At the largest mass meeting in living memory, the citizens of Cincinnati, Ohio expressed
their enthusiastic support for the Texas Revolution on Nov.

Direct from the Cincinnati foundry, the identical six-
pounders reached the port of pounders reached the port of
New Orleans on Mar. 16 ,
1836. Passage for the desperately needed field pieces was booked on the next
vessel bound for Brazoria. vessel bound for Brazoria.
As luck would have it, on
board the very same ship was board the very same ship was
an emigrant couple from an emigrant couple from
Cincinnati with their twin
daughters Elizabeth and daughters Elizabeth and
Eleanor. In a hurriedly
organized ceremony at Brazoria, the little girls
presented the cannon to a presented the cannon to a
Texas crowd on behalf of their hometown.
According to legend, the curious coincidence caused an
onlooker to remark, "Well, 'Ill onlooker to remark, "Well, l'Ill
be. Two sets of twins." From then on, the timely gifts were always called the "Twin
Sisters." It took the cannon nearly
three weeks to catch up with the retreating rebel army. Since torrential rains had impassable quagmire, the quartermaster sent the Sisters to Harrisburg by way of the
Gulf of Mexico and Buffalo Bayou.

temporary encampment. The appearance of the Sisters on
April 11 th instantly lifted the

spent $\$ 700$ to give the badly

were back on Texas soil. were back on Texas soil.
However, in the chaos and
confusion of the Civil War the confusion of the Civil War the
priceless field pieces again were lost. The last confirmed

where a Rebel major thought he had seen the Sisters in

Physical signs may include an injury that has not been cared for properly, or that is inconsistent with explanation for its cause, pain from touching,
or cuts and bruises. Othersigns might be dehydration or mainutrition without illness related cause, inappropriate
