Allied Waste Service New Trash Collection Method Facing Challenges

Last week 46 residents missed the pickup for trash, according to Debbie Gosnell, City encouraged to read the following information from Allied Waste.

October 1, 2008 your trash service was converted to poly cart containers. This change will allow Allied Waste to service the City of Cross Plains more efficiently, while providing a more sanitary way to dispose of household waste.

As a resident or commercial hand-load customer, receiving city utilities, you are being provided with one (1) 95 gallon additional poly cart is required, happy to provide one to you for a nominal fee. A metal container is great capacity.

*On collection day (every Wednesday), place the poly cart curbside or at the edge of the street in FRONT of your property by 6:00 a.m. You may remove it after the garbage has been collected and should remove it by 7:00 p.m. Place the poly cart with the handle away from the

*Place your poly cart at least 3 feet away from a mailbox or other obstacles, 12 feet from a parked car, and avoid placing directly underneath low hanging branches or power lines. Your poly cart cannot be emptied if it is not easily accessed by the grabber arm of the collection truck!

*All food waste must be

*Poly carts are designed for household trash ONLY. Do Administrator. Residents are not fill with gravel, dirt or construction debris.

*Only what fits inside the Allied Waste Services was container will be collected (ie. proud to announce that beginning nothing placed beside or stacked on top of container). Please do not overfill poly cart, as lids should close properly.

If your cart is damaged or lost, call City Hall to have it replaced. If lost or damaged by homeowner (i.e.: hot coals or ashes placed in the cart), a \$60.00 replacement fee will be accessed. If the damage is not the fault of the homeowner, the replacement will be at no cost.



Gov. Rick Perry Launches Texas Veterans Leadership Program

AUSTIN - Texas Gov. Rick Perry officially launched the **Texas Workforce Commission** (TWC) Texas Veterans Leadership Program (TVLP) at a veterans recognition event in Dallas today. This major initiative is designed to assist veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan as they transition to the workplace and civilian life.

"Americans owe these men and women a debt of gratitude Survivors include his daughter, for their brave and selfless service to our country," Gov. Perry said. "While we can never thank them enough for protecting our freedom and the livelihood we hold dear, our veterans deserve the best support we can give them as they transition from military culture and the chaos of the battlefield to the civilian workplace."

TVLP is modeled after the Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program, established when TWC Chairman Tom Pauken was director of ACTION under President Ronald Reagan. That program involved successful Vietnam veterans helping their fellow veterans who were unemployed or underemployed, or who had lingering problems associated with their Vietnam experience. "Veterans have made

tremendous sacrifices during their service to our country, and the Texas Veterans Leadership Program is our opportunity to welcome veterans home in the right way and assist them with a successful transition," said TWC Chairman Pauken.

Over the past several months, TWC has laid the groundwork for today's launch by hiring 28 veterans as local Veterans Resource and Referral Specialists (VRRSs) to provide veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan with employment and training services. Located in each local workforce development board area across Texas, the VRRSs work closely with workforce center staff and the local staff of the Texas Veterans Commission.

morning is the perfect homeowners unprepared for the troubles associated with cold weather. Southerners should take preventive action before December 1st. Homeowners in higher elevations should act sooner. Failure to prepare can prove costly when pipes freeze so the plumbing experts recommend taking these early precautions instead of waiting until cold weather arrives.

 Disconnect outside water hoses. If left connected during freezing temperatures, water in hoses will freeze and expand causing connecting faucets and pipes to freeze and break. Inspect outside faucets. If dripping or leaking, make the necessary repairs or call a plumber before a hard freeze. Note that when pipes freeze, water pressure builds causing cracks, no matter if the pipe is made of plastic, copper or steel. Even a tiny crack can unleash 250 gallons of floodwater in a single day. • If your home is equipped with interior shut-off valves leading to outside faucets, close them and drain water from lines.

Remove any rocks and debris from the pit then dump a bucket of water into the pit to test the sump pump. If it turns on, empties the pit quickly then turns itself off, it is operating properly.

This Week in Texas History

Citizens of Cincinnati donate 'Twin Sisters' to the cause

At the largest mass meeting in living memory, the citizens of Cincinnati, Ohio expressed their enthusiastic support for the Texas Revolution on Nov.

Nov. 12 - 18, 2008

Their sincere statement of solidarity did not satisfy the Cincinnatians, who wanted to make a concrete contribution to the cause. So the hat was passed until sufficient funds were collected to buy the Texans something they could really use - a matching pair of cannon.

Direct from the Cincinnati foundry, the identical sixpounders reached the port of New Orleans on Mar. 16, 1836. Passage for the desperately needed field pieces was booked on the next vessel bound for Brazoria.

As luck would have it, on board the very same ship was an emigrant couple from Cincinnati with their twin daughters Elizabeth and Eleanor. In a hurriedly organized ceremony at Brazoria, the little girls presented the cannon to a Texas crowd on behalf of their

According to legend, the curious coincidence caused an onlooker to remark, "Well, I'll be. Two sets of twins." From then on, the timely gifts were always called the "Twin Sisters."

It took the cannon nearly three weeks to catch up with the retreating rebel army. Since torrential rains had turned the dirt roads into an impassable quagmire, the quartermaster sent the Sisters to Harrisburg by way of the Gulf of Mexico and Buffalo Bayou.

From there a team of horses hauled the cannon overland to Gen. Sam Houston's temporary encampment. The appearance of the Sisters on April 11th instantly lifted the

spirits of the demoralized neglected relics a good soldiers.

Ten days later, the Mexican artillery got off the first shot, but the misguided missile whizzed harmlessly over the roared in unison tearing huge were lost. The last confirmed holes in the enemy lines and signaling the start of the

slaughter at San Jacinto. Three months after the 18minute battle that ensured Lone Star sovereignty, interim president David G. Burnet wrote a thank-you note to the people of Cincinnati. He praised the accuracy and reliability of the cannon whose "first effective operations were in the memorable field of San Jacinto, where they contributed greatly to the achievement of a victory not often paralleled in the annals of

After their one on one taste of combat, the Twin Sisters were transferred to Austin to protect workers building the new capital against possible Indian attack. They returned to San Jacinto for the fifth anniversary of the magnificent triumph and later than year served as the percussion session at President Houston's second inauguration.

During the Mexican War, a federal inspector stumbled upon the antiques in a routine inventory of Texas munitions. Ignorant of their historic significance, he shipped them off to the U.S. arsenal at Baton

A few days after Texas dropped out of the Union in February 1861, the secessionists asked Confederate officials in Louisiana to track down the Sisters. A thorough search turned up one of the missing cannon at a scrap yard and the other in a private collection.

The Louisiana legislature

However, in the chaos and heads of the advancing confusion of the Civil War the Texans. Then the Twin Sisters priceless field pieces again sighting was near Austin, where a Rebel major thought he had seen the Sisters in

The state superintendent of public buildings and grounds tried in vain to pick up the trail a half century later. "I have received nearly one hundred letters," he wrote in 1910, "placing them in nearly as many different places extending from Washington, D.C. to Santa Fe, New Mexico."

An intriguing story that has stubbornly resurfaced over the decades may provide a clue to the Twin Sisters' final resting place. Five ragged Rebs supposedly came upon two ancient weapons at a railroad depot outside Houston in August 1865. Tarnished dedication plates identified the cannon as the long-lost present from the generous people of Cincinnati.

To keep the Sisters from falling into Yankee hands, the Texans slipped back that night and dragged them to freedom. Somewhere in the general vicinity of Buffalo Bayou, they secretly buried the keepsakes for posterity.

The only hitch is that the rescue party never revealed the exact location. Even if this tale is true, archaeologists could dig up a sizable section of modern-day Houston and still not find the Twin Sisters.



Cattle Brucellosis tests still required for change of ownership in Texas

Selling or buying cattle? A cattle brucellosis, or "Bangs" ownership of adult cattle in Texas, says Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian.

For many years, Texas ranchers and livestock health officials worked to eradicate cattle brucellosis, a bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves, or produce less milk.

We have enjoyed Class "Free" status for cattle brucellosis since February 2008, but testing is still required at livestock markets, special sales and private treaty sales, for at least two years, said Dr. Hillman.

of the national brucellosis test is still required for changing, program standard, and it assures that a state is clearly free of the disease and that we can quickly identify and deal with reintroduced or yet undetected infection.

Slaughter testing surveillance will continue across the country for an indefinite period, to ensure that the disease is completely eradicated from cattle herds in Texas and other states.

Dr. Hillman noted that cattle which are sexually intact and 18 months of age or older must be tested prior to sale.

The test requires a small blood sample from the animal, collected by an accredited veterinarian, or TAHC or USDA personnel. A chute-side test is conducted at livestock markets on sale days, with laboratory confirmation by the State-Federal laboratory.

For private treaty or special sales, an accredited, private

the blood sample and submit the blood sample to the State-Federal laboratory, where the test will be run.


Texas was the last state to achieve cattle brucellosis free status, but there is no guarantee we can maintain this status, if we aren't vigilant, said Dr. Hillman. He stressed that the continued testing will identify potential cases of cattle brucellosis that weren't detected during the eradication effort. Brucellosis status can be lost, if two infected herds are detected within a two-year period. It is essential that we continue to follow the national standards

Eradicating a disease is a livestock health victory, and that makes vigilance even more important now, said Dr. Hillman. "Don't risk buying infection. Ensure that the breeding cattle you buy have been tested."

Dr. Hillman also reminds cattle owners, especially those in the eastern portions of the state, that heifers should be vaccinated against cattle brucellosis, particularly if they will be used as breeding animals. Accredited veterinarians can administer the RB-51 vaccine to heifers between the ages of four and 12 months to provide lifelong protection against the





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



Adult Protective Services It's Everyone's Business

Prevention Month. Adult anxiety, Protective Services has statements, implausible stories implemented a public awareness campaign entitled Everyone's Business". The campaign is designed to make people aware of the needs of the elderly and disabled and encourage citizens to report suspected abuse, neglet, or exploitation.

Adult Protective Services (APS) investigates allegations of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of the elderly or adults with disabilities. When maltreatment is confirmed, APS provides or arranges services in an attempt to alleviate the problem. APS is dedicated to ensuring the health and safety of vulnerable adults in Texas.

Many people who are elderly or have disabilities live alone or are dependent on others for their care. Isolation is a factor that places vulnerable adults at risk for abuse, neglect, or exploitation. Make it your mission to remember the elderly and adults with disabilities in your community.

Report abuse, neglect or exploitation by calling 1-800-252-5400

As the public becomes more aware of vulnerable adults and their needs, APS will continue to see an increase in the number of reports. In the last decade, the number of in-home cases investigated by Adult Protective Services has more than doubled.

There are indicators of abuse, neglect, or exploitation. The presence of these signs does not always mean something is wrong, but they may be clues that a problem exists, and that a report needs to be made to law enforcement or Adult Protective Services.

Physical signs may include an injury that has not been cared for properly, or that is inconsistent with explanation for its cause, pain from touching, or cuts and bruises. Other signs might be dehydration or malnutrition without illnessrelated cause, inappropriate administration of medication, and lack of necessities such as food, water, or utilities.

Some behaviors may indicate

May was Elder Abuse maltreatment—such as fear, belongings, papers, credit cards or confusion.

> Sometimes the caregiver may demonstrate signs that something is wrong such as preventing the elder from speaking to or seeing visitors or anger, indifference, or aggressive behavior toward

Signs of financial abuse may include elder's personal

APS investigates allegations that occur in a person's home or in state schools, hospitals and community MHMR centers. Adult Protective Services will investigate exploitation allegations involving nursing home residents if the alleged perpetrator is not an employee of the facility and is someone who has an ongoing relationship

"You don't have to be certain that a situation is abusive or neglectful. We'll look into it and find out." states local supervisor Angela Medina. "Good faith reports are exempt from personal liability and are kept confidential."
