Alcohol petition gathering names

Proponents of legalizing the sale of alcoholic beverages in the City of Hedley were busy gathering signatures early this week and anticipate having no trouble reaching their goal.

Tonja Ruthardt, who owns of Uncle Bob's convenience store in Hedley, told the Enterprise this week she needs just 64 names of registered voters who cast ballots in the last governor's election in order to put the local option on this November's ballot.

"We have almost 50 signatures so far," Ruthardt said Tuesday morning. "I'm planning to be finished today."

Once the signatures are presented to the county, they will be certified by the tax assessor/collector's office, and then the commissioners' court orders an election, she said.

The Donley County Clerk's office said if a successful petition is presented, the question could be on the ballot during the next general election, which is on Tuesday, November 8, 2011.

Getting the required signatures has been easy so far, Ruthardt said.

"I have had not one person against it that I have come in contact with," Ruthardt said. "People understand our town needs the money."

Clarendon's Stage 4 Rules

Clarendon's mandatory restrictions for Stage Four are as follows:

1. Residential customers with odd-numbered street addresses water on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Residential customers with even-numbered street addresses water on Thursdays and Sundays. Commercial customers water on Tuesdays and Fridays. Irrigation of landscaped areas shall be limited to designated watering days between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and between 8 p.m. and 12:00 midnight and shall be by means of hand-held hoses, hand-held buckets, drip irrigation, or permanently installed automatic sprinkler system only. The use of hose-end sprinklers is prohibited at all times.
2. Use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle not occurring on the premises of a commercial car wash and commercial service stations and not in the immediate interest of public health, safety, and welfare is prohibited. Further, such vehicle washing at commercial car washes and commercial service stations shall occur only between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and between 6:00 p.m. and 10 p.m.
3. Avoid filling swimming pools except during the above watering hours.
4. Avoid operating ornamental fountains unless necessary to support aquatic life or if equipped with a recirculation system.
5. Do not water-wash driveways, sidewalks, and other hard-surfaced areas. Do not wash down buildings or structures except for immediate fire protection.
6. Repair all leaks as soon as possible, and report any leaks or unauthorized usage to City Hall. Night and weekend emergency leaks should be reported to the Donley County Sheriff's Office at 806.874.3533. Persons found guilty of violating Clarendon's Stage 4 rules can face a maximum fine of \$500.

Clarendon declares Stage Four drought

The water level at Greenbelt Lake continues to decline this week, prompting the City of Clarendon to move into Stage Four of its drought contingency plan. The City of Hedley remains at Stage Three.

Greenbelt Water Authority reported a lake depth of 47.20 feet Tuesday, which is down from 47.48 feet last week.

Members of the Greenbelt Board of Directors discussed the falling lake level during their regu-

lar meeting last Thursday, August 18, but took no action pending the results of a long term engineering analysis of the reservoir. That report, which is expected in October, will look at the future of the lake and is also supposed to identify alternative sources of water to meet long-term needs.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd told the board that the authority's member cities - Clarendon, Childress, Crowell,

Quanah, and Hedley - had all showing cutbacks in water usage, and he recommended not enacting further restrictions or implementing a system of water allotments at this time.

"I think we need to give our engineers a chance to report," Kidd told the board, "and I think people will do more to conserve if they can make their own choices how to do it."

Greenbelt hit Stage Four of its

own drought plan on August 2 when the reservoir's depth fell to 48.0 feet. The plan continues to call on Greenbelt customers to try to reduce water usage by 30 percent.

Kidd said he believes most people have given up on watering outside and thinks that summer coming to an end will help on water usage. He also said the Georgia Pacific plant near Quanah - one of Greenbelt's biggest industrial customers - is exploring ways to cut its

water usage.

Clarendon City Administrator Lambert Little attended the Greenbelt board meeting and said he was pleased with the cooperation his citizens were showing in Stage Three as he announced his intention to declare Stage Four.

Hedley City Secretary Jason Conatser says his community was remaining on Stage Three until he could have a meeting with the mayor this week.

Babcock bond still \$1 million Messer sets date for trial to begin

A \$1 million bond remains in place for accused child murderer Robert Babcock following a district court hearing in Clarendon last Thursday, August 18.

Babcock is charged with Capital Murder in the January 5 death of his son, four-year-old Chance Mark Jones. During last week's court appearance it was revealed that his attorneys plan to pursue an insanity defense, and they are seeking additional psychological and neurological evaluations of their client.

Babcock's mother, Gayle Edes, took the stand during the bond reduction hearing and testified that neither she nor her son have the resources to put up the \$100,000 cash necessary to secure his bond. District Attorney Luke Inman questioned Edes about her relationship with Jones.

Inman also presented to the court the details of the original complaint against Babcock and brought up other cases in Texas where bonds were not reduced.

Judge Stuart Messer maintained the \$1 million bond, citing the seriousness of the offense and the defendant's intent to pursue an insanity defense.

"I find the \$1 million bond is appropriate to assure a court appearance and for the safety of the community," Messer said.

The court also considered a separate \$100,000 bond for Babcock on an undicted domestic violence charge, and Messer reduced that to a personal recognizance bond.

Also during last week's court appearance, Judge Messer set two more pre-trial dates - one on October 4 and another on November 29 - and schedule Babcock's trial to begin January 17, 2012.

CC Regents okay \$8.9 million budget

Clarendon College Regents approved an \$8.9 million budget for Fiscal Year 2012 during their regular meeting Thursday, August 18.

The overall budget includes a previously approved increase in tuition and deals with about \$400,000 of lost funding from state budget cuts, college officials say.

CC Dean of Administrative Services Annette Ferguson said the college will lose more than \$100,000 in revenue from the state cutting funds to classes in prisons in Childress and Pampa but said CC hopes to make up that loss with a

new nursing program in Childress.

The college is also bearing a greater share of the cost for employee health benefits and is paying a new one percent surcharge fee to participate in the state's retirement program.

CC President Phil Shirley said the budget reflects the fact that state funding for higher education continues to wane, shifting the cost of education more to the student.

College employees won't be getting a raise in the new budget, but Shirley said the college will pay a \$400 stipend to employees on

December 15.

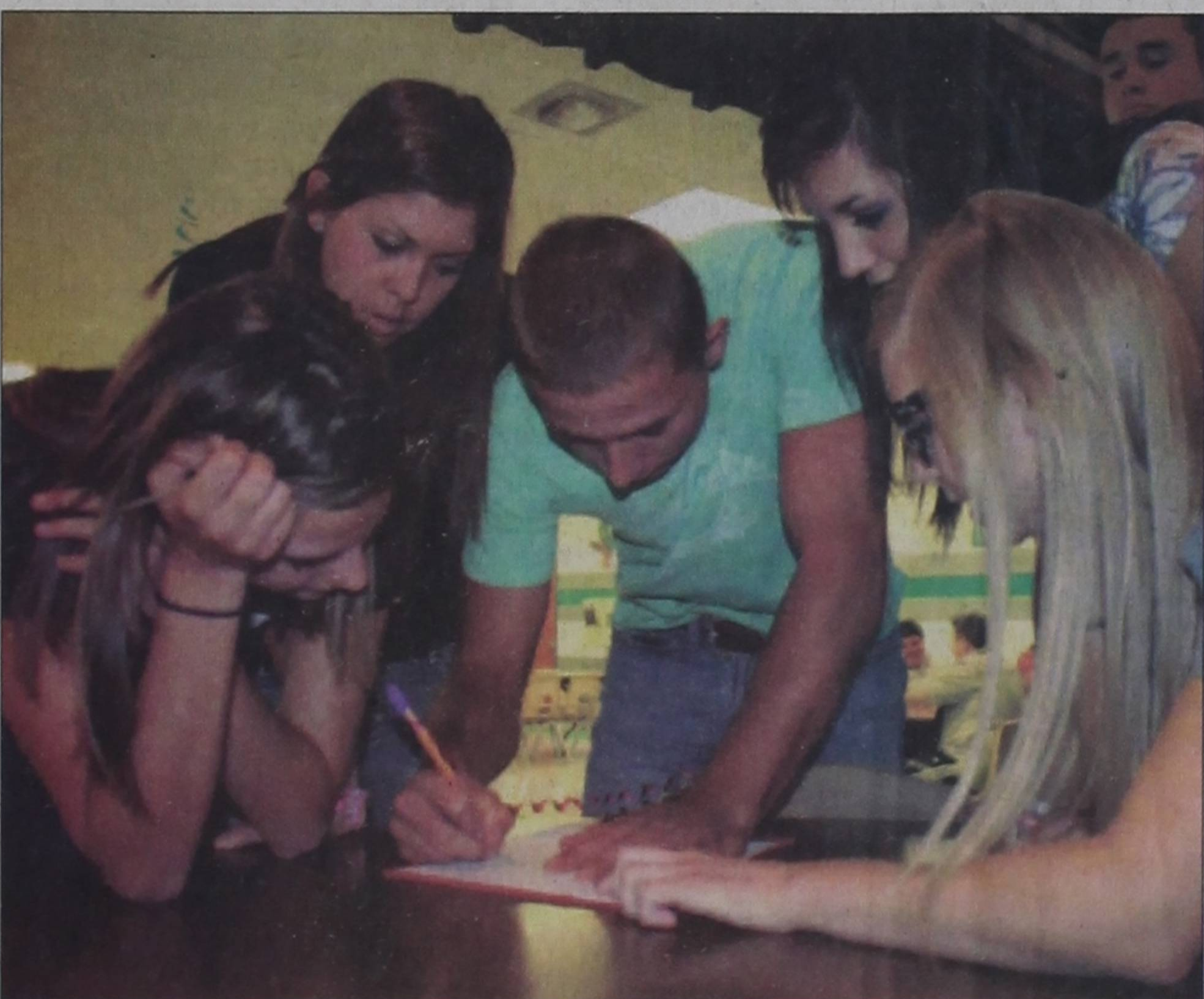
"We wanted to do something to show we appreciate them by some monetary means," the president said. "We wish it could be more."

To support the new budget, the Clarendon College District is proposing adopting the effective tax rate of \$0.2221 per \$100 valuation, which would bring in the same local tax revenue as last year of approximately \$400,000. The current tax rate is \$0.2219. Regents will consider and adopt a tax rate next month.

No one attended a public

budget hearing held immediately prior to the board meeting.

In other college business, Regents acknowledged the resignations of baseball coach Mike Silva and library director Reagan Silva; approved the hiring of cashier Sharon Jones; and acknowledged the assignment of new duties to faculty members Melissa McCoy as division director and Dr. Robert Taylor as administrative assistant to the Dean of Institutional Research. The board also voted to extend the bank depository contract with Her-ring Bank by two years.

Texas' agriculture losses reach record \$5.2 billion

COLLEGE STATION - The historic Texas drought has led to a record \$5.2 billion in agricultural losses, making it the most costly drought on record, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service economists.

"The drought of 2011 will have a lasting impact on Texas agriculture," said Dr. Travis Miller, AgriLife Extension agronomist and a member of the Governor's Drought Preparedness Council.

"This drought is ongoing," said Dr. David Anderson, AgriLife Extension livestock economist. "Further losses will continue if rainfall does not come soon to establish this year's winter wheat crop and wheat grazing."

The \$5.2 billion in losses exceeds the previous record of \$4.1 billion during the 2006 drought. The losses also represent 27.7 percent of the average value of agricultural production over the last four years, Anderson said.

The current drought losses have reached record levels in large part due to Texas farmers failing to cash in crops

during times of high commodity prices, economists said. The state's cattle producers continue to cull herds at historic levels and spend money on expensive supplemental feed.

"Livestock losses include the increased cost of feeding due to lack of pastures and ranges and market losses," Anderson said. "Market losses include the impact of fewer pounds sold per calf and the impact of lower market prices due to the large number of cattle sold in a very short time period."

The following are losses by commodity:

Livestock: \$2.06 billion (includes \$1.2 billion previously reported in May); Lost hay production value: \$750 million; Cotton: \$1.8 billion; Corn: \$327 million; Wheat: \$243 million; Sorghum: \$63 million;

To remain comparable to past drought loss estimates, last Wednesday's loss estimates do not include losses to fruit and vegetable producers, horticultural and nursery crops, or other grain and

row crops.

"In that regard, these estimates are considered conservative," Anderson said.

The \$5.2 billion total released Wednesday takes into account \$1.2 billion in drought losses previously reported by AgriLife Extension in May, which were primarily livestock-related losses due to added supplemental costs and lost grazing.

"The drought began for much of the state in September 2010," Miller said. "Much of the Gulf Coast, Central, West Texas and the High Plains had seen abundant moisture in the summer from Tropical Storm Hermine and other rainfall events. An unusually strong La Nina pattern moved into place in the fall of 2010, which had an impact comparable to turning off the 'rainfall switch' for most of Texas and surrounding states."

October 2010 through July 2011 was the driest 10-month period in recorded Texas weather, Miller said.

"The drought, coupled with prolonged high winds and record temperatures were enormously destructive to Texas agriculture and natural resources," he said. "The summer rains caused grass growth, which provided fuel for an unprecedented fire season, with more than 3.3 million acres of Texas ravaged by wildfire."

"This destructive climatic pattern has taken a huge toll on crops and forages, and the timing could not have been worse for Texas producers, as all of the major agricultural commodities are enjoying strong prices."

Combined losses for wheat, corn and sorghum grain farmers in Texas due to drought are more than \$600 million. Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension grains economist, said Texas wheat production in 2011 is about half what it would have been in a normal year.

"Wheat yields were down from a five-year average of 30 bushels to 26 bushels per acre and abandonment was up," he said. "Given this year's plantings of 5.7 million acres, we would have harvested 2.8 million in a normal year. In 2011, harvested acreage is estimated at only 2 million

acres, down 800,000 acres. The combination of yield losses on harvested acres and higher abandonment put Texas wheat-for-grain losses at \$243 million."

Texas corn production is estimated to be down about 30 percent in 2011, Welch said, with harvested acres down 16 percent due to higher abandonment rates.

"Yields are down 16 percent statewide," he said. "Highlighting the severity of this year's heat and dry conditions is that the most severe yield losses are seen in the irrigated corn grown in the Panhandle. The average corn yield in the northern High Plains is estimated at 165 bushels per acre compared to a five-year average of 205 bushels, down 40 bushels per acre. Yield losses and abandonment will cost Texas corn producers \$327 million in 2011."

Grain sorghum production in Texas, according to Welch, is expected to be about half of normal in 2011. The 1.6 million acres planted spring marked the lowest in Texas history.

"Then drought lowered yields and raised abandonment rates," he said. "The drought estimates for sorghum reported are based only on the yield and harvested acreage estimates from U.S. Department of Agriculture. This totals about \$63 million."

Meanwhile, Texas cotton growers faced unprecedented impacts from drought in 2011, said Dr. John Robinson, AgriLife Extension cotton economist. Robinson said in August USDA projected "a relatively low average cotton yield of 636 pounds per harvested acre" in addition to a "historically high abandonment of 52 percent."

"Compared to five-year average yields and abandonment, 2011 represents a huge loss in potential production," Robinson said. "Applied to USDA's measure of 7.1 million planted cotton acres in Texas, and valued at their projected price of 95 cents per pound, this loss adds up to \$1.8 billion. "It's that \$1.8 billion is also the 10-year average total value of cotton lint and cottonseed production in Texas. So, Texas cotton growers lost as much market income in 2011 as they would normally make

for an entire cotton crop."

"Perhaps the most telling thing about the 2011 drought was that even irrigated farmers were not spared," Miller said. "While most Texas irrigation systems work well in normal or even below normal rainfall, many irrigators found that water supplies were not able to provide all of the water requirements of the crop in the absence of any rain and excessive heat. By mid-July, farmers began to try to stop (economic) losses, dedicating all of their water supplies to a reduced amount of acres as water demand from the crops was higher than their ability to supply it."

The following is economic drought losses from 1998 through 2011: 2011 - \$5.2 billion; 2009 - \$3.6 billion; 2008 - \$1.4 billion; 2006 - \$4.1 billion; 2002 - \$316 million; 2000 - \$1.1 billion; 1999 - \$223 million; 1998 - \$2.4 billion.

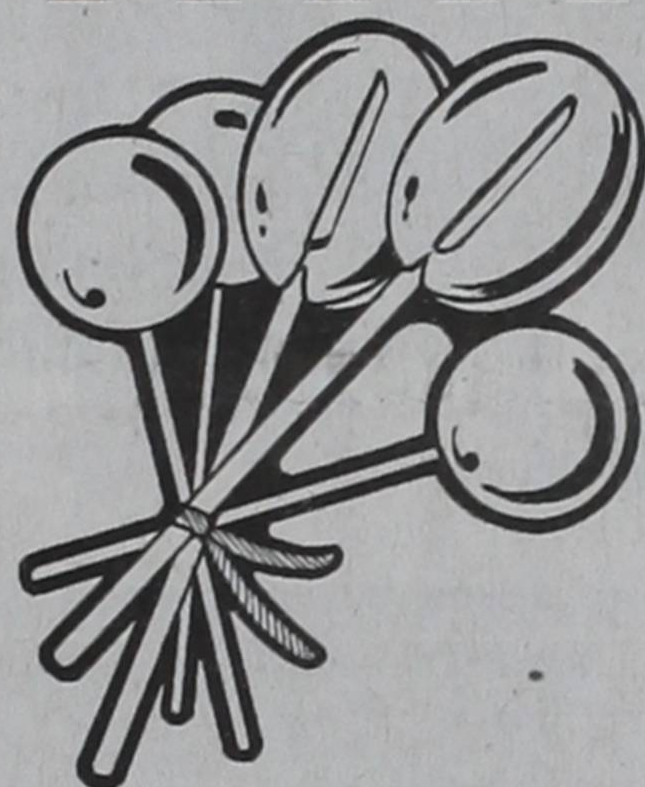

Clarendon Church of Christ 3 POINTS ABOUT SIN

I want to make a few points about sin from Psalm 32. It is written by David, and the background is his sin with Bathsheba. As you know, David took another man's wife and impregnated her. He then killed her husband, Uriah, to cover it up. David is a hero of the Bible but obviously a man with flaws. I always wondered how he could be so seemingly callous about what he did. When you read Psalm 32, he agonized over what he did. Let's look at 3 lessons about sin from David's Psalm 32.

1. Forgiveness is a Great Blessing. (Psalms 32:1-2) "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, Whose sin is covered. Blessed is the man to whom the LORD does not impute iniquity, And in whose spirit there is no deceit." If you have ever done wrong, being forgiven by someone is one of the most uplifting experiences you can have, especially if it is God doing the forgiving. David longed for the relief he would have once he was forgiven. Of course, he like the rest of us, didn't want to admit to his sin. It took God sending Nathan to him before he would confess. Once he confessed his sin, God forgave.

2. Carrying Sin is a Huge Burden. (Psalms 32:3-4) "When I kept silent, my bones grew old Through my groaning all the day long. For day and night Your hand was heavy upon me; My vitality was turned into the drought of summer." Our God-given conscience will weigh heavily upon us while carrying a sin. The longer we stay in sin, the worse the feeling gets. David describes the situation like a long summer of drought. We know that feeling! It seems that it will never end. Unlike drought, this burden can be lifted at any moment. All we must do is turn back to God, and He will relieve us of this burden.

3. There is Comfort in Knowing That God Will Forgive. (Psalms 32:5-7) "I acknowledged my sin to You, And my iniquity I have not hidden. I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the LORD.' And You forgave the iniquity of my sin. For this cause everyone who is godly shall pray to You in a time when You may be found; Surely in a flood of great waters They shall not come near him. You are my hiding place; You shall preserve me from trouble; You shall surround me with songs of deliverance." Our first point was that it is a blessing to be forgiven. This point is that it is comforting to know that anytime we want to get right with God about our sin. He promises to forgive. There is no excuse for any of us to hold our sin inside for fear that God would reject us. Like the father for the prodigal son, God is waiting with outstretched arms for us to "come home."

I pray that we would all trust God to help us in our spiritual needs. He loves us and provided a way for all to be cleansed of sin. That Way is Jesus Christ. There is no need to bear the burden of guilt when God wants to help. Turn to God and He will lift you up.

Hedley Owls to take on Pirates Friday night

A healthier group of boys made the trip from Hedley to Silverton Friday, August 19, to scrimmage the Silverton Owls and the Lazbuddie Longhorns. For many it was their first look at competition outside of practice.

Head coach Adam Cline said, "We looked better than we did a week ago. There are still plenty of things to correct but all in all we are miles ahead of where we were last week."

One area of obvious improvement was the play of the defense. After giving up 11 scores in four scrimmages last week the Owls held Silverton and Lazbuddie to a combined two scores.

The Owls will travel to Lefors on Thursday, August 25, to start their season. Kickoff will be at 7:00 p.m. The Owls first home game will be September 9 at 7:30 versus the McLean Tigers.

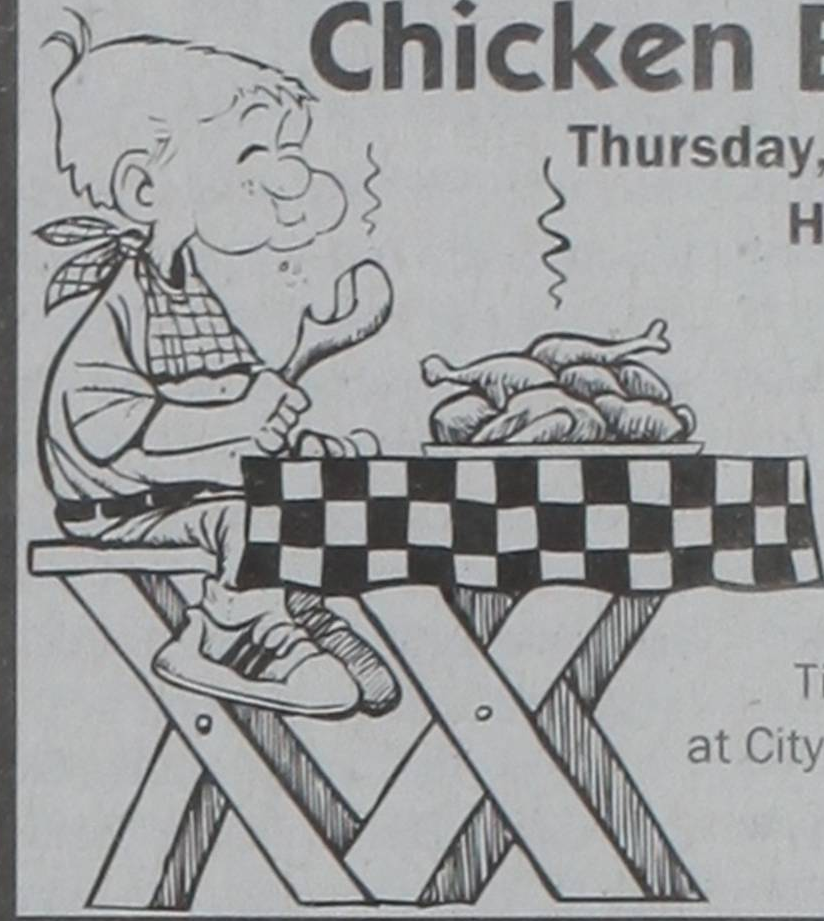

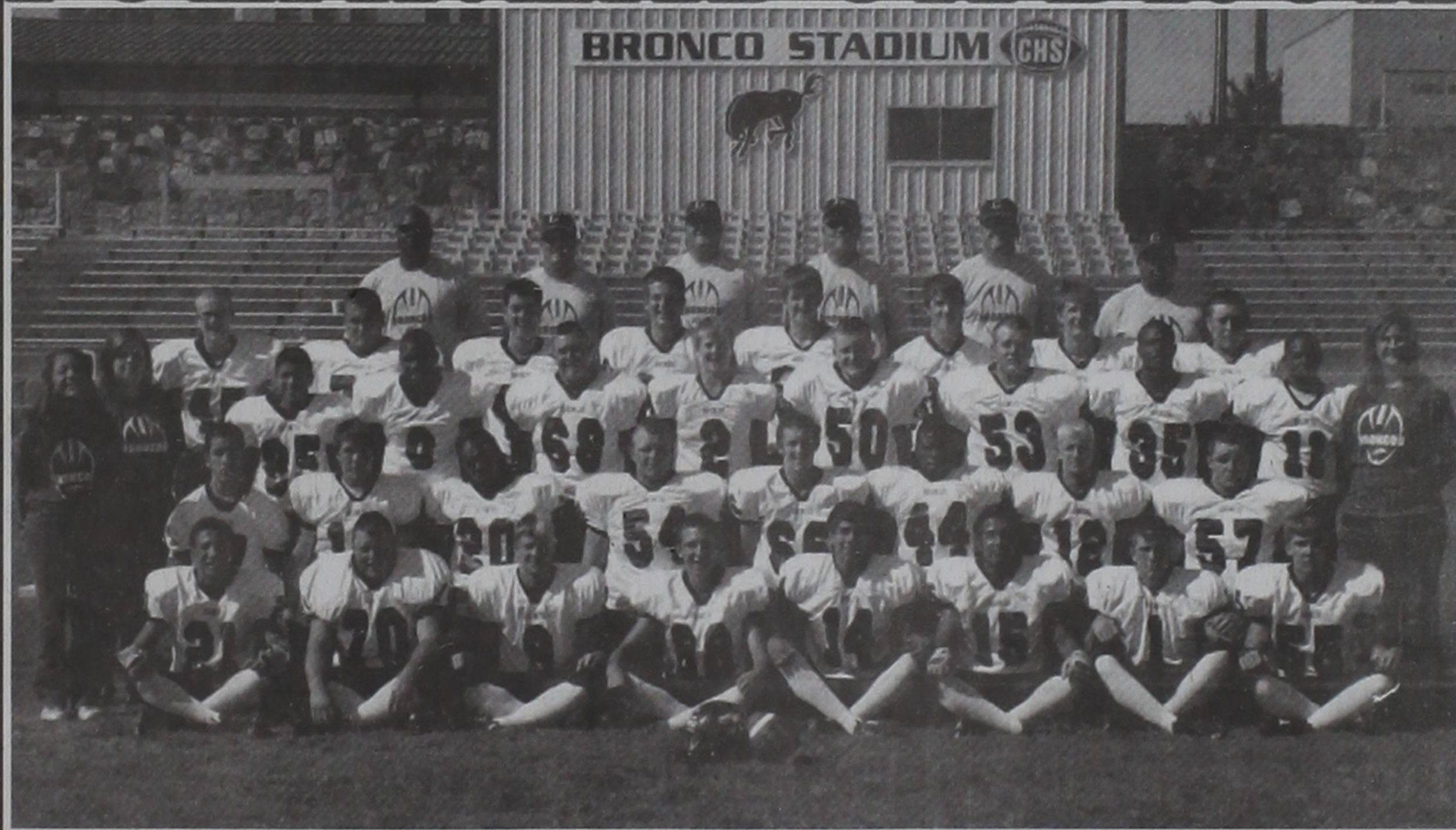

Former Clarendon resident celebrates 101st birthday

Edna Dishman was born on August 26, 1910. I kind of like the term Pioneer Spirit when I think of her for she exhibited this spirit in the many phases of her life. The following are some thoughts she shared with me recently, and I would like to share them with you.

Edna remembers some exciting times from when she was a little girl. Colonel Goodnight was a founding father of the Panhandle of Texas. In fact, a little town along 287 is called Goodnight, Texas. Edna in her pre-teens would go to Mrs. Goodnight's two story house on the ranch. Mrs. Goodnight would take Edna up to the second floor, and they would peer out the window as Indians would line buffalo along the fence and prepare to shoot them with bows and arrows and finally stab the beasts. She was not scared by this, but said, "I always thought this was cruel to kill the buffalo, but I knew they needed to have meat and needed to make their clothes. In fact, Colonel Goodnight had Indians working for him on the JA Ranch."

"Were you ever scared," I asked. Edna emphatically said, "No."

In 1915, she was scared at times when transients would come knocking at their door. Her father was known around town for being generous to others, and people heard about this.

One time a man came to the

door when Edna was a little girl, and he really frightened her. Times were really tough during the time leading up to the Great Depression. At times, the Dishman family had little money, but love and the pioneer spirit held them together.

"Community efforts got us through, working together", Edna said.

A key thing was that Sunday was the Lord's Day. When her family would receive rations to survive on, at times, Edna's father would give away their rations to a more, needier family. Sometimes all they had for dinner was cornbread. Edna's parents could not afford to get her a doll, so she had to make a rag doll.

Edna dated on horseback. She met Elmer Dishman at a Baptist church. Edna was attracted to Elmer because another girl was interested in him. Edna did date Elmer Dishman as he would court her on horseback. They were married and had a beautiful life and family together for 59 years.

In 1992, Edna and Elmer were in a tragic car accident. She lived, but her life partner was lost. Faith in her Heavenly Father was all she needed to see her through this time. She told me the biggest leap of faith was deciding to sell her lifelong belongings and move to Dallas to live in a high rise on Turtle Creek. She was excited to move in the same building her daughter, Jo Adams, lives

in. Her son, Keith was instrumental in helping her make this transition to Dallas. This was a time when she

put her whole faith in God to move forward. Once she did this, all things fell into place. Edna told me there is

a plan for everything, and she has a plan for being here on earth, and she would continue to fulfill this plan.

This Baptist girl noticed city life was a lot different than the small town of Clarendon, Texas, that she had left behind. Edna was surprised that not one Baptist minister ever came by to see her in her new Dallas life.

She did not have a church home and this bothered the woman of faith greatly. A friend asked her to go with her to a performance of an international men's choir at a United Methodist Church. When she walked in, she knew she had found a home! In her excitement, she began to tell her daughter, Jo Adams, about her new church. Edna urged her daughter to go with her one Sunday. Jo fell in love with the people of the Methodist church, and Edna and her daughter found their church home.

Edna touches my life in so many ways. Last year, she was a vocal member on Grace's You Can Make It video, encouraging the teens not to give up, life is too much fun, live it! Her strength, her light, her faith led me through a dark valley of my life. I can visit on the phone with her and realize an hour has past. I cannot wait to see her place and her tomato plants and garden on the balcony. I asked her what her favorite songs were and she said they are too many to tell. All of a sudden I heard her singing on the phone "I'd Rather

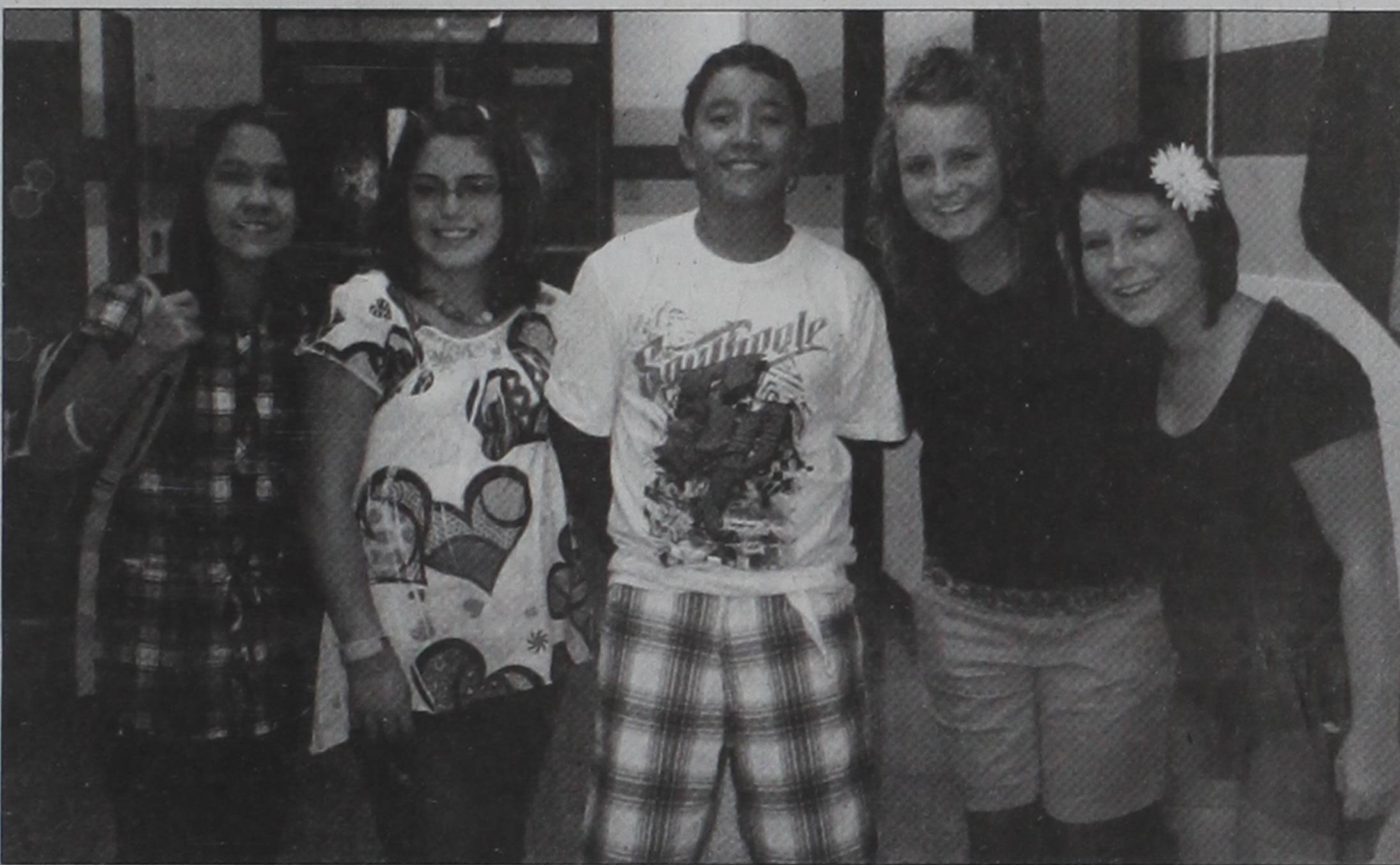
Have Jesus Than Anything." I will never forget this precious moment in time, or her sweet voice of faith.

Edna, you are truly my Pioneer of the Panhandle! Happy 101st Birthday!

Closing Quote (by Edna 08/14/11): Edna passed a note in church to me. Here is what it says: "God's Saving Power" - There is no rut so deep you cannot leave it, no dream so lost you cannot retrieve it, no pain so great you cannot endure it, no sin so bad God can not cure it."

Pathfinders celebrate 50 years in 1961

As part of this midcentury celebration, the minutes tell us that the club secretary, Mrs. Lee Holland, read the club's first meeting's minutes and list of charter members. How I wish her copy had been left in the official records.

The Patching Club House at 620 S. Koogle was the main meeting place for the pathfinders at this time. Fred G. Patching, Sr. had traded Jack SoRelle's father a section of land for the large house that would later be bequeathed to the federated club ladies of Clarendon. During this decade, maintenance was a major concern with the several ladies' clubs sharing expenses of upkeep on the lawn, an air conditioner installation, an upstairs bride's room provision, and crystal and silver dishes purchased for various social activities. These expenses may have accounted for doubling annual dues from \$1.25 to \$2.50. The Club House was also rented out for wedding showers, receptions, and more to defray expenses.

This decade saw more outside speakers being brought in to share information. In February of 1964, Mr. Bright Newhouse gave a program on Soil Conservation and appeared before the ladies and showed the Cotton John film, *Go See the Land*. Family members continued to be recruited to perform. The very next year in February Club Treasurer Genoah Lowe was in charge of the program. Her talk began with "the earth is the Lord's and all there in" stating that we have laws to live by but mainly God's laws. Her main topic pertained to trees with express the beauty, uses and presentation by and for men. Her son, Douglas, a Soil Conservation worker from Wellington presented the film entitled, *The Earth is the Lord's*. He finished his part on the program with the Soil

Conservation Creed and a poem entitled "Dirt" which concluded that, next to God, dirt reigned supreme. Music continued to be a feature of meetings. In December 1962, Miss Cindy Lowe played two piano selections for her mother and grandmothers' fellow members.

Some of our projects were more successful than others. Wanda Phelan urged all members to have their houses numbered and their street markers in place so that Clarendon might be eligible for free mail delivery. We are still waiting for that free home delivery. This was at a time when our phone numbers consisted of two or three numbers and a letter. Do any of you remember the slogan "A Million and One for '61" that referred to the drive to buy and install safety seat belts for our vehicles? Pathfinders took this drive seriously. In 1961, one of our meetings was held in the new home of Mae Noblett at 601 S. Cottage and included a house tour.

Our memorials for this decade read like an Outstanding Women of Clarendon list.

Mrs. Lena (George) Antrobus joined the Pathfinders in 1940. She was given special recognition as being the oldest active club member of the federation at 92 years.

Mrs. Jessica Patching, Jr. (Fred) joined Pathfinders in 1951 and died at age 63 in 1960.

Mrs. Beulah Dodson McMurry (J.L.) joined the Pathfinders in 1925 and was an active and faithful member until her passing April 16, 1962.

Mrs. Allie Graves Patman (J.T.) belonged from 1926 until her death June 18, 1963. Ruth Robinson remembers her aunt Allie as being an artist, Sunday school teacher of the Win One class at the Methodist Church, and a wonderful cook. As Sheriff Patman's wife, she pre-

pared meals for the occupants of the county jail including that last meal for George Miller before his necktie party.

Mrs. Lean (Cap) Morris during her lifetime was actively involved in PTA, band parents, Mother's Club, and Methodist Missionary Society. She sponsored the Home Economics Dept. and the Beta Sigma Phi Mu Gamma Chapter. She was a Girl Scout and Camp Fire leader and taught Sunday School. Mrs. Morris served in all the officers and was Worthy Matron of the Clarendon Chapter 6 of the Eastern Star. She had joined Pathfinders in 1939. Her proudest accomplishments were Carl, Jr., Naomi (Green), John Miller, and Mae. She left this earth in 1964.

Miss Ruth Richardson was the Donley County School Superintendent and a 16-year member of Pathfinders when she passed away in 1966.

Mrs. Edna (Ed) Dishman joined Pathfinders in 1935 and deceased in 1967.

Mrs. Willetta Cole (A.T.) and her young husband, Abram, moved to Clarendon in 1902 where he was an attorney for the railroad. They moved in to the large impressive Victorian house at 520 E. Third when the saloon keeper who had built it went out of business due to Clarendon being voted dry. In 1911, Willetta joined a group of other women dedicated to educating themselves and others in forming the Pathfinder Study Club. Mrs. Judge Cole held every office in the club and opened her beautiful home for regular meetings and special occasions until her death in 1969.

I wonder if any of the Pathfinders of 1961 celebrating their 50th anniversary could have imagined how life in Clarendon, Texas, would be when we observed our centennial.

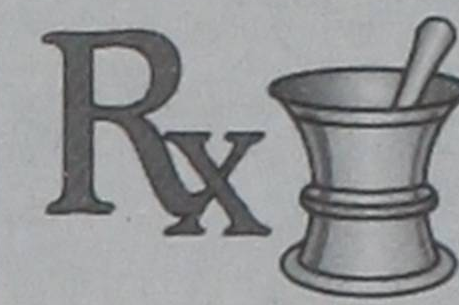


Drugs in the News

Study to Evaluate Treatment for Blindness

The Foundation Fighting Blindness recently announced that their organization was launching a study of a currently approved prescription drug to evaluate its ability to slow the loss of vision in persons with a condition called retinitis pigmentosa. The drug to be evaluated is valproic acid. Two clinical testing centers will be used. The evaluation will require participants to visit one of the two centers for approximately seven times during the period they will self-administer the drug in the form of ingestible capsules. An eye wellness newsletter recently reported work at the University of Massachusetts that showed low doses of valproic acid (an anticonvulsant type medicine that is also used for bipolar disorders) produced positive results in persons with macular degeneration.

Retinitis pigmentosa is an inherited or genetic disorder in which the structure of the eye called the retina degenerates. In some, the retina may degenerate gradually over years or decades to a condition of partial or complete blindness. Nutritional therapies including vitamin A are effective for some individuals.

New homestead application laws announced

Beginning next month, individuals seeking to apply for a homestead exemption in Texas will need to comply with a new application process.

The recent session of the Texas Legislature imposed rigorous new standards of mandatory disclosure for those property owners who apply for any one of several kinds of homestead exemptions starting September 1.

In order to receive a homestead exemption for property tax purposes, applicants must now provide a copy of their Texas driver's license or Texas state-issued identification card and a copy of their vehicle registration receipt with their application for a homestead exemption. Moreover, the addresses shown on each of the documents must be the same as the address for which the homestead exemption is sought.

Those who do not own a vehicle will be required to submit a notarized affidavit certifying that fact and provide a copy of a current bill received from a utility company. The address on the utility bill must be the same as

the address on the application for a homestead exemption.

The Legislature has closed loopholes in disclosure that allowed some citizens to obtain homestead exemptions on more than one property. The Legislature has also authorized central appraisal districts to gain access to the database of the Texas Department of Public Safety so that differences in addresses reported for driver's license and property tax reasons can be audited electronically.

The new requirement that takes effect on September 1 is required for any one of the several ways property owners can qualify for a residential property homestead. These include the following:

- General residential exemption
- Over-65 exemption
- Disability exemption
- 100% disabled veterans exemption
- Extension of exemption for a surviving spouse
- Exemption for manufactured (mobile) home

Each of the programs cited above have additional requirements for qualification. However, the

common standard is that all such applicants must provide the additional documentation as noted before regarding driver's license, Texas issued identification card, motor vehicle registration, and utility billing receipt.

For those seeking homestead exemption status on a manufactured home, the applicant must also provide documentation as noted below:

- Statement of ownership and location issued by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs
- A copy of the purchase contract or payment receipt that the applicant is the purchaser of the manufactured home, OR, a sworn affidavit that:

1. The applicant is the owner of the manufactured home;
2. The seller of the manufactured home did not provide the applicant with a purchase contract, and
3. The applicant could not locate the seller after making a good faith effort.

Applications dated and submitted to the Donley Appraisal District by August 31, 2011 will be processed under the pre-September 1 guidelines.

This year the TILF awarded 452 new scholarships and will renew approximately 188 multi-year awards for a total of 640 scholarships being distributed during the 2011-12 academic year, with value of approximately \$1.2 million.

Recipients must attend any approved college or university in Texas.

vocabulary at the 2009 and 10 UIL Academic State Meets. She also participated in UIL mathematics, calculator applications and TSSEC throughout her high school career.

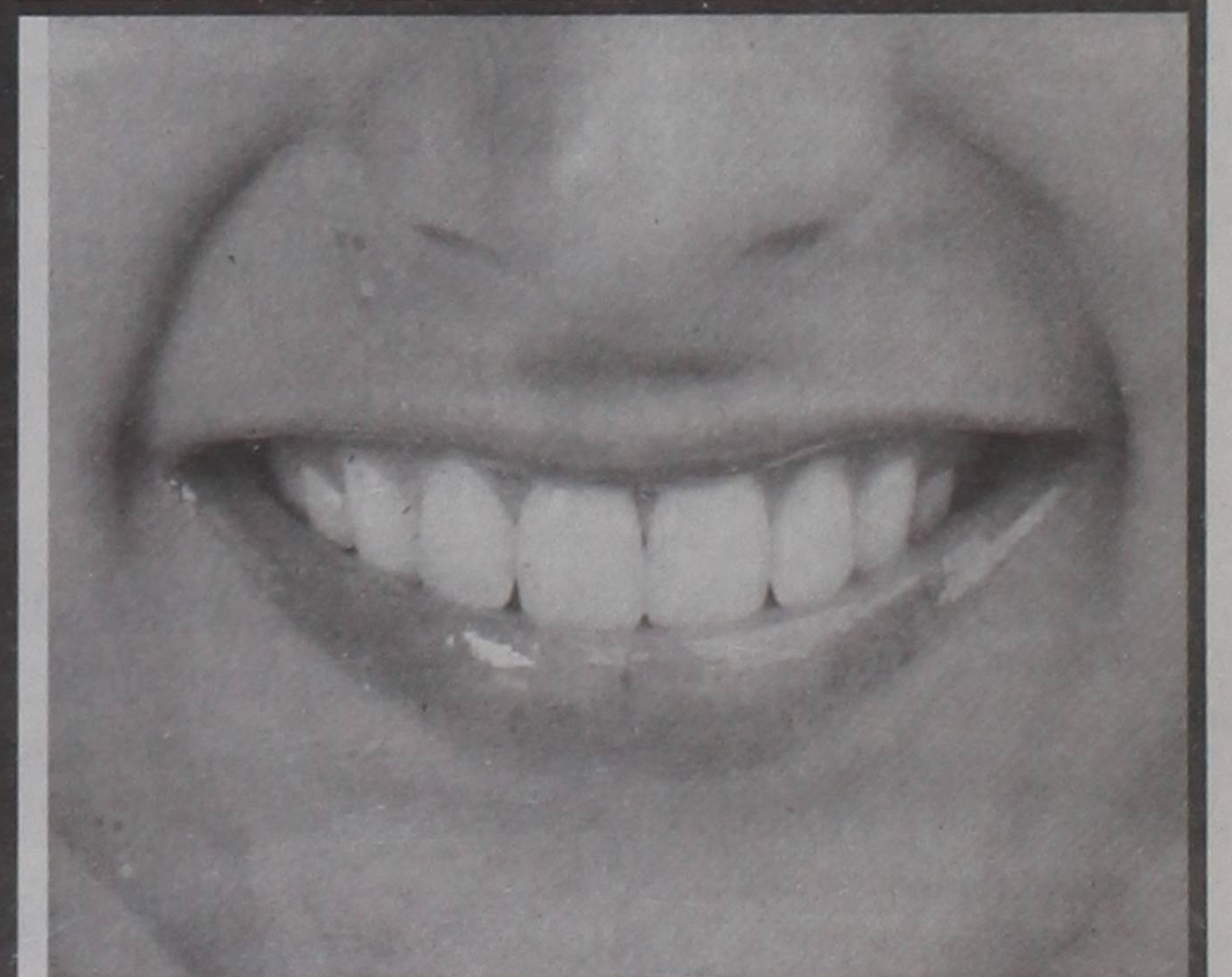

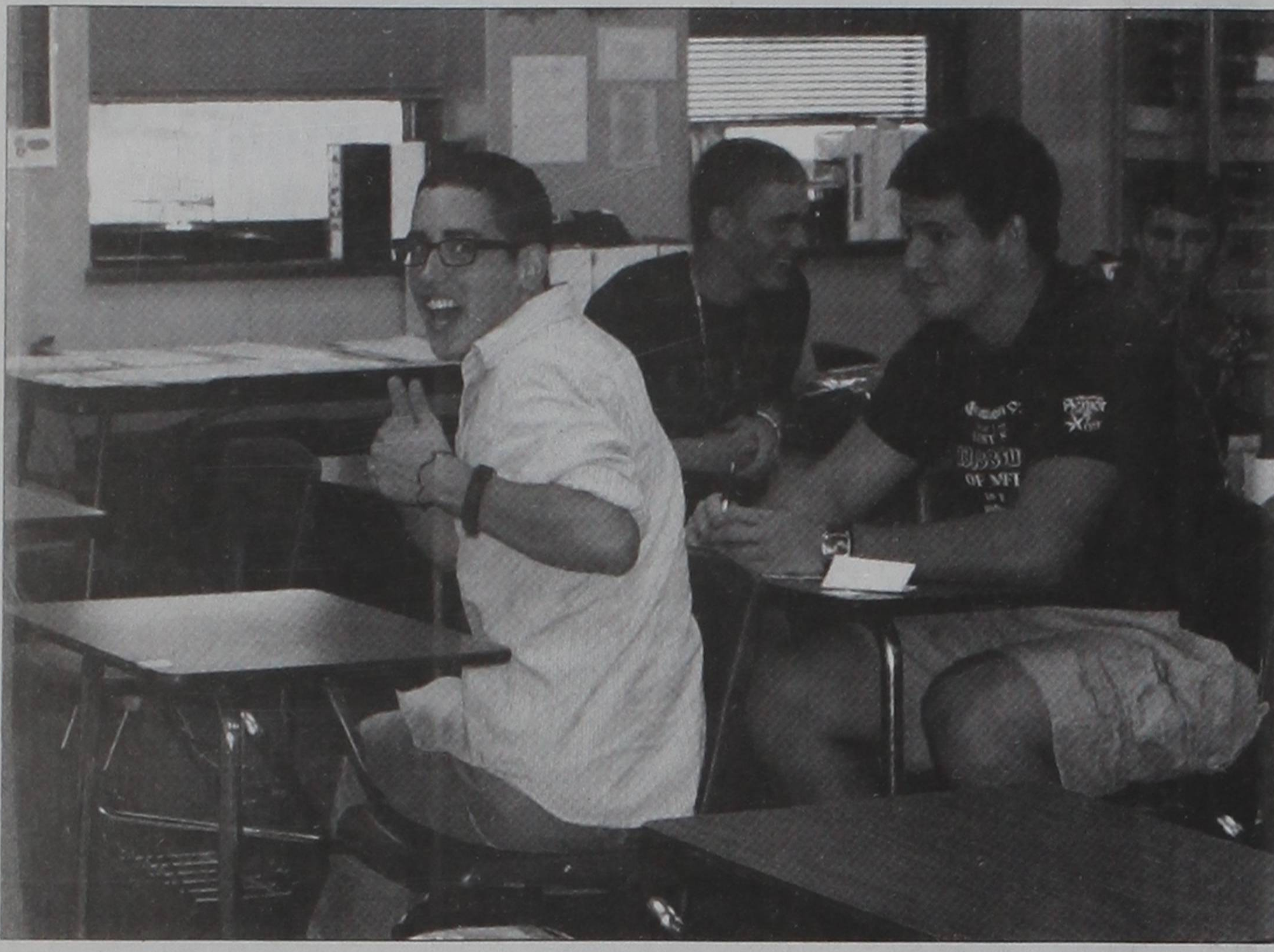

Court hears plea

The 100th Judicial District Court heard a plea from David Wade Deatherage, resulting in his conviction, when the court met in Clarendon last Thursday, August 18.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the case for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Deatherage was placed on probation for a period of ten years for the third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated 3rd or more. Deatherage was convicted and sentenced to ten years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ, but the sentence was probated for a period of ten years.

Deatherage, 28-year-old resident from Calvin, OK, was arrested in Donley County on May 12, 2011 by DPS Trooper Kellan Roberts and was later indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury on June 29, 2011 for driving while intoxicated.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Deatherage is required to pay a \$5,000 fine to Donley County, and is also required to pay \$558 in court costs, \$140 in restitution, 200 hours of community service, along with DWI requirements mandated by law.

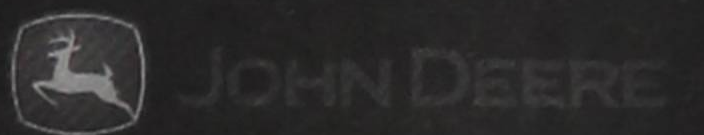
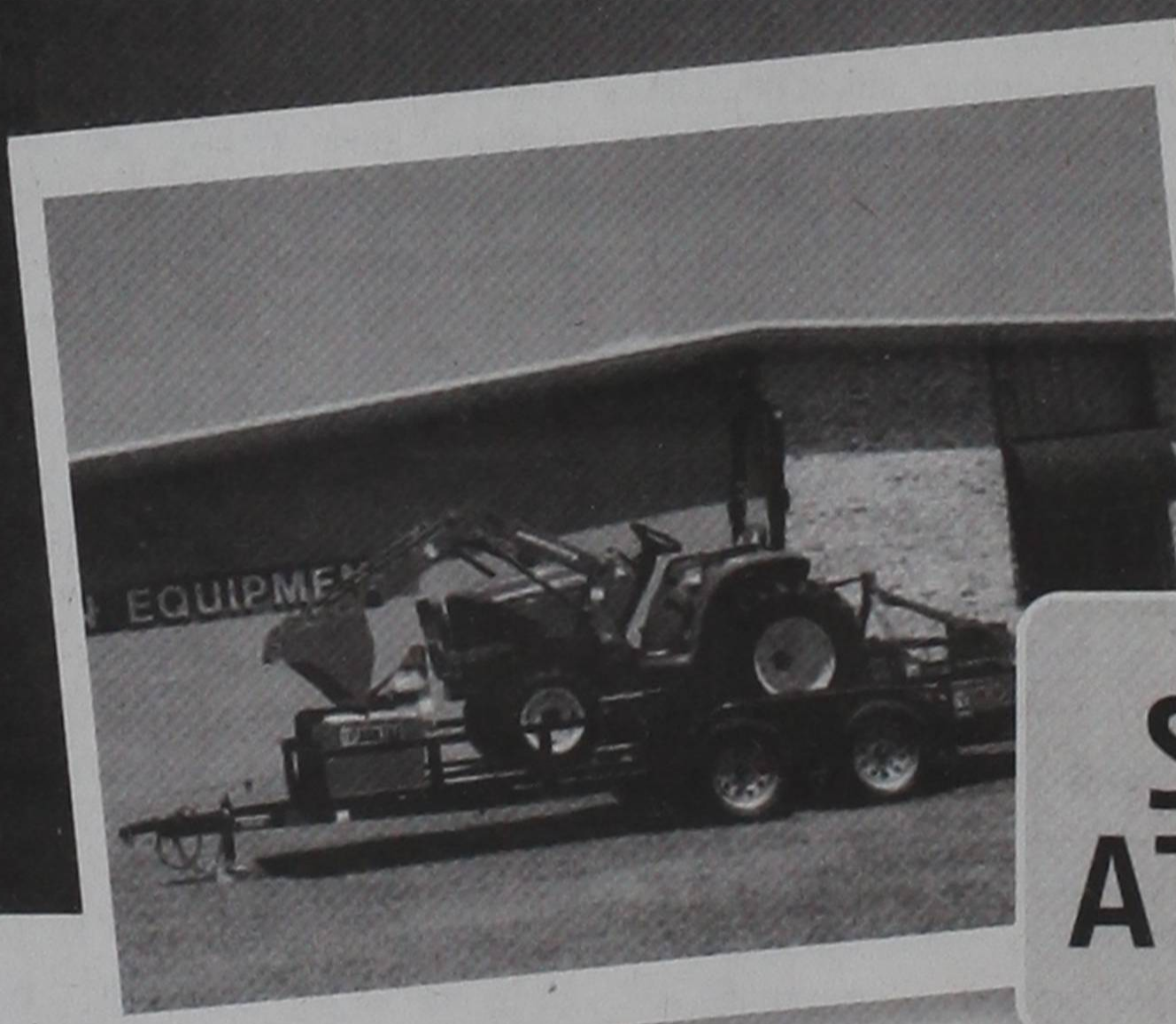

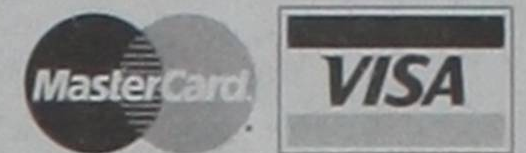
