The constitutional amendments appearing on the ballot at the general election on November 5 are the remaining 14 of a total of 20 proposed by the 60th Legislature during the regular session in 1967. Six of the 20 amendments have already been considered and adopted by the Texas electorate. With the adoption of those six amendments on November 11, 1967, the Texas Constitution of 1876 has been amended a grand total of 184 times.

The six amendments adopted last year contained provisions, in brief, as follows: (1) gave permissive authority to counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than depositing it in separate funds corresponding to tax levies for each of four constitutional purposes-general fund, road and bridge fund, public improvement fund, and jury fund; (2) permitted participation by municipalities in operation of mental health, mental retardation, and public health services; (3) extended the veterans' land program by authorizing the sale of \$200,000,000 of state lands to purchase lands for sale to veterans;

### Telephone Rate Effective Aug. 1

A reduction of long distance rates goes into effect for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$20,000,000 annually.

The reductions will be 5 to 10¢ from the charge for the first three minutes on daytime week-day station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

(4) authorized counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of law-enforcement officers injured in the line of duty; (5) authorized Park and Wildlife Department to issue and sell general obligation bonds in the amount of \$75,000,000 to finance acquisition and development of lands for state parks and recreation areas; and (6) permitted non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under the state or United States government where there is no conflict of interest and where the state will benefit.

The 14 amendments appear in the Sunday issues of the Journal and will continue to appear for the public to study for several issues to follow.

### Firemen Take Training Course

The thirty-ninth annual Firemen's Training school was held at Texas A&M at College Station July 21-26.

Muleshoe's Fire Department sent three firemen to the school which included Fire Marshall Owen Jones; H.E. Reeder, Jr., who is Captain of team four and C.O. LaRue, Jr., lieutenant of team five.

These men successfully completed and passed written examination of courses they took during the week of training.

Jones took training in Fire Prevention III; Reeder took Firefighting II and LaRue took the course offered in Fire Department Pump Operations.

The men reported this to be one of the largest schools in attendance ever held at A&M. There were over 400 instructors. The men from Muleshoe reported that they saw a lot of new equipment demonstrated and that it was the best school they had ever attended.

These firemen will receive a certificate of satisfactory completion of the courses taken from Texas A&M University.

## City Holds Hearing

A public hearing was held at City Hall Monday, July 29, conducted by the City Council for the purpose of hearing statements, both pro and con on the annexation of the County Club addition to the City of Muleshoe.

A petition was presented to the council, signed by 21 residents requesting that they not be taken into the City limits. The major concern expressed in being taken into the city was the cost of water and sewer installation.

It was pointed out at the hearing that a portion of the water pipe in the County Club addition will meet specifications of the city standards and will not have to be replaced which will be credited to the property owner and subtracted from the initial cost of the

installation since it will not have to be replaced.

The exact amount of such pipe is unknown as is the location of it at this time.

At the conclusion of the hearing, no action was taken on the annexation by the council members.

Meanwhile, the council is to continue an attempt to negotiate with D.L. Morrison, Jr., owner of the present establish water system, to work out a payment price for his investment in the waterworks system.

Also, a plan is under consideration for the residents to pay for the cost incurred, should they be annexed, in small payments, instead of a lump sum amount.

Cost of a water tap is \$25, and sewer tap is \$20. Per

foot cost of installing pipe has been estimated at \$1.50 per foot for water pipe and \$1 for sewer lines. This will be less the cost of usable existing lines.

An estimate of the over-all cost submitted to the Council by City Engineer Ralph Douglas is \$30,000.

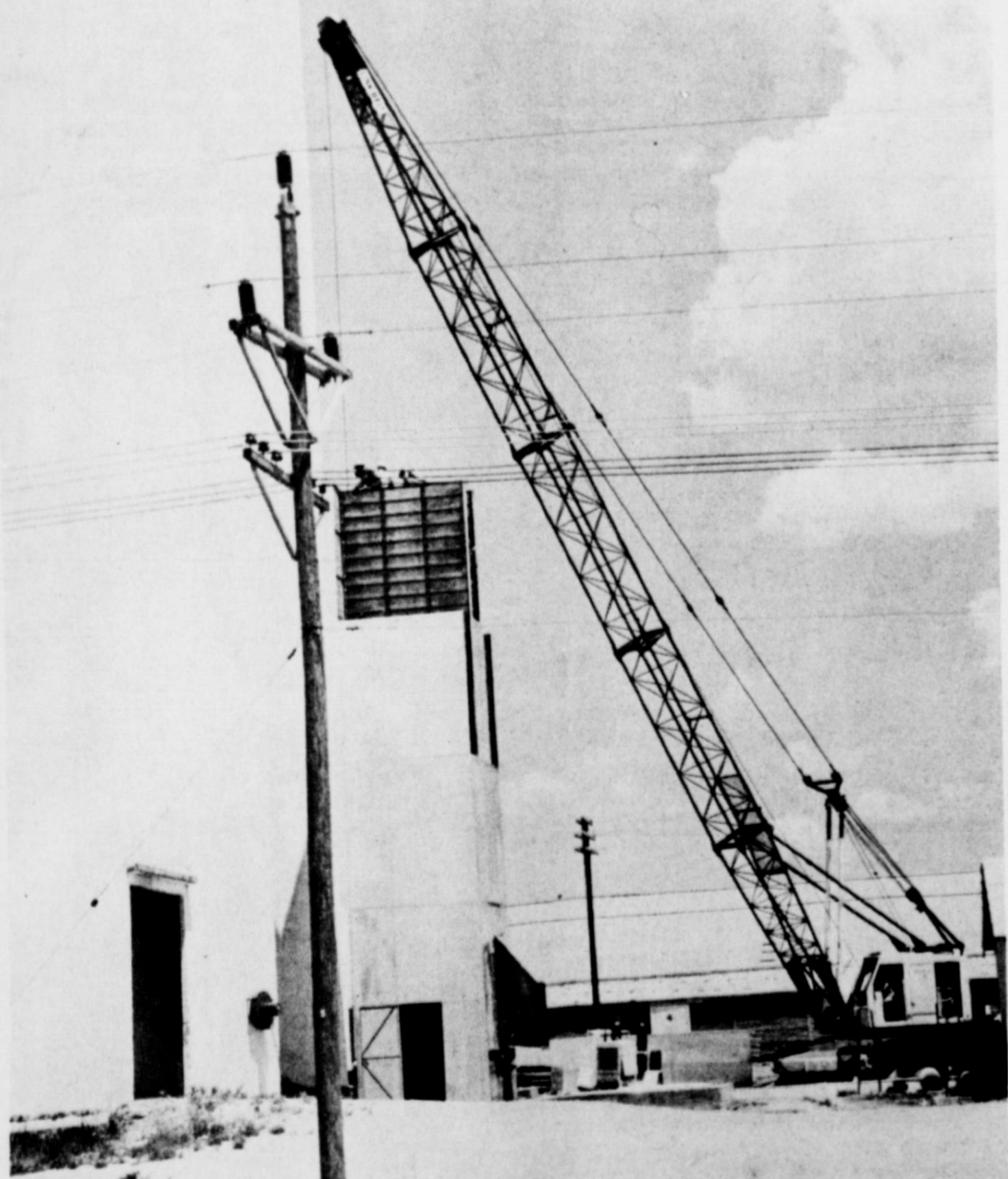

## Cooperative Credit Checks Received

Some Bailey County Electric Cooperative members recently received capital credit checks. Those members who received service in 1956 and 1966 received checks. The Board of Directors authorized payment of all 1956 capital credits and 25% of 1966 capital credits. This is money the members paid into the financed structure of the cooperative. At the end of each year the amount paid by members over and above actual operating expenses is determined and then assigned back to each member as capital credits. When the auditors, Board of Directors and Management find that the cooperative is in a financial position to refund it, capital credit checks are made to each individual who was a member at that time. Roger Miller Little League Park is where the softball games are played four nights a week, with the first of two games a night starting at 7:30 p.m.

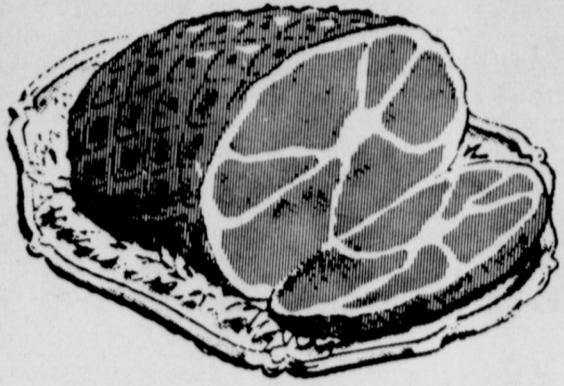
In Monday night action the Clum Sums won over Gulf Farm Center, 15-10 and the Deers defeated Lazbuddie by a slim margin of 13-12.

## To All Law Enforcement Officers

America is NOT a sick society. Let us stop condemning our whole populace for the sins of a few. Let us stop this nonsense of self-reproach and self-ridicule and throw off the guilt complex which threatens to envelop our country. When we face adversities and tragedies, let us do so with resolute confidence, avoid panic, and reserve judgment until all the facts are known. Historically, Americans are doers, not worriers. No country has ever done, or is doing, more for its own underprivileged citizens and for the unfortunate people of the world than the United States. Our record speaks for itself. We have no reason to be ashamed; indeed, we have much to be proud of. This is not to say that our society is infallible and has no problems. We do make mistakes, and we do have many great problems. But they are not insurmountable if we do not despair.

Some of our difficulty today arises from the fact that too much attention is given to various dissident elements which have a lot of noisy en-

ergy but little purpose. Many of them are complaining about conditions which they helped to create. Now, they want our whole society to plead guilty to mass ineptness. This is ridiculous. A noted columnist, commenting recently on the guilt complex sweeping our country, said, "I am tired of the hangdog American... a guy who lives in the greatest country on earth and feels he has to apologize for his own existence... The hangdog American is in danger of losing the fierce independence and self-pride of his pioneering ancestors. He is not only capitulating to his carping critics—he is becoming his own worst critic by doubting or distrusting his own obvious virtues: courage, ingenuity, loyalty, generosity, idealism. That is the worst thing that can happen to any man-to lose faith in himself."

To me, this makes sense. Courage, ability, and pride are hallmarks of success in any endeavor. A defeatist attitude is seldom associated with a winner or a leader. America

is a world leader in the cause of justice, liberty, and the dignity of man. We have no reason to act or think as losers or second-rate citizens.

It is time for Americans to shed their apologetic demeanor and stop belittling themselves. The hard-working, tax-paying, law-abiding people of this country are responsible for its growth and development. They provide the strength and resources which move our country forward. They aspire to the goals, principles, and ideals which are meaningful to all people. It is wrong to malign and accuse this vast group every time a crisis develops. No, our society is NOT sick. But, I suggest we check the pulse of the self-styled diagnosticians who see a social malady from every soapbox.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls dropped to as little as \$1.75 (station-to-station between midnight and 7 a.m.) from \$20.70 in 1915.

Long distance rates have been cut in half since 1945 in contrast to 77% rise in the consumer price index.

## MEMORY LIVES ON—

# Kindles Flames of Ordeal At Sea

Two men from Freeport, Grand Bahama know the threat of death at sea. The kind of threat where one remains at death's door day after day, dying slowly and by degrees. Then they know the grand and glorious feeling of being rescued from this plight and the zest of a new lease on life. One of these men is the brother-in-law of Elizabeth Barnett, Muleshoe.

Although this was an ordeal experienced last November and December, the memories of it has not faded with the passing of time.

Mrs. Barnett has just returned from a vacation in Freeport, Grand Bahama where she visited her sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. John Terrano. While there, she heard the 60-year old man vividly recount the 11-day battle for survival against heavy odds fought by he and a fisherman friend, Scott Fitzgerald.

While telling the story, Terrano never failed to give God credit for the victory of life over death wrought by the crewmembers aboard a Russian trawler. It was November 28, 1967. John Terrano, 60, and Scott Fitzgerald, 32, casino inspectors in Freeport, left their coastal home with the intention of fishing for about two hours.

Eleven days later the men were picked up out of the water by the Russian trawler, later transferred to a Coast Guard cutter, then to a hospital to recuperate from exposure, dehydration and near starvation. Terrano and Fitzgerald left shore aboard a boat they had purchased two weeks before and had used one time. Not far out, the motor of the 18-foot fiberglass craft cut out. They could not get it started. They had neither anchor nor oars and they drifted out to sea. The current was against them and the wind over the water was high. Soon they were far out to sea.

Both were scantily clad. Fitzgerald wore shorts and a light shirt while Terrano was dressed in a bathing suit and shirt, which was later lost along with Fitzgerald's shoes.

For food, they had only intended bait consisting of three cans of cat food and one can of sardines.

This began the endurance test.

Their food supply was supplemented later by Fitzgerald who gaffed a Dolphin in mid-air as it leapt up beside their boat. Most of the time sharks followed the boat, keeping all other fish away and only one other time did they find food. This was a floating seaweed with a tiny fish attached to it. They grabbed the weed and even though their mouths were swollen and parched, they managed to eat the weed and raw fish.

Both men are natives of San Francisco and are veterans of the casino inspection business, yet they did not know each

other until they joined the staff at EL Casino in Freeport.

The men figure they drifted more than 500 miles during the 11 days.

The trouble began, Fitzgerald said, when we were unable to start the motor that memorable day, after a few hours of fishing off Silver Point, there were no other crafts in sight, and no radio. Our drift direction was southwesterly.

The next night, Terrano said, we spotted the lights of what they now think was Great Isaac Light, a shipping beacon in the Berry Islands, 60 miles southwest of Freeport.

After getting into the Gulf-stream, however, the fiberglass boat began to drift north.

Sometime during the unplanned voyage, the men cut up the craft's canvas Bimini top to use for blankets.

Twice the men went overboard when large ships failed to spot the tiny craft bobbing in the waves.

The first time was on their second day adrift. They saw a freighter headed for them and they jumped overboard after beating on gas cans and screaming failed to attract the attention of the crew.

This was during the night and we thought sure the boat was going to hit us. We jumped out and swam and the Liaark rode the wake of the freighter and was pushed back to us.

The following night, a passing tanker's wake hit the small craft...the story remained the same and the spirits of the men hit a new low ebb with the passing of the tanker.

Relating the story, the fishermen said their only means of regaining strength was through prayer.

The water they had, which was little, was from melting ice and rainwater caught in a bucket.

For five days the men drank from one quart of water which collected in an ice chest, rationing themselves to one ounce each morning and afternoon. They measured the water in a cup fashioned from a soda can.

The most difficult ordeal at sea was keeping up each other's morale. We tried to heal each other, morale-wise and never told the other that our own hope was gone, even though we knew it was and time was running out for us.

They wondered aloud if their wives would believe they were dead should they never see land again. Of hope to convey the final message, in the form of driftwood, perhaps, Fitzgerald, who said later that he couldn't have lived another day, had carved a note to his wife, Rosemary, on the back of a wooden seat in the flat-bottomed outboard dated December 8.

The message read: "I love you so. Take care of yourself and Sandy. No matter what,

my darling, please live your life to its fullest. If you don't, I die with regret. Goodbye and all my love, Scott. (Sandy is the Fitzgerald's dog.)

Several days before being picked up by the trawler, the men weathered a storm that had moved out into the Atlantic after causing twisters and winds up to 40 miles an hour in the Carolinas. Seas ran 20 to 30 feet high.

"The only thing we actually knew was that the sun came up in the east and we went down in the west. Other than that, we knew nothing with the exception that we were there and just barely so."

The men were picked up at 1:30 a.m., 11 days after they disappeared, by the Russian trawler Khmolsk, 80 miles east of Cape Fear, North Carolina. Terrano was unable to walk and had to be carried aboard ship.

Bound for Newfoundland from

Cuba, the trawler crew had no real reason for being there, it was a fishing vessel and the crew had cut power and was just drifting.

"This boat was God sent," the men felt and stated.

"We received excellent treatment from the Russians. They administered fluids and food until the Russian ship rendezvoused with the Coast Guard cutter, Jonwill outside the three mile limit and the men were rushed to Carteret County Hospital in Moorehead City, N.C. where they were joined by their jubilant wives.

The wives of the lost men, like the men themselves, were shaken and wore from their experience of not knowing what had happened to their husbands and were followed by friends to be at their besides.

After the Coast guard gave up the search for the men, the owners of El Casino where they were employed, hired planes to fly over the waters and continue the search.

\$146,004.11 will be refunded to 1956 members and 25% of the 1966 checks totaling \$33,260.60. This money will go back into the area economy.

Bailey County Electric Cooperative also continues to pay on its loan ahead of schedule. On June 14, 1968 the cooperative paid \$100,000.00 cushion of credits to the Rural Electrification Administration as another advance payment on the loan from R.E.A. Bailey County Electric has paid all regular loan payments on time, with interest. This \$100,000.00 advance payment brings the total advance payments to \$957,550—nearly a million dollars ahead of time.

The total amount paid ahead of schedule by R.E.A. electric borrowers throughout the nation so far this fiscal year totals \$24,764,077.00. In addition, the borrowers have made \$194,604,292.00 in regularly scheduled principal and interest payments, for a total of \$219,368,369.00 in receipts for the U.S. Treasury from the rural electric program.

## HEALTH AND BEAUTY

Your body contains an amazing assortment of different minerals. Two of them are well known to most of us. Iron for rich, healthy blood and calcium for strong bones and teeth are quoted so much that they have become tired, old phrases.

We hear so often about the need for these minerals that we are likely to think our needs begin and end with them. However, they are only two of the more than 20 different minerals that are bound up in the complex chemistry of our bodies.

At least 15 of these minerals perform essential functions. The rest are found in such small amounts that they probably serve no purpose at

all. Scientists tell us that these rarer elements may function in ways that are as yet unknown. For example, no reason has been found for the speck of aluminum found in the brain. With radioactive tracers it may be possible to track

down this substance and determine if it is one of the things that spark our mental processes.

The amazing thing about the minerals found in our bodies is that even though there is barely a handful of them, many of them are necessary for life. A good example of this is that a minute quantity of calcium keeps the heart beating regularly and steadily.

The vital role of iodine has long been understood. There is scarcely enough of it in the body to cover the head of a pin. Without this tiny amount a person would be a dwarfed, stupid creature known as a cretin.
