

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

This was a regular quarterly meeting of the Cross Plains **EDC** (Economic Development Corporation). Members present were: Era Lee Hanke, Mark Norris, Dannes Turner, President Joe McWilliams and Jerry Cassle. Debbie Gosnell, Director, was also present. W.G. McCoy and Bryan Bennett were absent.

Members of the public meeting with the board were Jana McCoy, Robb Lindner, Peg Terrell, Therennie McCrohan, Cindy Payne and Danny Johnson.

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

Joe McWilliams moved to approve the minutes of the previous meetings as presented. Era Lee Hanke seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to accept the financials as presented. Joe McWilliams seconded and motion carried.

Danny Johnson met with the board to discuss his wrecker business. Danny informed the board that he has purchased the property located across the street from the City Hall where Buck Brown's Shop used to be. He advised the board that he intended to provide full auto repair, tire repair, small engine and lawn mower repair as well as a State Inspection facility. He acknowledged that he would continue to provide full road-side wrecker service and towing.

Johnson told the board that he would be providing employment for himself, his wife and his nephew. He requested a Grant in the amount of \$10,000.00 of which he would install a concrete slab in the building and if there were other funds remaining, he would put in windows and make repairs to the building. Johnson thanked the board for their consideration and excused himself.

After lengthy discussion and consideration the board instructed Gosnell to contact Johnson and advise him that the board would like for him to get bids on the concrete and present to Gosnell when available. They also asked Gosnell to inform him that the board does not feel that they can contribute the full \$10,000.00 but that they are interested in helping him. All agreed to look at the building after the meeting is dismissed.

Jana McCoy and Robb Lindner, representatives for a Rural Health Clinic met with the board to update them on the situation with the grant application for the Clinic proposed for Cross Plains. According to Lindner results of the grant applications should be received in late September. 
