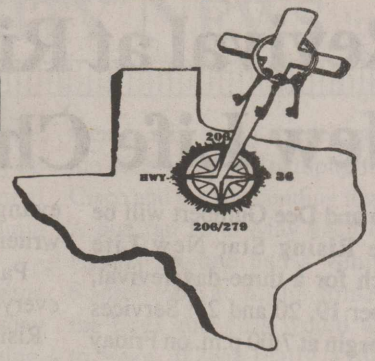

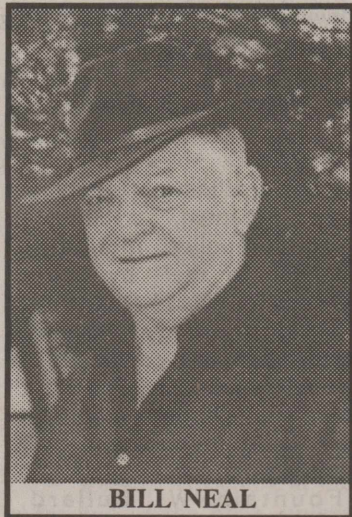

## Bill Neal at Meet The Author, Tuesday, October 23rd

On Tuesday, October 23, 7:00 p.m., the Cross Plains Public Library invites you to the Community Center to hear about *Getting Away with Murder on the Texas Frontier*, when Bill Neal talks about the book and how he came to write it. Anyone who's a fan of the "westerns" of television and the movies has probably wondered, "Was the West really that Wild, or did Hollywood exaggerate it?" The answer, of course, is "Yes" and "Yes." While the Western frontier has been glamorized, life was pretty raw and wild. Bill Neal tells several well-researched stories about murderers who went free — and some who ended up as the "guest of honor" at a lynching party. There are plenty of "good guys" and lots of "bad guys" in the book (on both sides of the law) and some not so good women, including a mail order bride who strayed from the straight and narrow.

Sam Houston's son Temple, a prominent criminal defense attorney of the time, is involved in several of the stories. In one case, Houston was faced with a jury that was heavily prejudiced against his client. During the trial, he drew his pistol and emptied it into the jury box! He was firing blanks, fortunately, and innocently claimed he only did it to dramatize the plea of self defense. The judge grudgingly

accepted his explanation. When his client was found guilty, Houston moved for a mistrial because the jury was to have been sequestered and not allowed to leave each other's company. During Houston's shooting, the jury members had scattered among the spectators in full view of the entire court. It worked — Houston got a new trial for his client, got a jury more sympathetic to his client, and the jury ruled in Houston's favor.

Sometimes juries may have relied more on common sense than the letter of the law. Lizzie Isaacs's husband George was sentenced to life in prison for his part in the Wells Fargo murderer of 1894. Lizzie lost no time in obtaining a divorce, and not long afterward, she was tried for

## City Says Dumping Without Permission Is Stealing

Dumpster Rules Enforced, Condemned House Gets 2nd Chance and Fire Chief Proposes Trade-in at the Oct. 9th City Council Meeting.

As a result of the on-going problem with citizens using private commercial dumpsters for their personal trash, some things are changing. New signs will be posted throughout the city around those dumpsters stating: **Dumping Without Permission is Stealing: Violators Will Be Prosecuted.** (Penal Code, Section 31.04), **Theft of Services.**

It was noted that some businesses have installed hidden cameras to record those who are illegally dumping their personal trash.

As a follow up to the July 10th meeting, discussion was held once again concerning what to do about local contractor debris. City Administrator, **Debbie Gosnell** presented the facts and figures regarding what it will take for the City to purchase a "Roll-Off" container for that purpose.

BFI has quoted a price of \$3,709 for a 30 yard and \$4,450 for a 40 yard container. The cost to deliver the containers to Cross Plains will be \$746 per container. The Roll-Off will be locked in the City's yard site.

Some of the questions asked were: *What would the cost be to move a container temporarily to a work site? Could that be done, and how? What would the dumping fee be? And who would pay for the final emptying of the Roll-Off?* Gosnell will call BFI with those questions and let the Council know their reply.

\***Kala Stout** asked for an extension on her house located in the 700 block of North Avenue A, that was officially condemned in June of this year. In an attempt to keep it from being demolished, she told the Council she has replaced all of the broken windows and has ordered exterior doors. She has also nailed down the loose tin on the roof to keep it secure until a new roof can be put on.

## Register Now for "Learn About..." Program and Lapsit

Registration is now underway for the "Learn About..." Program and the Lapsit Program at the Cross Plains Public Library.

The "Learn About..." Program is a pre-school program for children ages 3-5. Your child **MUST** be age 3 by September 1, 2007, and not currently enrolled in a pre-school class at the local school. The children will have the opportunity to do finger plays, sing, hear stories, have refreshments, check out books, and "learn about" a variety of activities.

The Lapsit Program is for children ages birth to 3 years (not yet eligible for the LAP Program). Each child enrolled **MUST** be accompanied by an adult. The

children listen to stories and do finger plays and other activities.

Both programs will meet on Wednesday mornings from 10:00 to 10:45, **beginning November 7th** and continuing until the end of April, 2008.

## Cross Plains EMS Needs You!!!

Do you want the Cross Plains Medical Service to continue in our community? This question may seem to be a "no-brainer" but these facts will help you answer the question intelligently:

1. State regulations require two certified attendants (ECA or higher) on the ambulance in order to transport a patient—and in addition to that, a qualified driver.
2. Shifts for volunteers are from 6 a.m. - 6 p.m. and 6 p.m. - 6 a.m. day/night. That calls for a total of 6 volunteers per day, or **180 shifts** to be filled each month.
3. With 14 certified attendants, that means that each one

would have to volunteer for 8-9 shifts each month on the average.

4. With 7 qualified drivers, that means that each volunteer would have to volunteer for 8-9 shifts each month on the average.
5. Some don't/can't volunteer as others, so some volunteers are taking many more shifts than the 8-9 per month! At least one has taken 15 shifts for October, two more have taken 11, several other 10. (There is such as thing as "BURNOUT!")
6. Most of the volunteers have regular jobs. Some can take off work to make a run, hence

## Early voting for Constitutional Amendment Election begins Monday in Callahan County

Early voting for the Tuesday, November 6th Constitutional Amendment Election in Callahan County will begin Monday, October 22nd at three voting locations in Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains.

Callahan County Clerk Donna Bell said early voting hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. at the Callahan County Courthouse (100 W. 4th Street) in Baird, the Clyde Justice of the Peace Office (208 Oak Street) and the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace Office (424 South Main). Early voting will continue through Friday, November 2nd. Ballot language for the Tuesday, November 6, 2007 Constitutional Amendment Election in Texas includes:

**Proposition 1 - HJR 103**  
"The constitutional amendment providing for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university."

"Enmienda constitucional que dispone la continuación de la asignación de fondos para instalaciones y otros bienes de capital en la Universidad Estatal de Angelo al efectuarse un cambio de administración de dicha universidad."

**Proposition 2 - SJR 57**  
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and au-

thorizing bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose."

"Enmienda constitucional que dispone la emisión de quinientos millones de dólares en bonos de obligación general destinados a financiar préstamos educativos a estudiantes y que autorizan acuerdos de mejoramiento referentes a bonos de obligación general emitidos para dichos fines."

**Proposition 3 - HJR 40**  
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the

residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the residence homestead for the preceding tax year."

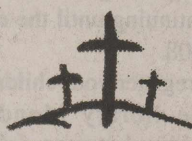

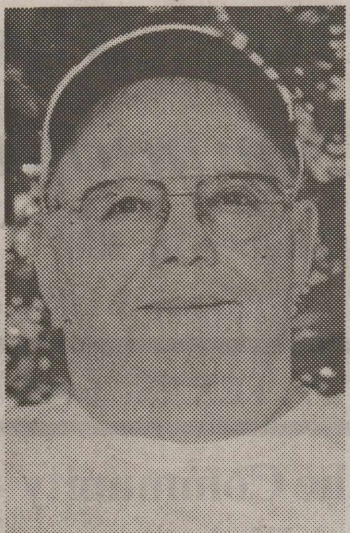

until November 30, 2007 to have all of the repairs done so it is weather tight and dried-in, or as Councilman Jerry Casse put it, "It's coming down!"

Ms. Stout's repairman, Ray Dodd spoke up and said it would be at least a week or so before he could start on his part of the job because of prior commitments. He then wanted to know how the City of Cross Plains can condemn any house since there is no City Inspector.

Those on the Council stated that there is a Texas State Building Code and the City has to honor that Code. Gosnell stated that she has tried to work with Ms. Stout on this for 3 years with no result.

The question was posed as to what would happen if Stout gets almost finished and has sunk a lot of money into the project, but still isn't complete by the November 30th deadline. Will they still demolish it? Gosnell said that if they see she is making solid progress, they'd work with her. Stout agreed to sign an agreement to have the repairs made within the time frame allowed.

\*Fire Chief Ricky Carouth explained the Fire Department's need to replace their 2004 truck due to its higher than average profile, making it top heavy and dangerous to drive. He gave a few examples of how unstable it was. He proposed trading it in on a vehicle that would better serve the needs of Cross Plains as well as its rural neighbors.

Carouth and his men have looked into the best way to trade up and come out ahead. He explained that the current truck is tied to the Forest Service through a grant. If the Forest Service gives

the go-ahead, he will be able to use it as a trade-in to absorb part of the cost of the new truck.

The vehicle he is looking at has the capability to allow men to stand on the truck and actually see the fire they are fighting. With the old truck, a man has to stand beside the truck and may not know what is happening at the other end of the hose, unless someone is also communicating to them on the radio.

The proposed truck also has an extra hose stored inside the front bumper that will be charged up and ready to go. This extra feature would be very helpful at vehicle fires. It was stated that new trucks are priced at around \$221,000. With the trade in, this truck is estimated to cost \$171,150. That would leave a remainder of approximately \$72,000 to come up with.

Another issue is the old City Pumper Truck. The State of Texas requires that the main Pumper Truck be less than 25 years old. In 4 years this old truck will no longer qualify to be the main Pumper Truck. A new Pumper is needed and the new truck Chief Carouth is looking at can do the job of replacing that truck as well. It will have the capacity to pump at least 1,000 gallons per minute instead of 750.

Carouth reported they are continuing to check into various grants and ways to generate funds for the Fire Department. "We've tried to get outside money, grant money, somebody else's money... anything else than to ask the City," added Carouth.

Discussion was tabled until another time and the Council advised Carouth to continue to

work on grants and confirm that the Forest Service will allow the trade-in.

\*In lieu of a Chamber of Commerce member being present, Debbie Gosnell presented the Chamber's Annual Budget for the Motel Tax. The Barbarian Committee, Project Pride, The Roping Club and the Chamber all receive a portion of the Motel tax for items that relate to tourism.

It was noted that Project Pride and the Barbarian Committee both received 16% or \$800 each, with the Roping Club receiving 8% or \$400 per year.

One of the main items to be paid this year out of the Chamber's budget will be helping with replacing all of the Christmas lights that outline the downtown buildings. The lights were severely damaged in the hailstorm that hit this summer and the wiring was going bad due to a few years out in the heat.

\*Debbie asked the Council to allow her to look into getting a price on a new copier. The City now leases a copier for \$55 a month, which also covers the cost of all service calls and replacement toner. The have used this one for 5 years.

Gosnell feels that with the new technology that's available, a new version may serve the City better. If a new printer is bought outright without a contract, tech help and toner will be extra. Gosnell will look into the possibilities and get back to the Council.

## Texas Comptroller publishes list of Cross Plains unclaimed property owners

On Sunday, October 21st, the Texas Comptroller's Office will again publish the annual list of individuals with abandoned property in more than 30 Texas newspapers across the state. This notice is required by Texas Property Code Section 74.201.

This year's list contains the names of more than 152,000 individuals for whom the state is holding \$250 or more in forgotten funds.

If you think you might have unclaimed property you may call the Texas Comptroller's Office at (800) 654-3463 or direct in Austin at (512) 463-3120 to inquire about their unclaimed property. The phone lines are very busy during the first few weeks following the release of the list. You may prefer to use the online database at [www.window.state.tx.us/up](http://www.window.state.tx.us/up) to search for your name and begin the claims process electronically. There is no deadline to file a claim; the money will be here until it is claimed.

The Texas Comptroller's Office is committed to reuniting Texans with hundreds of millions of dollars in unclaimed property.

### General Information

**What is unclaimed property?** Unclaimed Property can be any financial asset that appears to have been abandoned by the owner for more than one year. Some examples of property that can become abandoned are:

- \* Dividend, payroll or cashier's checks
- \* Stocks, mutual fund ac-

counts, bonds

- \* Utility deposits and other refunds
- \* Bank accounts and safe deposit box contents
- \* Insurance proceeds
- \* Mineral interest or royalty payments
- \* Court deposits, trust funds, escrow accounts

**Why does it come to the State?**

The unclaimed property law requires financial institutions, businesses, and government entities to report to the state, personal property they are holding that is considered abandoned or unclaimed.

The Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts is responsible for administering the Texas Unclaimed Property Program. Property is turned over to the Comptroller's office annually when the owner's whereabouts are unknown and the property has been inactive on the books of the reporting company after the appropriate abandonment period has run.

### Unclaimed Property Statutes

Chapters 72 through 75 of the Texas Property Code govern the State of Texas Unclaimed Property Program. To view the statutes applying to the abandonment of property, property held by financial institutions, report delivery and claim process, or Texas minerals, go to the Texas Property Code and scroll down to Title 6, Unclaimed Property, then click on the appropriate chapter.

Chapter 76 of the Texas Property Code governs the Texas

county, municipality, and independent school district (ISD) programs. To view the statute applying to the report, delivery, and claims process for properties held at the county, municipality, and ISD level, go to the Texas Property Code and scroll down to Title 6, Unclaimed Property, then, click on the link to Chapter 76.

**Is there a time limit for claiming my property?**

No, the Comptroller's office acts only as custodian for the missing owners, holding the property in trust until it is claimed. Texas never takes legal ownership of the property, so there is no time limit for filing a claim.

**What efforts are made to find owners?**

\* A newspaper insert is published annually listing the owner names reported each year.

\* An annual exhibit at the Texas State Fair provides searches of the Comptroller's database of owners.

\* Notices may be mailed to owners reported with complete last known addresses

\* In addition, this web site provides a database search feature for you to locate property that may be yours.

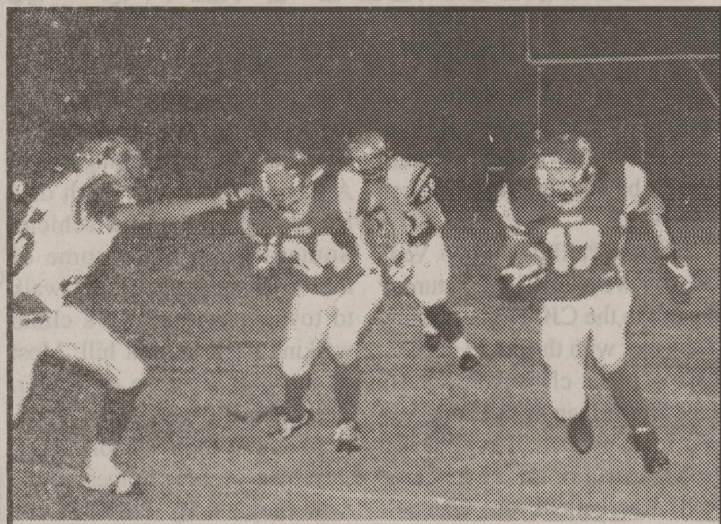

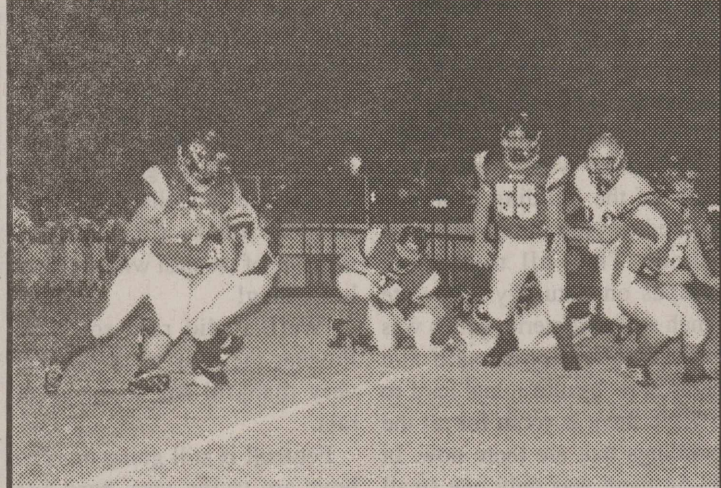

### Texas Permanent School Fund Shows Strong Return

The Texas Permanent School Fund, the nation's largest endowment supporting public elementary and secondary schools, was valued at \$25.1 billion at the close of the 2006-2007 fiscal year, the Texas Education Agency announced.

The value reflects at 14.3 percent return from Sept. 1, 2006, through Aug. 31, 2007. Because of the Fund's performance, \$1.4 billion will be available to help support Texas schools during the 2008-2009 biennium.

While serving as the largest endowment in the nation for public schools, the Fund is the second largest overall education endowment. The largest belongs to Harvard University.

"Today's Texas schoolchildren are very fortunate to be able to benefit from this thriving endowment," said Dr. Don McLeroy, chairman of the State Board of Education. "The Board takes its fiduciary role very seriously and prudently seeks to maximize the Fund's return to also benefit the future Texas schoolchildren as well."

"The Fund had a very good year in 2007, and

outperformed the benchmark. This outperformance represents about \$65 million in value added for the Fund relative to the benchmark," said Holland Timmins, Chief Investment Officer.

The Fund, which hit the \$25 billion mark for the first time in February, was established in 1854 with a \$2 million appropriation from the Texas Legislature. The total return from the Fund is used to provide textbooks free of charge to the state's 4.6 million schoolchildren.

The Fund also is used to guarantee school bonds. The backing enables local school districts to gain AAA ratings for their bonds, saving them millions of dollars in interest and insurance costs. During the past 24 years, the Bond Guarantee Program has guaranteed more than 3,731 school district bond issues valued at \$75.6 billion.

"The permanent School Fund is making enormous contributions to the education of our children, said Robert Scott, acting commissioner of education. "Texans have every reason to be proud of its strong value and its growth potential in the future."

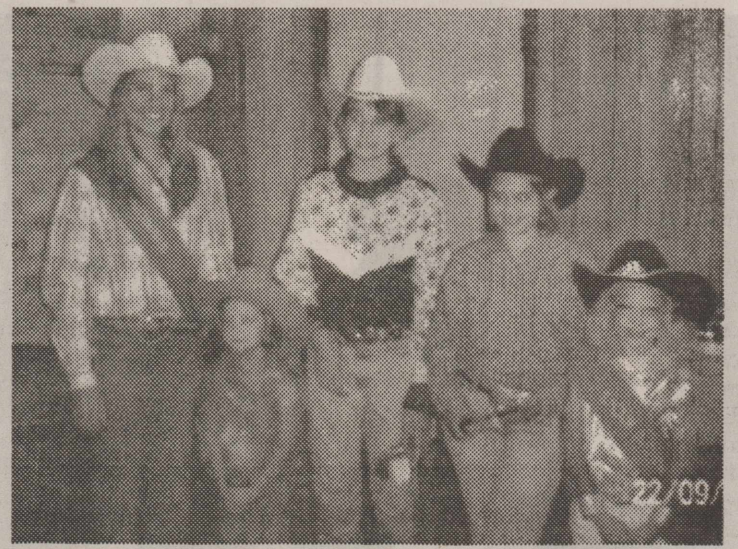

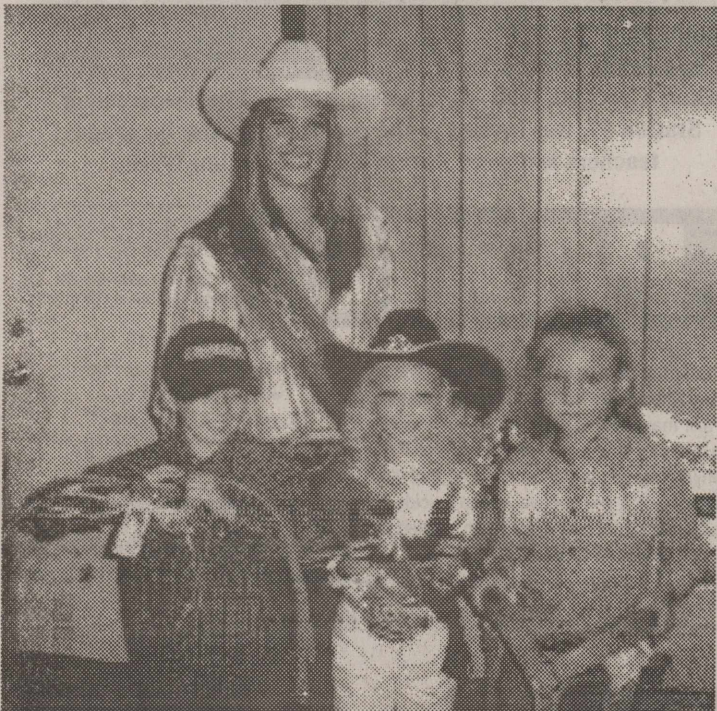

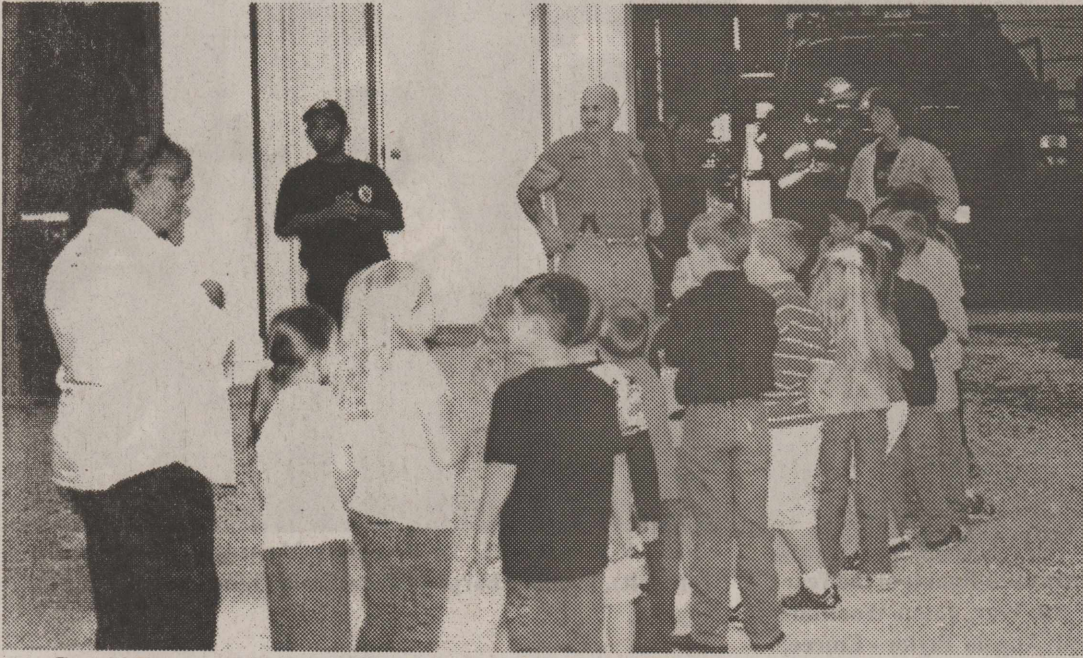

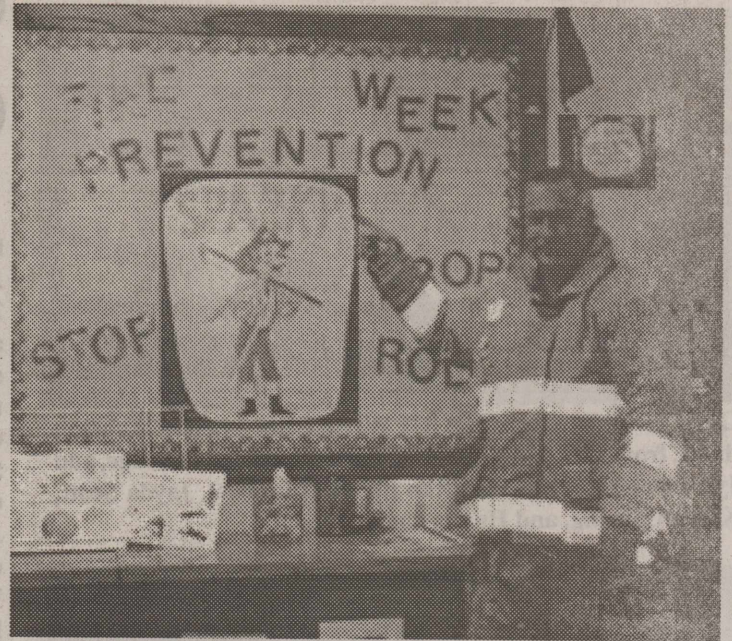

The jury took only 8 minutes to find Lizzie's sons "not guilty."

## Commissioners vote not to allow repeater system

Callahan County Commissioners voted 3-2 not to allow an amateur radio repeater system to be installed on the Callahan County Radio Tower near Admire.  
The commissioners' court took the action Tuesday, October 9th during a commissioners' court meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.  
At the Tuesday morning meeting, Howard Collier met with the commissioners' court to present a proposal for a repeater system to be installed on the County Radio Tower to be used by amateur radio operators. After the presentation by Collier, Commissioner Cliff Kirkham made a motion to provide space on the tower for the repeater system. County Judge Roger Corn seconded the motion. The motion failed 3-2 with Commissioners Harold Hicks, Bryan Farmer and Tom Windham voting against the motion and Judge Corn and Commissioner Kirkham voting for the motion.  
Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:  
—Judge Roger Corn called the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Present at the meeting included: Commissioner Precinct #1 Harold Hicks, Commissioner Precinct #2 Bryan Farmer, Commissioner Precinct #3 Tom Windham, Commissioner Precinct #4 Cliff Kirkham, County Treasurer Dianne Gunter and County Clerk Donna Bell.  
Also present at the meeting were County Attorney Shane Deel, Howard Collier and Allen Boehm.  
—Jan Windham, Callahan County Emergency Management Coordinator, explained the revisions to the Hazard Mitigation Action Plan. Commissioner Hicks made a motion to accept the Callahan County resolution to adopt the revisions to the Hazard Mitigation Action Plan. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and it passed with a 5-0 vote.  
—The minutes of the previous commissioners' court meeting were reviewed and signed.  
—There was no public comment received.  
—Sam Goldsmith of Goldsmith Solutions, presented Information Technology Policies & Procedures to the commissioners' court. After much discussion, Commissioner Kirkham made a motion to accept the Information Technology Policies & Procedures. Commissioner Farmer seconded the motion and it passed with a 5-0 vote.  
—Commissioner Windham made a motion to accept the Site License Agreement with Conterra Ultra Broadband, LLC. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Farmer and it carried with a 5-0 vote. Conterra Ultra Broadband will install two dishes on the Callahan County Radio Tower and would rent tower space to Conterra Ultra Broadband for \$700.00 per month.  
—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to accept the Texas Association of Counties Risk Management Pool Interlocal Participation Agreement. Commissioner Windham would second the motion and the motion was approved with a 5-0 vote.

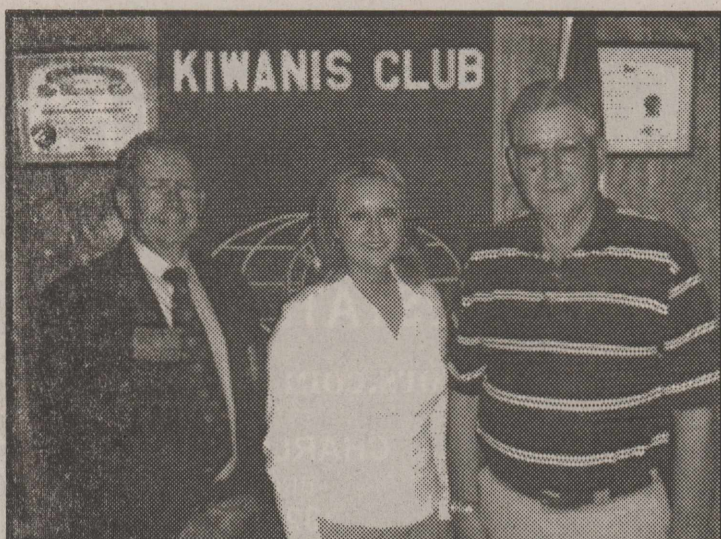

they work days; some can't take off work to make a run, hence they work nights. Some are on shift work and/or their job is flexible so they volunteer for days or nights accordingly.

- Anytime that enough volunteers are not able to take a shift, the ambulance must be placed "out of service." That means that an ambulance would have to come from Clyde (45 minutes away).
- The Cross Plains ambulance has had to be placed "out of service" during some days recently due to not enough attendants available for service.
- If the ambulance is "out of service" too often, the CP EMS is subject to losing necessary certification—hence no Cross Plains ambulance at all!
- There is little "out-of-pocket" cost for those who volunteer to take Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) class to become a worker on the Cross Plains Ambulance Service (EMS).

Several have taken the course the past few years, then dropped out—hence do not volunteer to help. (They promise to give 2 years of service but did not honor their commitment.)

Now, with these facts, do YOU want the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service to continue in our area? If you do, are you willing to take the ECA course? Are you willing to find someone who will if you cannot? The EMS is not "hurting" financially—even though we certainly need continued monetary support—but the EMS is **HURTING** for volunteers (attendants, especially).

An ECA class is being scheduled to begin soon. There must be at least 10 students. If you are interested in taking the course, please call Susan Schaefer (725-6747), John Swift (725-6116) or Jimmy Long (725-6432) — ASAP!

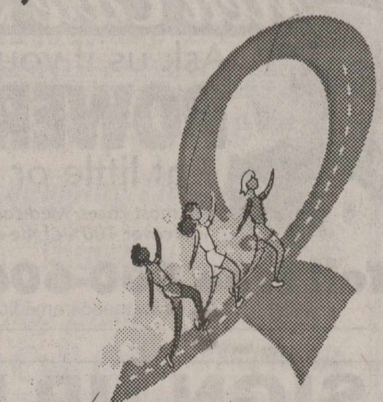
