graphs of metal sellers, their vehicles and the metal they're selling. The buyers must scan the sellers' government-issued
ID and take their thumbprint. ID and take their thumbprint.
People selling metal have to pro vide the make, model and license plate number of the ve-
hicle used to deliver their metal. hicle used to deliver their metal.
At least in Dallas, gone are the At east in Dalias, gone are the
days when a seller could roll a grocery cart of copper into a recycling station without explain-
ing how and where they got the metal.
Expanded law enforcement and strict city ordinances are a necessary and laudable step in
the right direction, the right direction; but they can
only go so far. Police and city only go so far. Police and city
officials can't be everywhere at once. Every resident of Texas can help law enforcement to
crack down on copper theft. We crack down on copper theft. We

WASHINGTON-At a press conference on Capitol Hill July 8,
2008. U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, Vice Chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, shared with his colleagues about Texans' concerns on record-high gas prices. Last week, Sen. Cornyn with many Texas families and with many Texas families and

"This new legislation is a balanced approach to help provide Texans and all Americans
near-term relief from near-term relief from record gas
prices and long-term energy security. The time to act is now, and I'm hopeful everyone will join us in passing this muchneeded legislation immediately. Sen. Cornyn concluded. In addition to supporting the Gas Price Reduction Act, Sen. Cornyn and other members of the

American Energy Production Act (S.2958).
