

City Hall has confirmed a case of rabies inside the Clarendon city limits this week.

City Secretary Machiel Covey said animal control picked up a skunk west of Koogle Street last Thursday, and a positive test for rabies was received Monday morning.

Local officials have been urging caution with regards to rabies the last two weeks because the instances of rabies in the Texas Panhandle are twice as high as they were last year.

Citizens are urged to get their pets vaccinated for rabies immediately, and everyone needs to stay away from any wild animals - skunks, raccoon, etc. - which may be coming into populated areas due to the drought conditions.

Clarendon Fire Marshall Jeremy Powell said it was not clear why the fire began, but he said it was apparent where it started.

The home of Don and Treva Fulton, located in the 100 block of Charles Drive, caught fire last Tuesday, October 18. Emergency personnel were paged out at 10:14 a.m., and the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department responded quickly.

"We had trucks leaving the station within about three minutes, and we were on the scene in 13 minutes," Powell said. "The fire was put out exactly one hour to the minute from when we were paged."

The fire was contained to two bedrooms and a bathroom; and while most of the structure was saved, the family says there was extensive smoke damage.

Family members report that Mr. and Mrs. Fulton are staying at the Best Western Red River Inn and have recently found a replacement mobile home. This week a good Samaritan has stepped forward to clean off the site and prepare it for the new home.

The couple's furniture needs are met, but they need towels, pillows, bedding, etc. If anyone wishes to help, they can call the Fulton's daughter, Linda Rowland, at 874-4824.

"Mostly they just need prayers right now," Mrs. Rowland said.


# Water district gets \$1 million for conservation

AUSTIN - The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) last week approved by resolution a \$1,000,000 loan from the Agricultural Water Conservation Program to the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District to finance an agricultural water conservation program.

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District will utilize these funds to provide loans to area farmers to purchase center-pivot irrigation systems.

The District's jurisdictional area covers all or parts of eight counties in the Panhandle of Texas, including Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Armstrong, Potter, Hutchinson and Roberts. The area covers 6,378 square miles and has 967,000 cultivated acres, of which 281,500 are irrigated. Principal crops grown in the area include wheat, grain sorghum, corn and sunflowers.

The TWDB is the state agency charged with collecting and disseminating water-related data, assisting with regional planning and preparing the State Water Plan for the development of the state's water resources. The TWDB administers cost-effective financial programs for the construction of water supply, wastewater treatment, flood control, and agricultural water conservation projects.

# Kaddafi's removal, 30 years late?

In the 1980s, I was an unrefined adolescent from blue-collar Butler, Pennsylvania. I knew nothing and cared nothing about politics. I had no idea if I was a conservative or liberal, Democrat or Republican, or much of anything else. But I knew one thing: Moammar Kaddafi was a bad dude. This was expressed in a rather unsophisticated way by the bumper-sticker affixed to my white Chevy Chevette, which declared simply and succinctly: "Kaddafi Sucks."


Yep, Moammar Kaddafi was a bad dude. And now, three decades later, and some 40-plus years after coming to power, he is gone, dispatched to the ashheap of history with other murderous terrorists and

# Water matters for the future of Texas

Texas is experiencing one of the most severe droughts on record. The eleven months from October 2010 through August 2011 marked the driest in Texas for that same timeframe since 1895, leaving many families and farmers suffering from this critical water shortage. The Texas Water Development Board (Board) estimates that the drought could cost Texas businesses and employees upwards of \$12 billion, annually, in lost income. Enter Proposition 2.

Proposition 2 is a proposed constitutional amendment that will allow the Board to issue additional general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time. Proceeds from these bonds will be used in a revolving loan program that political subdivisions - such as cities, counties, districts, river authorities, and nonprofit water supply corporations - can apply for and access to fund water and wastewater infrastructure in their communities. By using a lower bonding rate, this financing option through the state is sometimes the only way water infrastructure projects are possible.





islature meets again. Without additional bonding authority and the passage of Proposition 2, the Board will not be able to assist communities with funds to provide for the water needs of the state. Simply put, without Proposition 2, the Board will be out of money to loan. And without rain, ensuring a sound infrastructure may be the only way to have access to water in dire times.

Will Proposition 2 cost taxpayers



Ultimately, these monies will provide the funding necessary to support the infrastructure and components of the State Water Plan. The State Water Plan, which is updated every five years by the Board using a 50-year planning horizon, represents a true bottom-up approach necessary for water planning. Regional water plans developed by local entities are used to form the larger, statewide document. This plan prioritizes projects for water funding throughout the state, and funds to realize those projects are supported by the Board through these loans.

With meteorologists telling us that the current drought is going to get worse before it gets better, the decisions that we make regarding future water supply and infrastructure are more important than ever before. It is important that we all make our voices heard at the ballot box, and I encourage everyone to get out and vote. I will not here add to reports of how Kaddafi met his final fate, but I would like to share a valuable piece of information that was revealed to me by Bill Clark, Ronald Reagan's right-hand man and national security adviser when Kaddafi was ramping up in the 1980s.

It was early 1981. President Reagan had just been inaugurated. Alexandre de Marentches, the director of France's external intelligence agency, SDECE, came to the White House with a highly sensitive plan to remove Kaddafi. The plan was to assassinate the Libyan dictator during a parade, by use of an explosive device placed near the reviewing stand. "Our answer," said Clark, "was that we understood their feelings" toward the man, but we don't do assassinations."

That was because there was an executive order banning assassinations, first signed by President Gerald Ford and supported by President Carter. The Reagan team had no intention of violating the order as one of the first acts of the new administration.

Intelligence sources I consulted confirmed Clark's recollection of de Marenches' request. "He came over to the U.S., probably in early February 1981," said one source, a high-level CIA "operations" person. "His interlocutor was Vice President Bush. The purpose of the visit was to discuss the removal of Kaddafi. He came to try to get us involved operationally in the plan.... He wanted not just our moral or political support but to get us involved in the actual operation."

This same source pointed to the "Safari Club," which was a group of countries - France, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Morocco, and the Shah's Iran - that had banded together for two primary purposes: 1) to fight the spread of Soviet communism in Africa; and 2) to counter Kaddafi, particularly his adventures in neighboring Chad. The group was formed by intelligence ministers in the mid-1970s, and de Marenches was its catalyst. The group was appalled by America's unwillingness to no longer stand up to the Soviets; it was post-Watergate, post-Vietnam, Americans had elected an incredibly liberal Congress, and Jimmy Carter was president. The Club sought to fill the vacuum.

There is a history of voters approving constitutional amendments that give the Board this authority. In 1957, Texans authorized the Board to issue up

Proposition 2 is self-supporting, meaning the repayment will not come from state general revenue. Entities that choose to use this funding to address their water needs will repay the principal and interest on the loans. It is those principal and interest payments that will be used to repay the bonds. While I understand the concern that the Board will be authorized to issue debt that has not been specifically approved by the taxpayers. the evergreen nature of these bonds is vital to the continuation of long-term

De Marenches' offer against Kaddafi was consistent with the concerns of the Safari Club.

As an indication of the confidential nature of his overture, de Marenches did not discuss his offer to the Reagan administration in either of his 1986 and 1992 books. But he did note yet another intention to kill Kaddafi: He said that on March 1, 1978, Egyptian leader Anwar Sadat had asked de Marenches for help in "disposing of him [Kaddafi] physically."

Think of the irony here, and how tragically history unfolds: It would be Sadat who was assassinated in 1981 - on October 6, 1981. He was killed at a reviewing stand at a parade, shot by Islamists for his "crime" of making peace with Israel.

While Sadat died, Kaddafi was permitted to live. Sadat made peace. Kaddafi left a trail of blood and violence.

And here's another irony still: Just weeks after de Marenches' offer to Reagan to assassinate Kaddafi, Reagan was shot, on March 30, 1981, and nearly bled to death.

In retrospect, should President Reagan have agreed to the French request to take out Kaddafi? A lot of innocent lives would have been spared. Terrorist attacks from Lockerbie, Scotland to the Mediterranean would have been averted.

Alas, such action by Reagan would indeed have been illegal, and was not the mission or foreign-policy plan of his incoming administration. Had Reagan started his presidency by violating an executive order on assassinations, liberals in that post-Watergate/post-Vietnam Congress would have run him out of town with impeachment papers before his historic two-term takedown of the Evil Empire could commence.

# Time for a new approach in DC

Americans are aware that there is a growth and fundamental divide in Washington, D.C. over how to revive our lagging economy.

Thirty-one months ago, the President signed into law a nearly \$1 trillion dollar economic stimulus package. Republicans opposed the bill because it increased the deficit; it was a short-term patch, assembled in secret, and favored certain groups. Today, there are 1.7 million fewer jobs than when the bill was signed. Unemployment remains above nine percent.

Nevertheless, the President has spent more than a month now campaigning on a second stimulus bill, hastily developed, that would raise taxes permanently, would increase spending, and, again, is targeted at a few select groups. He has urged Republicans to offer an alternative, rather than just criticizing his plan.



It offers reasoned guidelines to lower spending, reform our tax code, curb over-regulation, encourage domestic energy exploration, and implement common sense health care policies - serious plans for long-term

businesses to invest and grow. Our plan would make the research and development tax credit permanent. We must unburden the economy from costly, job-killing regulations. Currently, businesses are forced to spend an inordinate amount of time and financial resources complying with cumbersome rules and regulations imposed by the federal government. This is time and money that businesses could spend on developing new products and services, growing their markets, and creating jobs. One proposal contained in our plan, known as the REINS Act, would require congressional approval on any proposed federal regulation that would impose more than a \$100 million cost on the U.S. economy. Our plan will also prohibit the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from over-regulating greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act. If Congress does not act to stop the EPA, trillions of dollars will be extracted from our economy, and more than 1 million jobs eliminated.



While the drilling moratorium in the Gulf of Mexico may have been officially lifted a year ago, there continues to be a steep decline in the number of permits approved by the administration, creating a de-facto moratorium. In addition, the administration has failed to restore the time leaseholders lost during the moratorium. This policy has forced hundreds of rigs to sit idle, and thus far 11 rigs have left the Gulf to drill for oil overseas – taking their jobs and tax revenue with them. Offshore energy producers are vital to America's economic growth and energy security, and our national energy policies need to start reflecting that reality. Common sense health care

None of us know the depth of our faith until it is tried or tested. Revelation 2:10 tells us that we must be "faithful unto death". That means being faithful even if it costs us our lives. This is certainly consistent throughout the Bible. Genesis 22 gives us the account of God commanding Abraham to take

Isaac and offer him as a burnt sacrifice. Abraham was to take Isaac to Moriah and offer him there.

In verse 3 of the chapter Abraham gets up early the very next morning and prepares for the trip. Abraham and his group traveled a couple of days to get to the destination. Verses 9-10 show Abraham in the last minutes with his son. He is not dragging his feet in obeying God's command. He is not trying to find another interpretation of what God had told him to do. God was very clear. There was no gray area and Abraham wasn't looking for any. Here we see a faithful servant of God carrying out a command that

would tempt many of us not to obey.

There is another faith being tested in this account. Isaac's faith was surely tested. Verse 7, Isaac wants to know where the lamb is for the sacrifice. In verse 8, Abraham tells Isaac that God would provide and in verse 9 we see that Abraham bound Isaac and made ready to sacrifice him. The question that is extremely important is, "How old is Isaac?" We see in verse 6 that Abraham gave the wood for the sacrifice to Isaac to carry. In verse 5, Abraham refers to Isaac as a young man or lad. It would be safe to reason that Isaac was a teen or older. Josephus believed Isaac to be about 25 years of age (Antiquities, I, xiii, 1-4). We can't be sure of the age, but if he could carry the wood for the sacrifice, he was certainly strong enough to struggle with his very aged father. We not only don't read of a struggle, but after the ordeal, we see for the rest of Abraham's life a loving relationship with his son. Isaac obviously never held it against his father. The command of God demanded obedience from both father and son. One was being commanded to give his son, the other commanded to give himself.

This is a foreshadowing of Jesus and His deep love and faith in God. Jesus came to do what the will of God was (John 9:1-5). We should assess our faith in light of the examples of Abraham, Isaac, and our Savior. How deep is our faith? Are we willing to follow the commands of God quickly and completely? If not, why not? Trials will come. The question is, "What will you do?".



Monthly Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for more than 60 million Americans will increase 3.6 percent in 2012, the Social Security Administration announced today.

The 3.6 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits that nearly 55 million Social Security beneficiaries receive in January 2012. Increased payments to more than 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December 30, 2011.

Some other changes that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$110,100 from \$106,800. Of the estimated 161 million workers who will pay Social Security taxes in 2012, about 10 million will pay higher taxes as a result of the increase in the taxable maximum. Information about Medicare changes for 2012, when announced, will be available at www.Medicare. gov. For some beneficiaries, their Social Security increase may be partially or completely offset by increases in Medicare premiums. The Social Security Act provides for how the COLA is calculated. 

# Drugs in the News

### Less Heart Risk: Ibuprofen and Naproxen

In the late 1990s, it was discovered that anti-inflammatory drugs called NSAIDs (nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs) increased the risk of heart attacks and strokes. This occured with some of the newer drugs (called Cox-2 inhibitors) that were developed to avoid NSAIDrelated astrointestinal bleeding. Two of the prescription drugs in this group at that time (Vioxx and Bextra) were determined to be at such risk for cardiovascular problems that they were eventually pulled from the market. A similar drug, Celebrex, is still available with a warning about possible cardiovascular problems.

A recent evaluation of 30 studies involving NSAIDs suggests that naproxen (Aleve) and low doses of ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) are the least likely to increase cardiovascular risk, while some other drugs in this group do increase the risk. Health experts warn, however, that an increase in gastrointestinal problems, such as bleeding, can occur with NSAID use, especially if the person has a history of ulcers, drinks alcohol heavily or takes steroids for such things as asthma or arthritis.



Texas Peanut Producers Board will be conducting our 2012 biennial election, which includes three of its four regions, for the purpose of electing four TPPB board members to fulfill expired board seats. There are a total of twelve TPPB voting board members. These elections, to be conducted in 145 Texas counties, are being held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter C, Section 41.

There are two seats open in Voting Region 2, which consists of the following 40 counties: Archer, Armstrong, Baylor, Borden, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Donley, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Garza, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Haskell, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lipscomb, Motley, Ochiltree, Roberts, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wheeler, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.
