Officials warn dog owners on treats

City Hall has been notified by state officials and the federal Food and Drug Administration that dog owners need to take caution when giving chicken jerky products to their pets.

Chicken jerky - also sold as pet food chicken tenders, strips, or treats - may be associated with illnesses in dogs. The FDA has seen an increase over the last 12 months in complaints associated with chicken jerky products imported from China.

Chicken jerky products should not be substituted for a balanced diet and are intended to be fed in small quantities. Dog owners should watch their pets for any unusual symptoms of appetite, digestion, diarrhea, or vomiting, and contact their veterinarian if conditions persist for more than 24 hours.



Bulldogs help restock local food pantry

The holidays came early last week at the local Panhandle Community Services office when the Clarendon College Bulldog baseball and men's basketball teams delivered a surprise.

Fifty-one student athletes conducted a canned food drive on November 12, and the people of Clarendon responded in a big way. The result was a van and a pickup both full of sacks and boxes of food to replenish the PCS food pantry, shocking PCS director Marchia Campbell.

"It was like Christmas for me," Campbell said. "I didn't even know they were doing it, and when the coaches showed up I was just totally surprised. This is awesome!"

Campbell had to have some volunteers help her sort through the food, which covered four long tables and fully stocked much of the food pantry, especially with soups, peas, and corn.

"I really appreciate what the college did and want to say 'thank you' to the teams and the whole community for coming together on this," Campbell said.

Jobless rate falls to 5.7%

Donley County's unemployment rate improved from September to October, but 111 people were still looking for work.

Data from the Texas Workforce Commission shows that the county had a workforce of 1,932 last month with unemployment at 5.7 percent.

By comparison, the local unemployment rate in September was 6.5 percent with 124 people looking for work out of a workforce of 1,919.

Statewide, the private sector continued to grow in October, adding 13,500 jobs. Texas' total nonfarm employment has expanded by 231,600 jobs over the year to reach an estimated 10,616,500 positions in October. Overall, Texas added 2,500 jobs over the month. Texas has experienced positive annual job growth in the past 18 months with annual growth rates above 2.0 percent for the last five consecutive months.

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 8.4 percent in October, down slightly from 8.5 percent in September, and remains below the national unemployment rate of 9.0 percent.

"Private employers continue to invest their capital in the growing Texas workforce," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "The private sector has added an impressive 286,200 jobs since October 2010, for a growth rate of 3.4 percent."

Rare lizard threatens state economy

Texas is the largest daily producer of oil and natural gas in the nation and one of the top ten producers in the world. Currently, there are 150,199 oil wells and 94,800 gas wells actively producing in the state, supplying 31.2 percent and 35.8 percent, respectively, of the U.S. total. So, when the federal government, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, proposed to list the dunes sagebrush lizard (DSL) on the Endangered Species List without a defensible scientific base, you can imagine my surprise and bewilderment. The DSL is found in Winkler, Andrews, Gaines, Yoakum, Cochran, Ward, and Crane counties, coincidentally home to the state and country's dominant oil producing basin, the Permian Basin. With the U.S. economy in shreds and the lack of scientific evidence, one can't help but wonder if this most recent federal overreach is just a continuation of the Obama Administration's attack on Texas and her abundant oil resources.

Which is why I am calling for the DSL to be granted an exemption from

the Endangered Species Act (Act).

The Act says that a determination is to be made on the best scientific and commercial data available, but what if only 10 percent of that data specifically relates to Texas? And more interestingly, some reports used to base this determination date back as far as 1972. am appalled that the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service deems this as scientifically acceptable. I am in favor of protecting wildlife against human consumption and action, but this is clearly a violent and exorbitant use of the Act. It's also interesting to note that Congress believes that economic impact should be considered while designating the critical habitat for the endangered species once it is listed. but no such consideration is given during the listing process.

Clearly, the Act needs to be overhauled and reworked to adapt to the 21st century. The original legislation passed Congress in 1973, and while the most recent amendment in 2004 exempted the Department of Defense (DOD), there has not been a concerted effort to review the

Act in over 20 years. I understand the need to exempt the DOD on the basis of national security reasons and would call for the same exemption to apply in the case of the DSL in West Texas. Fiftyseven percent of all oil consumed in the U.S. is imported, therefore allowing foreign countries to manipulate and hold hostage the American marketplace. This country's energy independence requires us to produce oil and gas from within our own borders and with unsupported listings on the Endangered Species List and the regulations that accompany a listing, companies simply cannot, and will not continue to do business here.

Comptroller Susan Combs, the oil and gas industry, and stakeholders of the Task Force on Economic Growth and Endangered Species are to be commended for their innovative work on the Texas Conservation Plan for the DSL. However, once the imminent listing of the DSL occurs, I urge the Texas Congressional delegation to pursue an exemption of the Act.

Small business key to economy

Nothing captures the meaning of the American Dream more than an entrepreneur who risks everything to start a small business. Each small business owner has a story to tell - and to paraphrase Thomas Edison every story is a combination of personal inspiration and a lot of personal perspiration. Rather than work 9-5 for someone else, small business owners choose to try to build something, working 15 hours a day as their own boss, pouring their life savings into making their dreams a reality.

These enterprising men and women are the engines of U.S. job creation. Small business success isn't guaranteed. Many small businesses fail in their first year. But small business owners' risktaking and pioneering spirits are essential to re-energizing our economy. Their new ideas and innovations that create the businesses – even entirely new industries - account for 65 percent of net new jobs in our country.

Everyone has heard of - or been trapped in - the Black Friday, post-Thanksgiving shopping frenzy. But this November 26th, the Saturday following Thanksgiving Day, marks the 2nd annual Small Business Saturday. Hundreds of public and private organizations have joined together to encourage Americans to support locally-owned small businesses during one of the busiest shopping weekends of the year.

Unfortunately, no matter how the holiday shopping season goes, the government is playing the Grinch to small business growth. The net result of so much over-regulation, the looming costs of the Obama health care law and the threat of higher taxes have cut hiring by start-up small businesses to one-half

of what it was just a few years ago. Fewer start-ups and less hiring by new small businesses have subtracted

economy - enough to bring our national unemployment rate to a whopping 9 percent rate.

In recent months, the Senate has taken some steps to help small businesses by extending tax incentives for new hires and repealing a costly withholding requirement.

But these positive steps are eclipsed by the new burdens and higher costs being placed on businesses. The Obama administration continues to rush through mountains of new environmental and economic regulations. This year alone, 71,864 pages of new regulations have been added to the Federal Register translating into \$93.2 billion in new costs imposed on job creators.

Small businesses are the ones hardest hit. According to a study commissioned by the U.S. Small Business Administration, Office of Advocacy, businesses with fewer than 20 employees actually pay 36 percent more in regulatory costs per employee than larger companies. Most small businesses lack the resources to hire the accountants, lawyers and lobbyists needed to comply with many new government regulations and requirements.

Implementation of the Obama health care law will also fall most heav-

ily on small businesses and small business workers. According to a report from the National Federation of Independent Businesses, nearly two-thirds of small businesses believe that the law will increase health care premiums. As I travel around Texas, business owners tell me that the Obama health care law's costly regulations are already suppressing investment and job creation, and will soon create a permanent disincentive for new hiring.

Uncertainty about taxes is another huge obstacle to small business growth. Most small business owners file their taxes as individuals and will be hit very hard if the President carries out his plan to allow current income tax rates to rise automatically on January 1, 2013. What small business owners need - what our economy and millions of job-seekers need - is growth-oriented tax reform: a simpler tax code, elimination of loopholes, and lower rates that can spur innovation, investment and job-creation for the coming decade.

If leaders in Washington want to help businesses on Main Street, we must start by focusing on consistent, longterm policies, rather than short-term, election-year sweeteners.

As a former small business owner myself, I have seen firsthand the effects that over-regulation and taxes can have on entrepreneurs' ability to invest and grow their business. I hope all Americans and Texans, mindful of the vital role of entrepreneurs and business people in their communities, visit their locally owned businesses on Small Business Saturday.





Drugs in the News

Treatment Evaluated for Prostate Cancer

Recently, researchers released promising test results of an experimental treatment for prostate cancer. The treatment involved approximately 1,200 men with advanced prostate cancer who had been previously treated with taxotere (Docetaxel). The experimental treatment is called MDV3100 (a brand name will be assigned if it is approved later by the FDA). Men who received MDV3100 experienced an additional average survival rate of almost 5 months compared to the men who did not get the drug. According to researchers involved in the study, MDV3100 works, in part, by blocking or suppressing the male hormones that fuel cancer growth. One report indicates that test results were so positive that the men who had not received MDV3100 were later given the drug also. The company that makes MDV3100 says that it plans to meet with the FDA next year regarding possible approval for general use.

Health experts indicated that prostate cancer is the second most commonly occurring cancer in men in the U:S. The American Cancer Society indicates that about one man in six will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during his lifetime.

The Broncos will play Paducah at home November 29 beginning at 8:00 p.m. and will participate in the Arbor Academy Tournament December 1-3.


Peanut board to hold elections


LUBBOCK - The Texas Peanut Producers Board will be holding an election for four expiring directors' seats. The election will be held from Jan. 9-23, 2012, with the nomination process opening Nov. 23, 2011.

There are two seats open in Voting Region 2, which consists of the following 40 counties: Archer, Armstrong, Baylor, Borden, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Crosby, Dickens, Donley, Fisher, Floyd, Foard, Garza, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Haskell, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lipscomb, Motley, Ochiltree, Roberts, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wheeler, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

Nomination forms will be publicly available Nov. 23, 2011, at peanut buying point locations and Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices in the counties listed above, or they can be requested by mail directly from TPPB at 4205 N. I-27, Lubbock, Texas 79403. If you request a nomination form by mail from TPPB, please include your county of residence. Nomination applicants must reside in a county within a TPPB voting region where they seek nomination and must have their application signed by the applicant and 10 other eligible voters. A form must be filed with TPPB no later than December 23, 2011, in order for it to be valid.

A person is eligible to vote in this board election if he or she is currently a producer of peanuts, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of this election (January 23, 2012), has been a producer of peanuts or has caused peanuts to be produced for commercial purposes. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers that pay the peanut assessment. Any person qualified to vote is also qualified to seek nomination for election to the board as a director. For a producer to vote in director elections, the producer must reside within a county located in the voting region they wish to vote.
