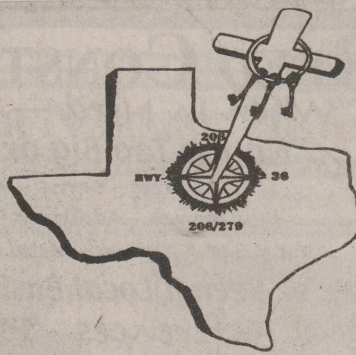

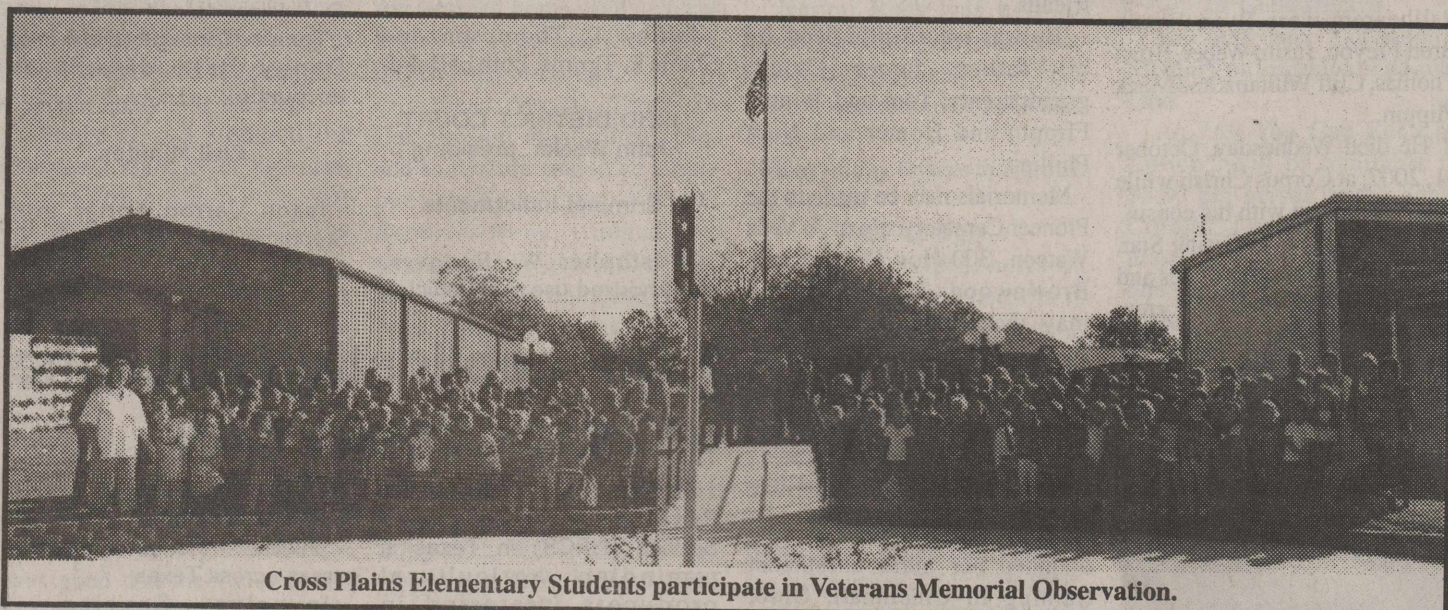

## First Veterans Day Celebration at New Memorial Park Emotional A Reflection of Events Leading to Construction

On the first Veterans Day following the construction of the Cross Plains and Area Veterans Memorial, tears came to the eyes of many as the Cross Plains Elementary Students stood on the ground of the memorial. This event was truly part of what this

Memorial is all about, honoring our Veterans past and present, and teaching future generations the sacrifices of our military.

To reflect on how this Memorial became a reality involves Cross Plains Citizens and donations from Exes from all over the United States who subscribed to the *Cross Plains Review*, the only publication utilized. The printing of the final list of Veteran names for corrections by the *Review* was instrumental.

In June of 2005 my father, Audrey Purvis, approached me after viewing the Rising Star Veteran's Memorial. Seeing how impressed he was with this memorial and expressing that Cross Plains should have something of their own to honor our past and present military, I began to do some research. Being in the nursing field for many years and caring for many veterans, I knew how important a monument would be to all veterans and their families.

After a conversation with Mr. White, who assisted with the Rising Star Memorial, I felt it might be a project that possibly took years, but one that was long overdue for all communities. He assured me that the donations would begin coming in and gave Rising Star's full support. He stated, "The more Veteran Memorials the Better."

After consulting with Linda Butler at Cross Plains Monument concerning the granite and Turner Landscaping with design ideas, I took the information to an American Legion meeting to ask for their support.

Five members were present,

Audrey Purvis, Donald Beeler, W.D. Clark, Logan Long and the late Elvis Scott. As I nervously told them about my idea, they began to pull checkbooks and wallets out and pitching money into the center of the table. From that moment on, I knew we had to fulfill a vision not only of my Dad and I, but of so many whose lives were affected by military service. The next day a bank account was opened and the first article for the *Cross Plains Review* was prepared.

The donations and names began to arrive daily from all over the United States. My parent's dining table became the command post for Veterans from the Civil War to the Iraq War. Names arrived with nicknames, initials, and given names. Some arrived with letters, notes, postcards, some on napkins, and many by phone. I think the names and paperwork were only removed for Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner.

The Cross Plains and surrounding cemeteries were walked, checking for any military service stones.

Tremendous support was given by the City Administrator, Mayor and the Members of the EDC throughout the project. The project and donations continued during the devastating fire and rebuilding of the community.

After one year of consulting with corporate lawyers concerning the property donation, the land was donated by the Wilbur Williams Estate and Windstream Communications.

Many Veterans and their families were instrumental in collecting the 1700 names.

Special thanks to Jimmielee Payne, Donnel Clark and the late Glenn Payne for assisting with the names WWII, and to Bob Dean with the names of Korea Veterans.

One thing is evident, your friends and family never forget you. The names of so many who lost their lives fighting for their country were sent in time after time, many telling the story of each one. We actually felt as if we knew Ray Smith, who went down on the Arizona, by the time the names were etched. This monument was long overdue for him and so many others.

As the landscaping began on the property and meetings with TxDot occurred, so many had donated labor and materials for the project. Concrete was poured 10 inches thick for the seven (7) 2,000 pound granite stones, along with a sidewalk and circle drive, just in time for Homecoming.

A ceremony was held with Mary Scott Nabers being the guest of honor to dedicate the first stone. The granite stones containing the names of the 1700 Veterans were delivered on May 24, 2007 and a formal Dedication of the Cross Plains and Area Veterans Memorial Park was held on May 26, 2007.

As this marks the first Veterans Day for the Memorial, please keep all military personnel in your thoughts and prayers. Thanks to the American Legion Post and the Cross Plains I.S.D. for honoring our local veterans on this special day.

Requirements for your appointment include:

- \* All adults need some kind of identification, drivers license or ID.
- \* All social security cards for the household are required.
- \* Shot records are required for children.

\* **Proof of income:** If you are insured, they take most insurances, including Medicare, Medicaid, Chips. For the uninsured they have a sliding scale program, so they will need the last two check stubs or last year's tax return.

\* **Proof of address:** This could be your valid driver's license if it is current with your address or a utility bill of some kind.

**EQIP application deadline in Texas draws near**

Temple, Texas - The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas is reminding agricultural producers interested in participating in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) that the deadline to apply for 2008 funding is Nov. 16, 2007.

"We want to be sure producers are aware of the Nov. 16 ranking deadline," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "EQIP funds have been made available to us to fund contracts this fall, and we will be working diligently to do that."

"However, producers should know that if they miss this deadline, sign-up is a continuous process and there will most likely be subsequent ranking periods before Dec. 31st unless a new Farm Bill is passed," Gohmert said.

Funds have been provided to each county to meet the primary natural resource concerns identified at the local level. NRCS has also set aside funds for statewide resource concerns, which include:

- Water Quantity - Brush management in five areas, primarily in central Texas
- Water Quantity - Irrigation efficiency practices in central, south, and west Texas
- Water Quality and Air Quality - Waste management and air quality practices for beef, dairy, poultry, and swine animal feeding operations
- Wildlife - Habitat emphasis areas across Texas
- Invasive Species Management of Chinese Tallow and Salt Cedar
- Water Quality - Conservation practices in an 18-county area in south central Texas
- Reforestation
- Reestablishment of forest in an 18-county area in east Texas (over)

EQIP promotes agricultural environmental quality and production. Through EQIP, farmers and ranchers receive financial and technical assistance to help install conservation practices and to implement management systems that promote conservation. Financial assistance is generally at about a 50:50 ratio; technical assistance is provided at 100 percent NRCS cost.

Many of you attended the ceremony staged by the American Legion Post in Cross Plains last Friday at the War Memorial. The Cross Plains Elementary students gathered at the Memorial when the American Legion Officials raised the flag donated by Cottonwood native, Sgt. Robert Bennett.

The flag had flown over Roberts Army Post named "Task Force Mustang" in Iraq during his second tour of duty there. And it was good that the Cross Plains ISD afforded its students a good learning experience that involved them by participating in the ceremony. Legionnaire Gorman Parish, of Cottonwood, also participated in the ceremony.

The only thing missing in all this memorial to servicemen, which is appreciated, believe me,

is a memorial to those who stayed at home and waited out the wars. Their wait is heroic, also.

Next time you visit the memorial, look for Fred Purvis' six son's, John, Gene, Hugh, Golden, Richard, and Bobby Joe. All returned home safely except Bobby Joe, who went down with this Bomber in Europe.

Fred Purvis lived in Cottonwood most all his life, and as Richard said in an article published in the *Abilene Reporter-News*, trudged two miles every day to the mail box, hoping to hear from one of his boys. What did he think about on his way to the mailbox? What was his anticipation? Good news? Sad news? What did he have to think about all the way home? Those who stayed behind also served.

Look also for the names of Bart Coppinger, WWI, and Stanley Coppinger, WWII. Both were sons of Mrs. Minnie Coppinger who lived just two miles east of Cottonwood. What was her wait like? Minnie Coppinger was the only Gold Star Mother who displayed a gold star in her window during two wars. What did she think about and worry about through two long wars. Yes,

those who stayed behind also served.

What did Ode and Irene Strahan think about during World War II? Their son, Everett Neil, went down with his ship, a destroyer, the USS Monagohans in the Pacific. What were days and nights like as they waited out World War II? Where is a memorial to those who had hard times just waiting out all those wars?

Now during the Middle East Wars, is not a memorial due to those who stay behind and wait, and wait, and wait, through endless days and nights for their warriors to return home?

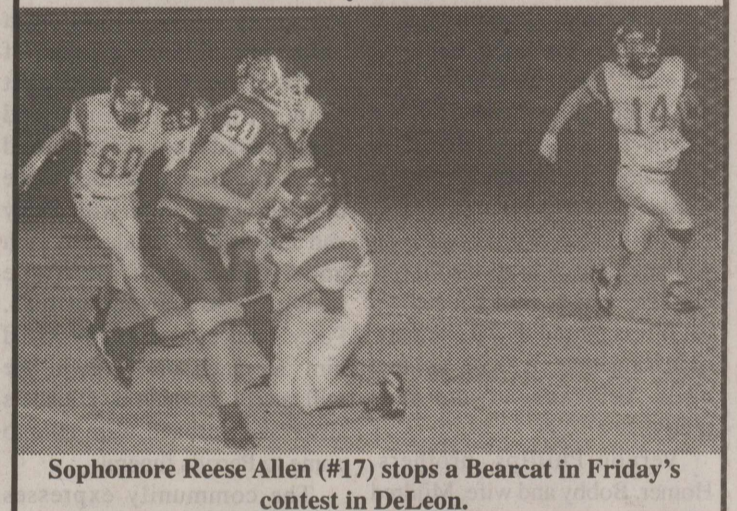

## CJC to offer linked courses this spring

CISCO, Texas - Cisco Junior College will offer linked courses this spring at the Cisco campus and the Abilene Educational Center. Linked courses have the same length, meeting times and dates, learning expectations and outcomes as credit courses but in a non-credit format.

The courses allow individuals the chance to take a class just to experience something new. The classes slated for inclusion in the program include: horticulture, foundations of art, painting, literature, music appreciation, digital photography, cabinet making, Spanish, business computer applications and many more.

According to Charlotte Speegle, CJC Dean of Technical and Workforce Education, linked courses provide individuals with the opportunity to take a wide variety of courses that may not always be available through traditional non-credit programs. "More and more individuals are finding that they must have continuing education units rather than semester credit hours to fulfill licensure requirements," said Speegle.

Linked courses also cost significantly less than their credit-course counterparts, and many of the traditional registration rules do not apply. Additionally, linked courses can be converted to credit courses within two years of completion.

To convert the non-credit contact hours to college credit hours, a student must possess a high school diploma or GED, meet all college entrance requirements and pay the tuition difference between the non-credit and credit course.

Students interested in enrolling in linked courses should complete the online application for admission and the online non-credit/continuing education registration form. Then students will be placed on a "wait list."

CJC personnel will notify students that they have been selected to attend the linked courses. Once a student is notified they must pay the linked course tuition. The cost for a linked continuing education/non-credit course is \$150 for students 18-64 years of age and \$100 for persons 65 and older. Payment can be made in person at either the Cisco or Abilene business offices or may be paid over the phone with a valid credit card. ## Ag Commissioner promotes 'three E's' to help students fight obesity

HOUSTON—Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples met with students at Varnett Charter School to talk about "education, exercise and eating right"—the three E's to fighting childhood obesity and promoting a healthy lifestyle. Commissioner Staples was in Houston to visit and eat lunch with local students to help promote National School Lunch Week, Oct. 15th-21st.

"I know you have heard about the three R's," Commissioner Staples said. "Now, it's time to start thinking about the three E's to keep you healthy and physically fit. You are the future of Texas, and how you eat makes a big difference in your day and your life."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have reported the prevalence of obesity has more than doubled during the last 30 years to almost one-third of the country's population. Obesity rates in young children and teenagers have increased at an even greater rate.

Texas ranks 12th in adult obesity in the United States, and if current trends continue 20 million people, or 75 percent, of Texas adults might be overweight or obese by the year 2040.

"The time to stop this alarming trend is now," Commissioner

Staples said. "That's why it's important to get plenty of exercise, to eat a healthy, well-balanced diet and to learn about good nutrition so our children can grow up to be healthy, active Texans."

"School meals are a great way to ensure students are getting a well-balanced diet since they must meet federal nutrition requirements and state and federal requirements for fat and sugar grams," Commissioner Staples said. "National School Lunch Week gives us the chance to highlight the important role our schools have in providing nutritious meals and in helping children develop good eating habits."

The National School Lunch Program currently provides low-cost or free lunches for more than 3 million Texas schoolchildren daily. In 2003 the Texas Department of Agriculture became the state's administering agency for the program in public schools. On Oct. 1st TDA began administering the National School Lunch Program for private and faith-based schools in the state.

National School Lunch Week was established in 1963 to help raise awareness of the role the National School Lunch Program has in the nutritional health of students.



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## Protecting Our National Sovereignty

Our state, and our country, are struggling to keep up with the effects of globalization—the increasingly free flow of ideas, information, goods and capital across borders and around the world.

One major challenge is making certain that our national sovereignty is protected, even as international commerce increases. This is no small matter. Our sovereignty is the foundation for our freedom.

Sovereignty should rest strictly with the American people. We cannot allow a foreign country or an international organization to make decisions that should be our own exclusive province, based on our own national interests.

The U.S. Senate is currently debating the Law of the Sea Treaty (LOST), a document that I believe poses a threat to these concepts. The treaty has been signed by 155 countries. But President Reagan rejected it in 1982, and the Senate refused to ratify a different version approved by President Clinton in 1994. Now it's back.

LOST sets up an international bureaucracy under the United Nations that would control the world's oceans and everything in them as "the common heritage of mankind." Any revenues produced by exploiting resources, such as oil discovered in international waters, would be allocated and divided by international tribunals.

LOST agencies would have authority to levy royalties and fees—effectively the first international tax. Some critics believe the treaty would lead to decisions by an international tribunal regulating the environment, not only in the ocean but all over the globe.

The Bush Administration is

pushing the Senate to ratify the treaty this time. It's needed to ensure that our Navy can navigate anywhere, it says, and to protect our ability to share in undersea resources, such as petroleum that might be found under the Arctic Circle.

In my view, our historical experience with international organizations has not been satisfactory. We are often outvoted, without good cause. The United Nations has earned a dismal and deteriorating record for corruption, highlighted by complicity in the largest fraud in history, the Iraq oil-for-food scandal. More recently, the U.N. has been accused of tolerating bribes and kickbacks in dispensing aid to tsunami victims in Southeast Asia.

U.N. efforts have been particularly ineffectual in resolving real conflicts. I believe the best insurance for orderly management of the high seas—and effective protection of U.S. sovereign interests—is a strong U.S. Navy. This concept has served us well for 200 years.

In mid-October, the U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments on a criminal case from Texas that poses yet another threat to our sovereignty. The case involved Jose Ernesto Medellin, a foreign citizen convicted and sentenced to death in 1994 in the brutal rape and murder of two teenage girls in Houston.

Long after his sentence was final, Medellin's lawyers came up with a new appeal point. They argued that because Medellin was not a U.S. citizen, and under the Vienna Convention the Mexican consulate should have been notified when he was arrested, his appeal should be reopened. This argument was accepted in 2004 by a foreign tribunal, the International Court of Justice in The Hague.

Medellin was indeed born in Mexico, but lived in the U.S.

most of his life. He speaks, reads and writes English, and attended U.S. schools. Disappointingly, the Bush Administration has issued a directive to Texas officials attempting to enforce the foreign court's judgment, and also backed Medellin's side at the U.S. Supreme Court.

I have argued that the President lacks constitutional authority to direct Texas to reopen Medellin's conviction. In my opinion, the President cannot by himself transform an international treaty, and especially a foreign court's judgment, into domestic law.

In recent years, some Supreme Court Justices have shown a willingness to cite the law of other countries as support for their interpretation of the U.S. Constitution. That's yet another unwelcome trend, in my opinion.

The U.S. constitutional system is the product of our unique American experience. It has produced the most successful country in history, a nation that has been "the shining city on the hill" to the rest of the world.

We should do everything possible to protect that legacy. The world depends upon our leadership.

Corrections and Apologies for last week's article. T.J. Burks is not spelled with an "e". I copied dates wrong. 1885 should have been 1855.

Part Two  
Travel saga of  
T. J. Burks

I left Austin on the 22nd or 23rd of December. That evening there came up the worst, "Norther" Texas has ever had. I had 18 miles to travel to get to Burnet. I had to pass over a high mountain and when I got over, I found I could move nothing but my fingers. I felt sleepy. I knew I was in a very critical condition.

I began to work my fingers as fast as I could and then my wrist and so on until I could pull my leg over the saddle. I went through every evolution I knew to get joints moving and blood circulating again. I finally reached sister Bettie's. She had a good fire. I drank a half glass of brandy and finally got warm.

We left Burnet, Texas, in March, 1856 for Mississippi in a two

horse wagon with very little money. I paid the Masons back out of what I had. When we got to Shreveport, I had one dollar. I bought one bushel of meal. We ate and fed our team out of that. I sold our team and equipage for \$125.00. We went from there to Vicksburg and would go on to Brandon. Again, no money. I did know the stage contractor, so I explained my situation. He arranged for me to pay on the other end. I also think he slipped a five dollar gold piece in my pocket. As I was walking to the Depot, I found it. I bought supper for Bettie and the children. They laid into that supper like hungry puppies.

We got on the stage coach at 8 o'clock that night and got home the next day. There was great rejoicing among the relatives. I was not anxious to travel for a while.

I hope that you have enjoyed this story. As far as I know, it is basically true. It does show the hardships of travel back then.

Next time T.J. Burks takes a different kind of journey.

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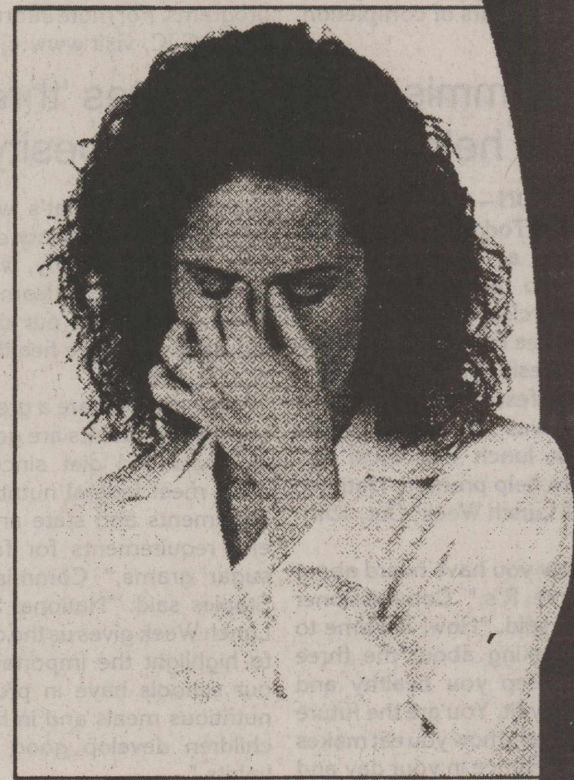
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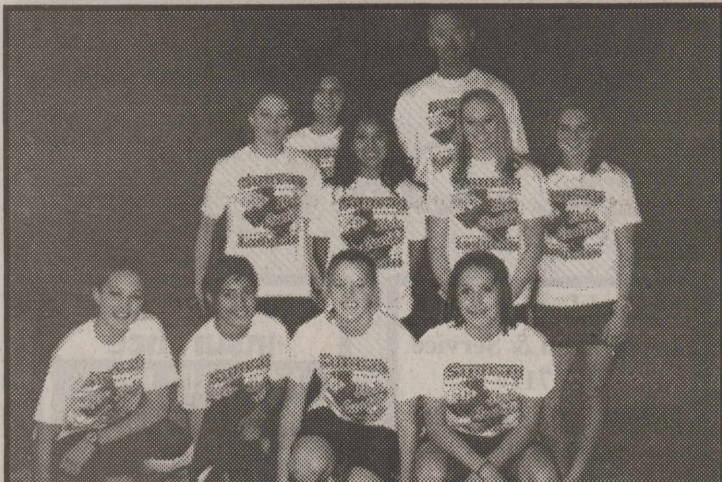

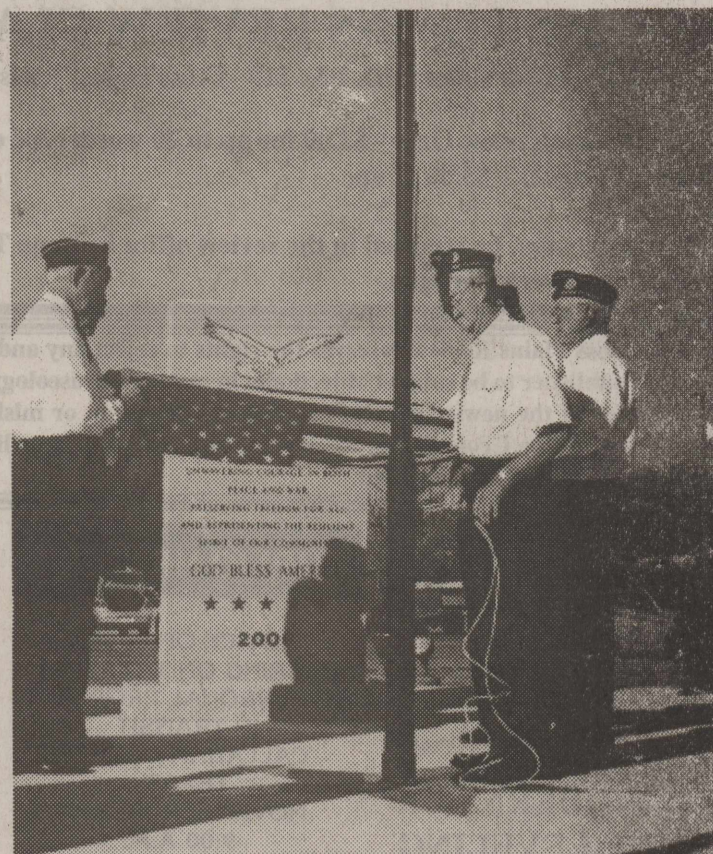

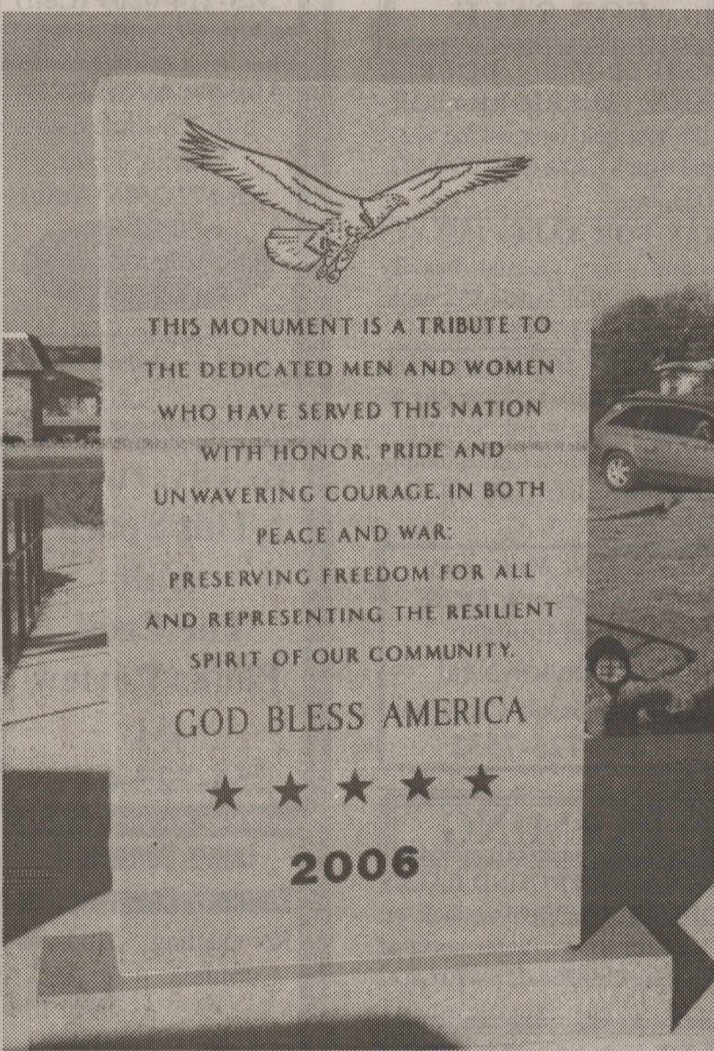

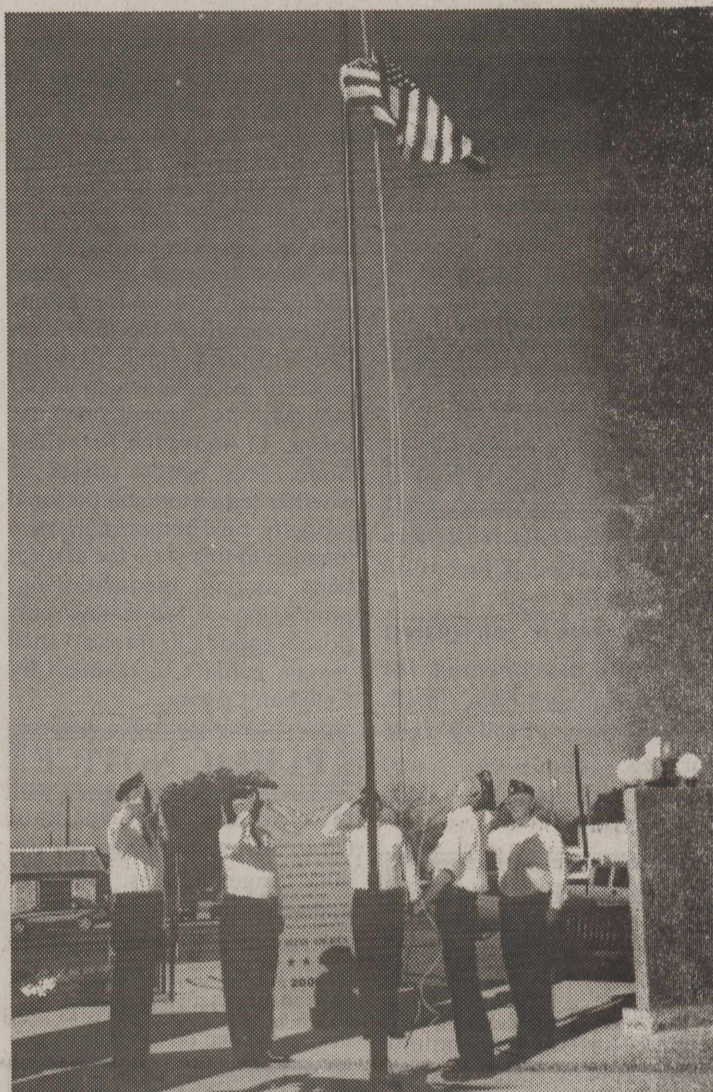

## Callahan Divide Soil & Water Conservation District Now taking Windbreak Tree Orders

The Callahan Divide Soil & Water Conservation District is now taking orders for their Annual Windbreak Tree Program. Each year the District offers these trees to the general public on a first come first serve basis at a very inexpensive price. These windbreak trees come fresh from the Texas Forest Service Nursery out of Idalou, Texas.

This year's selection of available trees includes four varieties of evergreens. They are Live Oak, Afghanistan Pine, Eastern Redcedar, and Italian Stone Pine. These Evergreen Seedlings are being offered for 5 for \$12.50 or \$65.00 for a box of 30 per species.

In addition to the Evergreens, several varieties of bare-rooted hardwood seedlings are being offered this year. The list includes Bur Oak, Shumard Oak, Sawtooth Oak, Lacebark Elm and Pecan.

These hardwood seedlings are offered in bundles of 10 for \$12.00 per species.

We are also introducing two

wildlife packets this year. Each packet comes with four different species of trees. The packets include (100 trees) 25 of each type of tree. Packets for Deer and Squirrel. Contact the Callahan Divide Soil & Water Conservation District in Baird for information on which trees are included in a certain packet. Wildlife packets sell for \$95.00 per deer packet and \$100.00 for squirrel.

Tree orders will be taken until January 25th, 2008 or until supplies run out, whichever comes first. The trees will be delivered to Baird on February 16, 2008. All orders are pre-paid with a check or money order. These trees are delivered fresh from the Texas Forest Service Nursery.
