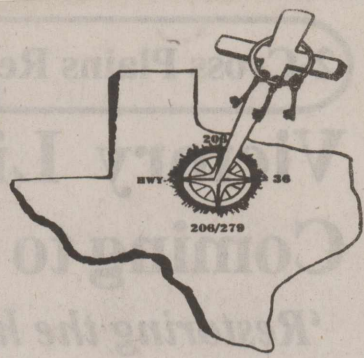

When I saw her in June she came directly to me, excited as usual and jumped in the chair with me. Immediately she began running her head and length of her Dachshund style body on my leg. This was her way of greeting everyone she loved. She was the most affectionate animal I have ever known.

Blandye brought Kozy to Kye when he was around 13 and had just underwent facial surgery in Dallas. She won all our hearts right away. My cousin, the late Guy Watson, gave Kozy her unique name. It suited her well, as she loved to cuddle up real cozy with you in a chair or on the bed. Whoever was sick, she felt it her obligation to lay with and comfort them.

Even as a puppy she was a fierce protector of her home, meeting any stranger with her barking and snapping. Some referred to her as "that mean little dog" but that wasn't really her nature.

Kozy had lived the last 10 years with Leah and Chris. When she first left I would talk to her on the telephone when I called. She would howl or bark when she heard my voice. Kreede, Leah and Chris' daughter, cried for two hours when they told her Kozy had gone to Heaven. She said, "I want my Kozy, my baby girl back."

A dog is truly a good friend, as they are always happy to see you and never judgemental. I'll close with a cute veterinary's sign that gave great advice:

Out With the New and In With the Old Back to Square One?

A Special Meeting was called on July 23rd to suggest names for a Committee to work with the Senior Citizens Center. Mayor Ray Purvis started the meeting off with a request to City Secretary, Debbie Gosnell. He said that in recent weeks there have been many "called" meetings, some of which he wasn't given very much notice on.

He explained that because it was he (as Mayor) that was required to preside over the meetings, he would very much appreciate it if she would let him know more in advance when another "special" meeting was going to be held. Gosnell apologized and said that she would do that in the future.

Moving on, Mayor Purvis said that for months now he had given much thought to the problem with the Senior Citizen's building. He acknowledged that all kinds of ideas and suggestions had been made about the situation.

He said, "To be honest with you, I really didn't know what would be the best way to handle this problem. I knew a new roof would be costly and I feared that the City wouldn't be able to afford to replace the roof without some type of assistance or increase in City utilities, or possibly a property tax."

Purvis then talked about the suggestions some people made about a new building. He said that even though that would be nice, it would be even more costly and leave the same problem of not having any funds. He went on to say, "After the last meeting, I felt I received some answers." He said that at that meeting every-

one had an opportunity to speak and ask questions that were important to them. He acknowledged Senior Citizens advocate Kathy Anderson was also present, speaking from the viewpoint of the Senior's themselves.

The Mayor said that Mrs. Anderson read letters from the Senior Citizens who go to the Center everyday. He then quoted from last week's *Cross Plains Review* article about the Senior's request to Anderson about wanting to stay in the building. He then went on to say, "They (the Seniors) attend all the activities held at the Center and from talking to the Seniors, they apparently trust her opinion."

She read statements from each of the members, asking why the City Council was making them move from the Center. They stated that they did not want a new Center, and they wanted their roof fixed and to be left in the current building."

Mayor Purvis then read Meals On Wheels Volunteer, Kim Crockett's 'Letter To The Editor' and replied, "After reading the 'Letter To The Editor' in last week's paper, I feel that they aren't the only ones that think the Seniors should be left in the current building."

Purvis declared, "As Mayor. I am recommending to the Council tonight that we forget the idea of a new building and continue to look for ways to upgrade the building the Seniors are currently in."

He added that City Employees have worked very hard over the past week to fix the most damaged areas of the roof that are causing the most problems. He

stated that he had pictures of what had been done and it appears they have done a great job in correcting the problem. He interjected, "Of course we won't know how good of a job they've done until it rains again. But until then, we hope the people who are working hard trying to raise funds to help with the repairs can continue looking for these funds."

Purvis explained that Julene Franke has written some grants and encouraged others to also look into what they might do to help with grants. "Now I'm certainly not suggesting that we put all the work on Julene, however if in her experience in writing grants, she wants to continue helping the Senior Citizen's Center apply for grants, then I think we should certainly let her look for grants to update the building."

"With the information Kathy Anderson provided us all at the last meeting," Purvis stated, "it is my recommendation that we (the City Council) do not go forward with plans to build a new building, but instead update and upgrade the current building."

Mayor Purvis summed up the meeting with, "Therefore, I see no reason in appointing a committee tonight, and I will entertain a motion that we discontinue the idea of building a new Senior Citizens Center and to move forward, allowing Julene and the Senior Citizens committee to look for grants for the Center and the possibility of getting their 501c3 status." The Council voted unanimously for this decision.

The next regular City Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday, August 13th at 6:30 p.m.



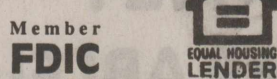

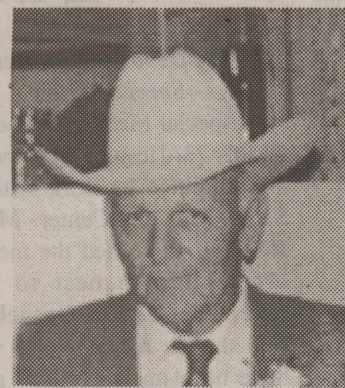

He did not even notice that I had had my hair fixed when I went to see him. We were more concerned with IV bottles and what the doctor had said.

Bill has lots of friends. The phone rings every few minutes with people wanting to know how he is. I tell them that he is getting better but not very fast. They aren't even talking going home.

I have often said I was going to nominate Bill for Citizen of the Year because he is so typical of what a good citizen should be. He does "Meals on Wheels", is active in Kiwanis, and in his Church. He is a good citizen, a good friend and a good neighbor.

I will wait and try to keep my half going. At least expect him to be coming home and things will be in balance again!

United Spinal Association urges ATV Safety, especially for Children

Jackson Heights, NY—As warmer weekends and summer vacations draw near, the number of Americans participating in outdoor recreational activities and sports increases. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the number of four-wheel all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) in use between 2002 and 2003 increased by 700,000 units (13%). Along with increased use, the size and power of ATVs has also increased resulting in more serious injuries. The number of injuries requiring emergency room treatment is reported to have risen 10% from 113,900 in 2002 to 125,500 in 2003.

As part of its nationwide *Motorsafe* campaign to promote safe motoring and raise public awareness about spinal cord injury, United Spinal Association reminds the public, especially parents, that in 2003, ATVs killed at least 111 children younger than 16 years of age accounting for 27% of all fatalities. Children under 16 suffered 38,600 serious injuries in 2003 which was 31% of all injuries. This age group received more serious injuries than any other group. Between 1985 and 2003, children under 16 accounted for 37% of all injuries.

United Spinal's *Motorsafe* program stresses the following precautions:

- Always wear protective gear, such as a helmet and goggles.
- Never ride on public roadways, only on designated trails.
- Never ride if you're intoxicated, tired, or on medication.
- Never carry a passenger on a single-rider vehicle.
- Ride an ATV that has the right specifications for your age.
- Riders younger than 16 should always be supervised.
- Ride at safe speeds.
- Take an ATV educational course.

United Spinal Association's *Motorsafe* program is a nationwide public awareness campaign promoting safe motoring. The program targets all people who operate automobiles, motorcycles, all-

terrain vehicles, motorboats, personal watercraft, and snowmobiles. United Spinal's goal is to share information and knowledge of specific hazards involved in operating these types of equipment and to highlight good practices that will prevent serious injury or even death. **DSHS Issues Food Recall
Reminder for Consumers**

The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is urging Texas consumers to heed instructions issued in a nationwide recall of certain hot dog sauces and other products manufactured by Castleberry Food Products, Augusta, Ga.

Consumers should not eat any of the recalled products and should discard any they have on hand.

The recall, announced earlier this week by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the company, was done because of possible contamination with the organism that causes botulism, a serious paralytic illness.

The following products, if they have "best by" dates from April 30, 2009, through May 22, 2009, are being recalled:

Drive Chili With Beans, 15-ounce can (UPC 3030001515); Southern Home Corned Beef Hash, 15-ounce can (UPC 0788015360); Meijer Corned Beef Hash, 15-ounce can (UPC 4125095229); Castleberry's Chili With Beans, 15-ounce can (UPC 3030001015); Castleberry's Barbecue Pork, 10-ounce can (UPC 3030000402); Bunker Hill Chili No Beans, 10-ounce can (UPC 7526604112).

Four people, including two from Texas, became ill after consuming Castleberry's or

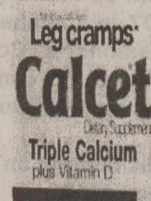
Castleberry's Austex hot dog chili sauce. The other recalled products were produced in the same plant.

Anyone with symptoms of botulism should seek immediate medical attention.

Symptoms may include double vision, blurred vision, drooping eyelids, slurred speech, difficulty swallowing, and muscle weakness that moves progressively down the body. Botulism can cause paralysis of the breathing muscles, which can be deadly without prompt medical attention.

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Gravesite Memorial is Planned in Memory of Former Roscoe Policeman

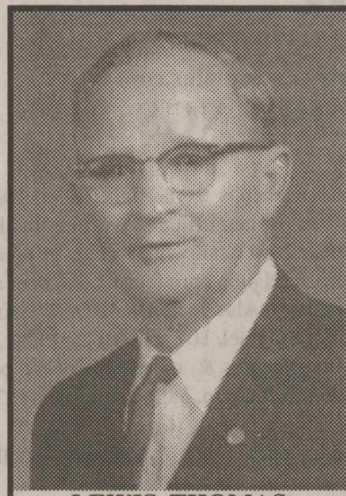
On August 4, 1966, officer Lewis Thomas Snyder gave the ultimate sacrifice protecting the Roscoe community. Officer Snyder was killed in the line of duty that day.
