ruling in 2006 and 2007, prayer will no longer be allowed to be put on the agenda as an item to begin the meetings. The decisive case highlighted the Tangipahoa School Parish in Louisiana. (Doe v. Tangipahoa Parish School Board. 473 F 3d 188 (5th Cir. 2006) reh'g granted en banc, 478 F.3d 679 (5th Cir. 2007).

Apparently, the trouble started when a disgruntled parent sued the board and several school officials on behalf of his two sons. It was claimed that the prayer at the meetings violated the Establishment Clause. The references to Jesus constituted more than "allowable ceremonial deism" and demonstrated a preference for Christianity above other religions. The Louisiana school appealed. After being sued, they rejected an attempt to make prayers less focused on Christianity and more 'inclusive'. Childress stated however that in future CPISD meetings, anyone from the public that attends the Board meeting may ask for prayer in Open Forum, and anyone who chooses may join them in that prayer.

Shale economic impact study. The report estimates that overall effects of Barnett Shale activity will yield over 100,000 jobs and \$10.4 billion in annual output through 2015.

Carrillo Commissioner reported that as of mid-April, there were 6.083 producing wells and 3,300 permitted locations for new wells into this unconventional natural gas reservoir. Approximately 177 operators are currently involved in the trend with Devon Energy as the largest producer. Since 2000, the Barnett Shale has produced over 2.3 trillion cubic feet (Tcf) of natural gas-representing approximately 6.2 Tcf of natural gas in 2006, making it the top gas producing state in the nation.

"The Texas Barnett Shale trend represents extraordinary opportunities for the region, the state, and the nation," states Commissioner Carrillo. USDA announces \$990 thousand for household water well system grants

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 29, 2007 - Agriculture Under Secretary for Rural Development Thomas C. Dorr today announced the availability of \$990,000 in funds to help qualified nonprofit organizations establish lending programs for rural household water wells.

"The Household Water Well System Grants complement our community water loan and grant program by funding individuals who receive their water from wells," said Dorr. "Many who live in rural America do not live in towns and communities where a centralized water system is feasible. This program helps to meet that basic human need: access to clean, safe drinking water."

The Household Water Well System Grant Program (HWWS) provides funds to non-profit private organizations for them to make individual loans to homeowners to construct or upgrade household water well systems. The applicant must contribute a matching amount equal to at least 10 percent of the grant request to capitalize the loan fund. Since the program was created in the 2002 Farm Bill, Rural Development has made 5 grants for \$2,286,100.

The deadline for applications to be submitted is May 31, 2007. Applications may be submitted electronically through http:// www.grants.gov. Paper applications may be submitted to the U.S.

A couple of parents asked if this was state law or local policy. It was stated that it was local policy to not allow those who didn't pass walk across the stage. Hyles stated, "It's policy. We either vote to change policy or not." Kim Crockett observed, "The one thing I see wrong here is we have failed our students for another year." It was brought out, "Some kids are smarter than others, some kids just have a terrible time taking tests even though they may know the answers." All the parents involved stated that they planned on going forward with this and having their kids re-tested. One parent said, "My child stayed after class and took hours from her job." Another stated, "My daughter stayed after school for a month. I know how much she studied." Another parent said that their child had even come to school so sick that she could hardly hold her head up, but know she had to be there for the test. It was asked, "Why tell them just 2 weeks before they graduate that they can't? Crockett inquired, "If the TAKS is the standard and if it's going to be eliminated soon, would that make any difference?" Ames asked, "If they have done their very best, is it fair to penalize them? 
*Some changes were made to the Local Parent Involvement Policy before it was approved. Kim Crockett suggested adding to the policy that parents can utilize the school's web site to check on their child's grades. 

Elementary and Junior High schools will still use them, but High Schools will use End-of-Course Assessment Tests. The Board approved increasing required credits to graduate from 25 to 26, while the policy on Dual Credit Classes was tabled.

*Emotions ran high as various parents and students showed up to speak in favor of allowing 3 Seniors to participate in Graduation Ceremonies, even though they did not pass the required TAKS test.

One parent sited a Grand Prairie School who lifted their policy. They allowed several students who failed to walk the stage in cap and gown, with the stipulation that the students would try to pass the TAKS after graduation. It was also brought out that Abilene had 38 seniors who failed the TAKS
