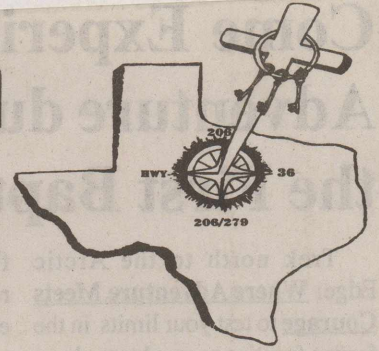

## Robert E. Howard Activities Abound with 3-day Event

This weekend, June 8, 9, and 10, will find hundreds of visitors from 20 states, Washington D.C., Germany, England, France and Sweden spending time in Cross Plains as they pay homage to their hero, Robert E. Howard. This year is the centennial celebration of the birth of the man who became known as the world's greatest fantasy writer. Although Howard was born in Peaster, Texas, he lived in Cross Plains with his physician father and mother from 1919 until his death in 1936.

One of the featured guests of honor for the 2006 celebration will be Glenn Lord, who is known for his never-ending efforts in championing Howard and his works. Lord published the first collection of REH poetry in 1959, edited the legendary fanzine, "The Howard Collector" from 1960-1972, was literary agent for the owners of Howard's works for over 30 years and continues to be involved in advisory and editing roles with all things Howard.

Co-guest of honor will be Roy Thomas, who was the driving force behind the success of Marvel's comic book, "Conan the Barbarian" in the 70's. His award winning contributions in this area set the standard for all depictions of the Cimmerian hero in visual medium. In addition to his work with the comics, Thomas has worked on adaptations of Conan into film, television and animation.

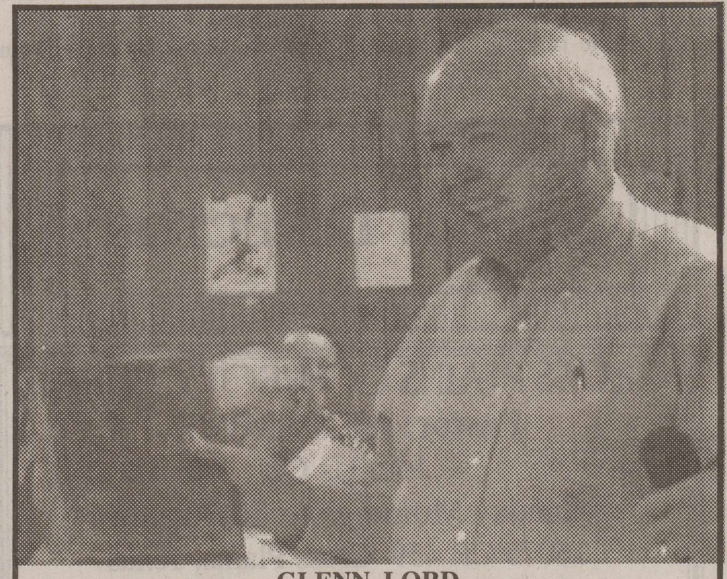
When Project Pride purchased and restored the old Howard House on West Highway 36 in 1989, the celebrations of Robert E. Howard's writings and influence took on new life and have been growing every year. Era Lee Hanke, President of Project Pride, commented that: "we are very honored to be able to co-host this annual event that draws fans back year after year." She went on to explain how all the volunteers who help at the Howard House Museum and the returning fans are likened to one big extended family—"a family that crosses all geographical, cultural and age lines."

This year's celebration will include a wide variety of panel discussions led by Lord, Thomas and members of the Robert E. Howard United Press

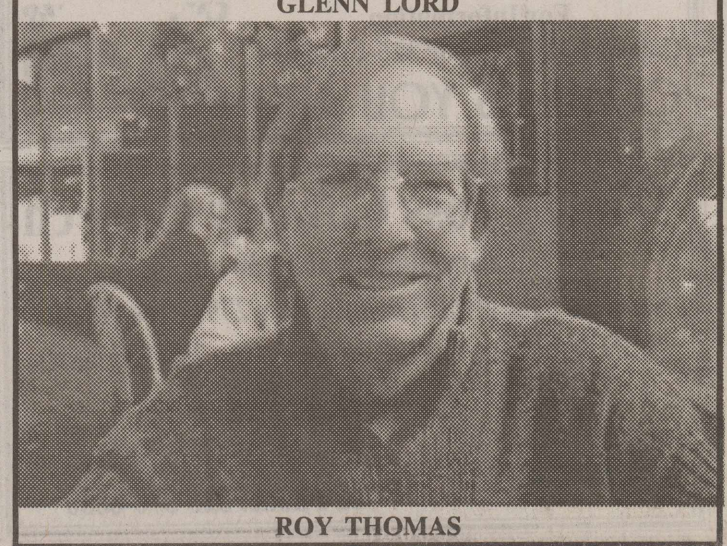
## BURKETT Homecoming and Annual Memorial Service

Michael Myers, the screenwriter for the movie, will be on hand to introduce the movie depicting the story of Robert Howard and his local school-teacher friend, Novalyn Price. Price had written the story of their relationship under the title of "One Who Walked Alone", which was later adapted into the movie starring Vincent D'Onofrio and Renee Zellweger.

In addition to the panel discussions at the Public Library, the High School Gym and the Pavilion at the Howard House on Friday, there will be a swap meet, autograph session and a silent auction at the Community Center from 3-5:30 p.m. The Violet Crown Radio Theatre performance in the high school gym will begin at 7 p.m. with reenactments of some of Howard's and Price's stories.

The three-day celebration is

an effort to pay tribute to the ingenious literary abilities of Howard. Not limited to any one genre, Howard wrote tales of the wild-west, adventures of swash-buckling heroes and body pounding boxing matches as well as poetry for both the tender hearted and those seeking a visual story in rhyme. The Conan stories and his other fantasy writings are simply what have gained the most attention from Howard aficionados.

The Howard House Museum will be open for tours all three days with Howard books and memorabilia being for sale in the gift shop. The Cross Plains Public Library will have original manuscripts on display and the Post Office will offer a special event cancellation all day Friday at the Post Office. All activities are free to the public; however, donations will be taken for the fire related funds at the movie and radio theatre.

The Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District is now taking orders for their Annual Fish Program. Each year the District offers these fish to the general public on a first come first served basis at a very inexpensive price.

These fish come from the Arms Fish Farm out of Dublin, Texas. This year's selection of fish includes Bluegill, Hybrid Bream, Red Ear, Grass Carp, Largemouth Bass, Catfish, Bluecat, Crappie, Goldfish and Koi. In addition we are also offering Red Horse Minnows, Fathead and Goldshiners.

Fish orders will be taken from April 19, 2006 thru June 22,

2006 or until supplies run out, whichever comes first.

The fish will be delivered to Baird on Thursdays.

Appointments to pickup fish will be set up at the time of order. All orders are prepaid with a check or money order and delivery is guaranteed.

## Applications needed for the Texas Family Farm and Ranch Heritage Program

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs reminded families who are applying for the Family Land Heritage Program that applications are due to the Texas Department of Agriculture by Friday, September 15. The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes farms and ranches that have been kept in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 100, 150 and 200 years or more. Since the program started in 1974, more than 4,120 farms and ranches in 229 counties have been honored. Applications are being accepted for farms or ranches established in 1906 and earlier that are still owned and operated by the descendants of the founder, either through blood, marriage or adoption. The land must also fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

The owners must reside in Texas and be actively managing

the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all the land has ever been rented or leased to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres were retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, the property will still qualify. There is no cost to apply for the recognition.

Fayette County has the most Family Land Heritage honorees with 124 properties, Houston County is next with 85 properties, Austin and Gillespie counties are tied with 82 properties each, Medina County has 81 properties and De Witt County has 80 properties.

## Pioneer Cemetery Memorial Day Observance Draws Large Crowd

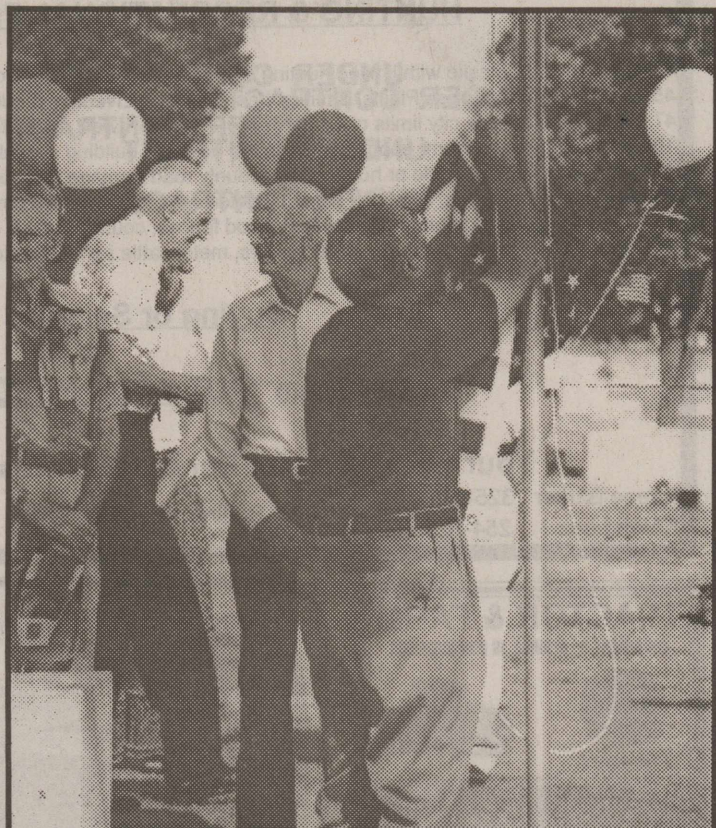

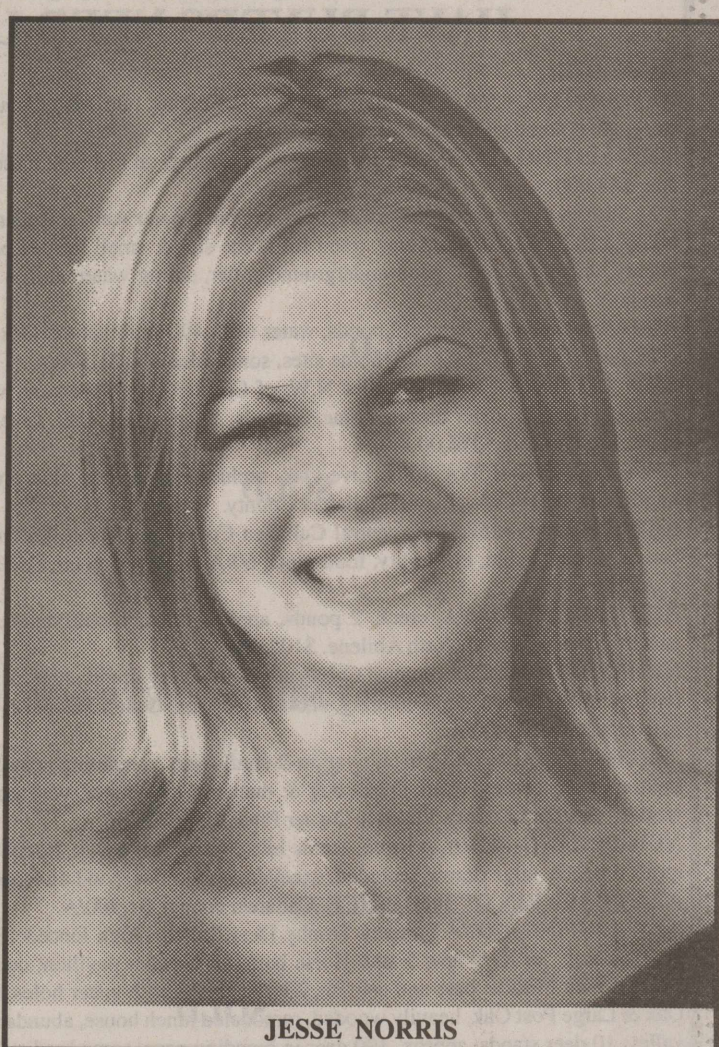
## Norris is Awarded 2006 Beta Sigma Phi Scholarship

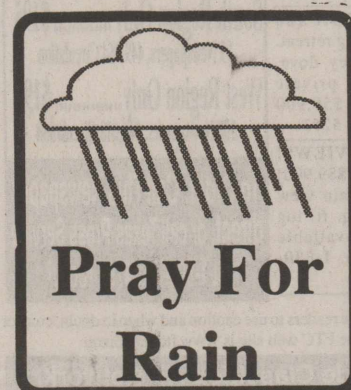


