#### **CEDC** facade grant program is renewed

Property owners and businesses on Kearney Street have until September 10 to apply for money to improve their storefronts under the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation's 2012 Façade Grant Program.

The CEDC had budgeted funds in this fiscal year but then put the program on hiatus at the request of City Hall as it applied for a state Downtown Revitalization Grant. After that state money was denied, the CEDC Board agreed this month to reactivate the program for the remainder of the fiscal year ending September 30.

Under the program, the CEDC will provide matching funds for improvements made to storefronts in the 100, 200, and 300 blocks of South Kearney Street for projects that can be anything from new signage to a complete storefront remodel. The maximum award is \$2,000.

Grant applications are available from CEDC Executive Director Chandra Eggemeyer inside City Hall.

## Clarendon firefighters' quick response save home

Quick action by the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department saved a house on West Third Street from being a total loss Tuesday morning.

Dispatchers paged out firemen at 8:26 a.m., and they were on the scene five minutes later. A total of five trucks and 11 firemen responded.

Clarendon Fire Chief Jeremy Powell said fire fighters noticed smoke coming from the attic vents and then saw flames coming from the kitchen window at the back of the house. The blaze was under control in about an hour.

The Josh Allred family was moving into the home this week and had part of their belongings there. Powell said boxes were on top of the kitchen stove when the electric company turned power onto the home Tuesday morning. No one was home at the time of the blaze.

Powell said fire and water damage was contained to the kitchen area, but the rest of the house suffered smoke and heat damage. The owner of the rent house reportedly has the structure insured, and the Allred family has renter's insurance that will likely covering their belongings.

In light of claims that we've been in an economic recovery since late 2009, news such as the unemployment rate bumping up to 8.3 percent is disconcerting. Our so-called "recovery" is slower than Japan's during its Lost Decade. In response, many are calling for even more government largess to promote prosperity, yet they conveniently ignore the magnitude of our attempts thus far. Such thinking will keep us stuck in the mire. Allow me to tell you why we can't hitchhike our way to recovery:

Since the beginning of the recession, the Federal Reserve increased the money supply over 64 percent by \$3.4 trillion. Annual federal government spending increased by over \$875 billion or 32 percent. Our national debt increased \$5.8 trillion from 2007 through 2011.

These stimulus efforts have provided little in the way of sustainable economic progress. Initially things looked superficially promising. Nominal and real GDP both recovered, and at an annual rate of 4 percent as recently as late 2011. The unemployment rate fell from its peak of 10 percent in October 2010. Alas, such happy movements have stalled of late.

A full three years into the so-called recovery, official unemployment remains stuck above 8 percent. The employment situation is not even as good as the official rate indicates. Monthly job creation during the second quarter of 2012 averaged only 75,000 per month—less than half of what it was a year ago. The average duration of unemployment has been fluctuating around 40 weeks since last March. Of those unemployed, 40 percent have been without work for at least 27 weeks—one tenth of a percent less than where it stood this January. The unemployment rate would be much higher had not the labor force participation rate been at a 30-year low.

The problem is that any sustainable improvement in employment must be predicated on private productive activity, because labor demand is directly related to the value workers help to produce. Private business activity has improved since 2009; however we have yet to return to where we were before the crash. Net domestic private business investment, the amount of investment over and above what is necessary merely to maintain our current stock of capital, peaked in the third quarter of 2007 and began the downhill slide into the Great Recession. It went negative, meaning we were consuming capital during all of 2009, but it has been continually positive since. Despite recent upticks, however, net investment is still 32 percent below its pre-recession peak three years after recovery was declared.

The more recent the data, the worse the news. For the past two months, the ISM manufacturing composite index has indicated declines in industrial production. Manufacturing had not decreased for two successive months since 2009, but June's ISM survey of heavy industry revealed the largest single monthly decline since 2001.

This should teach us we cannot pave the road to prosperity with monetary inflation—by increasing the money supply out of thin air like we've been doingand government spending. That some people improve their financial situation as recipients of government expenditure is true enough, but any improvement of the economic situation that is predicated on government spending is a temporary respite at best. Sustaining a higher standard of living through statist means requires ever increasing government spending.

This is a problem because increased government spending requires funding through increased taxation, borrowing, or monetary inflation. Increased taxes consume capital by decreasing taxpayers' ability and incentive to save and invest. Government borrowing from the non-bank public distorts investment by taking scarce factors of production out private entrepreneurial hands and puts them in inefficient bureaucratic hands. Monetary inflation via credit expansion further punishes savers by debasing the dollar and also stimulates capital malinvestment via artificially low interest rates. Unsustainable investments look profitable, when they really are not, so the structure of production is distorted against the desires of voluntary savers. Once the governmental gravy train slows down, bad investments are recognized for what they are and must be liquidated. Bankruptcies occur, and jobs are lost. The economic statistics begin to reveal more reality and less make-believe.

True recovery requires a free economy that encourages the development of the market division of labor, saving and the accumulation of capital, and a market price system free of manipulation that allows entrepreneurs to innovate and wisely invest resources. We cannot hitchhike to prosperity on the back of the Federal Reserve or the U.S. Treasury.

## Politicians are cheap entertainment

Our county commissioners approved the placement of this monument on the Courthouse Square. I understand that a few folks convinced the commissioners that this action is a good thing to do and is constitutional, perhaps based upon a misunderstanding of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision regarding the monument located on the Texas State Capital grounds, and the actions of surrounding Texas Panhandle communities.


In the past, counties in Georgia, Oklahoma, Alabama, and Kentucky have challenged the constitutionality of the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States. To date, all the challenges have been ruled unconstitutional. Two of the poorest counties in southern Kentucky were forced remove their Decalogue monuments, and were then compelled to pay the American Civil Liberties Union \$400,000 in legal fees. This is what is often called an unintended consequence.

A group of citizens got a burr under their saddle and are of the persuasion that they can successfully challenge the Supreme Court's position. Supposedly, this group of people has pledged to defend Donley County in the event of a lawsuit challenging the monument. If so, is their commitment in writing. Will this group also pay the legal fees that may result from this action? If not, it

could get really expensive.

Personally, I think the **Donley County** Commissioners' decision puts Donley County at risk I'm not sure

to meet the standards the Supreme Court has placed upon public officials who choose to challenge the law and display the Decalogue on public property. The nation's highest court has put officials on notice that their motives must be clearly secular for such displays to pass constitutional muster. What happens if the Supreme Court rules against Donley County?

Past decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court are somewhat conflicting and exhibit doctrinal instability regarding the religious display cases. The Eighth, Ninth, and Tenth Circuit Courts have issued conflicting rulings that will ultimately need to be clarified. I'm not sure it's prudent for Donley County to join the fray and risk an enormous legal expense, in addition to losing a private investment of \$20,000 for the monument.

There is still time to stop this project if the silent majority will speak up.

Thankfully, our county commissioners are not the only public officials living on the edge. For example, consider Republican Lubbock County Judge Tom Head. Not wanting Missouri Republican Todd Akin to grab all the recent political headlines, Judge Head proclaimed that civil unrest or even civil war, possibly including a menacing United Nations invasion force, trekking across the Great South Plains towards Lubbock, could result if President Obama is re-elected.

Head, a Texas Tech graduate with a degree in psychology, stated, "(Obama is) is going to try to hand over the sover-

eignty of the United States to the U.N., and what is going to happen when that happens?" Head then added, "I'm thinking the worst. Civil unrest, civil disobedience, civil war maybe. And we we're not just talking a few riots here and demonstrations, we're talking Lexington, Concord, take up arms and get rid of the guy." The Judge then went on to predict that if that happens, Obama will "send in U.N. troops.

"I don't want 'em in Lubbock County. OK. So I'm going to stand in front of their armored personnel carrier wants "trained, equipped, seasoned veteran officers to back me."

# Drugs in the News

Medication for Diabetic Eye Condition

Recently, the FDA approved Lucentis (ranibizumab injection) for treatment of diabetic macular edema (DME), an eye condition that causes blurred vision, severe vision loss and sometimes blindness. This condition occurs when fluid from blood vessels leaks into the area of the eye called the macula, the center of the eye's retina. Diabetes is the leading cause of new cases of blindness among people aged 20 to 74. Lucentis is a recombinant humanized monoclonal antibody fragmen. It works by inhibiting VEGF-A, a protein that plays a critical role in increasing the permeability (leakiness) of the blood vessels in the eyes.

In clinical trials, a significant number of individuals treated with Lucentis showed an effective improvement in their vision and were significantly more likely to maintain their vision for at least 24 months. Lucentis comes as an intravitreal injection, recommended to be administrated once a month. Hopefully, the approval of Lucentis will help in the fight against blindness and provide alternative treatment option to laser surgery for individuals with DME.

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or Company) publishes this notice that on July 27, 2012, it filed its Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates and Reconcile Fuel Costs (the Petition) with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or the Commission) in Docket No. 40443, and with those municipal authorities in its Texas service territory that have original jurisdiction over SWEPCO's electric rates. This notice is being published in accordance with Section 36.103 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act, Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)(1), and Commission Substantive Rule 25.235(b).

SWEPCO is proposing to change its rates for electric service provided to all of its 181,000 Texas retail customers. All such customers and all classes of customers will be affected by this change. As it relates to the reconciliation of fuel costs, the proposed change will affect all Texas retail customers who pay fixed fuel factors.

## STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

SWEPCO's request to change its rates is based on the financial results for a 12-month test year ending on December 31, 2011. The effect of SWEPCO's proposed rate change would be to increase its adjusted test year revenues by \$83,087,295, an increase of 33.8%, exclusive of fuel revenues. The overall impact of the rate change, considering both fuel and non-fuel revenues, is a 17.8% increase. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.

SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Petition and Statement of Intent. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission and other regulatory authorities.

## TARIFF REVISIONS

SWEPCO is proposing revisions to most tariffs and schedules. In addition, in order to facilitate future transmission cost recovery factor (TCRF) and distribution cost recovery factor (DCRF) filings pursuant to Commission Substantive Rules 25:239 and 25:243, respectively, SWEPCO is requesting that the Commission set the TCRF to zero and establish baseline values that will be used to calculate SWEPCO's TCRF and DCRF in future dockets.

## RECONCILIATION OF FUEL COSTS

SWEPCO has also requested authority to reconcile its fuel costs for the period from April 1, 2009 through December 31, 2011 (the Reconciliation Period). SWEPCO's request, if granted, will affect all Texas retail customers who pay fixed fuel factors.

During the Reconciliation Period, SWEPCO incurred a total of \$588,826,910 in eligible fuel, fuel-related, and purchased-power costs to generate and purchase electric energy for its Texas retail customers. For the Reconciliation Period, SWEPCO calculates that it has under-recovered its Texas retail fuel, fuel related, and purchased-power costs by \$7,191,375 excluding interest. Including interest, SWEPCO's cumulative under-recovery balance is \$3,936,492 as of December 31, 2011.
