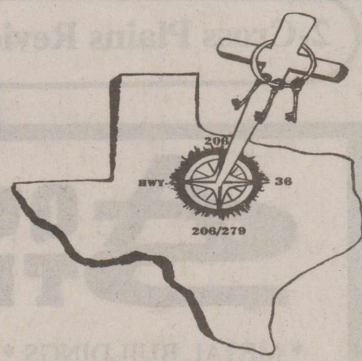

## Local Horse Exhibitor to Compete in Bayer Select World Championship Show

American Quarter Horse enthusiast Rickey Carey, age 51, of Cross Plains, will be competing in the Bayer Select World Championship Show at the Amarillo National Center in Amarillo, Texas on August 29 thru September 3, 2006.

Carey will be among 1,000 Amateur Select competitors over the age 50, from the United States, Canada and several countries participating in the show. He will compete with his American Quarter Horse Clusify Me, a 6-year-old chestnut gelding in the Aged Geldings Class.

The Bayer Select World Championship Show, open exclusively to amateur members age 50 and older, is expecting hundreds of exhibitors at the inaugural event.

Currently, there are more than 35,000 members in the American Quarter Horse Association's Amateur division with 12,000 eligible for the Amateur Select division.

This is an invitational event. That serves as a showcase for top American Quarter Horse Amateur Select exhibitors, so competition promises to be intense and exciting. Competitors vying for more than 20 world championship titles, as well as prizes, must have earned a predetermined number of points at American Quarter Horse Association approved shows between June 1, 2005 and May 31, 2006.

Bayer Select World Championship Show is sponsored by Bayer,

an AQHA Corporate Partner since 1984. Bayer is the official provider of animal health products for AQHA. It will be sponsored by Bank of America, Farnam, John Deere, Montana Silversmiths, Nutrena, Sooner, Tex Tan and WeatherBeeta.

Highlights of the show will air on "America's Horse," AQHA's weekly series on the TVG Network. The broadcast dates are Sunday, September 24 at 11:30 a.m. Eastern and October 25 at 11:0 a.m. Eastern.

The Bayer Select World Championship also offers a variety of social activities and a trade show, featuring numerous equine-related products and services.

## Ross Cemetery Honored

BAIRD, TEXAS—The Texas Historical Commission (THC) recently designated Ross Cemetery as a Historic Texas Cemetery. The distinction means the cemetery has been legally recorded through the THC's Historic Texas Cemetery Program, an important step in ensuring its preservation.

This designation is reserved for cemeteries that are at least 50 years old and documented through the Historic Texas Cemeteries process to record their historic association and significance.

A dedication ceremony to commemorate this historic designation and the placing of the medallion at the cemetery will be held at later date.

"The designation is a tool that will increase public awareness of these important cultural resources," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the THC. "Awareness and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of a cemetery."

While not a required element of the Texas Historic Cemetery designation, the distinctive medallion is a recognized symbol of preservation efforts. The medallion includes the words "Historic Texas Cemetery - Texas Historical Commission" encircling a central star, rose and cypress branch. It is available to any cemetery that has received the Historic Texas Cemetery des-

ignation through an application process that documents the history and features of the state's historic public and private burial grounds.

Cemeteries hold valuable historical information. They are often the last reminders of early settlements' historical events, religious beliefs, lifestyles and genealogy. While the Historic Texas Cemetery designation encourages cemetery preservation, it cannot guarantee that a historic cemetery will avoid destruction. Threats to historic cemeteries include urban expansion and development, vandalism, grazing animals and long-term deterioration from weather and uncontrolled vegetation.

The THC developed the Historic Texas Cemetery designation to address the destruction of historic cemeteries and the illegal removal of cemetery fixtures. Any individual or organization is eligible to submit an application for this designation. The Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. The agency administers a variety of programs to preserve the archaeological, historical and cultural resources of Texas.

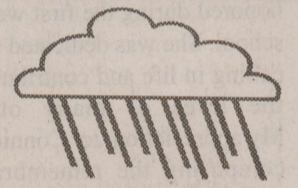

### "Three Checked Chickens and a Booodle of White Chickens"

As a youngster, someone gave my sister and I one pullet each. Our parents were already raising chickens, however the two given to Ann and me were different. They were Dominique.

The only way I know to describe them is to say they looked like black and white checked chickens. So-oo-o, these two checked chicks were alone.

The next task on our agenda was to name them. My sister, being more practical than I, chose to name her chick Billy Bea Beech, after a local radio personality.

I, on the other hand (with apparent delusions of grandeur), not to mention the fact that I was an incurable dreamer and romantic, named mine Tiny Silver.

Now, that I look back on it, the chicken looked more like Little Richard or Chubby Checker than it did Tiny Silver.

We had a great time playing with mama and daddy's little baby chickens. They would buy some every year.

It's sort of like adoption. When their mama lays the eggs and they are kept in the brooder. It keeps them warm until they hatch. If the eggs had been left with the mother hen, she would have sat on them until they hatched and then took care of them.

Since these hatched in the brooder, as each one left the egg shell they were wiped off with a dry clean cloth, and food and water were placed inside for them. The brooder was warmed by a small light bulb.

These little chicks would spend at least three days inside the brooder, except for four 15 minute spans. After that they were taken out for longer and longer periods of time.

Eventually they were taken out all day and just went inside the brooder at night to sleep.

Sometimes a little chicken would pass on to that Big Rooster in the Sky. When those occasions came my sister and I felt compelled to provide a funeral. We would ask Mama for a little box. Back then the long stemmed matches used to light the kitchen stove were made of wood and so was the box they came in. It was just the right size.

We would fill the bottom of the box with fresh green grass; look thru mama's sewing scraps and pick out the right one. Next we wrapped the baby chicken in the scrap and placed it in the box. We would secure the twine and tie the box up and stick some little flowers underneath the twine.

Then, out we went to select the burial site. We would either get our little shovels or mama's big mix'n spoon and dig in the ground. After burying the box, a hymn or two would be sung and the grave was closed. A bouquet of flowers would be added.

These little chicks left this world in style!!!!

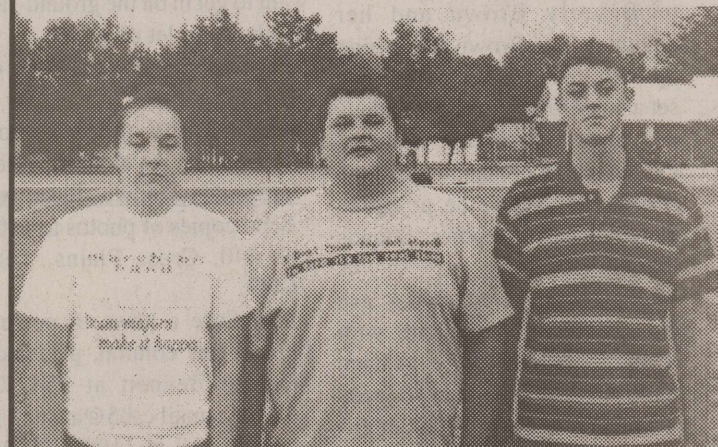

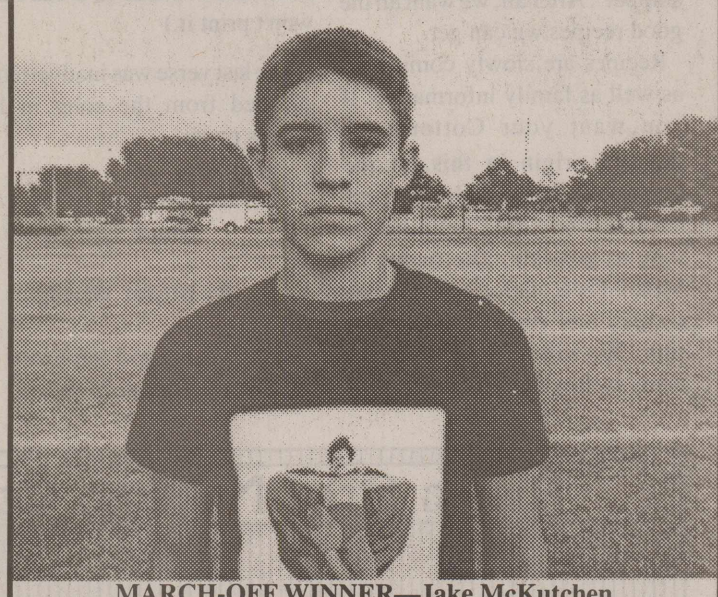

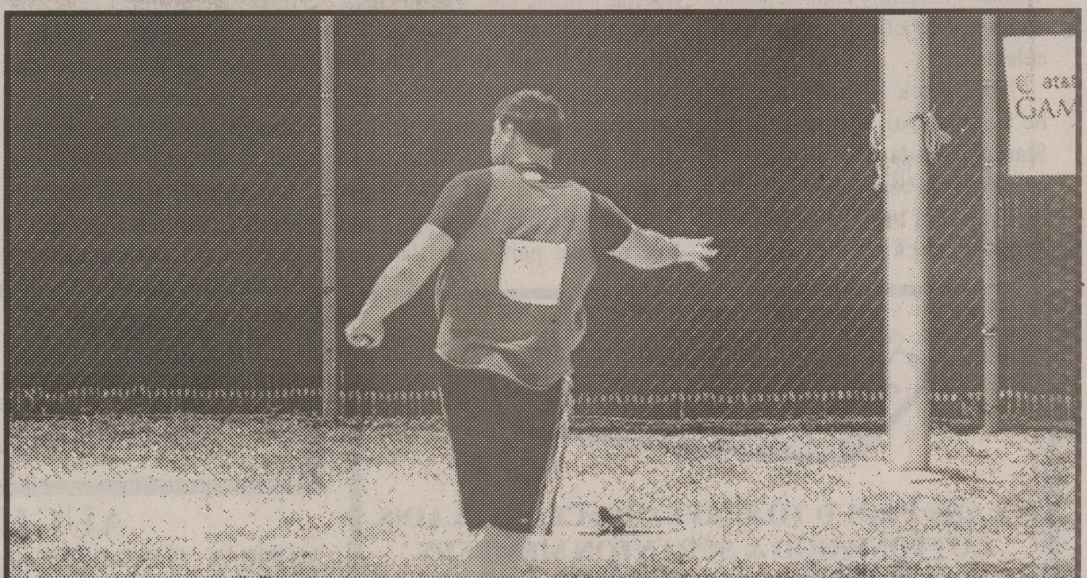

## Applications due Sept. 15th for Family Farm & Ranch program

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs reminded families who are applying for the Family Land Heritage Program that applications are due to the Texas Department of Agriculture by Friday, September 15th. The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes farms and ranches that have been kept in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 100, 150 and 200 years or more. Since the program started in 1974, more than 4,120 farms and ranches in 229 counties have been honored.

"This unique program honors the agricultural contributions of countless generations of Texans," said Combs. "These men and women have held onto their ancestors' land over the decades, enduring some challenging times."

Applications are being accepted for farms or ranches established in 1906 and earlier that are still owned and operated by the decedents of the founder, either through blood, marriage or adoption. The land must also fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less

than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

The owners must reside in Texas and be actively managing the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all the land has ever been rented or leased to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres were retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, the property will still qualify. There is no cost to apply for the recognition.

Fayette County has the most Family Land Heritage honorees with 124 properties, Houston County is next with 85 properties, Austin and Gillespie counties are tied with 82 properties each, Medina County has 81 properties and De Witt County has 80 properties.

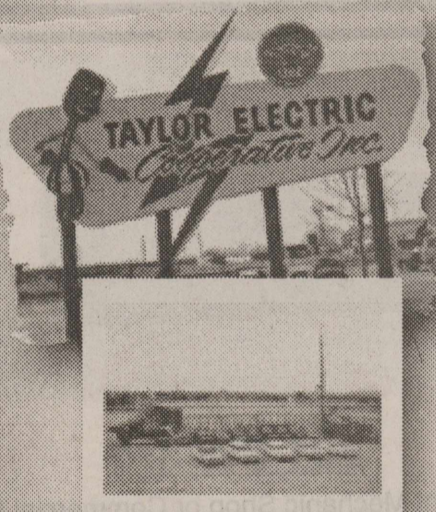

- 2007 – Member Appreciation Day Grand Opening event scheduled.

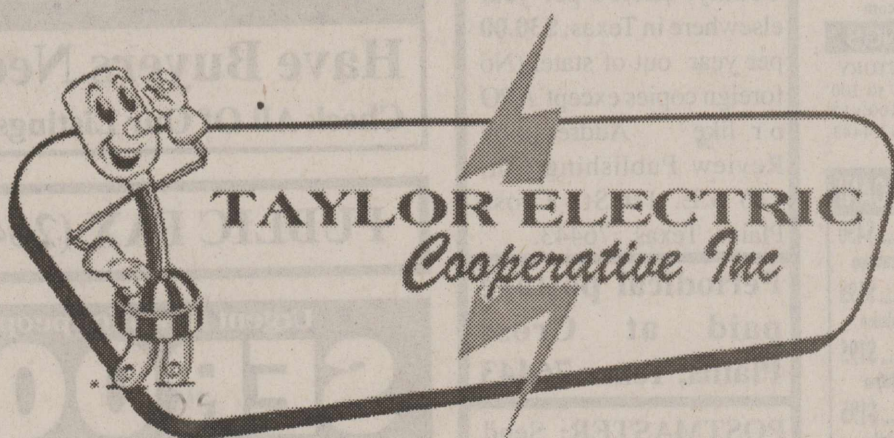

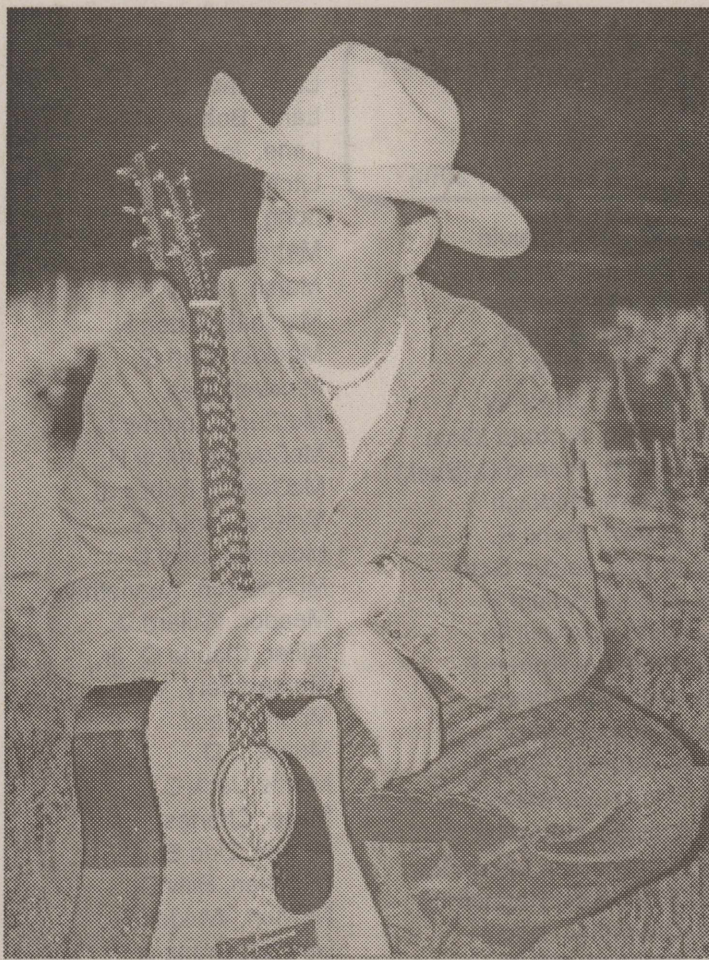

**Perry lifts restrictions to bring in hay to drought stricken herds**

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry has directed the Texas Department of Transportation to temporarily waive certain trucking restrictions to allow the emergency delivery of hay to Texas farmers and ranchers harmed by ongoing drought conditions. In a letter to Ric Williamson, chairman of the Texas Transportation Commission, Perry said the U.S. Department of Agriculture has estimated a 77 percent loss in hay production in Texas, and Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs and the Texas Farm Bureau have asked for help in expediting delivery of hay to Texas. "Hay importation from neighboring states less affected by drought will help Texas producers survive the final hot months of the year," Perry wrote. His letter directs TxDOT to suspend the permitting requirements and legal height restriction for round hay bales, and associated permit fees, for carriers transporting round bales of hay. The suspension of those requirements will expire Oct. 31st. To ensure the safety of the traveling public, Perry said TxDOT must require loads exceeding 14 feet in height to contact TxDOT's Motor Carrier Division to receive expedited routing. All other legal requirements, including licensing, registration, insurance, and safety, remain in place. Perry earlier this year issued a similar directive for emergency hay deliveries, but that expired on April 30th.
