

Faithful Audience Meets Author Mike Cox

A good-sized crowd mingled in the Community Center last week, enjoying refreshments and visiting with author Mike Cox as they discussed his stories of the Texas Rangers. The "Meet the Author" event, sponsored by the Cross Plains Public Library continues to attract top-notch Texas writers, a feat that is envied by much larger libraries.

Cox, who lives in Austin, grew up in a family atmosphere of reading and writing-lots of reading and writing as both of his parents and his grandfather were published authors. His grandfather, L.A. Wilke, spent a career with early day newspapers

Chuck Norris, the no-nonsense lawman in "Walker, Texas Ranger" made the law enforcement arm of the DPS seem overly glamorous, with cases being resolved quickly in black and white. But as Cox told of the long history of the unit, black and white was not always the case. "The story of Texas Rangers is as controversial as it is heroic," the long time writer stated.

The scholarship will be awarded on Saturday, November 1, 2008 at the NAEHCY conference in Crystal City, Virginia (near Washington D.C.). Part of the awarding of the scholarship is an all expense paid trip to the NAEHYC conference to accept the scholarship as well as some educational sight seeing in the area.

These scholarship funds are available to students who are homeless or who have been homeless during their school attendance, and who have demonstrated average or higher achievement.



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

Crockett's Grandson no chip off the old block

OCT. 15 - 21, 2008

The Oct. 15, 1876 edition of a New Mexico weekly carried a report from Cimarron detailing the death of a Texas outlaw named Davy Crockett.

Just a coincidence? That was what everyone thought to trial six months later, the much abuse some men will until Robert Crockett, son of the famous frontiersman and Alamo martyr, came to visit

David Crockett was born in Tennessee 17 years after his legendary grandfather gave his life for the independence on Mexico's northernmost province. He was still just a boy in the 1850's, when his family moved to Texas and settled on a homestead in present-day Hood County that the state set aside for his

widowed grandmother. Davy, as the youth was known, struck out on his own in the early 1870's. He wound up in northern New Mexico, where he bought a small cattle

ranch east of Cimarron. Bored with the day-to-day drudgery of punching cows, Davy sold the spread, took a room in town and lived off the proceeds. For companionship he chose his former foreman, a no-count sponge named Gus Heffron, who was happy to help his old boss spend his

money. Except for the occasional night in the local drunk tank, Davy managed to stay out of serious trouble. Handsome and generous to a fault, he was well-liked by the residents of Cimarron, who were willing to overlook his growing

attachment to the bottle. All that changed on the night of Mar. 24, 1876. Davy, in his usual state of intoxication, reached for the door handle to exit a bar at the same exact moment an army cavalryman tried to enter the watering hole. Enraged by the short but spirited tug-of-war, the inebriated Texan pulled his pistol the instant the door flew open and shot the soldier

troopers seated at a table behind him, Davy spun around and emptied his six-gun into the trio. He hit all three cavalrymen fatally wounding When the case came defendant blamed the triple murder on booze and his bad temper. Had the victims been white Davy probably would have hanged. But the fact that they were freed slaves made all the difference in the world to the community and the judge.

fine and court costs. Davy should have thanked his lucky stars and taken the opportunity to turn over a new - and sober - leaf. Instead, he and his drinking buddy Heffron went on a two-week tear.

In an anonymous letter to the editor of the Santa Fe "New Mexican," a citizen of Cimarron related the rampage: "These two men have defied arrest, threatening to kill anyone who should attempt it; have rode their horses into saloons, stores and offices, and with their double-barreled shotguns cocked have compelled persons to comply with their demands no matter what they were."

According to the concerned correspondent, Cimarron's lone lawman was as helpless as everyone else. Saturday they halted the sheriff, and with their shotguns loaded, cocked and aimed at his breast told him he only lived at their pleasure. (They) politely informed him that when he made any attempt to arrest them to be sure to have 'the drop,' or his time on earth would be short."

Egged on by his sadistic sidekick, Davy delighted in publicly humiliating Sheriff Rinehart. He took whatever caught his eye from store shelves and told frightened shopkeepers to put his "purchases" on the sheriff's or order online On one especially

Remembering three other memorable evening, he marched Rinehart at gunpoint into a saloon and forced him to swallow shot after shot of whiskey until he passed out on the barroom floor.

> But there is a limit to how take, and a rancher and the postmaster reached theirs on Sep. 30, 1876. Joseph Holbrook and McCullough had ignored earlier appeals from the overmatched sheriff, but now they were ready to lend a hand regardless of the risk.

A grateful Rinehart deputized the two volunteers in secret, and the three armed themselves with shotguns. After making sure Davy Crockett and Gus Heffron were drinking their favorite haunt dry, they concealed themselves along the road the bullies always traveled on the way back to their camp.

At nine o'clock, the two tipsy toughs mounted their horses and started riding out of town. Rancher Holbrook stepped out of the shadows and into the road with his shotgun pointed straight at the pair.

Giving them a chance to surrender, he shouted, "Up with your hands!" Drunken Davy laughed out loud and dared him to shoot.

Holbrook called his bluff with a double-barreled blast. Davy's horse bolted and did not stop until it reached the Cimarron River.

When the sheriff and his twoman posse finally reached the riverbank, the 23 year old Texan was sitting lifeless in the saddle with a death grip on the horn. It took every ounce of their strength to pry loose Davy Crockett's dead fingers.





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
