City aldermen issue \$1.35 million debt

The City of Clarendon issued \$1.35 million in bonded indebtedness during a called meeting last Thursday, September 27.

Members of the Board of Aldermen voted unanimously to issue \$700,000 in general obligation bonds, which were approved by voters in a May election with the money going toward street improvements.

The board also voted unanimously to issue \$650,000 in tax notes for water and sewer line replacements under streets to be repaved.

The city will pay just 1.620 percent interest on the money it borrowed, and the final payments on the debt is scheduled for 2019.



City puts Little on 3 months probation

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen placed City Administrator Lambert Little on probation for three months following an evaluation of his performance last Tuesday, September 25.

The board met behind closed doors for more than an hour and a half to conduct the administrator's annual evaluation before calling Little into their meeting on the second floor of City Hall. Citizens left downstairs could hear yelling from Alderman Tommy Hill and later from Mr. Little before the board reconvened in open session after another hour and 15 minutes.

When the board reconvened, Mayor Larry Hicks asked if the aldermen wanted to take action following the closed session discussion. Alderman Abby Patten said she expected to see the city be run more effectively in terms of finances, employees, and resources.

Little suggested a three- or sixmonth probationary period with him meeting with the board once a month to see if he can reach their expectations. Alderman Tommy Hill said he would agree to three months "to see if everything can be done in the best interest of the city and the citizens.

The board then voted 3-2 for the probationary period with Hill, Patten and Jesus Hernandez in favor and Aldermen Will Thompson and Terry Noble opposed. Noble said he didn't feel like much would be happening in the next three months for Little to be fairly judged.

Hicks urged all the aldermen to come to Little's office to let him know personally what they expected of him.

In other city business last Tuesday, the board considered the tax rate for the 2013 fiscal year and voted to maintain the current rate of \$0.65 per \$100 valuation on a 3-2 vote with Hill, Patten, and Hernandez in favor and Thompson and Noble opposed.

The board of aldermen also approved the \$1.6 million 2013 fiscal budget also on a 3-2 vote with the yay's and nay's breaking along the same lines.

In public comments at the beginning of the meeting, the board heard from Robert Benson regarding the city's past sponsorship of the Junior Rodeo Cowboy Association and his desire for the city to sponsor it again and from Laura Paul regarding a complaint she had previously filed about concerns she has regarding a property in her neighborhood.

During a budget hearing before the regular meeting, editor Roger Estlack inquired about the size of the proposed municipal budget and the amount available for contingency expenses in the coming year, which is about \$10,900.

Romney a little low on number getting checks

Forty-nine percent of the American public is on the federal teat, and they are sucking the old sow dry.

It is a fact straight from government sources, and it was published long before Mitt Romney was caught on an open microphone. The former Massachusetts Governor found himself in hot water with the leftists last month when he was "exposed" for saying behind closed doors that 47 percent

of the American people would never vote for him because they are dependent on government checks.

But months before he said it, an article in October 2011by Brian Faler with Bloomberg News detailed that actually 49 percent of Americans get some Commentary kind of government check, and by roger estlack his number came straight from

the United States Census... an organization run since 2009 by the Obama Administration. Furthermore, Faler wrote that 63 percent of all federal spending that year "will consist of checks written to individuals for which the government receives no services," and that fact came from the White House budget office.

By comparison, only 18 percent of Americans were on the government dole in 1940. The number of people getting assistance means it's hard for either party to enact meaningful reforms to rein in spending, and, as Romney said, it makes it harder for a conservative to get elected. The message of personal responsibility and self reliance rings hollow with nearly half of the populace, most of who are in favor of cutting any program... except the one that benefits them.

Able-bodied, lazy people on welfare is a problem, but there is so much more to it than that. There are Social Security and Medicare recipients who feel they paid into a system that now owes them benefits (even if many will receive far more than they pay in over a lifetime), there are college students receiving federal education grants (the number of which went up 70 percent in five years), and single or low-income parents who qualify for daycare assistance. All of these programs - and dozens and dozens of others - bleed the treasury, none of them are authorized by Constitution, and they all violate the concept put forth by our Founding Fathers that the federal government is supposed to be limited in its size and scope.

However well intentioned the programs were in their origins, we have reached a point where federal assistance - in all its many forms - threatens to bankrupt the government of the United States and the only way to stop it is at the ballot box. But there again, Mr. Romney is correct in his assessment because even the suggestion of reforms brings out the fire-breathing accusations from Democrats that Republicans just want to starve children, kill old people, and stop anyone from going to college.

Americans have to wake up to what's going on, and all the sacred cows have to be put on the budget altar. Otherwise, the \$16 trillion debt this nation has acquired will soon look like peanuts as the costs of retiring Baby Boomers and the mandates of Obamacare gut the treasury in the coming years.

Romney's problem wasn't that he wrote off half the electorate; it was that he told the truth. And the truth hurts.

District attorney seems soft on crime

After contemplating the outrageously lenient plea bargain agreement (nine months in county jail) between District Attorney Luke Inman and Gayle Edes, in return for her guilty plea to Injury to a Child by Omission, I got to thinking, which can be an adventure for

While explaining his rational for the agreement, Mr. Inman stated, "The injury to a child case by omission was not something that we could file immediately due to factual and legal hurdles we had to overcome. It's not as simple as going forward against the perpetrator who actually committed the assault. There had to be forensic medical testimony that would support the injury occurred as a result of not seeking medical attention, and that part of the investigation took time."


I understand that Gayle Edes' health and deferred adjudication for the perps. has suffered during these intervening months. If I were facing this charge my health would suffer considerably, too - although not as much as Chance Jones' health suffered. I'm still outraged that Mr. Inman basically let Gayle Edes walk. The dirty little fact that Chance died from his injuries apparently made little impact upon Mr. Inman's sense of moral and judicial outrage.

In the case of Gayle Edes, justice was not served. I wondered how justice is normally served in the 100th Judicial District. A two year search of CLARENDON ENTERPRISE records, which do not include all the case dispositions in District Attorney Inman's prosecutions over this period of time, I discovered that justice is usually served with a generous helping of leniency.

This leniency makes me wonder why this is so? One thing I've always loved about Texas is that we are a people who value law and order and are known

to be tough on crime.

Perhaps Mr. Inman just doesn't want to be bothered with trying cases in court, It's much easier, and probably cheaper, to plea



bargain than to prosecute. After all, he does have a large area to cover, and it may be tiring to spend all his time driving around his district, toting all those files and depositions around. Why not just plea bargain those cases that don't involve unseemly death or injury? Now, a few of his cases involving injury did result in probation

More than a few of Mr. Inman's cases involved some remarkable case dispositions. For example, in one case, a man pleaded guilty to kidnapping, a 3rd degree felony. He received three years probation – for kidnapping for heaven's sake!

Even worse, another fellow pled guilty to sexual assault of a child. His sentence? Probation, with deferred adjudication - which means he doesn't have to register as a convicted sex offender. Nice,

On that same day, another disagreeable fellow pled guilty to aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, and received two years probation with deferred adjudication. In case you didn't know, deferred adjudication means that if you keep your nose clean for the duration of your probation or sentence, your record is wiped clean of your crime.

Over this time period several people

have plea bargained burglary of habitat - which means they broke into an occupied house - into case dispositions that resulted in probated sentences with deferred adjudication. And we wonder why we have folks breaking into our local business, five of 'em at last count.

Included also, were a few cases of misdemeanor drug possession - marijuana for example - that also resulted in a couple of years of probation with deferred adjudication. Meanwhile, there was an ill tempered man who pled guilty to aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. He also received probation with deferred adjudication. There must have been some really interesting extenuating circumstance for him to the receive a similar sentence as the guy won was busted for possession of pot.

Throw in the two idiots who stole some water meters, with accompanying accessories, who also received probation with deferred adjudication, and you get my point.

For whatever reasons, Mr. Inman does not seem to be too tough on crime, which is good for the offenders and not so good for the victims and law abiding citizens.

It's a shame because we (Donley County) have an exceptional sheriff and sheriff's department. Sheriff Blackburn and his chief deputy Randy Bond, along with the rest of the deputies, do an excellent job of keeping the peace. They are excellent investigators and are highly committed solving crimes and keeping us as safe as possible. Sometimes, the leniency of our district attorney may



I have sat in front of my computer many times since we came home Monday, September 17, 2012 trying to figure out what to say....I am at a loss for words. For the past 20 months I have tried to be strong and have had little time to grieve. Instead I have prepared myself for war.

After Robert was convicted and sentenced, I felt the way many people did - relieved that justice had been served. But those feelings were short lived because I had tricked my mind into believing when you fight really hard for something you normally are rewarded. But, my reward never came, Chance was still gone.

So to respond to Gayle's plea hearing on [September 17] is difficult because I know that no matter how hard we fight Chance is never coming home. Should she have received a harsher punishment? YES. But, I am very thankful for all the hard work and dedication that Luke Inman, Hattie Sanderson and all of the individuals involved in helping fight for justice. Everyone worked so hard for a little boy who deserved so much better than to have suffered at the hands of his own blood. I have read very few articles about Chance's death unable to bear the truth, but I have read every



single comment that has been posted by readers from Clarendon to Oklahoma and was never able to respond because I didn't want to do anything to jeopardize the upcoming cases. I feel that I have waited long enough... Chance Mark was LOVED by so many people and I am thankful every day to have had the opportunity to hear him say, "I love you."

Many people make the comment that Chance was never given the chance to be truly loved by

anyone. This is the farthest thing from the truth; Chance was loved so deeply by so many people. If anyone were to truly look at the pictures of Chance they would see his amazing smile and glowing eyes know that he was a happy child. Chance Mark had an amazing non-blood related family that would have fought to the ends of the earth to keep him safe. Chance touched so many people's hearts with his humor and beautiful smile and why anyone would ever want to harm him is unimaginable. I am reminded every day of how precious life is how fast it can all be taken

Memories and pictures of Chance is all that we have left and what happens to Robert Babcock and Gayle Edes is now in God's hands and they too will suffer their own punishment. They were never apart of Chance's life and will never be seen as anything more than murders

- father and grandmother are not titles that they deserve.

Chance Mark Jones will never be forgotten and his memory will live on forever in our hearts. If you take anything away from Chance's story please remember this, "Don't take a Chance, against child abuse," because you can never bring them back once they are gone. You have a voice where many children like Chance did not. Speak up and help to prevent a child from ever having to suffer the way that Chance did... no-one deserves to be hurt, especially a child.

James 1:27 tells us that true religion, the kind that God accepts, is to look after orphans and widows in their distress. God has always put emphasis on taking care of those who can't take care of themselves. It doesn't mean just financially. It means protection also. That is one reason Christians are very passionate about abortion, as it is the murder of the most defenseless.

Over the years, we can see in our nation the lack of protection of our older people but even more so the lack of regard for children. There has been a trend that crimes committed against these two groups go relatively unpunished. Abortion is one of these atrocities. Another is sex crimes or molestations of children. The criminals who do these crimes are habitual offenders and often aren't given any time to serve or very small sentences. They are often put on probation and given at least one more shot to molest again. Crimes involving money or the rape of an adult, seems to draw a harsher sentence than a crimeagainst a child. Why is that? I believe when we made it legal to kill unborn children that we devalued children's lives.

Even in our own community we saw a child murdered and the accomplice was given probation and little time to serve. Ask yourself this question, "Would the driver of a getaway car get just probation if Herring Bank or Pilgrim's Bank was robbed?" I think we know the answer to that. In Leila Lake, we had another child molester caught and given only probation. It is a scary thought how little value our children have today. This criminal is going to walk the streets free and we know that these type criminals often reoffend. Whose poor child is next? It is a matter of time if you look at the statistics. This isn't just in our area. These abusers of children often get probation. Why do we put up with this? Because our nation and communities have turned away from God, that's why. We protect those who are important or can vote. We protect those with money and influence. But the poor child, who has no value to society, is left to defend himself.

My prayer is that we change that philosophy in our own community first. If every small town made that commitment, maybe, in time, we could change the country. But, it has to start in our homes first. May God give us the courage to take care of His weakest.

New Medication May Reduce Pancreatitis Risk

A recent study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) reported that statins may reduce the risk of pancreatitis in persons with normal or mildly increased triglycerides. Statins are a class of medications used to lower cholesterol levels. Pancreatitis is the inflammation of the pancreas. The pancreas releases the hormones (insulin and glucagon), as well as digestive enzymes that help in the digestion of food. Pancreatitis ranges from a mild selflimiting episode to a severe or fatal event.

This analysis in JAMA opposes early observational studies and suggests that statins may reduce the risk of developing pancreatitis among individuals with normal to slightly elevated triglyceride levels. In this study, researchers concluded that statins lowered the risk of pancreatitis by 23 percent. Researchers emphasized that these findings are specific for individuals with normal or mildly increased triglycerides, and not applicible to individuals with very high triglyceride levels.
