



Lois DeBusk Garrett was born to Sam DeBusk and Jenny Brooke DeBusk on June 24, 1910 at the family home near Burkett. She was the fifth child of six, and the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam DeBusk. She was the last surviving child. Lois married E.L. (Buck) Garrett in July 1928, at the age of 18. She was the last surviving sibling.

Lois was preceded in death by her infant son, William Dickson Garrett in 1936, and her husband, E.L. (Buck) Garrett in 1984.

As a child, Lois attended school in Cross Plains, and had the distinction of being the person who chose the mascot for the school, the Cross Plains Buffaloes. Lois led a colorful life and lived in many areas of the world, including Caracas, Venezuela, Hobbs, New Mexico and several cities in Texas, including Ranger, Pampa. LUBBOCK (September 12, 2008)-Dwight Fullingim, Democratic congressional candidate for U.S. Congress for the 19th District of Texas, announced plans to stop next month in Clyde at the Clyde Woman's Club on South First for a meet and greet gathering sponsored by Willis and Dorothy Zinn, according to Daniel Bradley, campaign manager. The event is scheduled for Saturday, October 11th, from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. and is expected to draw concerned citizens from Clyde, Baird and the surrounding countryside.

Fullingim will have a busy day on the campaign trail October 11th, and will speak at a special Beans and Jeans Rally at Graham in Young County earlier in

the day. Events such as Rodeos, festivals and county fairs have been a focus of Fullingim's campaign since he won the Democratic Primary in March, according to campaign manager Bradley.

"The top issues I've been hearing about everywhere I go are energy costs, healthcare and the economy," Fullingim said.

"Americans from all walks of life are facing tough times, and the people in this district need someone who will stand up and speak for them in Washington."

Fullingim recently opened his headquarters in Lubbock to coordinate a centralized campaign and launched the campaign's website at www.Dwight08.com to introduce voters to his stands on the issues and to offer more ways for supporters to get involved.

According to Bradley, the plan is to mount a grassroots effort, which will include trips to every county in the district to deliver Fullingim's message.

"All indications are positive for the messages Dwight's been delivering to voters," he said. "People really just want a real choice in their representation, and Dwight offers that."

Campaign activities in Abilene, the second largest city in District 19, are being coordinated from the Taylor County Democratic Headquarters, according to Bradley. "We will get into every one of the 27 counties before the November election," he added.

3. Once children outgrow their forward-facing seats, they should ride in booster seats, in the back seat, until the vehicle seat belts fit properly. Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs and the shoulder belt fits across the chest (usually at age 8 or when they are 4'9" tall).

4. When children outgrow their booster seats, they can use the adult seat belts in the back seat, if they fit properly (lap belt lays across the upper thighs and the shoulder belt fits across the chest).

State law requires children younger than 17 years old to be buckled up in the front and back seat, and those younger than five years old and less than 36 inches tall must be secured in child safety seats. Violations can result in a fine of up to \$200.

Governor outrages Texans by paroling war chiefs

OCT. 8 - 14, 2008 Gov. Edmund J. Davis paroled a pair of Kiowa war chiefs on Oct. 8, 1873, a grandstand gesture the Reconstruction Republican knew would be unpopular with his constituents but which he hoped would guarantee the federal guns to keep him in office.

The uproar over the surprise release of Santanta and Big Tree was not limited to outraged Texans. Gen. William T. Sherman, who helped to put the renegades behind bars, quickly jotted off an angry letter to the governor. Predicting a bloody rampage by the Kiowas, he prayed Davis would be the first to lose his scalp. By the end of the Civil War, the vast majority of Lone Star Indians had been exterminated or expelled. The ferocious exceptions were the Comanches and Kiowas, masters of the western half of the state who succeeded in stemming the tide of white expansion. Taking advantage of the chaos that followed the collapse of the Confederacy, the elusive warriors launched an unprecedented offensive which actually depopulated previously settled sections. By 1870 the Texas frontier was being rapidly rolled back as terrified pioneers sought safety in the east. Three years earlier, Washington had promised the Plains Indians the impossible. The Treaty of Medicine Lodge granted the nomads an enormous sanctuary south of the Arkansas River, including the Texas Panhandle, where the buffalo would be a federally protected species. It was, however, up to the army to enforce the treaty, and neither Sherman nor his superior, Gen. Phillip Sheridan, wanted to serve as game wardens for the buffalo preserve. Sherman, in fact, advocated the wholesale slaughter of the bison herds, which he called "the Indians'

commissary. The military intentionally ignored the Medicine Lodge pact and allowed hundreds of hunters unrestricted access to the High Plains.

Meanwhile, the Kiowas enjoyed the best of both worlds. They spent the winter in the Indian Territory, where government agents waited on them hand and foot providing food, shelter and all the other

attention and severe criticism as the sympathetic northern press depicted the defendants as innocent victims of anti-Indian bigotry.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty and condemned the Kiowas to death on the gallows. Bowing to pressure from President Grant, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and public opinion in the North, Gov. Davis commuted the

necessities of life. With warm weather the rested Indians ravaged northwestern Texas and periodically returned to the reservation, where the same agents protected them from punishment.

A Kiowa band led by Santank, Big Tree and Santanta observed this springtime ritual in 1871 spreading terror throughout Young and Jack counties. In an attack on a wagon train between Jacksboro and Fort Griffin, a half dozen teamsters were slain with one even roasted alive over an open fire. Gen. Sherman, who just happened to be in the neighborhood on a routine inspection, visited the site of the massacre. The grisly scene provoked an immediate confrontation between the furious "Scourge of Georgia" and the unrepentant Kiowas. After Santank proudly took credit for the carnage, Sherman ordered the arrest and extradition of the three culprits. Federal law prohibited prosecution of reservation Indians without written permission from the agent in charge, and such a request never had been honored. But in this case the Kiowa supervisor gladly gave his consent in order to get rid of the troublemaking trio.

Santank sensed the fate that awaited him in Texas. On the trail he made a suicidal break for freedom and was shot to death by his guards.

Sherman handed Santanta and Big Tree over to the civilian authorities at Jacksboro. Their trial attracted national sentences to life imprisonment.

When Grant requested the inmates' presence at a St. Louis conference with the Southern Plains tribes, Davis again obliged. At the parley federal officials offered the incarcerated chiefs their freedom in return for peace ignoring the price Texans would pay for the shameful clemency.

While Grant could not demand the Kiowas' release, nothing prevented him from making his wishes known to the embattled governor. Facing certain defeat at the next election, Davis planned on appealing for troops to keep him in office. On the false assumption that the president would return the favor, he paroled Santanta and Big Tree. Santanta refused to mend his marauding ways and wound up back in prison. With the deposed Davis no longer around to lend a helping hand, he leaped to his doom from a second-floor window in October 1878.

Big Tree picked a different path by choosing religion over revenge. He founded a Baptist mission among the Kiowas and was an outspoken proponent of coexistence with the whites until his death from natural causes in 1929.





Activities will include demonstrations of Brush Busters individual plant treatment techniques; prickly pear control using boomless nozzles and other application methods; half-cutting mesquite for quail cover; patch-burn grazing and summer burning.

"Brush Sculpting" is the art and science of selectively removing woody plants' to optimize a property's potential for sustaining a balance of wildlife, livestock, aesthetics and value," said Dr. Dale Rollins, who coined the phrase ten years ago. Rollins said the methodology, now used on thousands of Texas acres, often incorporates a number of integrated management techniques to achieve the final goal.

The purpose of the workshop is to review the evolution of Brush Sculpting and to look at and evaluate the many methods now used in the practice on Texas rangelands, Rollins said.

The program has been approved for eight Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units (5-1/2 in the general category and 2-1/2 in the integrated pest management category).





These complaints cited numerous instances of false advertising, deceptive business practices and unkept promises. The state's enforcement action seeks restitution for customers whose bank accounts were unlawfully debited by the defen- fendants' monthly debiting. dants.

Momentum, which sells its products online, operates several Web sites, including


"20Minutefacelift.com." "2DaySlimdown.com," "Momentumdirect.net" and "Momentumworldwide.com." The company does business under various names, including Momentum Health & Nutrition, purchasers.

Momentum Direct's online ads trumpeted the other products' "life-changing" qualities, guaranteeing that users of the "20-Minute Facelift" will "look 10 utes" - or purchasers' money

The bulk of complaints indiwherein the defendant refused to honor cancellation requests. Others complained the company failed to provide promised refunds and some were sent and billed for completely unsolicited products.

The state's investigation found that Momentum Direct ignored customers' cancellation requests, charged for products never shipped and even continued to debit customer bank accounts for products that were never ordered. Many consumers incurred bank charges for insufficient funds due to the de-Some even closed their bank accounts to prevent further damage. Customers who attempted to contact the company by telephone, e-mail or first-class mail were unable to get a response.

The Attorney General is seeking full restitution for harmed consumers; civil penalties of up to \$20,000 per violation of the **Texas Deceptive Trade Practices** Momentum Worldwide, Nutrition Act; and a penalty of \$250,000
