Capital Improvement Program Outlined Long-Range Plan Avoids Increase In Tax, Rates

No increase in property taxes or water and sewer rates are proposed to finance a carefully planned improvement program for Muleshoe.

This City of Muleshoe Comprehensive Plan prepared by Kenneth W. Larsen and Associates and upon recommendation of the City Planning Commission, the City Council has decided to call an election for a Capital Improvements Program for the city.

This election will be held on Tuesday, September 10 and will cover improvement to the waterworks and sewer system, improvements for the park system, street improvements, and construction of a city hall, a library, a Community center, and a suburban fire station.

Planning consultant is Kenneth Larsen, Albuquerque; consulting engineer, Ralph Douglas; architect, Bill W. Cantrell; financial advisor, Joe W. Smith, First Southwest Company, Lubbock; and legal council, Dumas, Huguinin and Bootham, Bond attorneys, Dallas.

The city council states "We will appreciate your study of the City's Comprehensive Plan and the proposed Capital Improvements Program and will welcome any further inquiry you desire to make."

A public hearing has been scheduled for Thursday, September 5 at 8 p.m. in the high school cafeteria when officials will be on hand to answer any question which the public might have in mind concerning the upcoming bond election and proposed improvement project.

This Capital Improvement Program is designed to cover improvements needed during the basic period of 1968-72 with some allowance for the period 1973-77.

The program has been carefully considered not only from the standpoint of providing badly needed improvements for the City, but also in the light of determination to maintain the financial integrity and credit of the City of Muleshoe.

Authorization of these bonds together with the Comprehensive Plan will not only allow the City Council to provide necessary improvement but will serve a further two fold purpose: 1. The City can plan over a period of years with State and Federal agencies, assured of the necessary funds to match grants that may be made. In this way the City's funds may cover many additional projects.

2. The City will be in a position to cooperate with and support the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation which is doing an outstanding service in public relations for the Muleshoe area in their efforts to attract business and industry to the community. The city will be able to make improvements, such as in the Waterworks and Sewer System, that will enable companies to locate in Muleshoe.

The Capital Improvements program projects to be financed with revenue bonds for the period 1968-72 have a sub-total of \$235,000 and the 1973-77

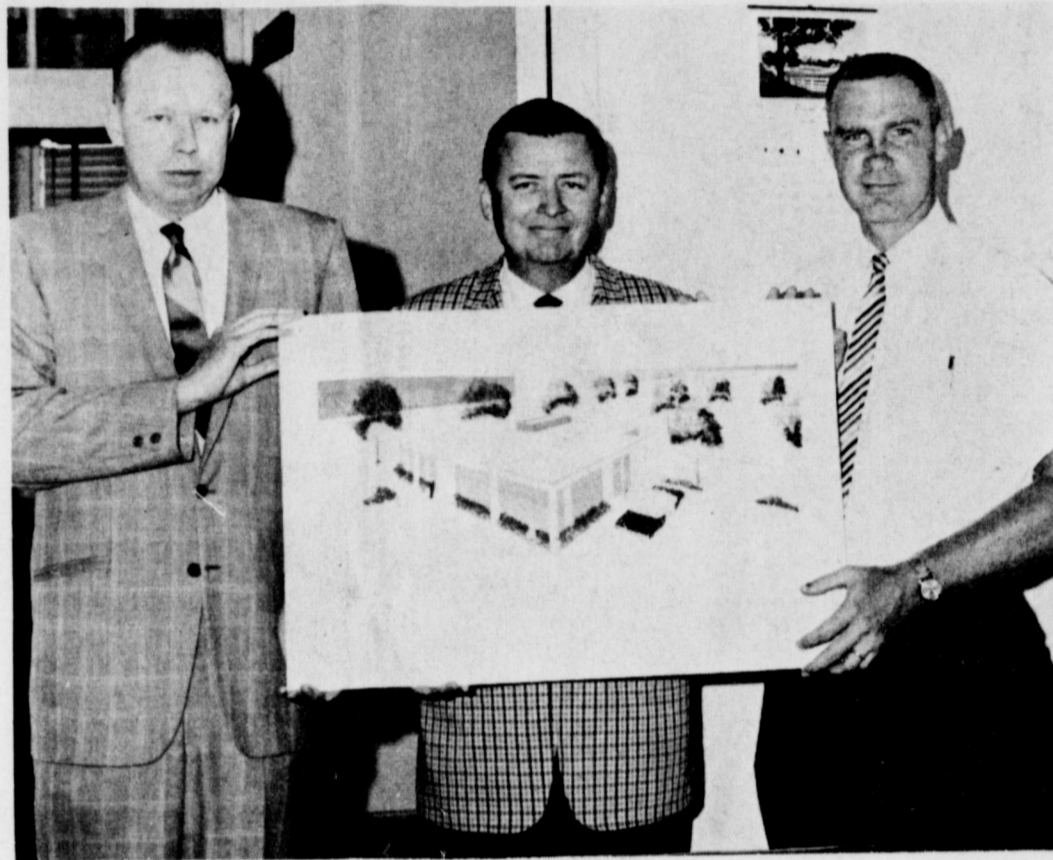
Miss Marilyn Wrona, born in Green Memorial Hospital here Tuesday, August 6 is the third generation of a family to be born in Muleshoe.

Athletic Director Optimistic As Football Season Nears

Athletic Director, Dick Stafford is cautiously optimistic about the 1968 football season.

In an interview Tuesday afternoon Stafford said, "The bunch of boys who plan to play football in the 1968 season have worked exceptionally hard during the off-season. During the off-season 'hard' program, we feel that the attitude of the

boys has changed a great deal, from a losing attitude to 'we can win.' "Actually we feel we have gained a great deal. In this day and time the entire program can be made or lost from December to the next fall."

"We expect a better team this year than we have had in the past few years," he continued, "If we can avoid key injuries we definitely can have a better season this year than last year."

According to Stafford, three things were stressed to improve the athletic program. First, is mental and physical toughness; second, strengthening through a physical weight program and third, increase quickness and speed through an agility program.

He emphasized that the team weakness is offensive and defensive ends and the team strength lies in the running backs.

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Law Enforcement Central Building No Tax Increase Created By Jail Construction

Plans are in the final stages for a bond election called for September 10 which will enable Bailey County to have an all modern "Bailey County Law Enforcement Center". Architects have submitted scale drawing of a building to be located on the northwestern corner of the present courthouse square to house all law enforcement agencies, Bailey County Sheriff's office, Muleshoe City Police Department, State Highway Patrol office and Texas Driver's License division. In addition to these offices, plans call for a jail which will be a secure place for prisoners, in-as-much-as it will be an adequate jail in which prisoners can be contained without fear of escape during the night. This also protects you, the citizens.

Where there is now no one on duty at the present jail, the new structure would be centrally used and a dispatcher on duty in the same building with the jail at all times.

It will also be constructed so as to comply with state and federal regulations, enabling Bailey County to retain their own federal prisoners and those for other counties which would qualify the county for federal funds for keeping such prisoners.

Lubbock now gets money from Bailey County for this service with transporting the prisoners back and forth, jail and food totaling around \$9,000 per year. This amount is included in the county budget.

By constructing the central law enforcement center, there will not be a tax increase either for the city or the county.

Bailey County Judge Don Chah outlines the program in this manner:

On August 12th, 1968, the Commissioner's Court of Bailey County voted to call a jail bond election to be held on September 10, 1968. The amount of the proposed bond issue is \$175,000.00.

Most persons in this County are familiar with the present County jail, built in 1925 on the third floor of the Courthouse. It has a capacity for 12 men prisoners with no separate facilities for women and juvenile offenders. The new jail would have a capacity for 33 men, and

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Gas Compressor Station Nearing Halfway Mark

Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America's new Goodland compressor station is nearing 50 percent completion. Two 4,000-horsepower compressor engines are to be installed as part of a program which will enable NGPL to transport natural gas from its Crittendon Field reserves to its mainline near Fritch and Dumas.

In addition to the station construction at Goodland, additional compressor facilities are being constructed at Hereford and Lovington, N.M.

The new pipeline segment--102-miles of 30-inch pipeline--is also underway in Lea County, N.M., and Ward and Winkler Counties, Texas.

The new pipeline and compressor facilities are part of NGPL's expansion program which has an estimated total cost of \$68.5 million. Completion of the plan will increase NGPL's peak-day deliverability

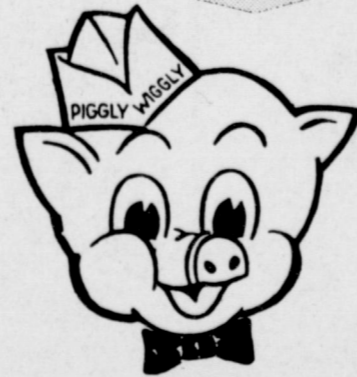

facilities for 6 women and 4 juveniles.

Most persons in the County are also familiar with the escapes we have had from the present jail. Sheriff Dee Clements has reported that the County Health Officer was contemplating ordering the present jail closed for health reasons. Sheriff Clements also reports that the present jail is not being used for prisoners who receive sentences of over one week, in keeping with the Health Officer's wishes. These prisoners are transferred to Lubbock, which means that we pay other counties for safe-keeping our prisoners, and the deputies must be out of the county more than if we had adequate facilities in this county. We do not need a "nice" jail to keep sentenced prisoners and those awaiting trial, but we do need a secure ground floor jail which complies with health standards so that when a person receives a sentence or is awaiting trial, the people of the county and particularly the victims of criminal offenses will know that the persons arrested will be available for trial, and that the sentenced prisoner will be kept for the full duration of his sentence.

If the bond election passes, plans will be made to sell the bonds after the first of the year, so that the first payment will not be due until after the first of the year of 1970. If this is done, it will not be necessary to create an interest and sinking fund in the County budget until September of 1969. The Constitution of Texas allows a County to levy a tax of 80¢ on every \$100.00 assessed valuation for four purposes; the general fund, now set at 49¢; the jury fund, now set at 4¢; the permanent improvement fund, now set at 8¢, and the road and bridge fund,

now set at 19¢. No matter how large of a bond issue is passed, and there are limits set down by law as to the amount, the money to repay the construction bonds must come from this 80¢, and a County may not levy additional taxes to pay for permanent improvements.

With our present assessed valuation of \$15,200,000.00, there are two ways to pay for jail bonds. One is to ARBITRARILY increase assessed valuation to 17 or 18 million dollars, which in my opinion is no way to pay for a jail, because it does not take into consideration that some persons may have their property properly assessed now, and this would automatically increase their taxes. People are becoming increasingly critical of raising taxes to pay for programs that their representatives think they need. But, there is another way to repay jail bonds without raising taxes or valuation one bit. This way is, in the budget for 1969, to cut the levy from some of these other three funds and add it to the permanent improvement fund. THIS WILL NOT INCREASE TAXES OR VALUATION AND WE WILL STILL BE ABLE TO PAY FOR THE JAIL BONDS.

The general fund is now set at a levy of 49¢ for a total income in 1968 of \$70,956.00 and total expenditures of \$70,770.92. We will probably be able to cut this levy 2 or 3 cents since the \$9000.00 budgeted for transporting prisoners and jail expense payable to other counties will be reduced with a new jail. We might cut this fund 14¢ and do away with the bookmobile program, purchase of any new vehicles for the sheriff's department, any charity at all, such as grocery orders and hospital bills, the dispatcher's salary,

the county agent's and the home demonstration agent's travel expense, the entire salary of the Veteran's Service Officer and a few other matters, but I believe that these things play an important role in the service that your elected officials are able to give to the people of this County.

The Road and Bridge fund is now set at 19¢. If we do not obligate this fund in the coming year, we could plan now to cut this fund from 19¢ to 7¢, and with the 2 or 3 cents from the general fund put in the Permanent Improvement fund this would be sufficient to pay the bond issue and the utilities for the new building.

Now cutting 12¢ from the road and bridge fund seems a lot, but in addition to the 7¢ remaining in that fund, there are additional levies of 15¢ and 30¢ going into road and bridge fund, approximately \$100,000.00 annually in license plate fees, and \$23,000.00 in state aid. Actually 15¢ of road and bridge money has been used to retire warrants to pay for the purchase of Right of Way. These warrants have recently been retired, so road machinery and the operating capital of the precincts will not be decreased. Total county income for the year 1967 was some \$443,000.00 and of this amount, over \$200,000.00 was spent from road and bridge funds so that instead of increasing the amount of money spent in operating the precincts, we could use this levy to re-tire jail bonds.

You must make up your own minds as to whether we need this new jail, but it can well be done without raising your taxes or your valuation arbitrarily. You are urged to visit our present facilities, and to view the proposed plans for the new jail and law enforcement center, and if you would like to

see the new jail, tell your commissioner that you are aware that such can be accomplished without a raise in taxes and support the bond election on September 10, 1968.

Drawings of the plan for the law enforcement center will be published in the Journals between now and election date, September 10, as will additional information as to type of structure planned and detailed features of the building.

An open meeting has been set in Muleshoe High School Cafeteria by city-county on September 5, 8 p.m. to enable all residents to ask any question they have in mind concerning the matter.

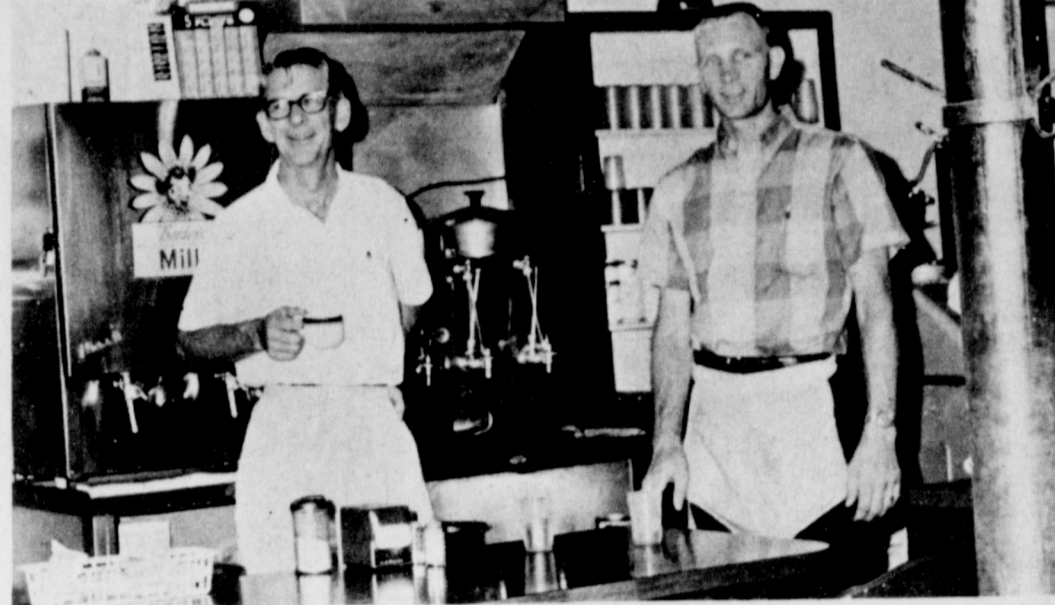

period will extend into the grand total of \$180,000 additional, bringing the grand total to \$415,000.

For the present time, in order that the taxes will not be raised, plans are for two new water wells and well field supply line; \$50,000; 2. 1,000 gallon round storage tank, \$85,000; 3. booster pump station, \$20,000; 4. 12 inch arctic main on south side of city, \$70,000 and replacement of certain small diameter two inch mains.

In the same general period, 1968-72 there are six improvements in the General Obligations Bond slot. They are 1. Park Improvement-Phase I: land acquisition and play equipment, \$40,000; 2. Paving existing streets in older parts of city and Birch Avenue, \$40,000; 3. Improvements to sewage and treatment plant, \$65,000; 4. City Hall and Land, \$105,000; Community Building, \$60,000 and 6. Library.

This brings the sub-total to \$350,000.

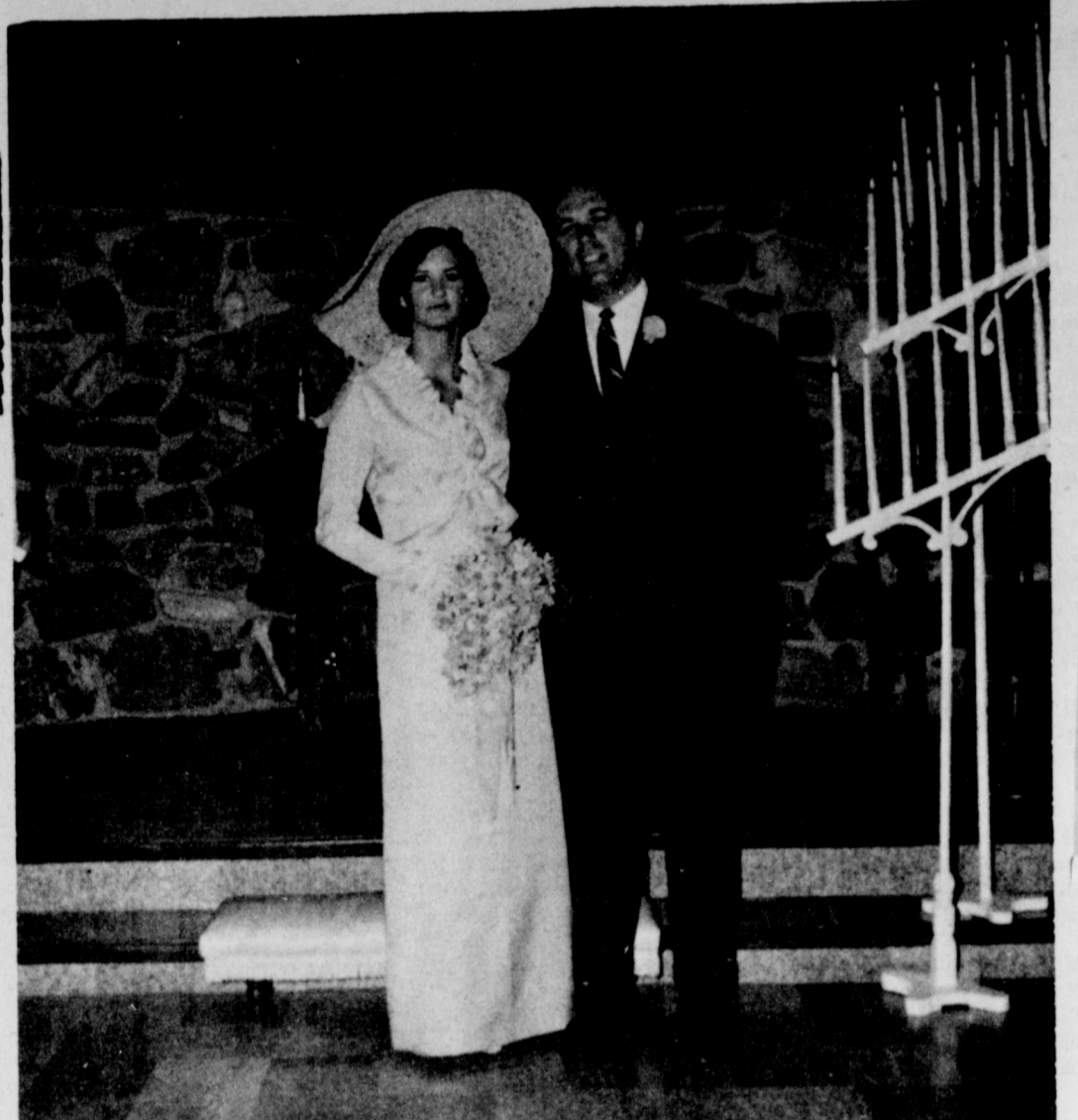

Some 700 educators attended a three day conference of The Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading (TAIR), held on the campus of West Texas State University, Canyon, last week.

Recipe of Week

If you find yourself too busy in your home or your social and civic activities to prepare an adequate dessert for your family as desired, you might take a page from the book of Mrs. Lonnie Merriott District Court Clerk of Bailey County.

Bake at 400° for about 40 minutes, until pie is desired brownness and apples are tender. Spread Orange Glaze over hot pie.

ORANGE GLAZE

1 cup confectioners sugar (sift if lumpy)
1 teaspoon grated orange peel
3 tablespoons orange juice
Mix together; spread over hot pie.

CRISCO PIE CRUST (For 9-inch double crust)
2 CUPS SIFTED REGULAR FLOUR
1 TEASPOON SALT
3/4 CUP Crisco or other Vegetable Shortening
1/4 cup water

Preheat oven. Sift flour before measuring; spoon lightly into nested measuring cup and level without shaking or packing down. Combine flour and salt in a mixing bowl. With a pastry blender or two knives, cut in Crisco until uniform; mixture should be fairly coarse. Sprinkle with water, a little at a time; toss with a fork. Work dough into a firm ball with your hands.

Divide dough into two parts and press into flat circles with smooth edges. On a lightly floured surface, roll bottom crust to a circle about 1 1/2 inches larger than inverted pie plate. Gently ease dough into place. Trim edge even with plate and add filling. Roll top crust same way.

1/8 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons orange juice
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
Orange Glaze (recipe below)

Preheat oven to 400°. Toss apples and raisins with combined sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt. Turn into pastry-lined 9-inch pie plate. Sprinkle with orange juice and dot with butter. Cover with top crust; seal and flute edge. Cut slits for escape of steam.

The 1968-69 Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. budget of \$181,750, while some \$27,000 below the 1967-68 budget, features a new "floating fund" of \$10,000 to launch an expanded drive for increased export and domestic markets for High Plains cotton.

Don Anderson, Crosby County cotton producer and president of the 23-county cotton organization, said the new budget provides for continuing current PCG programs on behalf of area cotton at only slightly reduced levels.

"But at the same time," he said, "we have tried to put more emphasis on building market demand that will justify producing more bales on the Plains at prices high enough for growers to show a profit."

The new Export and Domestic Market Development item in the budget, according to Anderson, is to be spent for added fiber analysis and spinning tests, travel, advertising and promotion, the services of a qualified textile engineer "or in whatever category we find will give the desired results."

The organization's reduced budget for the coming year is the result of much smaller production in the area for the past two years under the Agriculture Act of 1965. PCG derives its revenue principally from producer, gin, oil mill and compress dues paid on a per-bale basis.

Producer dues are 15 cents per bale, ginners pay one cent, oil mills send in two cents per ton of seed crushed and compresses submit 1/3 cent per bale received. Lesser dues are collected from banks, merchants, suppliers and other agri-businesses.

Major items in the commodity organization's 1968-69 budget, any of which may be increased by the Board on the Export and Market Development Fund if necessary, include:

Agriculture research, \$17,650, reduced substantially from the \$32,325 budgeted in 1967-68 because Cotton Producers Institute is now putting more grower funds into projects previously financed by PCG.

Advertising and public relations, \$22,000, covering area, national and international publications, displays, exhibits, style shows, women's cotton promotion groups and related activities.

Fiber research and technical service to spinning mills, \$11,

250, including development and dissemination of data to prove the spinning performance of popular area varieties.

Boll weevil operations, \$1,500. The great majority of funds for this program come from separate collections, reduced from 40 cents to 25 cents per bale this year.

Fiber quality analysis and reports, \$4,000, providing mills and merchants with seasonal quality breakdowns of area staple, grade, pressley, micronaire and elongation figures not available to them from any other source.

Travel, \$17,500, covers necessary travel of officers and staff for legislative representation, marketing efforts, industry meeting attendance, etc.

Salaries, \$52,500, for five full time employees, two field men who work about five months of the year and the service of a textile consultant.

The remainder of the budget is allocated to minor items such as insurance, rent, meetings, accounting costs, office supplies, etc.

An all day "Ginners' Management Workshop" will be staged for High Plains gin owners and managers on August 15 at the KoKo Palace, 50th and Avenue Q, Lubbock. Registration begins at 9 a.m. and the program extends to around 4 p.m.

The first of its kind on the Plains, the workshop is jointly sponsored by the Plains Ginners Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Purpose is to increase efficiency in the use of gin personnel and generally improve gin management techniques.

Billy C. Gunter, TAES District Agent, said a similar workshop was held in March of this year at Victoria, Texas and that attending ginners were well pleased with results.

Gunter will preside at the morning session and A.L. Higgins, Plainview gin owner and President of the Plains Ginners Association, will preside in the afternoon.

Luncheon speaker at the workshop will be Extension Director John E. Hutchison, with the "meat" of the program conducted by TAES Economists Kenneth Wolf and Johnny Feagan.

The program will open with discussions by Wolf on "The Management Lag and Process" and "Planning and Organizing for Action." This will be followed by a talk on "Internal

Economic Considerations in Operating a Gin" in which Feagan will discuss ways and means for better efficiency and maximum use of equipment and labor.

At the afternoon session "Diversification" is the lead topic, analyzing the basic principles of business diversification and how these can be applied to a cotton gin. Both Wolf and Feagan will participate in this discussion. Labor problems, new employees and the use of year-round labor will be taken up by Wolf under the title "Personnel Utilization."

Wolf will close out the formal part of the program with "Managing Manager Time," an address aimed at assisting the gin owner to better utilization of his own time.

An informal question and answer period, with all ginners invited to bring up individual problems, will be directed by Bill Thompson of Shallowater, President of the Texas Ginners Association.

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Republicans, Demos Square Away

With the Republican convention out of the way, Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls got back to his campaign for governor of Texas.

And his Democratic opponent, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, got started on a round of meetings with delegates to the state Democratic convention to see what they want in the party platform.

Smith's 31 meetings with delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts is an unusual approach to the party grassroots. He is asking the delegates to tell him how he should campaign to offset the growing Republican threat.

Democrats recall that in 1960, when then Vice-president Richard M. Nixon was the Republican candidate for president, the unknown Republican candidate for governor, William M. Steger, got 609,808 votes without even making a campaign. This time Eggers has been campaigning for months. He has been picking up support from dissident Democrats like Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and, with Nixon on the top of the ticket again, he is considered a real threat.

Eggers has been making a series of regional bus tours, campaigning in as many as 30 towns in four days, in an effort to duplicate the Smith success with personal campaigning.

During the primary campaign, Smith visited in 225 counties, some of which had never before seen a candidate for governor. This hard work showed up when he won the Democratic nomination easily.

LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE--Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes will attend the National Legislative Conference in Miami, Florida, August 20-22. Among the topics to be discussed by the state legislative

leaders from all 50 states are bloc grants to states from the federal government, annual legislative sessions and others concerning the recent problems in state government.

Barnes is president-elect of the conference.

AG OPINIONS--Community Action Agencies handling poverty programs may not be under the direction of county commissioners courts nor may they be headed by persons designated by commissioners courts, according to an opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Opinion notes that under the Texas Constitution, commissioners courts shall deal only with county business and concludes that poverty programs are not within the constitutional boundaries of commissioners court power.

Of the 55 CAAs in Texas, only five are handled through commissioners courts, so the effect of this ruling is not expected to be major.

In another opinion, Attorney General Martin ruled that the governor may authorize spending of federal funds to build a residence for the superintendent of the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery.

Authorization does not constitute an increase in the appropriation but merely authorizes the expenditure of funds already allocated by the legislature. Martin said the superintendent's house burned after lightning hit it on May 19.

Governor Connally approved spending \$25,000 in available federal funds to build a new residence.

SECURITIES APPROVED/STOPPED--State Securities Board received 22 applications for permits to sell \$8,939,110 in securities in Texas last week.

Securities Commissioner William M. King said the applications included two Texas companies -- Accelerators

Inc., Austin, and Electronic Data Systems Corporation, Dallas.

Deputy Commissioner Truman G. Holladay has ordered discontinuance of trade in the securities of Computronics Industries Corporation and Universal Computa-Data Corporation, both of 1111 N. Central Expressway, Dallas.

HEMISFAIR HUMPHREY--Vice-president Hubert Humphrey toured HemisFair Saturday as the guest of Governor Connally and a number of other state and local officials.

Humphrey was scheduled to

tour the United States Pavilion, the Institute of Texas Cultures and the international sector of the World's Fair. At the U.S. Pavilion, the program included remarks by the vice-president, Connally and Cong. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio.

Humphrey was to meet with the heads of all international pavilions and to end his visit with a special Western Hemisphere solidarity program between the Mexican and Canadian pavilions.

STUDENT LOANS--Texas Opportunity Plan--a state program for making loans available to Texas college and university students--has helped 20,121 students since the program's inception in September, 1966.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System reports that 42,000 loans totaling \$14,698,300 have been made, as of May 1, through 104 participating institutions.

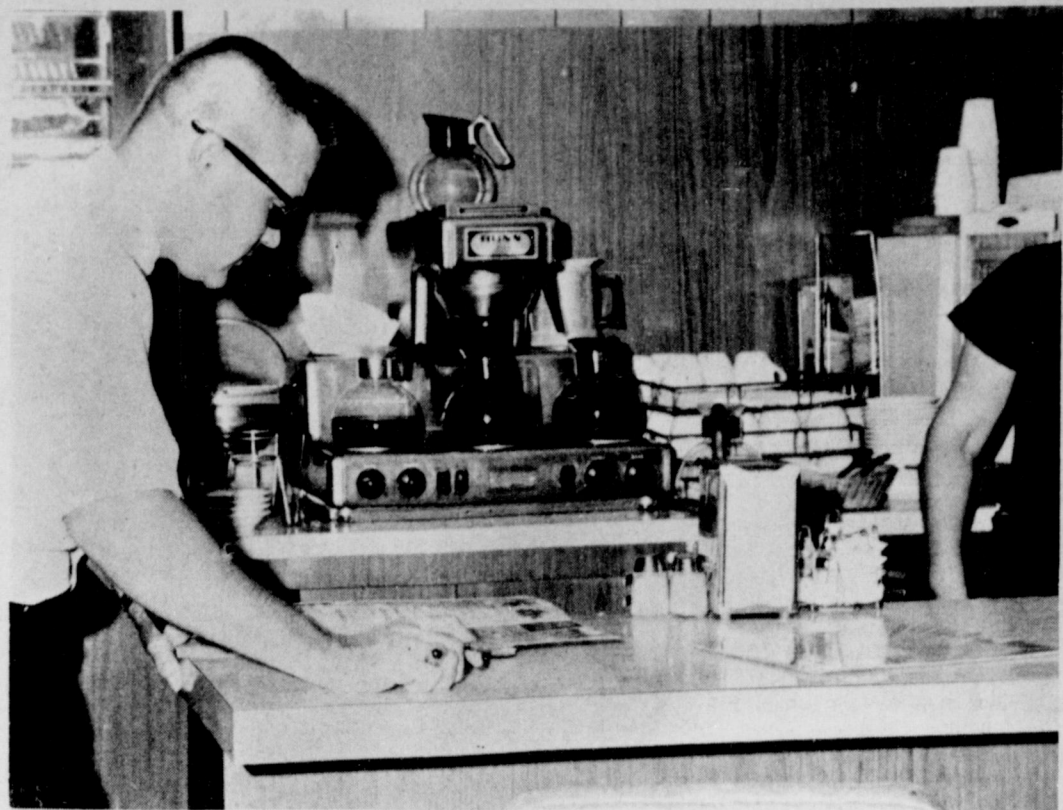

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Social Security Q's and A's

Q- I am a waitress downtown. My boss tells me I must keep a record of my tips and pay the social security tax to him at the end of every month. Is this true?

A- Yes, if your tips in a month amount to \$20 or more from any one employer you must pay the social security tax. Because your employer will send in the report of the tips, they will be added to your social security record and you and your dependents will have greater social security protection in the event of your retirement, disability or death.

Q- I have to pay the social security tax on the tips I receive from patrons. What good does it do me?

A- Social security benefits are based on how much a person earns over the years. By adding your tips to your regular wages, your social security benefit will be higher.

Q- I will be retiring soon and would like to file my claim for social security before then. However, I am not able to visit the social security office during its normal hours. How can I take care of my claim for benefits?

A- You should file your claim for social security two or three months before you reach 65. The social security office at Lubbock is normally open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday. To better serve the public, the office is also open Thursday evenings until 8:00 p.m.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Kill the Umpire!"

For verbal pyrotechnics, few events can equal a hard-fought game of baseball. As a rule the sound and fury signify nothing serious. But at times, matters do get out of hand.

Suppose, for example, that the fan who yells "Kill the umpire!" really takes a swing at him. What are the legal consequences?

For one thing, the umpire may hold the fan liable for the damage he inflicts. The law draws a sharp line between violent words and violent deeds.

But there may be further complications. Take this case:

An umpire, slugged by an irate

fan, decided that the real villain was the home team's peppery manager. Suing the manager for damages, the umpire argued in court:

"He kept heckling me all through the game. He knew perfectly well that he was getting the local fans all worked up against me. Therefore, he was responsible for my injury."

But the court refused to pin legal liability on the manager. The judge said it would be unfair to blame a manager for the antics of "every emotionally unstable person who might arrive at the game spoiling for a fight."

Furthermore, merely by taking on such a job in the first place, an umpire assumes a certain amount of risk.

In one case a college student, volunteering to umpire in a practice game, took up a position close behind the netting of the batting cage. A fast foul ball thudded into the netting and struck the student in the eye.

In due course he sued the school for damages, complaining that there was too much slack in the netting. But the court ruled that this was a risk he himself had assumed by standing in such a vulnerable spot.

Still, umpires do have the consolation of wielding vast power within the game itself. According to Section 9.02 of the Official Baseball Rules, the umpire's call, on almost every question, is the final word on the subject. With no appeal from his decisions, the umpire has the kind of authority that a judge on the bench might well envy.

One umpire displayed a keen sense of baseball law when he said: "They ain't strikes, they ain't balls, they ain't nothin' 'till I call 'em!"

ORDER FOR COUNTY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
 COUNTY OF BAILEY

ON THIS, the 12th day of August, 1968, the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County, convened in regular session, being open to the public, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Muleshoe, Texas, the following members of said Court being present and participating, to-wit:

DON W. CIHAK, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding; and W.M. DUDLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1, LOYD STEPHENS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2, W.H. EUBANKS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3, R. P. McCALL, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4, when among other proceedings had by said Court were the following:

The County Judge introduced the following order:

WHEREAS, this Court has affirmatively found and determined that it will be to the best interest and general welfare of the County to submit a proposition for the issuance of bonds for the purpose hereinafter set forth, therefore, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF BAILEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held throughout said County on the 10th day of September, 1968, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$175,000), to mature serially at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not later than twenty (20) years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, and to levy ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for the purpose of constructing and erecting a County Jail Building in the City of Muleshoe, the county seat of Bailey County, Texas, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?"

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"THE ISSUANCE OF \$175,000 JAIL BUILDING BONDS"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on

the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

NONE but those who are qualified property taxpaying voters in said County and who have duly rendered their property for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

THE POLLING PLACES and presiding officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows:

Precinct No. 1, Polling Place, American Legion Hall, Muleshoe, Texas; Presiding Judge, Ernest Kerr; Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. H.O. Barbour.
 Precinct No. 1-A, Polling Place, City Hall, Muleshoe, Texas; Presiding Judge, Myron Pool III; Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. W.R. Bowers.
 Precinct No. 2, Polling Place, West Camp Baptist Church, West Camp, Texas; Presiding Judge, Lonnie Wilhite; Alternate Presiding Judge, D.O. Burelsmith.

Precinct No. 3 (Mays Box), Polling Place, Longview Baptist Church, Longview Community; Presiding Judge, Bert Seales; Alternate Presiding Judge, Bo Ethridge.

Precinct No. 4, Polling Place Threeway School, Threeway, Texas; Presiding Judge, George Tyson; Alternate Presiding Judge, F.E. Knox.

Precinct No. 5, Polling Place, Needmore Community House, Needmore, Texas; Presiding Judge, Mrs. Rudolph Moraw; Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. Margaret Phipps.

Precinct No. 6, Polling Place, Bula School Building, Bula, Texas; Presiding Judge, Mrs. G.R. Salyer; Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. Eddie Wallace.

SPECIAL CONVAISSING BOARD: Presiding Judge, Connie Dale Gupton, Alternate Presiding Judge, Dorothy Wood.

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than two additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election. THE MANNER of holding said election shall be governed by the general laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 1 of Title 22, V.A.T.C.S.

THE COUNTY JUDGE shall cause notice of said election to be posted at the Courthouse Door and at a public place in each voting precinct in said County not less than fourteen (14) days next before said election, and to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said County, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

A SUBSTANTIAL copy of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The above and foregoing order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner McCall and seconded by Commissioner Eubanks that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": County Judge Cihak and Commissioners Dudley, Stephens, Eubanks, and McCall, and none voted "NO". PASSED AND APPROVED this, the 12 day of August, 1968.

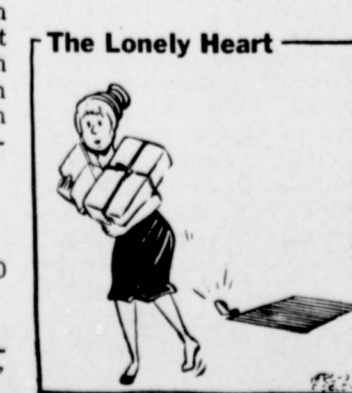
