

Protecting Our National Sovereignty

Our state, and our country, are struggling to keep up with the effects of globalization—the increasingly free flow of ideas, information, goods and capital across borders and around the

One major challenge is making certain that our national sovereignty is protected, even as international commerce increases. This is no small matter. Our sovereignty is the foundation for our freedom.

Sovereignty should rest strictly with the American people. We cannot allow a foreign country or an international organization to make decisions that should be our own exclusive province, Asia based on our own national inter-




