#### TRANSFERS.

"Any child lawfully enrolled in any district or independent district may be transferred to the enrollment of any other district or independent district in the same county, upon the written application of the parent or guardian or person having the lawful control of such child, filed with the county superintendent at any time before the apportionment of the school fund by the county superintendent or county judge of any scholastic year, but not afterwards; and no child shall be transferred more than once; provided, the party making application for transfer shall state in said application that it is the bona fide intention of applicant to send child to the school to which transfer is asked. Upon the transfer of any child its portion of the school funds shall follow and be paid over to the district or independent district to which such child is transferred; provided, no transfers shall be made after August first, after the enrollment was made."

Note that "the party making application for transfer shall state in said applications that it is the bona fide intention of the applicant to send the child to the school to which transfer is asked and that no transfers shall be made after August first of each year.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

The county board of examiners of each county shall, if necessary, hold an examination the first Friday and the Saturday following of the month of May, July, August, September and December of each year. Said board of examiners shall use the questions prescribed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and shall conduct the examination in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed by the county superintendent and State superintendent of Public Instruction.

No county examination will be held in July this year for the reason that the law does not become effective until July 14 1905.

The printers have promised to deliver to the State Department of Education a new edition of the School Laws of Texas by August 1, 1905, a supply of which will be sent immediately to all county superintendents and ex-officio county superintendents without requisition. Teachers and trustees desiring copies of the school laws should apply to their county superintendent for them after August 1, 1905.

Hon. J. B. Jay, Clairemont, Texas. Dear Sir:

Within a few weeks work will begin again on the Dallas & New Mexico Ry. and the road will be pushed rapidly through to Roswell, N. M. its Western terminus.

As you are perhaps aware, we have sixty-three miles graded to a point in Wise county. From the end of this grade our engineers have suggested two routes. One through Seymour by way of Jacksboro and the other through Haskell by way of Graham. Each of these routes have many attractive features and each seems equally feasible. We are undecided as to which route will be adopted and have decided to the matter before the people living along each route. The section offering most for the line will get it.

If the lower route be adopted we would pass through or very near your town of Clairemont and it is by direction of our President that I write to ask what inducements your town and county will offer in the way of cash and land donations in order to secure the road.
