## Man With Ties to Cross Plains Writes His Take on the Wildfire

Editor's Note: Cleve Wiese, a graduate journalism student at
New York University (NYU) wrote this story after visiting Cross Plains in the days following the fire. He is the son of Larry and Patricia (better known as Sissy Barr) Wiese and the grandson of the late Clara Nell

CROSS PLAINS, TX-Hollis Sherrell recalled fighting the approached his back yard. verify the good news. The dog was hers. "We thought she'd died in the fire because it came so fast," she said. "We call her the little miracle dog."

death-defying extraction of a keg of black powder from a burning shed filled with firearms. "(My son) sprayed me with water while I went in there to get it," he said, "I knew it'd blow out our windows and probably
