day morning. Sheriff Butch Blackburn said his office received a report that Joe Bryan McCary had been seen in a plumber's van during the youth ballgames and that he had lured children into the van. The sheriff said parents retrieved the kids, and McCary left the area. "This should show parents that they should know where their kids are at all times and who they are with," Blackburn said. "Even in Clarendon, they are not safe." A warrant for McCary was obtained, and he was arrested Monday morning and charged with three counts of Enticing a Child, a Class A Misdemeanor which carries a maximum sentence of a year in county jail and a \$2,000 fine. McCary, age 48, was arraigned by County Judge Jack Hall and bond was set at \$1,500 for each charge. He posted bond the same day. Blackburn said the investigation is still underway in this case. McCary has a prior criminal history of drug related charges. In related news, McCary's stepmother, 64-year-old Emily McCary, was also arrested Monday on a thirddegree felony charge of Tampering with a Witness after she was accused of harassing a victim's family. Justice of the Peace Connie Haven's set Mrs. McCary's bond at \$5,000, and she was released on bond the same day.

Greenbelt board okays city contract

The Greenbelt Water Authority Board of Directors Thursday unanimously last approved a contract with the City. of Clarendon for the purchase of groundwater from the city.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd said the contract includes a price of 45 cents per thousand gallons that the authority will pay the city. The price will be renegotiated every three years.

"It's a pretty simple contract, and it's written in the city's favor," Kidd said. "Our board really didn't have any problems with it." Greenbelt is still waiting on final submission of engineering report on the project to refurbish the oity's old water wells and build a pipeline to the Greenbelt filter plant.

"They've got preliminary numbers but are still waiting on some figures from the hydrologist," he said.

Kidd said the contract now goes back to the city for its final approval. City Administrator Lambert Little said the board of aldermen will have a called meeting next Tuesday, May 29, to consider that.

n September of 1944, a rare occurrence happened in the life of Eldon Holland that he calls a miracle.


For the second time since his arrival in the Dutch East Indies as part of his service for what became the Air Force during World War II, Eldon came in contact with his youngest brother, Calvin, who was serving with a different crew.

The brothers, only two years apart, conversed for a few hours at Eldon's base on Biak Island as Calvin's crew awaited the repair of a B-24 engine they had been following. The engine was fixed promptly, and the brothers were forced to say their goodbyes much too soon. Calvin then flew out of sight, headed for his home base. They would never meet again.

On October 24, 1944, Calvin and his crew disappeared. To this day, he is still listed as missing in action.

"It was a blessing Eldon got to see him," said Buford Holland, "just before he went out for the last time."

Eldon, Calvin, and their other brother, Buford, all graduated from Lelia Lake High School and farmed with their



Clarendon woman faces theft charges

A Clarendon woman is out on bond this week facing charges of stealing more than \$50,000 from her former employer.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said 32-year-old Laura King was arrested last Wednesday, May 16, and charged with the third degree felony of Aggregated Theft.

Blackburn's office investigated the case for about two weeks prior to the arrest after King's former employer contacted the sheriff. Bank records were examined, and a warrant was then obtained. At the time of her arrest, King was accused of taking \$54,993.

The investigation is continuing in this case, and Blackburn said he expects the final tally to increase and said that King could face additional charges.

King was arraigned by Justice of the Peace Connie Havens, and bond was set at \$20,000.

father. Each only 15 months apart, the brothers considered themselves triplets. Buford said his brothers volunteered to join the Air Force, leaving the small town of Lelia Lake to fight overseas.

"We liked to have been twins," Buford said. "We were all close."

Eldon and Calvin served on different B-24 bomber crews and had to part ways. Calvin was a radar operator and a gunner for his crew, and Eldon served as a flight engineer gunner. They would not see each other again for over two years, until July 1944. They became reacquainted at Eldon's base on Wadkie, a small island in the Dutch East Indies. Calvin's crew followed into the base another B-24 crew, which had been shot badly and their navigator had been killed. Eldon's base was closer than their base, so they stayed there for the night.

Eldon recalls how glad he was to see his brother, who stayed in his tent with him.

After their last meeting in September, Eldon did not hear any word of his brother until the first weeks of November, when his parents sent him a telegram informing him of the shocking

news: Calvin's plane had been shot down 30 days before, and the crew was missing.

Eldon wanted answers. He took his crew's radio operator with him and boarded an aircraft en route to Moratie, where Calvin's bomb group was based. They stayed the night with a crew they befriended during training, who were a part of Calvin's group but members of a separate squadron.

The next day, Eldon met with Calvin's operations officer to inquire what happened to his brother. The answers he received devastated him.

On October 24, 1944, Calvin and his crew went on a night radar gathering mission. Eldon remembers calling those Recon Missions, entailing one lone aircraft loaded with radar equipment flying over heavily defended targets at night gathering data regarding antiaircraft gun emplacement locations and counts. The aircraft would

also drop a full bomb load over the enemy.

Eldon said these missions were dangerous, and the success rate was low.

The operations officer told Eldon they received a mayday call from the radio operator on Calvin's crew. As they flew over Boreno, the plane was shot down. Eldon said the message was "Our aircraft has been hit, the aircraft is on fire, and we are going to attempt a water crash landing."

This was the last word heard from Calvin's crew. Eldon said a water landing in a B-24 was nearly impossible, and the plane went down just off the west coast of Boreno.

"You don't live through something like that," Buford said, "especially at night."

Calvin was presumed dead at age 20. Eldon said after discovering this, his nerves were completely shot. He was almost a

complete basket case.

"This was quite a blow for me," Eldon wrote in a recap of his military career. "I was so glad that I was through flying combat, as it would have been much worse for me after that. It had been very tough on me already."

At this point, Eldon's crew had completed all of their 47 flying missions, and he awaited transportation back to the United States. He arrived in San Francisco on January 22, 1945, and traveled by train to San Antonio, then took a bus home from there. He spent ten days at home, the first time he had seen his family in two-and-a-half years since his departure.

Buford's wife, Jerry, recalls Eldon as "all shook up" when he returned home from the war.

"He couldn't even hold a plate without shaking," she said. "He was so nervous."

Eldon could not talk about his war experiences, and even had See 'Missing' on page 9.

Following Saturday's incident, the Clarendon Baseball Association released a memo to its coaches stressing the need to prioritize child safety at its ballgames. The memo urges parents to keep their children with them and keep an eye on them at all times.

"Parents should not bring their children to the field and turn them loose unsupervised," the memo said. 'Children should sit with parents at games. The potential for child safety problems can occur at any game or any time, regardless of the age or gender of the child. Clarendon is not immune from the problems other bigger cities have."

Babcock trial begins next week

The Capital Murder trial of Robert Babcock is scheduled to begin next week in Memphis with jury selection beginning on Wednesday, May 30.

District Attorney Luke Inman's office said the state is not seeking the death penalty in the case. The maximum punishment range will be life in prison without parole.

The case is expected to last several days, and the court has calendared the trial until June 8.

In related news, Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Babcock's mother, Gayle Edes, was briefly jailed again Monday morning, May 21, by the order of District Judge Stuart Messer after she failed to appear for a docket call of the district court in Clarendon. She was released shortly afterward, also on the judge's order.

Edes is also facing a first degree felony charge of Injury to a Child by Omission because the state alleges that she, by omission, caused serious bodily injury to Jones by her failure to get medical attention for the boy.

guest commentary **Voter ID law** silences the voice of people

"There has never been in my lifetime, since we got rid of the poll tax and all the Jim Crow burdens on voting, the determined effort to limit the franchise that we see today. Why should we disenfranchise people forever once they've paid their price?" - Bill Clinton

Despite the propaganda being advanced by the government, the purpose of voter ID laws is not to eliminate voter fraud and protect the integrity of

elections. Rather, their aim is to silence and suppress as many American voters as possible and increase the already widening chasm between the electorate and our government representatives. speak truth In fact, voter ID laws are the icing on the cake when it to power comes to public officials shutby john whitehead ting Americans out of the decision-making process, silencing dissent, and making sure that those in power stay in power and have the last word on government policy. In other words, voter ID laws are the final step in securing the American corporate oligarchy, the unchallenged rule by the privileged and few. Voter ID laws which have swept the nation since 2011 effectively erode our system of representative government by blocking access to the seats of power by those who need it most: the young, the old, women and minorities. For example, Viviette Applewhite, who marched with Martin Luther King Jr. during the Civil Rights Movement, has cast a ballot in almost every presidential election since she first voted for John F. Kennedy in 1960. However, as a result of Pennsylvania's new voter ID law, which requires voters to present a photo ID to election officials on Election Day, this may be the first year the 93-year-old is not able to vote because she, like many others, does not have access to the required legal documents necessary in order to acquire a photo ID. This is not the first time in American history such tactics have been used to suppress the populace. For example, the South after Reconstruction was a textbook example of voter suppression, from poll taxes to grandfather clauses. At the same time in the North, immigrant voters were being suppressed via literacy tests. These were not formal barriers which said "no blacks" or "no immigrants" may vote, but requirements which while ostensibly aimed at preserving the integrity of elections were in reality meant to silence average Americans, much like today's voter ID laws. During that same time period, the state of New Jersey, which had for 17 years allowed women to vote, pulled the plug on women's suffrage. In contrast, as Judith Browne-Dianis of the Advancement Project noted, today's voter ID laws are "the most significant setback to voting rights in this country in a century." -Twenty-four laws or executive orders restricting access to the ballot have passed in 17 states since the beginning of 2011 and 74 more such bills are pending. By November 2012, there will be at least 30 states that will require identification to be shown at the polls. This requirement will disenfranchise up to 11% of eligible voters in America, and will have an even larger impact on groups that have traditionally faced discrimination at the polls. Thus far, voter ID laws have passed or are on their way to passage in Alabama, Kansas, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin, Virginia, and Rhode Island. However, in March 2012, the Justice Department blocked the laws in Texas and South Carolina that would disproportionately hurt minority voters. The concern in Texas arose over its disproportionate impact on Hispanic voters and a lack of evidence of widespread voter fraud. Insisting that Mississippi's voter ID law will violate the 1965 Voting Rights Act, the Mississippi NAACP has asked the Justice Department to block its state's voter ID law, as well. Surprisingly, there is an overwhelming lack of evidence that voter fraud - the official justification for these laws – is occurring on a mass scale. For example, Florida has only seen 31 potential cases of voter fraud in the past three years, only three of which resulted in arrests. Between 2002 and 2007, the Justice Department conducted an investigation in order to rout out potential voter fraud. During that time period, there were 300 million votes cast, but only 86 successful convictions under anti-voter fraud laws. Of those 86 convicted, many were simply ex-felons and immi-

FDA Approves Treatment for Plague

Levaquin (levofloxacin) previously noted to be used in the treatment of respiratory, urinary and skin infections has been recently approved by the FDA for the treatment of plague (a bacterial infection that is rare and may cause death). This approval was based on a study in test animals.

Only 1,000 to 2,000 cases of plague occur throughout the world each year. Bubonic plague (infection of the lymph nodes), pneumonic plague (infection of the lungs), and septicemic plague (infection of the blood) are the three most common forms of plague which can be spread to humans. Plague may be contracted through bites from infected fleas, and contact with infected animals or humans. Symptoms of plague may vary depending on the type. Plague has been known to occur in New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado in the past. While side effects may occur while taking Levaquin, the benefit of being treated with this product outweighs the risks associated with plague. Streptomycin, doxycycline, and tetracycline have previously been approved for the treatment of

to be admitted into a convalescent hospital on an army base at Santa Ana, Calif., for 90 days. He did not share the news he discovered about Calvin's crash with his family. He would not open up with this infor-. mation until 15 years later.

Eldon was present for one sad family event while home; sending Buford off to army boot camp, the only brother he had left.

Buford was 22, leaving his wife and son of 28 days behind on February 2. He said he did not look forward to serving after seeing the effects war had on his brothers.

"But you got a call and you had to go," he said.

time saying goodbye to her husband. She stayed with her parents for the duration of Buford's service.

I saw the letter lying on the dresser when I got back," he said. "I was trying to get back myself, but she got me home. Then I started all over again."

The brothers' mother was far from done writing letters, though. She wrote the other moms of the 11 members of Calvin's crew, hoping to discover clues and more information about their disappearance. She spent the rest of her life searching for her youngest son, believing he would come home at any minute.

"All the mothers were grasping at straws," Jerry said, "just trying to find any information."

While Buford served, he went Jerry had a particularly difficult to the headquarters where Calvin was stationed and asked if they knew any more information about his brother's disappearance, but they

wrote. He did not have a family of his own, but he could not wait to be an uncle. Unfortunately, he never got to see his nephew.

"He was all excited he was going to be an uncle," Jerry said. "They were raised with three boys," so they didn't know how to handle girls."

A headstone was eventually sent by the military to the Holland family in memory of Calvin and was installed in Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon.

Buford turned 89 on May 23, and Eldon is 90 years old. Both men are married with families of their own, Buford still living in Lelia Lake and Eldon residing in Big Spring.



Wreck puts two Amarillo boys in hospital

Two Amarillo youth were hospitalized after a one-vehicle rollover one-half mile east of Clarendon Sunday afternoon, May 20.

DPS Trooper Kelly Hill said 17-year-old Trevor Taylor was driving a 2005 Ford Escape westbound on US 287 when he traveled into the center median and struck the embankment of the crossover.

Taylor's vehicle became airborne for approximately 105 feet before landing on its right side and rolling $5\frac{1}{4}$ times and coming to rest in the eastbound lanes of traffic.

Taylor was transported by Donley County EMŞ to Northwest Texas Hospital, and his brother, 12-year-old Benjamin Taylor was transported to Northwest by Life-Star. Hill said seatbelts were worn by both young men.

No cause of the accident has been released pending the conclusion of the investigation.


