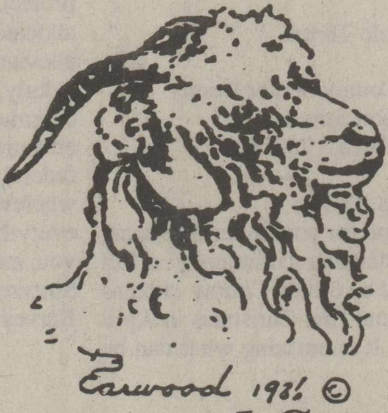

7 yr. old attempts to break record

Seven-year-old Daniel Shanklin of San Antonio, a normal down-to-earth kid, is doing out of the ordinary this summer. Daniel has his sights set on a new world record in flying!! Daniel, his brother Michael, and his flight instructors Stuart Moon and John Bird are currently in route to Kitty Hawk, North Carolina from San Diego, California. They are flying in a Cessna 172 Skyhawk II followed by a support plane piloted by his grandparents, Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth Shanklin of Fresno, California. The previous world record for youngest pilot/longest distance was set by an eight-year-old two years ago.

Instead of giving the boys the typical toys for Christmas, Dr. Shanklin gave the boys flying lessons this year. Colleen Shanklin, the boys' grandmother, stated that the boys have been in an airplane with them since they were 18 months old and are used to flying. What they are not used to is the media publicity that they have been getting; however, "through countless television and newspaper interviews, David has been almost nonchalant and cool-headed," according to Mrs. Shanklin.

Dr. Shanklin, a plastic surgeon from Fresno, asked the boys if they wanted to learn to fly and they both answered excitedly, "Yes!" One of the main reasons he wanted them to learn to fly was because if there was ever an emergency in the air where he couldn't handle the airplane, the boys would know what to do.

Daniel, as I said, is a typical seven-year-old as I watched him play out at the airport. I asked him if he liked girls and his answer was an emphatic "No, but my brother does!" His favorite subject in school is math and as I watched the boys plan their flight to San Antonio, I could understand why he needed to know a lot of math. According to Daniel, the hardest thing to do is "fly through the mountains and land" and the easiest thing to do is "take off - you just push the power in and raise the nose of the plane at the right time."

According to their flight instructor, Stuart Moon, "The boys work well together as a team. Last night, Michael planned the flight from El Paso and today, Daniel will plan the next leg of the trip." The boys took off at approximately 3:00 P.M. from Sonora headed for San Antonio, where they will be greeted by all of their classmates and the news media as a surprise. Both boys attend school in San Antonio and will be continuing into Louisiana today. The only way they can fly is to have an instructor on board, but

Stuart assured me that Daniel is doing the work. According to FAA regulations, you may not solo until age 16 and may not get a private license until age 17. The entire trip will cover 2,100 miles and take about eight days if the weather is favorable. Daniel also plans on flying into Washington, D.C. after the trip and wants to be an Air Force pilot when he gets older. When I asked Daniel how long it would take to fly to San Antonio from here, his exact words were "1 hour, 11 minutes, and 33 seconds." Wow!

Sonora comes to the rescue

A group of senior citizens bound for Las Vegas were stranded on I-H 10 and at the Senior Center Sunday for several hours when their bus broke down. It was on a call to investigate the report of several horses on the interstate highway when Sutton County Sheriffs Deputy Mo Salinas noticed the group near the Dry Devil's River crossing. Already, they had been there for three hours. They were in dire need of water and a call was made to the dispatcher to get water to the stranded people.

Within minutes Pat and "Butch" Campbell responded and obtained soft drinks and sandwiches. Troyce McKnight hauled a water can to them as well as Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Norbert

Ortiz and Jim Fish carried two cases of soft drinks. Other law enforcement personnel responded but were not available for their names to be taken. Carol Thorp and Gina Gamez of the Senior Center and Rev. Jim Stephen brought vans to transfer all to the Senior Center. There the group was given a meal while they waited in air conditioned comfort for repairs to be made to the bus. Another bus arrived at 6:30 p.m. and the group continued on their tour. This is just one more example of the generous and caring people we see in Sonora frequently, however if it hadn't been for the efforts of these people a far more serious matter could have occurred. The group extended their heart-felt appreciation to Sonora for coming to their aid.

Lopez wins by 41 votes

Saturday, May 25th, Sonora went to the polls once again to decide between two candidates for City Council. The face-off was between Lemuel Lopez and Bob Mooney. When the votes were counted, Mr. Lopez had won the election by 41 votes. According to City Hall, 411 people voted. Lemuel Lopez received 226 votes and Bob Mooney received 185 votes.

In a short conversation with both candidates, Lemuel said "I am grateful to the people of Sonora and would like to thank Bob Mooney for the race he ran." comment was related to the coming year as he said, "There will be a lot of changes made in the coming year and I am looking forward to them. I'll be back next year."

S.I.S.D. Board of Directors approve personnel changes

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met in special session at 12:00 Noon on Wednesday, May 22, 1991 in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 807 South Concho, Sonora, Texas.

School Board Members present included Donald Patton, President, Jesse Bustamante, Jim Garrett, Gary Hardgrave, Becky Johnson, Gloria Lopez, Michael Smith, and Charles Russell, Superintendent. Others present were Cynthia Keel and Smith Neal.

The meeting was called to order by President Patton and the invocation was given by Superintendent Russell.

The Board considered the pending litigation being brought by a coalition of schools against Senate

Bill 351 with the grounds of the suit being taxation without representation. The Superintendent reported that over 40 school districts had joined the coalition and that both the legal staff and the participating districts felt confident that they could win the suit.

The Superintendent listed the pros and cons of adopting the resolution to become a participant in the litigation and he commented that the district had a debt to the taxpayers to do everything possible to fight unfair taxation. He continued by stating that funds were

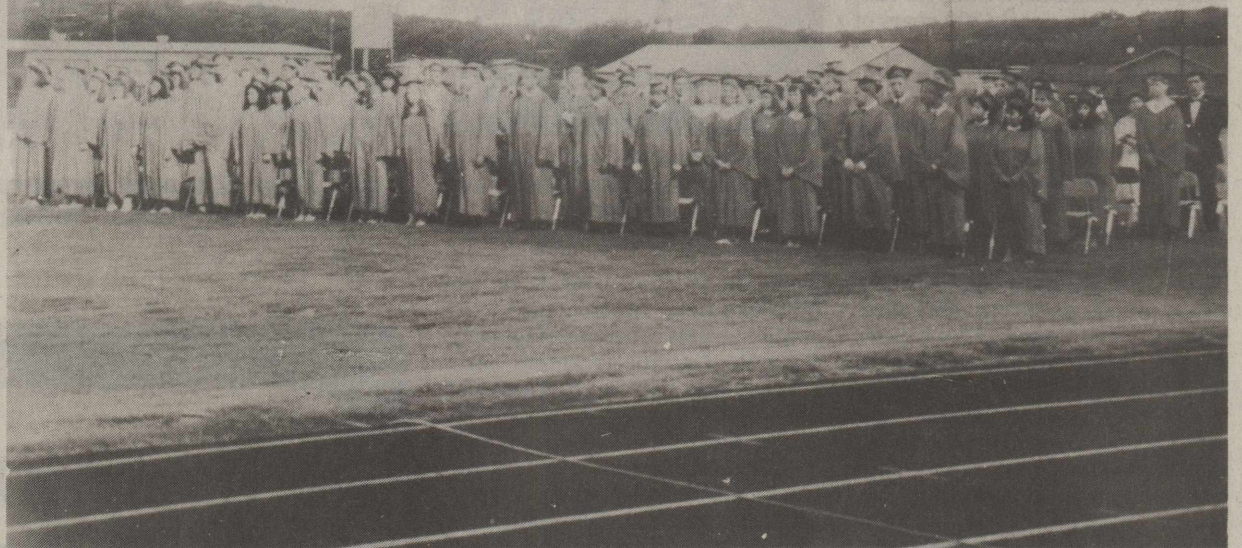
available to join the coalition from \$10,000 which is budgeted each year for legal fees. It was his recommendation to contribute \$2,500 and to adopt the resolution. The Board unanimously adopted

the resolution as stated with the stipulation that \$2,500 be contributed to the Budget Balanced Schools Litigation. Motion was made by Jim Garrett, seconded by Becky Johnson, and carried unanimously.

The Board then went into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

The Board reconvened in open session and voted unanimously to assign Smith Neal to the position of Administrative Assistant, Janet Patton to the position of Junior High Principal, and Warren McCarsion to the position of Vocational Director for the 1991-92 school year at the recommended salary. Motion was made by Becky Johnson and seconded by Gary Hardgrave.

The meeting adjourned at 12:53 P.M.

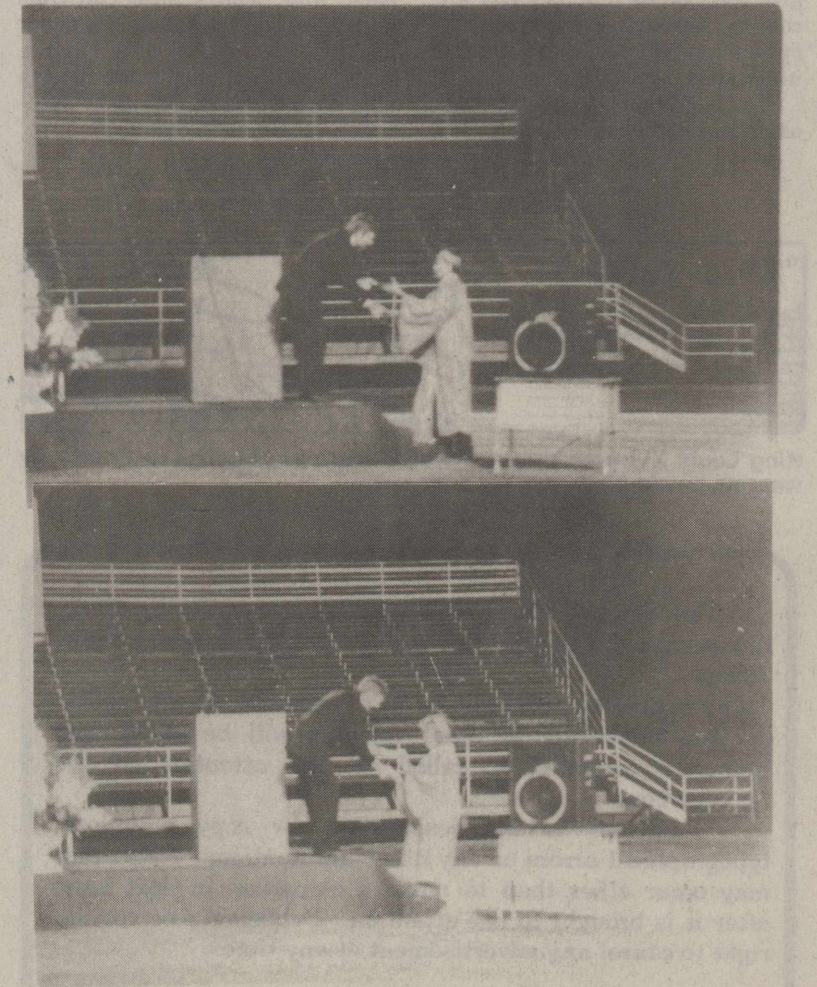

WHISPERS IN THE WIND

DOUG COALSON - TEXAS RANGER

If you will recall the Sam Merck piece which appeared in "Whispers..." April 18th. Mentioned was an hombre by the name of Doug Coalson. ... Sam Merck, Mike Douglas, and an old man by the name of Doug Coalson were apparently deputized and took chase of the desperado horse thieves (two bandits who stole a horse from the Jim Cauthorn place)."

Well, come to find out, that statement was wrong on two counts. First, Doug Coalson was not an old man. Born in 1859, he was about twenty eight years old at the time of the chase mentioned above. Secondly, all three fellers were Texas Rangers.

The only thing I can figure is that Tom Dragoo, in his written account that dated in August 1947, referred to Coalson as he remembered him last and was not aware Doug had been a Ranger.

The first account of Stephen Douglas Coalson was in "It Occurred in Kimble County", by O.C. Fisher. During an attack by Comanche warriors on their home, December 1, 1870. Doug was eleven and pleaded with his mother, Jennie (Blackwell) Coalson, to allow him to help her protect the home against the Indians. His father, Nicholas B. was on the trail of a bear and heard the shooting but thought it was his wife shooting squirrels for dinner. Back at the house they were afraid the attackers would burn the house and Doug, eleven and an expert shot, begged his mother to let him help her fight the Indians. He was told only to keep the gun loaded and ready, in the event she should have to keep firing uninterrupted.

During the attack Joe Harris, who was a teacher and field hand for the Coalsons, was killed as he ran toward the house to protect the

women and children. Sadly, his wife was there visiting Jennie with their year-and-a-half old baby and watched as he was killed and scalped.

Four years after the raid, Jennie died. Nick remarried and Doug went with the family to Barksdale where they established another home and a goat ranching operation. It was with the intentions of "getting even" for the death Joe Harris that he joined Captain Dan Roberts company of the Texas Rangers in early 1878. His family was attacked several times by Indians in the years that followed. He lost his new step-mother, Alice (Humphries); a baby brother, Humphrey; and his brother and sister Author and Elizabeth (twins) in separate attacks on the same dates in 1877 and 1878. It was his company of rangers the trailed the band that killed him step-mother, sister and baby brother. It was said that Doug continued trailing the Indians after the rest of the company gave up pursuit. A year later all the raids were halted as the Indians were captured and placed on reservations.

Doug settled with his brother and sister, Billy and Lula (Mrs. A.J. Hart), at Toyah in the early 1880's. There he married and was the father of six children, who all moved to California after they were grown. However, Doug remained a Texas Ranger until Dan Roberts retired and the company disbanded. It was in that capacity he was in Sonora, with Sam Merck, chasing the bandits mentioned above.

He died at the home of his sister at the age of eighty six, in 1925. He never left his beloved Toyah but made periodic visits to California to see his family. Against his wishes, Doug's body was carried with them to California and buried.

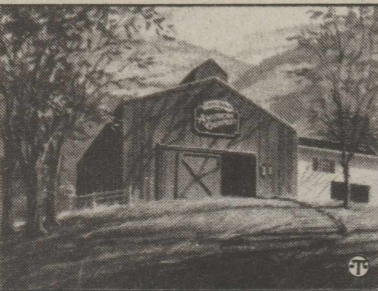

Biscuits' Crumbs

Ain't that stupid

I reckon the worst thing to happen here at the I O Everbody Ranch has been gettin' a satellite t.v. doohickey. Before that happened, we could sorta get the San Angelo station on a real good night, but the picture was so fuzzy and cloudy you really couldn't tell much about what was goin' on, so we mostly didn't watch it. With this modern technological wonder, we get so many stations it takes more'n half a hour just to whiz past 'em all. Now the boys want to set around after dinner and watch soap oprys, and after all that smoochin' and whatnot, they can't wait to head to town, even though they never find girls that look (or act) like them hussys on the tv.

But the thing that really gets my dander up is how anti-cookin' them commercials is. I mean they're plumb against anybody hangin' around the kitchen for longer'n 30 or 40 seconds or doin' anything harder'n programmin' the microwave. They most nearly always make cowboys and chuckwagon cooks look like refugees from the ought-to-be missin' person store. Take the lastes one, where the feller with the strange accent from the Ozarks or some other foreign country says, "Me'n the boys like to do somethin' kinda crazy ever now and then, like puttin' 2 kinds of cheese on the cheeseburgers!" That in itself is dumb enough, 'cause how many chuckwagons is goin' haul around much cheese at all, 'cept maybe a big hunk of rat cheese wrapped in a vinegar-soaked rag, and that'll get eat up right quick 'fore it gets all moldy. And how many hands would know munster cheese if it was to ride up and bite 'em on the . . . nose?

But what really gets to me worse'n anything else is when some idjit in a stupid apron's standin' there stickin' a big ol' fork in a good hunk of meat as he cremates it over a roarin' fire as he tells us he's barbecuing. That ain't barbecue and it ain't even a halfway decent way to treat a piece of beef. With these store-bought chickens, it's probably ok, 'cause anything you can do to kill the chemical taste in them critters is justifiable. But it ain't the way to fix barbecue. Barbecue's cooked over a good bed of coals, not over a flame. The last

thing in the world you want is fire blazin' up, scorchin' your meat, 'cause then what you end up with is a piece of burnt meat. You want a touch of smoke, but too much isn't better, 'cause it'll give you an all night gut ache that'll take 3 or 4 glasses of sody to ease yourself. You want the heat to do the cookin', not the fire, 'cause all the fire can do is burn whatever it touches.

Then there's barbecue sauce. Real barbecue don't have no tomatar ketchuppy glop poured all over it, 'cause ever cook with half a teaspoon of common sense knows tomatars scorch, and you're right back to eatin' burnt again. I know some folks must like the stuff, or they wouldn't have so many kinds in the store, but that ain't the way barbecue's cooked. I use red wine and butter as a soppin' sauce, 'cause the butter keeps the meat juicy and the wine adds flavor and acts like a tenderizer. I always rub my meat with a dry seasonin' made with cayenne pepper, paprika, garlic powder, onion powder, black pepper and sometimes some kinda herbs if I have 'm handy. I mix this all together and rub it all over the meat, massagin' it in real good, and let the meat set a spell to let the flavors work themselves in. And I never use a real hot bed of coals, 'cause I want my meat to cook good 'n slow. I get me a long stock, tie a rag on the end, and about ever hour or so, sop the meat real good just before and after I turn it. And I don't use no long fork to turn the meat, 'cause that just punches holes in it and lets all the juices run out. I either use tongs or heavy cotton work gloves. Th meat's ready when it's done, and that's about as close to tellin' you how long to cook it as I can get.

Barbecue's different that broilin' a steak or hamburger over coals or charcoal, but neither's done with fire shootin' up all over what's bein' cooked. Broilin's faster and generally used for smaller, thinner pieces of meat. Even when I cook them dad-burned chickens, I only use lemon juice, butter and garlic for a sop. But I reckon if you like your meat burnt to cinders, that's your privilege. Just don't come around my place lookin' for burnt barbecue. And the next time you're settin' around watchin' tv, take notice of how they try to discourage good cookin' from scratch, them ignore 'em and keep on cookin' the right way!

A note from the Editor

An item in our last weeks police reports has apparently caught the interest of several of our readers and in turn I have received several phone calls and letters pertaining to the event. It seems that on May 15, an individual was sitting in a vehicle at a local grocery store and was "moonin'" by a young man in a house across the street from the location. The questions that have been directed to me are all similar, "what is being done about that 'creep'."

The question is not one I could answer, so I contacted Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch. According to Chief Gesch, this type of action is only an offense if it is intentional and in a public place. If someone does expose him/herself intentionally and it offends someone, the offended person must file a formal complaint.

In this situation, the complaint could have been filed with the City Attorney, Beth Wallace. If a complaint had been filed, the offender possibly could have been charged with a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$200 plus court costs.

However the person who was offended in this situation has not filed a formal complaint and no action against this alleged offender can be taken. Our local law enforcement officers work very hard to maintain law and order in and around our town, however, in a situation such as this they cannot take any action without the individuals in the community doing their part also.

If you witness any action you believe merits a phone call to the police department, don't be afraid to ask what you should do to see the matter is tended to. Our law enforcement officers are not the ones you should be afraid of. They are there for you.
