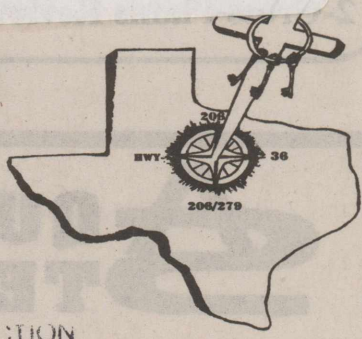

The city requests that you have your lawns and vacant lots mowed before September 1, 2006 to avoid the city mowing the lots and charging you for the bill.

If the bill is not paid, a lien will be placed against your property and must be paid before you can sell your property.

The City of Cross Plains also encourages its citizens to take pride in their property and to clean up before C.P.H.S. Homecoming.

With the drought situation like it is, this will more than likely be the last mowing of the season. Please do your part in making Cross Plains a beautiful place to live.

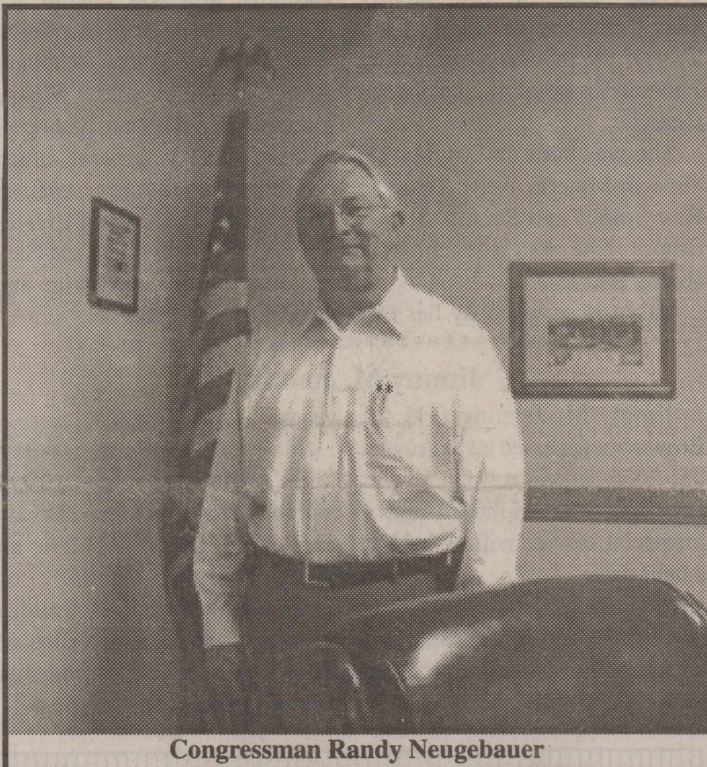
Congressman Randy Neugebauer Held Town Meeting in Cross Plains Thursday

"Coffee with the Congressman" was held at the Cross Plains City Hall Thursday, August 24th, with a small crowd of local and area residents present to address some issues with Congressman Randy Neugebauer. "I'm taking care of my customers, the 652,000 residents in the 19th District. I've personally met 30 percent of them and have had some kind of contact with 75 percent," he explained.

Congressman Neugebauer started the session commending the community of Cross Plains for their efforts in cleaning up and rebuilding following the massive firestorm last December. He noted, "I applaud this community for a great job. They pulled themselves up by the bootstraps." He went on to say, "In Texas we don't sit on a bridge and wait for a helicopter to come take care of us." Neugebauer remarked that our positive reaction to the disaster was a great example for the rest of the nation.

He talked about the 2002 Farm Bill ending and that the Agricultural Policy in America for the next 6 years will soon be addressed. Congressman

Neugebauer was eager to see what people in agriculture want the new farm bill to look like. The WTO (World Trade Organization) is looking for more customers for America to expand the markets. At this time the U.S. cannot compete in other countries without a more level playing field. His thoughts were that he had rather have no deal than a bad deal and to just

keep our current position. He remarked, "The drought is wide-spread reaching several states and has far-reaching implications for the nation. Meetings to discuss federal perspectives to help with the drought have been held," he noted.

Financial security was another important issue discussed. See Neugebauer Page 8

3 of 4 county schools report increased enrollment

Three of the four public schools in Callahan County reported student enrollment increases this year compared to 2005.

Clyde CISD, Baird ISD and Cross Plains ISD all reported higher first week student enrollment this year compared to last year. Eula ISD was the only county school reporting a decline in enrollment.

Clyde CISD reported the largest enrollment increase this year, up 33 students over 2005. Clyde CISD reported student enrollment in all grades at 1,468 as of last week. The school reported 1,435 during the first week of school in 2005.

By campus, Clyde CISD had 470 students in high school. Clyde Junior High had 221 students in grades seventh and eighth. Clyde Intermediate School, with grades fourth, fifth and sixth, had 325 students. Clyde Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten through third grade, had 452 students.

Cross Plains ISD had the second highest student enrollment increase of the four county schools this year, up 11 students over 2005. Cross Plains reported 386 students in the first week of classes this year, compared to 375 students in the first week in 2005.

By campus, Cross Plains ISD

reported 176 students in Cross Plains High School, which includes grades seven through twelve. At Cross Plains Elementary School, 210 students were reported in grades Pre-Kindergarten through six.

Baird ISD reported student enrollment up two students compared to last year. Baird ISD noted 347 students this year, compared to 345 students for the first week of 2005.

Baird High School, with students in grades nine through twelve, reported 123 students. At the Baird Middle School, there were 69 students. Baird Middle School includes students in grades seventh and eighth. At Baird Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten through sixth grade, there were 155 students enrolled.

Eula ISD saw a decline of 35 students this year compared to last year. Eula ISD reported 441 students this year. The school noted 476 students during the first week of school in 2005.

By campus, Eula High School reported 158 students in grades nine through twelve. At Eula Middle School, there were 97 students in grades six through eight. Eula Elementary School, with grades Pre-Kindergarten through fifth grade, reported 186 students.

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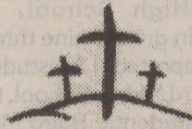

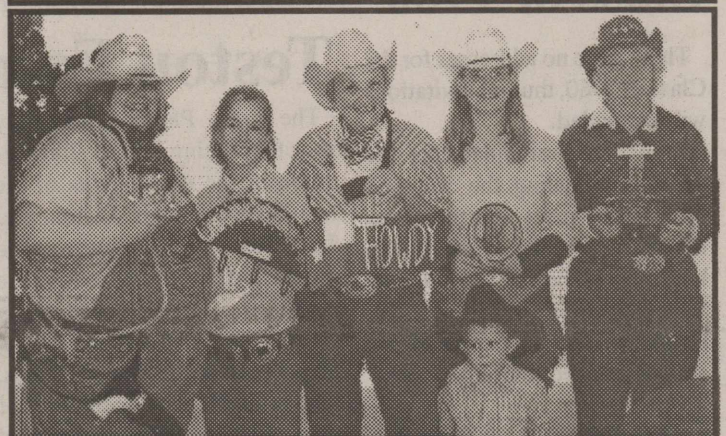

Former Merkel Coach is now at Cross Plains

The last of four Merkel coaches investigated two years ago for alleged inappropriate relationships with students has resigned, The Abilene Reporter-News reported in its August 24 edition.

The Merkel School Board received Shawn Bullock's resignation at its August 22nd meeting.

Merkel Superintendent Bill Hood said he does not know where Bullock is now working.

The resignation was dated July 24. Bullock was hired at Cross Plains High School on June 15 as head girls' basketball coach and girls' softball coach.

Three other former Merkel Coaches quit during the 2004-05 school year while Child Protective Services and the Taylor County Sheriff's Office investigated alleged inappropriate relationships with students that dated back several years. A Taylor county grand jury in May 2005 declined to bring criminal charges against any of the men.

Two of the men, Jeff Faubion and Tim Cope, surrendered their teaching licenses after a separate investigation by the State Board of Educator Certification. Dustin Lewis and Bullock kept their licenses, but received a reprimand for their conduct.

Bullock stepped down from his job as girls' basketball coach at Merkel during the 2004-05 school year and was reassigned to teach in the alternative education program, a position he held until he left the district.

Comment: Never could pick very much cotton in them old cotton fields back home.

"Those Lightened Eyes"

A long time ago (when I was a, maybe 3 or 4 years old), I remember getting up real early in the morning and some people in a horse-drawn wooden wagon came to the house and picked us up. It was way before the sun came up.

The people were dressed in overalls and long sleeve shirts and some of the mamas wore faded, homemade, print, house dresses and sun bonnets.

There was a man sitting on a little table. The mamas and daddies or pops made a line and stepped to the table and gave their name and the man gave them something that looked like a long, long laundry bag. In just a few minutes Mama said it was a cotton sack. She told me that the faster you picked and the more cotton you picked, the more money you would serve up for necessities like soap, beans, prunes, oatmeal, carrots, and cabbage. About that time I heard them call my name. I looked around and I was still in line. Then one more time I heard it again — KAY DENNIS! I walked over to the man at the little table. "Whares yore cotton sack?" he asked me. I pointed to the bib of my overalls and said, "I put the cotton in there!"

The man called to another, "Shorty, the sack is on her. Weigh her, it, the whole caboodle." They did.

As I viewed it, my pay, I couldn't believe it. It was a beautiful nickel. To me, it looked to be the largest nickel I had ever seen.

It was after dark when we got home that night. I can assure you that was the only horse-drawn wagon with lights that night. I beamed all the way home with that shiny nickel in my hand and a smile on my face.

This is in response to the article that was written in favor of the Trans Texas project. A consortium headed by Madrid Spain based Cintra, and San Antonio based Zachry Construction Corporation has agreed to build the first portion of the corridor. This will be a toll revenue for over 50, owned and operated by Cintra of Spain and TxDOT. This land grab will go through the richest farm land in Texas. Think of the pollution that all the trucks and rail traffic will bring. This monstrous project will run from Oklahoma to Laredo Mexico. This Trans Texas Corridor includes within its 1,200 foot wide path, ten vehicle lanes, six rail tracks, utilities, pipelines, and state concessions. The length of the corridors

proposed, total as much as 8,000 miles and will consume more than one-half million acres of Texas. Every mile of Corridor will consume 146 acres of land. That is private property that will become state owned property, removed from county and school district tax rolls. This proposed interstate to Mexico is the biggest land grab in history, and without public comment or input. I urge everyone to call their state representatives and ask why we haven't heard more about this. I think this should be voted on by the citizens of Texas, before any construction is considered. The Homecoming Committee has been working since February to get everything planned and organized, but sometimes very important details slip through the cracks and unfortunately I was made aware of one last week.

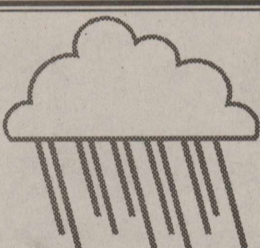
In preparing the invitations, I inadvertently left off the name of

including a sustainable economy. "We need to trust American taxpayers with their own money," he stated. He favors small business expansion and allowing them to keep more money to grow their own business. He explained that more people currently own their own homes and more individuals are gainfully employed.

"I would like to stop the death tax," Neugebauer stated. He expounded on the fact that it is not right for 4th and 5th generation farmers and ranchers to lose the property their families worked hard for to inheritance taxes.

Border security of course is another topic of great interest. With this global war on terrorism he emphasized that we need to know who and what is coming into our country. "Safety" is the main objective. A comprehensive Border Bill in the House focused on securing the borders. He talked about a proactive objective—to locate the illegals and stop them. He presented his views about sending a message to those who want to enter the U.S., to do so by proper methods, otherwise they should be charged with a felony and never allowed back in. Also he feels that employers who hire illegals should be charged with a felony, since the main reason they come to America is for the opportunities of employment.

"The war on terrorism is ongoing!" Congressman Neugebauer remarked. "Iran and North Korea are watching us to see if we back down." He reminded the crowd that we have to keep the course, as freedom and democracy are not free. He noted that soldiers who are serving during this difficult time are proud of what they are accomplishing. He told a story about 130 women from Iraq who risked their lives traveling to a political meeting. Seeking a political position in Iraq could bring danger or death to you and your family. He feels that Iraq wants freedom because they continue to turn out for elections in the face of overwhelming opposition.

Energy was discussed, with the high gas prices everyone is experiencing. He stated that 60 percent of our oil comes from other countries and as we all know, our country has become dependent on foreign production. No new refineries for gasoline have been built in the U.S. for 30 years. What have we been thinking???? The fact that China and Vietnam are becoming energy dependent, places us in a bad position of "demand greater than supply". Neugebauer said the House passed an energy blueprint. He is encouraging opening up some government owned land west of the Mississippi for drilling. Alternative fuels are being developed and wind power. Texas is the number one producer in the nation of wind power. Neugebauer says that more gas refineries need to be built and nuclear power plants. He suggests utilizing the existing coal supplies.

When the floor was open to discussion Ray Self addressed the border security problem. He noted that forged documents for identification and social security numbers keep employers from knowing who is truly illegal. He suggested that a computer chip be implanted inside their bodies to keep track of illegals. It was noted that 60 percent originally come into the country legally, but never go back to their home country. Neugebauer noted that the number two import into Mexico is money being sent back to families from illegals. He also stated that 50 percent of the population in "our" prisons are illegals. Our tax dollars are paying for this!

Bill Bishop asked his opinion concerning building a fence around the Texas borders. He answered that he didn't think a "Wall of China" was the answer, as it would be too expensive.

Charles Payne, a fifth generation farmer/rancher from Cross Plains, stated his concern

about the agricultural situation. He asked what might be done about the fact that we are becoming dependent on other countries for our food, also. Payne wanted to know if there was any plan to turn things around.

Congressman Neugebauer stated that he wanted a good energy and good agriculture policy for the good of the nation.

He was concerned that America is not very competitive. He said we send the message, "Come so we can tax you." There are so many regulations that businesses are discouraged. Congressman Neugebauer stated that it was time for judges to start doing what they are suppose to do—not making laws.

He talked about his tele-town hall meetings where there have been as many as 800 people across District 19th on the line at one time. Individual telephone numbers are randomly picked to participate. Congressman Neugebauer has successfully been participating in this over the last three months. You may be chosen to participate at some point.

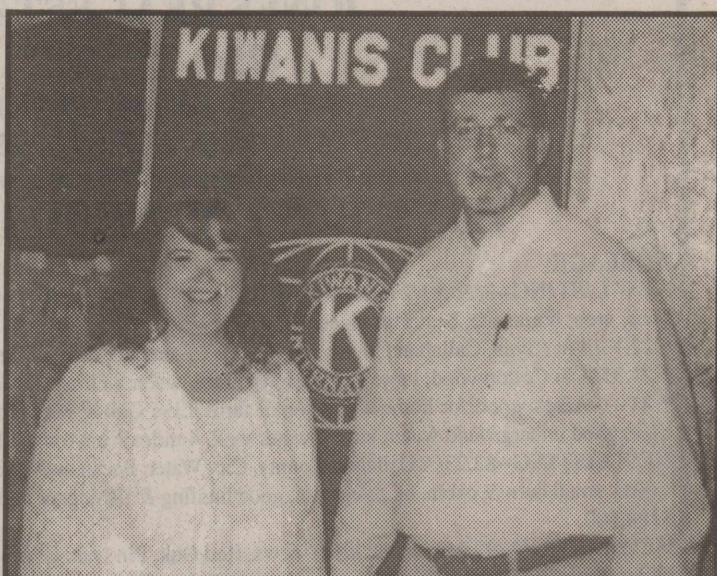

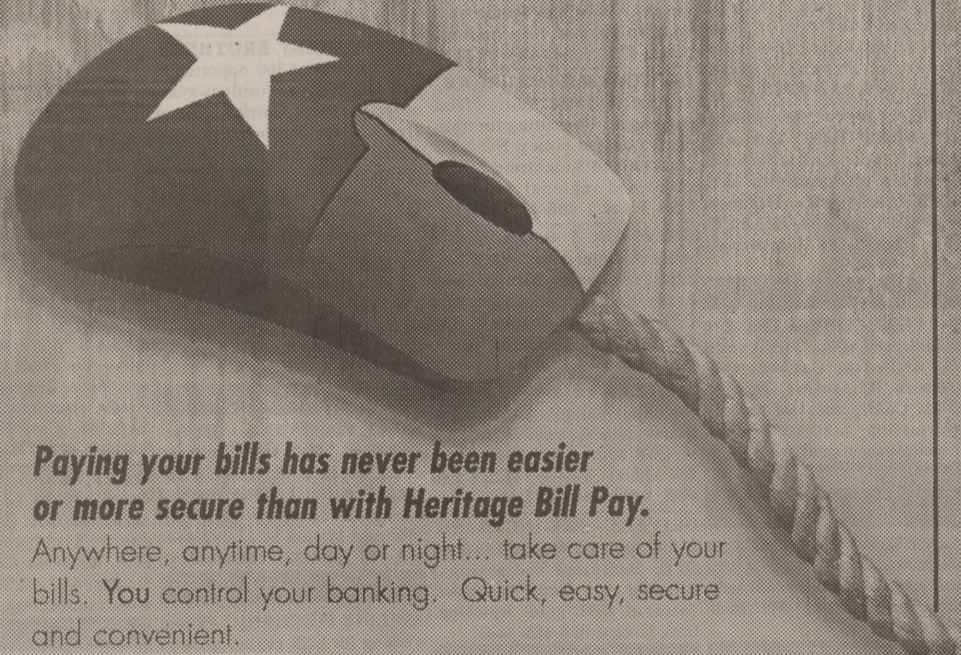
