White charged with stealing \$17,000

A Clarendon woman is out on bond this week, accused of stealing money from an elderly resident in her care.

Tammy White, age 48, is charged with a third degree felony of forgery, according to Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn.

White was arrested January 24 after a week-long investigation, the sheriff said. The subject is believed to have stolen more than \$17,000 by writing checks on the account of the senior in her care.

Justice of the Peace Connie Havens arraigned White, setting bail at \$25,000. The woman has no criminal history, the sheriff said.

Hicks to run again for Clarendon mayor

After one week of filing candidates are being slow to emerge for most races for local offices.

With the exception of the City of Howardwick (see related article), three of the other five local governments had not had anyone sign up as of Tuesday morning. The Donley County Hospital District and the City of Clarendon did have some activity, however.

Incumbents Wayne Tubbs (Place 1) and Melinda McAnear (Place 3) have applied to run for re-election on the hospital board, which oversees emergency medical services and indigent care in the county. They are joined by a new comer, Carey Wann, who is seeking the Place 2 seat currently held by Bob Watson.

Mayor Larry Hicks has filed his application at Clarendon City Hall to seek re-election. In addition to his position, the city also has two aldermen's positions up for election this year

Hedley has three positions open on its Board of Aldermen this year but had no candidates as of Tuesday.

Likewise, the three positions up this year on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees had not attracted any candidates.

Hedley ISD was also still looking for candidates for its Board of Trustees where two terms are up this

The Way Forward, Part 4 CC can lead city to growth


A wise man once noted that, "It was never boom or bust in Clarendon. It was just always a struggle."

That tongue-in-cheek comment may sound a bit pessimistic to some, but in reality it actually reveals one of our community's strengths, which has been a certain economic stability over the last century.

Not having been blessed with oil or gas wealth, Clarendon and Donley County hasn't seen the wild swings of good times and bad times that some other communities have had. We have, instead, enjoyed a

couple of assets that have bolstered our situation compared to other rural West Texas communities, namely Lake Greenbelt since 1968 and Clarendon College since 1898.

Barring the occurrence editor's of a hundred-year flood, the lake's future doesn't look good right now, but Clarendon College remains the beacon on the



Enterprise columnist Fred Gray has taken to referring to CC as "The Pearl of the Panhandle," but your humble editor still prefers the tried and true moniker "The Athens of the Panhandle," reflecting its place in history as the Panhandle's first college as well as its ongoing role of providing an education - and therefore a path to a better life - for local and area students.

Much has been said about the opportunities our dear college offers students, but we must also realize that Clarendon College is the number one economic development tool our city has. It is critical that the Board of Regents and administration recognize that they are not just caretakers of a college. In a very real sense they can have a greater impact on the future of this town than the Chamber of Commerce, the Economic Development Corporation, or even the city council.

Consider this. Each fall, Clarendon College brings in about 300 students to live in our community for two semesters. In addition to enriching our town with cultural diversity and annual economic stimulus, this gives Clarendon an opportunity that most small cities could only dream about - prospective new citizens.

We probably all can think of someone who came to college here and either married a local person or returned here after going on to get their four-year degree. Each CC student from out of town is someone who potentially could settle down here... if they find the town to their liking and find an opportunity for employment here.

A constant influx of young people and young families is a tremendous asset to any community, particularly if those new citizens get a quality education while they are here.

The challenge for Clarendon College is growing enrollment on the home campus with an eye toward helping Clarendon and Donley County. The headcount for the last few semesters has been down after an extended period of growth. We trust that this is only a temporary reversal of fortune, and college officials are already making plans to get their numbers back up.

Plans to get CC back above total enrollment of 1,200 here and at its satellites in Pampa and Childress are great. We must look at growth everywhere, but it is also incumbent that we - alumni; taxpayers; and CC regents, administration, faculty, and staff - take a long look at what creative things can be done to boost enrollment on the home campus.

Over the last few years, we've seen an increased focus on athletics as the path to growth for the college, but each new sports team carries a cost of increased travel and other expenses. While we are certainly proud of our Bulldogs and Lady Bulldogs, we must also focus on bringing more traditional students to College Hill. We need to expand our course offerings, particularly in the fine arts, and recruit a more diverse student body whose members are interested not only in sports, rodeo, and judging but also in music, art,

drama, literature, and the sciences. One limitation to growth is the lack of student housing, and this column has more than once called on the college to work with the city and other entities to find solutions to this. But the college could also take better advantage of the housing it does have by opening one dormitory for the summer months and offering more classes during those sessions. This would have the added benefit of keeping more students - and their economic impact - in Clarendon over the summer months, which is something that will be sorely needed if Lake Greenbelt continues to shrink.

CC also needs to develop new technical programs that are based here in Clarendon. A truck driving program or a hospitality training program might be good additions. We've tried offering programs - such as wind energy and nursing - in Clarendon and Pampa and then shake our heads when the program migrates to a larger population center. If a program is in demand and it is offered only in Clarendon, students will come to Clarendon. We have seen this historically, and it is still true.

More students eventually means the need for more faculty members, and that means more good paying jobs for other potential new citizens. And in all of this, we must work hard to find ways to include our students and new instructors in our community, to cater to their needs, and attract them to our merchants.

The growth of Clarendon College must be paramount as we resolve to get involved in 2013.

Back in the halcyon days of the mid into providing 1950s, on sunny, pleasant afternoons, my late mother and Aunt Lillian, would spread several blankets out on the front lawn of our home on Koogle Street. Then, Janice, David Lynn, Barry, and I would lie out on the blankets and watch the changing shapes of the white, puffy clouds as they journeyed across the clear blue sky. Mom and Aunt Lillian would serve us treats as we challenged our imaginations while seeking out familiar shapes in the billowy marshmallow images as they travelled by.

Pleasant memories of those days will forever live in the distant recesses of my mind, and often remind me of the goodness of the people who populate the Rolling Plains.

When people fly over our land and drive through Donley County on Highway 287, as they frantically go about living their lives, they miss something special - really special. They miss the core goodness and steadiness of the people of the Plains, the men and women who descended from the tough, determined pioneers who settled this land from the late 1870s onward.

This part of Texas, the Eastern Panhandle, was, and is, not an easy place to carve out a comfortable life. Long periods of drought, followed by a couple years of precious rainfall, made it extremely difficult to coax the land into flowering forth with a bountiful harvest. Therefore, especially in the early years of settlement, most of the pioneers were cattlemen and stock farmers. Nutritious native grasses, along with adequate water, made it possible for large herds of cattle to be developed and shipped to Eastern markets.

Later, dry land farmers carved out a merger existence from the dry, merciless land - buffeted by a seemingly endless, howling wind. With the advent of irrigation, and technical advancement by our farmers, the land was finally nurtured

the bountiful harvest needed by America and a hungry world.

Fortunately, the miserly land and a capricious Mother Nature were unable to break

the indomitable wills of the sturdy people who initially settled this area of Texas. Their genes have been passed down through the generations, and further refined by the continuing struggle to tame this beautiful land.

Those who have gone before us have left us the legacy of a good, determined people who have created a society of decent, polite, and well-mannered citizens with a profound respect for life. People who fly-over and drive through this land seldom stop long enough to realize that they are visiting a very special place, peopled by a very special people.

Our ancestors had to be creative, smart, and possess a unique ability to adapt to rapid changes if they were to survive, much less flourish. Those characteristics are readily apparent in the people who now live in this area. Sure, we may not speak the "Queen's English" in this neck of the woods, but it is of little matter. We have had to whip the English twice, then save their bacon twice over the centuries. A little "twang" is just fine, and adds a little flavor to the local texture, thank you very much.

Plainsmen believe in good manners, and most of us continue to open doors for the ladies, use "yes sir" and "yes ma'am" in our social intercourse, and are polite to other folks. Most people around here are creative and

I once had a friend who, while driving through Donley County, had a flat tire. Within 20 minutes, three different people stopped and offered assistance. This is not unusual behavior for folks around here. Actually, it is common behavior, this willingness to help others - even those who don't hail from this neck of the woods.

bright too. If you don't believe me, ask 'em. The only negative, and most folks around here don't consider it to be a negative at all, regarding the citizens of Donley County is we may have a few too many tea party types. Of course, many of my relatives, and perhaps even my boss, are tea party sympathizers. So, this small disparaging sentiment is best overlooked. They seem to tolerate me well, so I overlook this one small item.



Let's keep Texas' states parks open

Last week, stories broke across Texas that Texas State Parks may need to close given proposed funding levels in the state budget. This news may have come as a shock to Texans given the state's current budget surplus.

The possible closure of state parks begs the following questions: what is the value of state parks, why are they facing a budget shortfall, and what mechanisms exist to ensure they remain open and thriving?

Our state parks are very much a Texas treasure, providing an affordable, fun and healthy way for families to explore Texas. With over a half-million acres of open space, parks also help protect our water quality and wildlife habitats. Furthermore, the 8 million annual visitors to our parks provide a significant boost to our economy. The Texas parks system generates 12,000 jobs across the state, and out-of-state tourists pump \$283 million annually into our local communities.

Outdoor spaces are very popular among Texans. A 2013 statewide poll conducted by Hill Research Consultants shows that 84 percent of Texans see state parks as essential to healthy active lifestyles, and 85 percent of Texans acknowledge a need to protect our natural areas.

Yet we now find ourselves in a situation where the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) may have to close state parks. TPWD requested an additional \$11.2 million dollars for the operation of state parks in the 2014-2015 budget. While Senate and House budgets did allocate an additional \$6.9 million in funding, staff at the Legislative Budget Board interpreted these figures to mean 7 state parks could close.

Our state parks system is already facing tough times after TPWD saw its budget cut deeply during the last legislative session. Over 100 employees were laid off, some park operations and maintenance were reduced, and a popular local park grant program was eliminated. The parks system also suffered from the brutal drought and wildfires of 2011.

The good news is that a solution exists to the dire situation facing our state park system. In 1993, the Texas Legislature dedicated a portion of the sales tax on sporting goods to help fund Texas parks. Comptroller Susan Combs projects this fund will generate \$265 million over the coming 2014-2015 biennium, more than enough money to adequately fund our state park system.

But here's the catch. The Texas Legislature frequently diverts the Sporting Good Sales Tax intended for state parks to other areas of the budget. This

is part of a larger debate over "truth-inbudgeting" that involves many other fees and taxes being diverted away from their intended purpose.

How much is being diverted from parks funding? The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department only received approximately one-quarter of the Sporting Goods Sales Tax revenues for the 2012-2013 biennium.

The 2013 Hill Research poll also shows strong support for using the Sporting Goods Sales Tax to fund state parks. 76 percent of respondents support using revenue from the tax for "Acquiring, maintaining and operating state and local parks."

We don't need new taxes to solve the parks funding crisis. The Sporting Goods Sales Tax, if used for its intended purpose, generates sufficient revenue to keep our state park system healthy and thriving.

We can do better. Let's take pride in our state park system by funding it at adequate levels. Let's keep Texas parks open.

New Drug for Type 2 Diabetes

Recently, an advisory committee of the FDA recommended the approval of a new drug to treat type 2 diabetes in adults. It is called Invokana (canagliflozin). In clinical trials, individuals who took Invokana showed a significant improvement in their ability to control blood sugar. In addition, an improvement in weight loss and reduction in blood pressure was reported, compared to those who took a fake diabetes drug. These results were the same for the three special populations included in the study: older persons, those with moderate renal impairment, and individuals who had or were at risk for cardiovascular disease.

Type 2 diabetes is a chronic condition that affects the body's ability to metabolize sugar, or glucose. Pancreatic beta cells cannot keep up with the body's demand for insulin. Invokana works by inhibiting a selective sodium glucose co-transporter 2 (SGLT2), blocking the re-absorption of glucose by the kidney. It increases glucose excretion, and lowers blood glucose levels in people with diabetes who have elevated blood glucose levels.




