

had a deluge of rain, enough to cause flooding, but also enough to cause grass, weeds, As experts like to say, it was a underbrush and other plant life to flourish.

Then, for three months there was no rain and that abundant growth turned bone dry.

And on Dec. 27, a West Texas norther with winds of 45 mph bore down on Cross Plains. The humidity was extremely low and when someone tossed a cigarette out of a car along Highway 36 (they don't really know yet what happened) the perfect storm began.

Scott Farwell of the Dallas Morning News told of Bob Harrell and other firefighters arriving four miles west of town when the fire was a small outbreak in a ditch. They nearly had it out when wind blew an ember into a briar-choked fence row. The fire then exploded and headed for Cross Plains.

"In that moment Cross Plains was lost," Farwell said in his

Farwell quoted West Central Texas Council of Governments Director Jim Compton as saying: "Something like this could destroy the town,

absolutely.' I don't believe that. In the 20plus years I have owned the Review, I have seen these folks carry on with courage and tenacity through tornadoes, drought and floods.



PUBLIC NOTICE

Pursuant to Article 258.002(c) of the Texas Transportation Code, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas provides this notice to the public of its intention to convene a public meeting to receive comment upon the adoption of a County Road Map including each road in which the County claims the continued existence of a public interest and a right of access and egress for maintenance of an existing County Road. The roads in which the County claims a public interest have been maintained for many years, beginning some time prior to 1981, have previously been listed in a notice included in the 2005-06 Ad Valorem Tax statement. A proposed County Road Map depicting each road in which the County claims a public interest is available for inspection by the public at the office of the County Judge in the County Courthouse, during business hours, commencing December 1, 2005.

The Commissioners Court will conduct a public hearing on January 23, 2006, at 10:00 a.m., in the Commissioners Courtroom in the Callahan County Courthouse. At this time, pursuant to Article 258.002(b), Texas Transportation Code, any person asserting a private right, title or interest in a road may appear before the Commissioners Court to object or protest the County's claim of its right to continue maintenance of the public roads depicted on the County road map. Any person asserting a private right, title or interest in a road may also file a written protest with the County Judge at any time before the time and date of the scheduled public hearing. By way of this procedure, the County makes no claim affecting title, acreage, or ownership of the land, but seeks merely to establish and document the right of the County to continue maintenance of the existing county road in its present location and dimension.







the moving fire, landing on trees and structures in its way. This explains the random way one house burned and the one beside it did not. Harrell said that it was racing so fast across the fields that it would burn under the fence, leaving the briars on top untouched. In some places it burned only the bottom of the trees, leaving the foliage intact. He compared it to the scorching flame of a blow torch.

This made fighting containing this particular fire very difficult. highway patrolmen had never seen anything like this. They expressed shock and disbelief at the magnitude of what they encountered. A Potosi Volunteer Fireman said the wind was firemen. blowing so hard it blew their fire helmets out of the truck. The fire burned the fire hoses and nozzles and they had to replace them. He remarked that the flames jumped from 5 feet to 50 feet in a matter of seconds and was desinigrating everything in its path.

Mike McClure, a local resident and former volunteer firefighter (with almost two decades of experience) actually witnessed the exploding of his home along with many others on the two blocks in front of the school on North Main Street and a row of homes on Avenue E. In this area only the Cornerstone Bible Church, Dorothy Odom's house and Roylene Wilson's house (the Arrowwood house) are still standing, relatively unharmed.
