FHS grad joins faculty at Texas Tech

Renowned horse expert and veterinarian Britt Conklin has been hired as the new Associate Dean for Clinical Programs at the Texas Tech School of Veterinary Medicine.

Conklin is a 1993 graduate of Friona High School and was the class Historian. He earned his undergraduate degree from the Texas Tech College of Agricultural Sciences & Natural Resources. Britt has served as the senior equine professional services veterinarian for Boehringer-Ingelheim Animal Health since 2012. He also established a breakthrough veterinary practice in Weatherford after graduating from veterinary school.

"Being raised here in the Texas Panhandle, in production agriculture, has shaped the character and veterinarian I have become," Conklin said. "I am thrilled to be part of this exciting program and, as part of the Texas Tech family, I look forward to fostering those fundamental values we hold dear in the students who pass through this program."

Chieftains receive 4 selections on TSWA Class 3A All-State Football Team

The Friona Chieftains received four selections on the 2019 Texas Sports Writers Association Class 3A All-State Football Team that was announced on February 12th.

Sophomore running back Jacob Bautista was a TSWA All-State 2nd Team selection. He set two school

records by rushing for 2,091 yards and scoring 158 points. Jacob was a 2nd Team Offense All-District selection.


Receiving TSWA All-State honorable mention honors were senior guard Marcos Juarez, senior linebacker Roger Palacios, and

junior defensive back Juan Salinas.

Marcos Juarez was part of an offensive line that helped power the Chieftains to set 5 new school records and reach the Regional Semifinal playoff game. Marcos was a unanimous 1st Team Offense All-District selection.

Roger Palacios was an outside linebacker who had 96 total tackles for the season. Amazingly, 23 of those tackles were behind the line of scrimmage for a net loss. Roger was also a unanimous 1st Team Defense All-District selec-

Juan Salinas was the leading tackler for the Chieftains with 115 tackles. Of that total, 52 were unassisted or solo tackles. He also had 63 assisted tackles, caused 2 fumbles, and recorded 4 interceptions.





Board members heard a report from Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper regarding the school construction/renovation project. They were informed that Teinert Construction is finalizing the costs for the various elements of the project. A Notice to Proceed will occur sometime before the end of February.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices are unchanged in the past week, averaging \$2.09 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 14.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 5.6 cents per gallon higher than a year

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.79 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 0.7 cents in the last week to an average of \$2.43 per gallon. The national average is down 12.1 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 11.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Oil prices rebounded last week on word that OPEC members were closely considering cutting global oil production for several months to offset the decline in demand due to the coronavirus, pushing the national average marginally higher versus a week ago," said Patrick De-Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While it's possible average gasoline prices will remain within arm's reach of recent lows, unless there's renewed or new concerns with the spread of the coronavirus, we may have seen the deepest discounted prices behind us, with some chance we'll hold close to the lows before the seasonal rally begins in earnest. It wouldn't be a bad time to fill up to hedge the chances of prices rising in the coming days."





These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2019 sales by businesses that report tax annually. Christmas shopping that typically occurs in November was shifted into December due to the relatively late date of Thanksgiving 2019, helping make this month's allocations substantially higher than in previous months, a trend that is not expected to continue.

The City of Friona will receive \$50,040.58 for February 2020 as compared to \$41,054.12 which was received last year. This represents a 21.88% increase. The year-to-date payment total is \$87,789.66 which is a 22.83% increase over the \$71,470.88 received last year during the same time frame.



Of all the books in the New Testaments, only two were written by blood relatives of Jesus. Jude 1:3 rings out the charge of his book, as believers are commanded "to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints," (ESV). Jude's charge to stand against false teachers and influencers is relevant for believers of all ages, but if you will contend for the faith well, you must be rooted in the contender's assurance found in the opening two

The opening verses are a short introduction from Jude that also describes the believers as those who are "called, beloved in God the Father and kept for Jesus Christ."

Think about that, believers are called, beloved and kept. These three characteristics lay a firm foundation of blessed assurance in the Lord as you contend for the faith. Those who are truly saved can give praise that they are called by God unto salvation. The sovereignty and wisdom of God is unfathomable, but is not unpraisable, as the redeemed can praise God for his abundant mercy and grace upon them in Christ. Next, remember that you are "beloved in God the Father," and as a believer you have experienced the fullness of his love through salvation in Christ. Finally, a believer can have a firm assurance because they are "kept for Jesus Christ." Jesus Christ, the defeater of death, the conqueror over the grave, the Savior and Lord, the ruler over heaven and earth is the one who keeps those who are his saved until the end. Therefore, if you know Christ, rest in the assurance He gives and "contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints."



State Capital Highlights

Governor charges agency heads with developing workforce plan

AUSTIN — Requirements in House Bill 3, the sweeping school finance law passed by the Texas Legislature in 2019, require the state to plan for long-term workforce development.

On Feb. 13, Gov. Greg Abbott cited HB 3 in assigning the commissioners of three state agencies to identify strategies to meet the state's future workforce needs through his 2016 Tri-Agency Workforce Initiative. He instructed them to deliver a report to him by Sept. 1.

"The passage of House Bill 3 marked the most significant transformation of our education system in decades and an unwavering commitment to shaping the future of our workforce," Abbott said. "We must continue in our efforts to ensure Texans of all ages have access to high-quality education and workforce skills training that empowers them to achieve their full potential."

Abbott assigned Commissioners Mike Morath, Texas Education Agency; Harrison Keller, Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board; and Bryan Daniel, Texas Workforce Commission, to:

-Recommend strategies to ensure students are prepared for future growth at each stage in the educational pipeline;

-Ensure students who pursue higher education and workforce educational programs can complete those programs in a cost-efficient and timely manner;

—Analyze and make recommendations regarding strategies to streamline educational pathways, ensuring students can seamlessly transition into high-wage and high-demand careers;

—Improve the capacity within the state to produce credentials of value aligned with the needs of high-wage and high-demand occupations;

—Analyze and make recommendations to increase the supply of highly qualified and well-trained individuals entering the teaching profession across the state;

—Explore and recommend options for increasing economic activity in rural Texas, reducing regulatory burdens, and expanding educational partnerships between businesses, school districts and colleges; and

-Identify strategies to align agency operations, increase program efficiency, improve data analysis and capacity.

AG sues over travel ban

Texas is on a list of 11 states banned by a California law for state-funded travel. The law, Assembly Bill 1887, applies to states that since June 26, 2015, have enacted laws that discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expres-

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Feb. 10 filed an original action against the State of California in the U.S. Supreme Court, seeking to strike down the travel ban for states that uphold First Amendment protections for religious liberty.

What put Texas on California's list was HB 3859, a 2017 law allowing faith-based foster care and adoption agencies to decline placements they believe would violate their religious beliefs.

"Boycotting states based on nothing more than political disagreement breaks down the ability of states to serve as laboratories of democracy while still working together as one nation — the very thing our Constitution intended to prevent," Paxton said.

Revenue is distributed

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Feb. 12 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$1.04 billion in local sales tax allocations for February, which was 9.4% more than the amount distributed for February

The allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2019 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

In his announcement, Hegar pointed out that Christmas shopping typically occurring in November was shifted into December due to the relatively late date of Thanksgiving (Nov. 28), helping make the February allocations substantially higher than in previous months.

Report: Coronavirus case

The Texas Department of State Health Services reported Feb. 13 that the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has confirmed one case of COVID-19 in a person who has been under quarantine at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland since returning from China on a U.S. State Departmentchartered flight.

The individual reportedly is currently isolated and receiving medical care at a local hospital. Authorities said that because the patient has been under quarantine, the case does not change the risk of infection for people in San Antonio or other parts of Texas.

Meanwhile, federal and state health officials ask that travelers stay home, monitor themselves for symptoms and contact their health care provider if they develop fever, cough or shortness of breath within 14 days of being in China.

Almonds

In case you missed it, February 16th was National Almond Day. You may be a little late to celebrate on the actual day, but you are never too late for good recipes.

Almonds originated in Central and Southwest Asia, but soon spread especially along the "Silk Road." The trees grew near the road and fed the travelers along the way. This spread the almond to places like Spain, Morocco, Greece, and Israel. Soon areas in France, Italy, Portugal, Tunisia, and Turkey were also growing almonds. They first came to the United States in the 1700's with Spanish Franciscan Monks. They tried planting almond trees along the coast of California, but the trees did not flourish. By the next century, almond trees were moved inland. Today California produces 80% of the world's almonds which makes them the largest producer of almonds in the world.

Almonds have been eaten in nearly all ancient civilizations so it is no surprise it shows up in art, music, and literature. Even the Bible mentions almonds several times. The almond is an emblem of beauty, hope, and rebirth.

The almond is actually a stone fruit and related to the cherry, plum, and peach. Most trees are not self-pollinating and must be pollinated by bees. The almond trees bloom in February and March. As the almond kernel matures, it hardens and is protected by a fuzzy outer shell. In July, the shell begins to crack open to allow the nut inside to dry. The almonds are then harvested from the trees where they lay on the ground for further drying. Finally, the almonds are shelled and hulled, sized, and sent to storage until they are ready for distribution. All parts of the almond are used; the shell is used as animal bedding and the hull is used in animal feed.

Almonds are a very nutritious addition to one's diet. They are naturally cholesterol, gluten and dairy free. Also, almonds are high in protein with 6 grams per 1 ounce of nuts. Almonds are a great source of fiber, calcium, vitamin E, riboflavin, and magnesium. Heart healthy almonds have 13 grams of unsaturated fat and only one gram of saturated fat. They have a low glycemic index and help control cravings between meals.

Almonds can be enjoyed whole, blanched, sliced, or diced as well as using them as a flour, paste, butter, oil, or as a drink. For this week's recipes, I have compiled a simple menu using almonds. Crispy Almond Tilapia

Ingredients:

1 large egg

1/4 cup Louisiana-style hot sauce

3/4 cup slivered almonds, chopped and toasted

1/3 cup panko (Japanese) bread crumbs

1 teaspoon grated lemon zest

1 teaspoon seafood seasoning 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

4 tilapia fillets (4 ounces each)

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400°. Whisk together egg and hot sauce in a shallow bowl. In a separate shallow bowl, toss almonds, bread crumbs, lemon zest and spices. Halve fillets lengthwise; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Dip in egg mixture, then in almond mixture, patting to adhere; place on a greased or parchmentlined baking sheet. Bake until lightly browned and fish just begins to flake easily with a fork, 12-15 minutes.

Editor's Note:

To toast nuts, bake in a shallow pan in a 350° oven for 5-10 minutes or cook in a skillet over low heat until lightly browned, stirring occasionally.

Strawberry-Almond Salad with Basil-Balsamic Vinaigrette myrecipes.com

Ingredients:

1/3 cup chopped shallots (about 2) 1/3 cup balsamic vinegar

1/4 cup water

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 tablespoon honey 1/4 teaspoon pepper 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil 8 cups baby gourmet greens 1/2 cup sliced almonds, toasted

1/2 cup sliced red onion

1 (16-ounce) package fresh strawberries, sliced

How to Make It:

Process first 6 ingredients in a blender until blended. Stir in basil. Combine greens and remaining ingredients in a large bowl. Add dressing, and toss gently. Serve immediately.

Spanish Almond Cake www.thespruceeats.com

Ingredients:

6 large eggs


1 cup/200 grams of sugar (granulated) 7 ounce/200 grams ground almonds

1 lemon (zested) Garnish: powdered sugar

Steps to Make It:

Heat the oven to 360 F (180 C). Grease a springform pan approximately 8 inches (22 cm) in diameter. If a springform pan is not available, use a glass pie pan. Grind the almonds in a food processor or blender. Use slivered almonds with the skin removed to reduce preparation time. If using whole raw almonds, blanch first, then peel, dry and grind. You can also use already prepared almond flour. Grate the yellow part of the lemon peel, called the zest, using a "micro planer" or grater. Be careful to avoid the pith, the white, fibrous membrane underneath because it is bitter. Separate the yolks and whites of the eggs into two

medium-size mixing bowls. Pour granulated sugar into egg yolks and beat on high until yolks lighten in color and increase in volume. Add the ground almonds and lemon zest and mix well with a spoon or spatula. Beat the egg whites into stiff peaks in the other bowl. Then, carefully fold the whites into the egg yolk mixture. Gently pour the batter into the greased pan and bake on center rack for approximately 30 minutes, or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted in the center. Allow to cool, then run a knife around outside of a pan and unmold. Sprinkle top with powdered sugar before serving.

I Got My Shot; Why Am I Sick? Physicians Explain

The bottom line: Vaccines are our best protection against disease, but in some situations vaccinated people can still get sick. In the case of influenza, several factors can cause this. Nonetheless, physicians stress vaccines are the best form of protection, shielding many individuals from the disease or at least reducing the severity of symptoms, and preventing hospitalization or death.

Vaccines protect us from preventable diseases. However, why do some vaccinated people get sick anyway? Several factors determine a vaccine's effectiveness at protecting an individual, physicians say. While most vaccinations have high rates of effectiveness (even greater than 90% protection), others, like influenza, are less predictable. Vaccines protect us from prevent-

able diseases. However, why do some vaccinated people get sick anyway? Several factors determine a vaccine's effectiveness at protecting an individual, physicians say.

"Every year the [flu] virus changes, and scientists in laboratories have to try to figure out what the next strain of influenza will be, make the most educated guess, put those strains into the vaccine - and sometimes it's not a perfect match," said Austin internist, pediatrician, and infectious disease specialist David L. Lakey, MD, in a TMA video. "Sometimes the vaccine versus the strains of influenza that are circulating isn't perfect."

People with specific medical conditions such as heart disease, chronic lung disease, and cancer have a harder time fighting diseases and are at a higher risk of developing severe complications. Older people are also more susceptible to getting sick.

Some adults experience waning immunity - their immunity built up from child-hood vaccines diminishes. That's why they are strongly urged to keep up with their vaccinations, to give their immunity a boost.

"Patients that are diabetic, patients that have other things that immunocompromise them, individuals that are older, they don't have as robust a response to the vaccine," said Dr. Lakey, who serves on TMA's Council on Science and Public Health, in the video. "By immunizing those individuals, it protects them from having the severe cases."

People suffering from the flu can experience fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny or

stuffy nose, body aches, headaches, fatigue, and vomiting. If left untreated, some individuals may develop complications like pneumonia, which can be fatal. But the flu shot can minimize those symptoms if people get sick.

"It's also really good at preventing people from getting hospitalized, and so they may have a less severe case of influenza, still have the runny nose, fever, [but] may not end up in the hospital with influenza," Dr. Lakey explained. He added that if enough people get their shots, society is protected, a situation

immunity. This phenomenon "can decrease the number of people that are transmitting the virus and decrease the number of individuals that are going to infect me, my family, your family, from that circulating virus."

By getting your shots you can avoid getting sick altogether, or at least make the illness shorter, more bearable, and less dangerous.

In December 2019, area representatives from Bovina, Farwell, Friona, and Lazbuddie partnered with the U.S. Census Bureau to create a Census 2020 Complete Count Committee. This committee, chaired by Friona City Manager Lee Davila and Bovina City Manager Cesar Marquez, is comprised of about 20 individuals from the community, local schools, county offices and city governments. They are responsible for outreach and education for the 2020 Census in Parmer County. Their goal is to perform outreach to residents regarding the upcoming census and the benefits of an accurate count for each city. In the coming weeks, the Friona Star will assist them in sharing information about this year's census in order to encourage residents to promptly self-respond to the census, eliminating the time and tax dollars spent sending employees door-to-door to gather information. But first, here's a quick refresher of what the

census is and why it's essential for everyone to be counted.

Every ten years, the United States Census Bureau conducts a census to count the number of people living in the United States and determine the number of seats each state receives in the U.S. House of Representatives. Other uses of census data include political redistricting, distribution of federal funding, planning for infrastructure and social services, as well as understanding demographics changes in the country. The census can also assist Parmer County by helping fund school programs, attracting new businesses to the area, and improving health care programs. A complete and accurate count is essential to these efforts. The census is SAFE, EASY and IMPORTANT.
