Two local men take plea deals

Two local men were among the defendants when the district court met in Clarendon on Monday, April 9, and heard five pleas resulting in one conviction and four deferred adjudications.

District Attorney Luke Inman, assisted by Greg Buckley, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding. A total of \$6,500in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on April 9. In addition to the fines, the defendants were required to pay a total of \$1,969 in court costs and \$121,185.90 restitution.

Chad Michael Sanchez was placed on probation for a period of two years for the state jail felony offense of theft of brass. Sanchez pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.


Sanchez, a 23-year-old resident of Clarendon, was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place December 15, 2011 and pleaded guilty to a complaint and information filed by the State on April 5, 2012. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Sanchez is required to pay a \$1,500 fine to Donley County, \$473 in court costs, \$522.95 restitution, and complete 100 hours of community service. If Sanchez violates probation, he could face up to two years in the State Jail Division of TDCJ. Rowdy Joe Floyd was placed on probation for a period of two years for the state jail felony offense of theft of brass. Floyd pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense. Floyd, 21-year-old resident of Clarendon was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place December 15, 2011 and pleaded guilty to a complaint and information filed by the State on April 5, 2012. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Floyd is required to pay a \$1,500 fine to Donley County, \$473 in court costs, \$522.95 restitution, and complete 100 hours of community service. If Floyd violates probation, he could face up to two years in the State Jail Division of TDCJ. Stephanie Gale Davis was placed on probation for a period of ten years for the first degree felony offense of theft, in aggregated amounts. Davis pleaded guilty for the offense that took place on June 15, 2010, and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense. Davis, 43-year-old resident of White Deer, was indicted by a Carson County Grand Jury on March 1, 2012.

Titanic story

missed by Hollywood

More than 1500 people lost their lives when that magnificent vessel struck an iceberg on the night of April 14, 1912 and sank within hours. But 712 persons were rescued from the sinking of the luxury liner. Their survival is a story of courage, competence and faith.

"SOS Titanic calling. We have struck ice and require immediate assistance." That startling message was received on board the RMS Carpathia. The ship's only radio operator, Harold Cottam, had been working



Actually, it's tied with the Alabama Sixth Congressional District for that distinction. Both Congressional Districts include rabid football fans and very few liberals.


Accordingly, Donley County has few liberals and even fewer single women in my age group. I don't mind the absence of liberals as much as the absence of women. In fact, there are so few liberals that some of our citizens look askance upon moderates, just in case they backslide and become irksome liberals. They consider it their duty to prevent such a dreadful outcome.

Perhaps this is a natural phenomenon since there are no benchmark liberals in which to compare suspect progressive non-conservatives. Whatever the reason for this wonder, it is a bit respect for authority, and sanctity. disconcerting, especially for a few of my relatives, like Cousin Doug and his sonin-law, who think I'm too progressive and may become a future embarrassment such as the flag and a strong military. to the family. Not surprisingly, recent research indicates that most conservatives do not like liberals and endure them about as well as they tolerate goat-heads and shingles. Conversely, most liberals think conservatives are mindless, contemptible, and mystifying. Fearing some sort of nasty social infestation, liberals prefer to live on the left and right coasts and fly over the suspect red states, thereby avoiding superfluous social intercourse with tea partiers. A recent academic study asked 2,000 Americans to complete questionnaires about moral issues, as they relate to political ideology. A few respondents were asked to complete the questionnaires as they thought a "typical liberal" or a "typical conservative" would respond.



Liberals just don't underby fred gray stand conserva-

An interesting new book, The Righteous Mind, by Jonathan Haidt, a University of Virginia psychology professor, goes a long way into demystifying the right. Haidt argues that for liberals, morality is mostly a matter of three core values: caring for the weak, fairness, and liberty. Conservatives agree with those values and add three others: loyalty, Those three additional values bind conservatives together with a mutual respect for symbols and institutions, Haidt's research team asked some rather pesky questions in the course of their research. For example, what would the respondents think of a family that, after their pet dog was run over, ate it for dinner? As expected, most respondents were appalled by the question, but had trouble explaining why; they found the question to be disturbing even if no one is harmed - except, of course, the main dish. Conservatives were repulsed by this thought while liberals were merely dismayed. Naturally, eating road kill has little to do with political debates, but they do revolve around this broader moral code. The recent Republican primaries have included a mixture of loyalty, authority, and sanctity issues; and that's why people have found the primaries to be so passionate.



Research into the roots of political ideologies has significantly increased in recent years, thanks to the advent of the tea party. Ideologies are deep seated and form in early childhood. For example, adults who consider themselves to be liberal were described by their nurseryschool teachers as being curious, verbal novelty seekers - but not very neat or obedient.

Other research indicates that conservatives are particularly responsive to threats, with a greater startle reflex when they hear loud noises. Conservatives

well past the end of his normal shift.

Carpathia's first officer barged into the captain's quarters. "Who is this cheeky beggar coming into my cabin without knocking," thought Captain Arthur Rostron, who had just retired.

Titanic, the pride of the White Star Line, had been racing from Britain to New York. Now, she was 60 miles away.'In seconds, Captain Rostron was in the chart room, plotting a course to race to the side of the stricken vessel. Normally, Carpathia could make 14 knots. By diverting "every particle of steam" to her screws, she might reach 17 knots. Even so, it would take hours to come alongside.

Poring over his charts, the captain issued a stream of orders. The ship's doctors, pursers and chief steward were ordered to receive passengers from Titanic, readying supplies of blankets, stimulants and other restoratives. Get lists of survivors' names to be sent by wireless. Maintain strict silence. Avoid panic among Carpathia's own passengers. They would be left to shiver in their cabins, the steam heat having been diverted to drive the ship's propellers. Once he had finished his mental list of a hundred tasks, Captain Rostron was observed, head bowed, praying.

He had good reason to pray. There would be no other ship to do what Carpathia had to do that night. The Olympic, sister ship to Titanic, was hundreds of miles away. And the California, heartbreakingly close to Titanic, may have mistaken the sinking liner's emergency flares for fireworks of celebration. This was Titanic's well-publicized maiden voyage and her passenger manifest was a who's who of the rich and famous of two continents.

Captain Rostron could not forget his first duty - to his own ship and her passengers and crew. "Icebergs loomed up" on this still, moonless night, Arthur Rostron would write in his memoir, "Home from the Sea." "It was an anxious time with the Titanic's fateful experience very close in our minds. There were seven hundred souls on the Carpathia; these lives, as well as the survivors of the Titanic herself, depended on a sudden turn of the wheel." If Captain Rostron or his crew had neglected any one of the vital tasks required on that night to remember, the Titanic disaster could have ended even more tragically. They didn't. During World War II, the fate of Britain and the allied cause depended on the Battle of the Atlantic . All too often, men stranded in boats following a U-boat attack were left behind the convoys racing to bring critical supplies to the embattled nation. They flashed their little lights but the convoy had orders not to stop. Richard Snow's "A Measureless Peril" tells of a newly commissioned destroyer escort that raced to rescue the freezing men in a cluster of twelve lifeboats. "Don't waste too much time," the convoy commodore had radioed. The destroyer escort's unblooded crew members were shocked at this callousness, until they reached the little boats bobbing on the swells. All the life-jacketed seamen were dead. Their stiff-armed waves were caused by the movement of the waves. Such would have been the fate of the 712 Titanic passengers who made it into the lifeboats. Exposed a few more hours and they would all have died. Most of those in the freezing waters died. One woman watched Titanic's massive hull slip beneath the waters. She lost hope for her husband. Suddenly awakened, she begged others in her lifeboat not to push off an oil-covered figure desperately thrashing about in the water. They feared he might capsize them. Her piteous pleas finally touched their hearts. When the swimmer got on board, the pleading woman recognized her own husband. Captain Rostron received the Congressional Medal of Honor from a grateful America. Home in England, he was knighted. The day after Titanic sank, President Taft ordered the Coast Guard to commence iceberg patrols. For those who have been in peril on the sea, the captain's noble courage will always inspire gratitude and reverence. It's not too late to make a movie about Sir Arthur Rostron and the Carpathia crew.

Moderates and conservatives were proficient at guessing how liberals would answer questions. On the other hand, liberals - especially those self-described

American values play a significant role in political discourse. Conservatives consider six values when casting


also sweat more when they see disgusting images, such as a person eating worms. Liberals sweat less.

Anything that prompts us to think of disgust or cleanliness also seems to have at least a temporary effect on our politics. It pushes our sanctity buttons and makes us more conservative.

Ideologies shape more than our political thought. There is evidence that we seek pets who reflect our moral values. Liberals prefer dogs that are gentle but not subservient, while conservatives seek dogs that are loyal and obedient.

Moral values and political judgments are complicated and ambiguous, molded by an array of beliefs and traits. Little of this is a conscious or intellectual process. A higher I.Q. doesn't lead people to think through their moral positions in a more objective, candid way -even though they are more articulate in defending those positions.

There are significant differences in conservatives and liberals, differences difficult, but not impossible, to bridge. If we are to successfully address our dire national problems, we must find a way to overcome these differences - and soon.

Space Lab Challenge shows innovation

I recently hosted a remarkable group of young people on Capitol Hill - the finalists in the YouTube Space Lab Challenge. We're all familiar with You-Tube, one of the three most popular sites on the Internet. (If you're a parent, you know this from your children.)

Through the YouTube Space Challenge, 14 to 18 year-old students from around the world were given opportunities to design science experiments that could be carried out in space, with the winning experiments to be performed on the International Space Station (ISS) and broadcast on YouTube. The competition drew thousands of entries from the United States and around the world and

myself. So it was a good opportunity, I just took it and entered the competition, and it just worked."

When asked about the personal meaning of the political revolution in Egypt, he responded, "It sparked hope in pursue science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). One of the keys to capturing young minds is more good teachers in the STEM fields. The UTEACH program, which started at the University of Texas, allows undergraduates to earn a core degree in a STEM field while pursuing teacher training and certification as electives. This gives those with STEM credentials an option to teach in high school and enrich the educational experience for students. The program has been so successful that I authored a provision in federal law that provides for replicating the UTEACH program nationally.

Texas is also pioneering collaboration and learning across traditional scientific disciplines. Young students do this instinctively, and they learn more and faster. In 2004, we created The Academy of Medicine, Engineering and Science of Texas (TAMEST) to spur research and collaboration among Texas' leading scientists and academic institutions. The pace of innovation among participating institutions has accelerated significantly, opening up new opportunities for the next generation of scientists, and the promise of new technologies and industries for America's future. Science is truly a universal lan-. guage. If our children, and more children around the world, have freedom and opportunities to further their educations and pursue their dreams, and stretch the envelope of scientific knowledge, the future will be much brighter.

YouTube brought the winning students to Washington, D.C. last month. Senator Jay Rockefeller and I (the Chair and Ranking Member respectively of the Senate committee that oversees NASA) hosted an ice cream social in their honor. The kids had a great time, and it was wonderful to talk to them.

One of the winners was Amr Mohammed, a bright young man from Egypt. The experiment he submitted will show how living things change their behavior in zero gravity aboard the ISS, which could help to anticipate human adaptability to long space flights (e.g., to Mars). I asked Amr how he became interested in science and in submitting an experiment. His reply said a lot about the power of freedom to spark young minds.

"I've always loved science," he

me. I wasn't really trying before. Then, when something that seems impossible happens in front of you, you start trying to find new opportunity, and that's basically through science. You begin to believe that it can happen for you, too. So I found the opportunity online with YouTube."

I was also struck by the winning entry from two teenage girls - Dorothy Chen and Sara Ma of Troy, Michigan who authored the other Space Challenge winning entry. Their experiment will test how bacteria grow in the zero gravity of the ISS, which can shed light on how to fight dangerous germs on Earth. Not too many years ago, it would have been remarkable for a young woman to win a science competition. Today, more and more girls are entering and excelling in the sciences.



NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE TARIFF FILING

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) on April 4, 2012, its Petition requesting approval of its proposed Military Base Surcharge Tariff.

Section 36.354(a) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA), at Texas Utilities Code § 36.354, provides that each electric utility in an area where implementation of full customer choice has been delayed by the Commission in accordance with PURA § 39.103 shall discount charges for electric service provided to a military base. Section 36.354(b) of PURA establishes the discount to be provided to military installations as a 20 percent reduction of the base commercial rate that the electric utility would otherwise charge to the installation.

Section 36.354(c) of PURA provides that the electric utility may assess a surcharge to all its Texas retail customers to recover the difference in revenue between the revenues from the discounted rate for military bases and the base commercial rate. Tariff Sheet No. IV-16 provides the Military Base Adjustment Factor per billing kWh as reflected below:




Antibiotics: Not the Answer for Most Sinus Infections

A recent article published in Clinical Infectious Disease states that antibiotics are over prescribed to those who have sinus infections. Most sinus infections are caused by viruses that do not respond to antibiotic therapy but many practitioners end up prescribing them "just in case." Infectious Disease Society of America (IDSA) guidelines are available to help prescribers make the best decision before recommending antibiotics. The first choice antibiotic if a bacterial infection of the sinuses is suspected is usually amoxicillin/clavulanate (Augmentin). The guidelines suggest that azithromycin (Zithromax), clarithromycin (Biaxin), and trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole (Septra), be reserved for more serious infections. Additionally, the use of decongestants and antihistamines is discouraged as they might make symptoms worse. Nasal steroids (prescription only) and saline nasal irrigation might help relieve symptoms.


