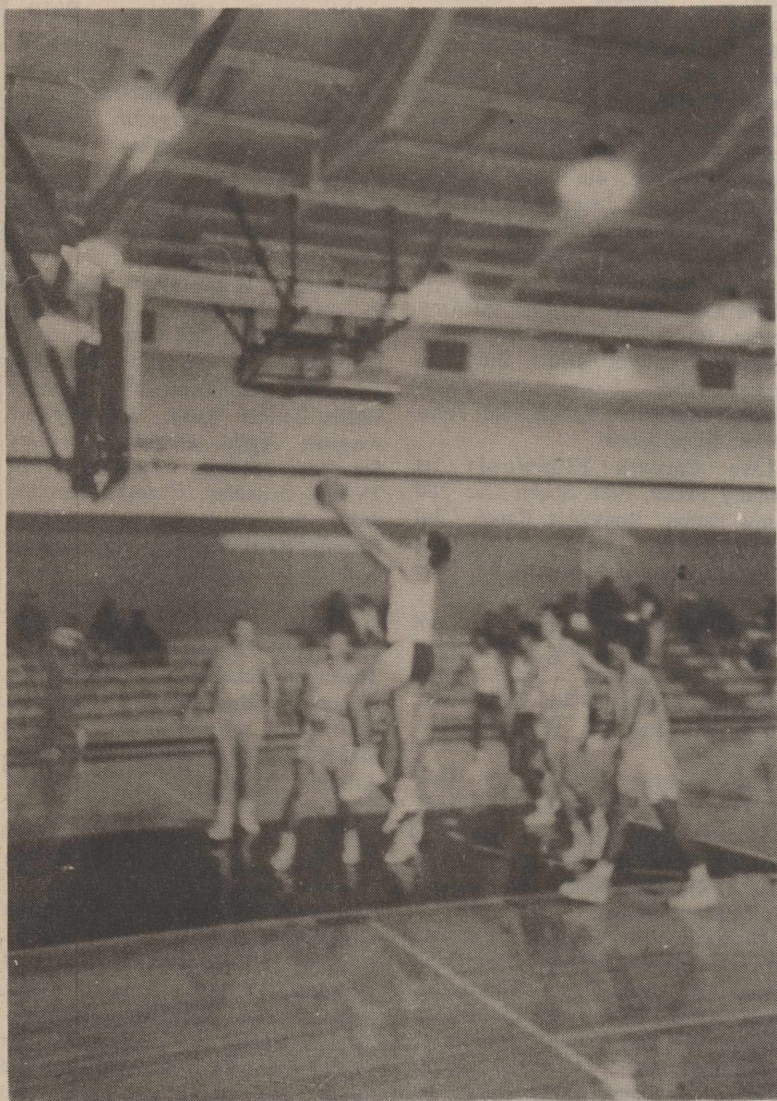

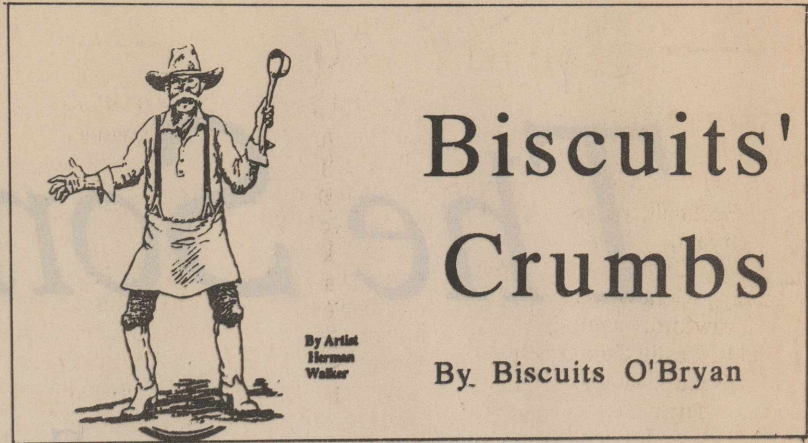

## A FISH STORY (OR IS IT A HORSE STORY)

I ain't too much on consuming large quantities of hard likker, cause the effects are too painful in my declinin' years (they were in my younger days too, but I was tougher then, or maybe just not as smart as I am now), but I recollect a fishin' trip I got lured into a few years back where my lack of discretion overrode my good sense. These two no-count cowboys had bought 'em a flat-bottom boat from a Cajun con-man who knew a couple of suckers when he seen 'em, and they told me how we could catch enough catfish to feed all of Brewster County just by floatin' peacefully down the Rio Grande follerin' a bunch of plastic milk jugs with hooks and lines on 'em. I look back on my decision to go with real concern for my senity.

We drove down to Lajitas (this was long before it became a big resort), told Rex Ivy what we was goin' to do, and he said he'd send somebody down to meet us at Adam's Ranch in about a week, all the while kinda grinnin' and shakin' his head. But I was too blind to read the signs. Then we drove down to Mariscal Canyon (so's we wouldn't be havin' to go through Santa Elena and the Rockslide) (at least we showed that much good sense), put the boat and all our gear in the river, locked up the pick-up (it was so old and beat up that it probably looked like it had been deserted), and away we went. "Course by then it was afternoon, so we didn't try to go very far that day. We spent the night in the canyon, and I never felt so small in all my life, bein' closed in on by them thousand foot high walls. That night, we seen the spookiest, but most awe-inspirin' thing we'd ever seen. About 2 hours after dark, we noticed this little band of light along the rim of the west wall of the canyon, and nobody could figger it out. That little strip of light ever so slowly began to grow, creepin' down the canyon wall. Now we were growed-up men, but I'll tell you, ever ghost story I'd ever heard come to mind and we was all about ready to pack up and try and escape when all of a sudden the biggest, brightest full moon I ever experienced exploded over the east rim. It was plumb glorious, and we danced, whooped, and hollered like a band of idiots, 'cause we was relieved, scared, and moon-struck. It's a memory that'll hang with me 'til I die. But that ain' what I set out to tell you.

We drifted on down the river, pullin' in a fish ever now and then, but not comin' anywhere close to gettin' enough even for a decent fish fry at the ranch, much less feedin' the county. But it was pleasant enough, and all I had to do was sit in the front of the boat and watch the jugs float along so I could let them boys know if a fish got ahold of one. Eventually, we come to the majestic city of Boquillas, Mexico. Now I don't know if things has changed there, but back then, they did't have electricity or running water, there was only a dirt road comin' in and out of town, and there wasn't a bridge to the American side, so shoppin' for supplies was pretty limited. One thing we done was ask around to see if there was any place we could get a meal, havin'

been eatin' camp food for a few days. This little kid took us to his house where his mama fixed us beans and fried taters. Then she set out this green chile salsa in a stone "metate" like they use to grind stuff. Now I like dietary fire good as the next feller, but a voice in my head told me to watch out, so I just set back and let the other boys have first go at the chile. Now ol' Melvin liked to brag about how he liked hot stuff, so he heaped a big bunch of that salsa on his beans and took a big bite. He chewed a couple of times, turned purple as a turnip, and his nose exploded blood. I swear he didn't breathe for about 5 minutes, then he let out a horse scream and headed for the river.

I've been thirsty in my day, but I would have to be near death to drink from the Rio Grande as it flows by Boquillas, but I think ol' Melvin took the river down about 3 inches. I tried a timid spoonful of that stuff on my beans, and that was nearly more'n I could handle. Great flavor, but it'd take the enamel off your teeth. But it was a change from what we'd been eatin'.

Our other purchase in Boquillas, before headin' on down towards Adams' Ranch was a case of Cokes, a sack of limes, and a gallon of rum, showin' that we was plumb desperate to swell the economy of the village. Since I was settin' in the front (and was the only one with a bottle opener), I got elected bartender (reckon that would be credentials enough to get me a job on one a' them cruise ships?). We commenced to floatin', fishin', and fightin' that big bottle. I'd open a Coke, pour out about half, squeeze in some lime juice, fill 'er up with rum, stick my thumb over the top to give it a shake, then pass it on. About the time I would get mine all drunk (and drunk is the operative work here) down, it was time to start the whole think all over again.

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## USDA Expands Twenty-four Resource Conservation and Development Areas

Twenty-four Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) areas have been expanded as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's rural development thrust.

"We're looking forward to working with more communities to help local people improve their economy and conserve natural resources," said Wes Oneth, State Conservationist for Texas.

"We're proud of the accomplishments of RC&D area in the near future," says Oneth. Established 25 years ago, the Resource Conservation and Development program works through local RC&D councils and their committees. The program assists RC&D councils set their own goals and then identify local agencies, groups, and foundations to fund and carry out these actions. USDA provides a coordinator for each area.

Council members represent sponsoring organizations, including city governments, soil and water conservation districts, and other non-profit groups. Today, 4,000 council members and 11,000 resource committee members volunteer their time in 194 RC&D areas nationwide. Texas has nine

operational areas covering 80 counties. We also have approximately 250 council members and 2,000 resource committee members. Texas also has three application areas (pending approval) covering 31 counties.

"Through their efforts, they have improved local water supplies, marketed local products, and improved needed community facilities, including hospitals, schools, and water and sewage treatment plants," explained Oneth. "They've also accelerated efforts to control erosion, improve recreation facilities, and provide flood prevention."

Councils have broad authority to seek help from the sources they feel are best qualified to provide the needed assistance. The help may be technical assistance from other federal agencies, state and local governments, local soil and water conservation districts, or private industry. It may be financial assistance through donations, loans, grants, or cost-sharing programs.

All programs and services of the Soil Conservation Service are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regards for race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status, or handicap.

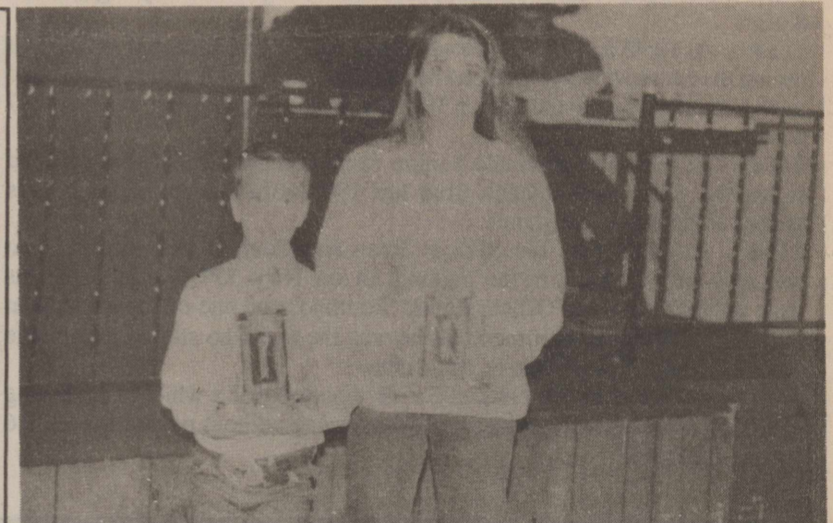
