Public Education in Texas is at Risk
Changes Needed in System


#### Abstract

By: Bill Hammond In 1983 the National Commis In 1983 the National Commis sion on Excellence in Educatio issued a report on the quality of education in the United States, stating, "If an unfriendly fores stating, "If an unfriendly foreign power had attempted to impose power had attempted to impose on America the mediocre educational performance that exists today, we might have viewed it as an act of war. As it stands, we have allowed this to happen to have allowed this to happen to same could be said of Texas saday today and today, and state government has only compounded the situation with a series of ineffective accountability measures. As a result, Texas high schoo graduates remain ill prepared for either college or the workforce. And while Texas workforce. And whie Texa employers require a higher level of skills due to advanced tech nology and increased competi- tion, our educational system is tion, our educational system is embracing mediocrity rathe than raising the bar. It's this dichotomy that is putting Texas at risk. For instance, the Texas For instance, the Texas Edu- cation Agency (TEA) reports cation Agency (TEA) reports school students is 3.7 percent, but anyone with an interest in education knows this is a dan gerously misleading number. A even more troubling statistic comes from the National As sessment of Educationa Progress, which maintains that only 29 percent of 4 th graders in Texas are proficient in reading, while Texas assessments put the percent disparity. But this only begins to scratch the surface of the problem. For example, Texas claims th approximately 97 percent of Texas schools are considered "academically acceptable" or "academically acceptable" better. By categorizing a scho as "academically acceptable, the state is saying that it is ac ceptable for 60 percent of an one ethnic group to fail the sei one ethnic group to fail the se ence section of the Texas As ence section of the Texas As sessment of Kowledge an Skills (TAKS) test and 55 percent of any one group to fail the math portion of the test. Furthe reducing the credibility of the reducing the credibility of the TAKS test are reports of ram pant cheating. If Texas is going If Texas is going to create a system that helps prepare ou children for their future and a the same time meet the needs o work to be doyers, there is much should be done. The first step that are real and easily understood by students, parents and taxpayers. For instance, the number of dropouts should be tracked un der a simple system that counts the total number of students in a freshman class on October 1st and compare that number fou years later to the total number of pupils who receive a diploma. Regarding cheating, questions on the TAKS test should be given in random order given in random order. Up-to-date, essential knowl edge and skills standards should drive a testing standard that is honest about what is needed fo Texas students to compete pos high school, whether it's in com munity college, a four-year uni munity coliege, a four-year uni- versity or some other sort of post-secondary education. This is fundamental to creating a workforce that ensures our abil ity to compete in a world economy. Put simply, Put simply, Texas students are not prepared to further theiredu not prepared to further theiredu- cation. In fact 60 percent of first year students in either two- or four-year colleges are required four-year colleges are requ to take remedial courses. to take remedial courses. Obviously, this is not a prob lem we can solve overnight, but the first step in creating a public education system that meets the needs of everyone involved is an honest diagnosis of where we stand. Perhaps TEA should ad mit that at least 10 percent of schools are not schools are not meeting the needs of Texas students and 10 to 30 percent or even 40 percent of schools need improvement. Bruce Deramus in the world, worth $\$ 1.5$ billion, Dallas Cowboys' owner Jerry according to Forbes magazine Jones is at it again, trying to fatten his own wallet by reach ing into the pockets of us com mon folk. More unfortunately, some of our elected officials are now trying to help him. Jotes is heading up the NFL Network Committee, serving as the loud and strident voice of the network as it negotiates to be carried by cable systems in Texa carried by cable systems in Texas and across the country. Accordand across the country. Accord- ing to Jones, fans will suffer if cable operators don't put the NFL Network on their basic tier instead of the premium sports instead of the premium sport tier, as they have proposed. tier, as they have proposed. Instead, fan and non-fan alik will suffer by losing more of their hard earned money if Jones and the NFL Network prevail. The NFL Network wants charge cable operators hundreds of millions of dollars for only eight games of the more than 250 being played all 250 being played all season. While the NFL Network wants all cable customers - fan or not - to pick up this cost, cable operators sightly argue that only those who actually want to watch the games should pay for them. Now two state lawmakers have gotten involved, threatening legislation against the cable companies if they don't bend to NFL Network's wishes. Jones is the perfect choic the spokesperson for corporate greed. Those in the Dallas/Fort Worth area will recall that ConWorth area will recall that Con- cerned Taxpayers of Arlington and others fought the "Jones Tax" when the Cowboys owner unveiled his plan to use public funds, through a variety of con- sumer taxes, to pay for about a third of his new stadium. Jones spent millions wooing city leaders and voters to get his way. As a result, Arlington resi- dents and visitors are paying dents and visitors are paying higher sales, car rental and hotel taxes. While we pay, Jones already is reaping the benefits. in September 2007. in September 2007. Attending a game already Attending a game already is too expensive for many working too expensive for many working families. Now fans are going to find it more difficult to catch a game on television especially if game on television, sespecially if their budgets do not allow them to subscribe to cable or satellite. Here's an example of how the NFLNetwork's plan would deny fans of the Dallas Cowboys, who play in two of the eight games play in two of the eight games set on the network. Anyone with access to the NFL Network would get the would get the game, and fans in the Dallas/Fort Worth ara cold the Dallas/Fort Worth area could still pick it up for free on a local still pick it up for free on a loca broadcast station (subject to local blackout rules). But fans in But fans in San Antonio, the Valley, FIPaso Valley, El Paso, Austin and else- where in Texas no where in Texas no longer would be able to turn on their television be able to turn on their televisio and catch the game on a loca station. The flu usually spreads from person to person when an infected person coughs or
sneezes and the sneezes and the droplets from

through the air and are deposited on the mouth or nose of people nearby. Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or
sneezing, and then throw the tissue away. Always wash your hands every time you cough or sneeze.
