Seven-year-old Daniel Shanklin of San Antonio, a normal down-toearth kid, is doing out of the ordinary this summer. Daniel has his sights set on a new world record in flying!! Daniel, his brother Michael, and his flight instructors Stuart Moon and John Bird are currently in route to Kitty Hawk, North Carolina from San Diego, California. They are flying in a Cessna 172 Skyhawk II followed as a surprise. Both boys attend when he gets older. Daniel, as I said, is a typical seven-year-old as I watched him play out at the airport. I asked him if he liked girls and his answer was an emphatic "No, but my brother does! According to Daniel, the hardest thing to do is "fly through the mountains and land" and the easiest thing to do is "take off - you just push the power in and raise the nose of the plane at the right time."

Saturday, May 25th, Sonora went to the polls once again to decide between two candidates for City Council. The face-off was between Lemuel Lopez and Bob Mooney. When the votes were counted, Mr. Lopez had won the election by 41 votes. According to City Hall, 411 people voted. Lemuel Lopez received 226 votes and Bob Mooney received 185 votes.

S.I.S.D. Board of Directors approve personnel changes

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met in special session at 12:00 Noon on Wednesday, May 22, 1991 in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 807 South Concho, Sonora, Texas.

School Board Members present included Donald Patton, President, Jesse Bustamante, Jim Garrett, Gary Hardgrave, Becky Johnson, Gloria Lopez, Michael Smith, and Charles Russell, Superintendent. Others present were Cynthia Keel and Smith Neal.

The meeting was called to order by President Patton and the invocation was given by Superintendent Russell.

The Board considered the pending litigation being brought by a coalition of schools against Senate suit being taxation without representation. The Superintendent reported that over 40 school districts had joined the coalition and that both the legal staff and the participating districts felt confident that they could win the suit.

The Superintendent listed the pros and cons of adopting the resolution to become a participant in the litigation and he commented that the district had a debt to the taxpayers to do everything possible to fight unfair taxation. He continued by stating that funds were

available to join the coalition from \$10,000 which is budgeted each year for legal fees. It was his recommendation to contribute \$2,500 and to adopt the resolution.

The Board unanimously adopted

Bill 351 with the grounds of the the resolution as stated with the stipulation that \$2,500 be contributed to the Budget Balanced Schools Litigation. Motion was made by Jim Garrett, seconded by Becky Johnson, and carried unanimously.

The Board then went into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

The Board reconvened in open session and voted unanimously to assign Smith Neal to the position of Administrative Assistant, Janet Patton to the position of Junior High Principal, and Warren McCarson to the position of Vocational Director for the 1991-92 school year at the recommended salary. Motion was made by Becky Johnson and seconded by Gary Hardgrave.

The meeting adjourned at 12:53



WHISPERS IN THE WIND

DOUG COALSON - TEXAS RANGER

If you will recall the Sam Merck women and children. Sadly, his piece which appeared in "Whispers...", April 18th. Mentioned was an hombre by the name of Doug Coalson. "... Sam Merck, Mike Douglas, and an old man by the name of Doug Coalson were apparently deputized and took chase of the desperado horse thieves (two bandits who stole a horse from the Jim Cauthorn place)."

Well, come to find out, that statement was wrong on two counts. First, Doug Coalson was not an old man. Born in 1859, he was about twenty eight years old at the time of the chase mentioned above. Secondly, all three fellers were Texas Rangers.

The only thing I can figure is that Tom Dragoo, in his written account that dated in August 1947, referred to Coalson as he remembered him last and was not aware Doug had been a Ranger.

The first account of Stephen Douglas Coalson was in "It Occurred in Kimble County", by O.C. Fisher. During an attack by Comanche warriors on their home, December 1, 1870. Doug was eleven and pleaded with his mother, Jennie (Blackwell) Coalson, to allow him to help her protect the home against the Indians. His father, Nicholas B. was on the trail of a bear and heard the shooting but thought it was his wife shooting squirrels for dinner. Back at the house they were afraid the attackers would burn the house and Doug, eleven and an expert shot, begged his mother to let him help her fight the Indians. He was told only to keep the gun loaded and ready, in the event she should have to keep firing uninterrupted.

During the attack Joe Harris, who was a teacher and field hand for the Coalsons, was killed as he ran toward the house to protect the

Four years after the raid, Jennie died. Nick remarried and Doug went with the family to Barksdale where they established another home and a goat ranching operation. It was with the intentions of "getting even" for the death Joe Harris that he joined Captain Dan Roberts company of the Texas Rangers in early 1878. His family was attacked several times by Indians in the years that followed. He lost his new step-mother, Alice (Humphries); a baby brother, Humphrey; and his brother and sister Author and Elizabeth (twins) in separate attacks on the same dates in 1877 and 1878. It was his company of rangers the trailed the band that killed him step-mother, sister and baby brother. It was said that Doug continued trailing the Indians after the rest of the company gave up pursuit. A year later all the raids were halted as the Indians were captured and placed on reservations.

Doug settled with his brother and sister, Billy and Lula (Mrs. A.J. Hart), at Toyah in the early 1880's. There he married and was the father of six children, who all moved to California after they were grown. However, Doug remained a Texas Ranger until Dan Roberts retired and the company disbanded. It was in that capacity he was in Sonora, with Sam Merck, chasing the bandits mentioned above.

He died at the home of his sister at the age of eighty six, in 1925. He never left his beloved Toyah but made periodic visits to California to see his family. Against his wishes, Doug's body was carried with them to California and buried.

An item in our last weeks police reports has apparently caught the interest of several of our readers and in turn I have received several phone calls and letters pertaining to the event. It seems that on May 15, an individual was sitting in a vehicle at a local grocery store and was "mooned" by a young man in a house across the street from the location. The questions that have been directed to me are all similar, "what is being done about that 'creep'."

The question is not one I could answer, so I contacted Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch. According to Chief Gesch, this type of action is only an offense if it is intentional and in a public place. If someone does expose him/herself intentionally and it offends someone, the offended person must file a formal complaint.

In this situation, the complaint could have been filed with the City Attorney, Beth Wallace. If a complaint had been filed, the offender possibly could have been charged with a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine

However the person who was offended in this situation has not filed a formal complaint and no action against this alleged offender can be taken. Our local law enforcement officers work very hard to maintain law and order in and around our town, however, in a situation such as this they cannot take any action without the individuals in the community doing their part

If you witness any action you believe merits a phone call to the police department, don't be afraid to ask what you should do to see the matter is tended to. Our law enforcement officers are not the ones you should be afraid of. They are there for you.

Sonora could be seeing lower electric bills by mid-summer

Customers of West Texas Utilities Company could be paying less for their electric service starting in July if the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) grants the company's request to lower fuel factors. WTU filed the request Tuesday, May 21, as an update to the original fuel filing it made in February.

Earl J. Johnson, WTU's local manager in Sonora, said "the company is asking for interim factors to be effective in July and fixed factors effective in October. Based on the company's expected cost of fuel this summer, the interim factors produce a decrease, compared to current costs 7.8% or \$4.42 a month on consumption of 660 kilowatt-hours per month." In October, the fixed factors will mean a decrease from today's costs of 2.6% (\$1.49) a month for 660 kilowatt-hours.

Although the Commission still must approve the company's request, WTU is optimistic that the lower factors will be the ones used to calculate customers' July bills, Mr. Johnson said. Other customer groups will see similar decreases in their costs as a result of the lower fuel factors.

The company made the initial filing in February because the PUC had said that fuel costs should be reconciled at least every three years either through a rate case or a fuel reconciliation case such as the present filing. WTU's fuel costs were last reconciled in a rate case which covered a period ending with March 31, 1987, almost four years
