5K to honor Jones' memory

Runners and walkers will crowd the JA Ranch Road this Saturday to raise awareness about child abuse during the first Chance Mark Jones Memorial 5K Walk/Run.

As of Tuesday morning, more than 180 people had registered for the event. Some of those just want to be supporters of the effort, but organizers believe about 160 people will actually participate in the event, which is coinciding with Child Abuse Prevention Month.

The race will start and end at the Community Fellow-

ship Church and will run along the scenic JA Ranch Road. Sign-ins start at 7 a.m., and the start time is 8 a.m. Participants who have already registered are encouraged to pick up their race packets on Friday evening from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the Best Western Red River Inn.

In addition to local participants, the event has drawn numerous runners and walkers from all over the Texas Panhandle and other parts of the state. Participants are registered from as far off as Burkburnett, and sponsorships have come in from as far as

San Antonio. Sponsorships are still being accepted to support the race, and proceeds will go towards a playground project that can be enjoyed by all the children of Donley County.

The Clarendon Lions Club is hosting the event in conjunction with the Donley County Child Welfare Board. The race is intended to bring the community together to honor the life of four-year-old Chance Mark Jones, who died on January 5, 2011, after two weeks of abuse by his biological father in a rural home near Clarendon. Jones would have

celebrated his seventh birthday on April 11.

Those interested in running or walking in the 5K (a little more than three miles) can sign up the day of the event, but T-shirt supplies are extremely limited. Registrations may also be picked up in person at the Clarendon Visitor Center located at the Mulkey Theatre, 110 S. Kearney.

Citizens speak up for HISD coach

Several citizens showed up to address the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees last Tuesday night, April 2, in the wake of the board voting not to renew the contract of Athletic Director and Coach Darrell Wallace.

Wallace, who is finishing his first year at Hedley, was reportedly blindsided when the board considered employee contracts at a March 19 meeting and voted not to accept the superintendent's recommendation to renew his contract.

Minutes of the March 19 meeting have not been made available, but sources tell the Enterprise that three board members - Dana Bell, Ted Wright, and Mark Howard - voted to accept the recommendation to renew Wallace. But they were opposed by Karen Watt, Tonja Ruthardt, James Edward Potts, and Bonnie Brown.

Five citizens spoke up last week in Wallace's defense during public comments, and one spoke against him.

Troy Monroe said he didn't think the board had given Wallace enough time to turn things around, and Katherine Monroe said the issue was not just about Wallace but about the future of the school, the town, and the kids and she questioned the personal motives of the board.

Wallace himself presented four letters from area coaches attesting to his character and the work he has done at Hedley.

"I want to bring something positive to Hedley, and these letters show that I've done what you hired me to do," Wallace told the board, reminding them that he was asked to focus on discipline when he was hired.

"We've lost one more game in football than last year and won two more in basketball," he said. "So this isn't about wins and losses as much as we would like it to be."

Hedley teacher Linda Naylor said she objected to Wallace taking credit for all the good things happening in terms of discipline and said she had heard numerous complaints about the coach from parents. Most serious, she said, was an allegation of Wallace being angry and driving recklessly in a school bus following a game loss.

Superintendent Bill Sanders began to answer Naylor, noting that this complaint had never been brought to him, but board member James Edward Potts cut him off and said that the superintendent was not a member of the board and not allowed to speak.

Sanders then signed in as a member of the public and later called complaints against Wallace "phantom allegations."

Hedley coach Garrett Baines gave an impassioned talk in support of Wallace, calling him a man of high moral character.

Enterprise reporter Fred Gray asked board members why they had voted to non-renew Wallace. Board member Karen Watt said the board had not voted to "non-renew" Wallace. Instead, she said, they were considering contracts for renewal, and when they came to Wallace's, they simply voted three "for" and four "against."

Gray then asked to see the minutes from the March 19 meeting, but he was told they had not been approved by the board.

Gray asked for the reason Wallace was not renewed. Board members responded that the discussion had been in closed session, and Potts said the reason was "nobody's business."

No action regarding Wallace was taken following the public comments. The board is scheduled to meet again next Tuesday, April 16.

Enterprise honored for raising abuse awareness

Raising awareness about child abuse and coverage of the prosecution of those responsible for the death four-year-old Chance Mark Jones earned The Clarendon Enterprise recognition by the Panhandle Press Association last Saturday, April 6.

The Enterprise was presented with the Ken Towery Community Service Award during the 103rd annual PPA Convention in Amarillo. "We are humbled and honored to receive this award," said Enterprise publisher Roger Estlack. "There are some news events that we wish we never had to cover, and certainly the senseless death of a child tops that list. As a community, we must never forget what happened to Chance Mark Jones; and as a paper we will not relent in our effort

to make people more aware that child abuse does exist and that we should do everything we can to stop it."

The award is named in honor of Pulitzer Prize winning journalist Kenneth Towery, who wanted to honor papers who serve their community and who presented PPA with more than \$13,000 from himself and other donors to fund the award. Two papers are recognized each year - one small weekly and one large weekly, semi-weekly, or small daily paper - and each paper receives a check for \$250.

The Enterprise has donated its award winnings to the Clarendon Lions Club for its project that will purchase playground equipment in Chance's memory. A memorial 5K Walk/Run is being held this

Saturday as a fundraiser for the Lions Club project.

The other community service winner this year was the Moore County News-Press in Dumas for its efforts to raise awareness about bullying.

Also at this year's annual PPA Better Newspaper Contest, the Enterprise received top honors in its division, earning the General Excellence award along with ten first place plaques in the categories of Headline Writing, Advertising Initiative, Front Page Layout, Spot News Photos (by Roger and Ashlee Estlack), Society & Lifestyles, Feature Stories (by Ashlyn Tubbs and Roger Estlack), Special Sections, Editorials (on the proposed Ten Commandments marker, the role of newspapers

defending freedom, and the tone of city politics), Serious Columns (by Roger Estlack), and Best Website.

The Enterprise also picked up third place plaques for Serious Columns (by Fred Gray), News Writing, and Sports Coverage (by Sandy Anderberg and Fred Gray).

The PPA was led this year by Canyon's Amanda Rogers. She will continue on the PPA board as Immediate Past President with the following officers: Wanda Brooks of Dumas, President; Jeff Blackmon of Shamrock, Vice President; and Roger Estlack of Clarendon, Secretary/Treasurer, along with directors Ashlee Estlack of Clarendon, Debra Wells of Borger, ReDonn Woods of Pampa, Larry Thornton of Muleshoe, and Wayne Hodgins of Post.

HISD should keep focus on town's future

"May you live in interesting times" is how the old Chinese curse goes, and nothing better describes last week's meeting of the Hedley School Board of Trustees than "interesting."

Word had earlier in the day reached the Enterprise that Athletic Director Darrell Wallace had been "non-renewed" during the previous board meeting, but that in and of itself didn't raise any red flags with us. Coaches are, after all, "non-renewed" all the time across Texas.

But then we asked for the minutes of the March meeting and learned they were "unavailable." That got this newspaper's interest, and it got the editor on the road for the next meeting.

Is Darrell Wallace a good man or a good coach? Never having met the man until last Tuesday, your humble editor can't answer that question with any direct knowledge.

What this column can answer though is that the public and the press have a right to see the minutes of any of our local boards, and it doesn't matter whether those minutes have been "approved" by said board or not. Once the board's secretary puts pen to paper in taking the official minutes that becomes a public record subject to the Texas Public Information Act (also known as the Open Records Act).

The minutes were again asked for during the meeting, but our representative was not given those minutes. But more troubling than that was the attitude exhibited by some board members that the public and certainly the media was not entitled to know why Coach Wallace had been dismissed. Board member James Edwards Potts even went so far as to say that he didn't "have much use for any of the Donley County media anyway."

He's entitled to his opinion, but we're entitled to the minutes. And at press time, we still don't have them.

We have, however, filed a formal Open Records request with the school, and we expect that they will be made available very soon.

The silly thing about the whole fiasco is that we don't really expect to learn much from the minutes. All we wanted to know was the wording of the motion and the recorded vote of those in favor and against.

What we did learn came from the behavior of the board itself where there seems to be a pretty strong split between the trustees themselves and a lot of animosity from at least one board member toward the superintendent.

And of course there was also several very unhappy residents who voiced their support for their coach and their concern about the state of the board.

For a town like Hedley, the school is the community in a very real sense, and the trustees need to take heed that they are not there to serve just their own interests but the long-term interest of Hedley's very identity.

Interesting times indeed.

Madison was right to be concerned

In light of the unruly factions seeking control of, or at the very least, a meaningful voice into today's political climate, a review of the thoughts of James Madison, long considered to be the primary author of the United States Constitution, may be useful.

Back in the days when our forefathers were debating the proper shape of the new government, James Madison became, in effect, the primary voice and scribe of the "radicals" who wished to scrap the Articles of Confederation and write an entirely new constitution for America. This group was well represented by George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, Thomas Jefferson, and Madison, among others.

Basically, our Founding Fathers foresaw the destructive role of a faction in breaking apart the republic. Alexander Hamilton wrote of this in Federalist No. 9 (Federalist Papers). In Federalist No. 10, Madison wrote of how to eliminate the negative effects of faction. He wrote that a faction is "a number of citizens, whether amounting to a minority or majority of the whole, who are united and actuated by some common impulse of passion, or of interest, adverse to the rights of other citizens, or to the permanent and aggregate interests of the community." He added that the most serious source of faction to be the diversity of opinion in political life which leads to dispute over fundamental issues such as what regime or religion should be preferred.

Critically, Madison scribbled that "the most common and durable source of factions has been the various and unequal distribution of property. Those who hold and those who are without property have ever formed distinct interests in society." Hello Tea Party, hello Sierra Club, hello Occupy Wall Street. It's always about the money.

Madison saw direct democracy as a danger to individual rights and advocated a representative democracy in

order to protect what he viewed as individual liberty from majority rule, or from the effects of such inequality within society. He said, "A pure democracy can admit no cure for the mischiefs of faction. A common passion or interest will be felt by the majority, and there is nothing to check the inducements to sacrifice the weaker party."

Madison first assessed that that are two ways to limit the damage caused by factions like the tea partiers and occupy Wall Street movement; either remove the causes of faction or control its effects. The first, destroying liberty, would work because "liberty is to faction what air is to fire", but it is impossible to do because liberty is essential to political life. Really? Americans have only been fighting for it since the American Revolution.

The other option, creating a society homogeneous in opinions and interests, is impracticable. After all, the diversity of people's ability is what makes us succeed, more or less, and inequality of property is a right that the government must protect. Actually, Madison emphasizes that economic stratification prevents everyone from sharing the same opinion. Therefore, Madison concludes that the damage caused by faction can be limited only by controlling its effects.

One big problem, Madison wrote, comes from majority factions because the principle of popular sovereignty should prevent minority factions from gaining power. He suggests two ways to check majority factions: prevent the "existence of the same passion or interest in a majority at the same time" or make a majority faction unable to

act. A small democracy, like a state, cannot avoid the dangers of majority faction because small size means that undesirable passions (see Connecticut's and Colorado's new gun laws) can very easily spread to a majority of the people, which can then enact its will through the democratic government without difficulty.

Madison makes an argument on how this is not possible in a pure democracy but possible in a republic. Madison suggests that the voice of the people pronounced by a body of representatives is more favorable to the interest of the community, since people's decisions are affected by their self-interest.

Therefore, Madison felt that a large republic is much better than a small republic because more "fit characters" were available to represent the public's voice. There is a larger pool of talent from which to draw a broader group of people. Since in a larger republic there are many more people, it is less likely that a group of scoundrels can take over the will of the people. In a large republic the variety of interests will also be greater and therefore make it harder to find a majority. Even if there is a majority, according to Madison, it would be harder for them to work together because of the large number of people and the fact that they are spread out in a wider territory. Balance in representation is therefore enhanced.

Thanks to the foresight of Madison, and the other Founding Fathers, the tea party types will usually be weakened by the occupiers of Wall Street. The tree huggers can negate the ecological damage done by the frackers and drillers. The green people can hold the oil companies and coal producers somewhat in check, and vice-versa.

Therefore, those of us who are in different factions ought to more tolerant of each other. Our differences make America stronger, which is what we all want.

TxDOT Observes 'Go Orange Week'

Navigating construction can be difficult, not to mention risky for both drivers and workers.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) manages more than 1,000 highway projects at any given time on 80,000 miles of Texas roads. To

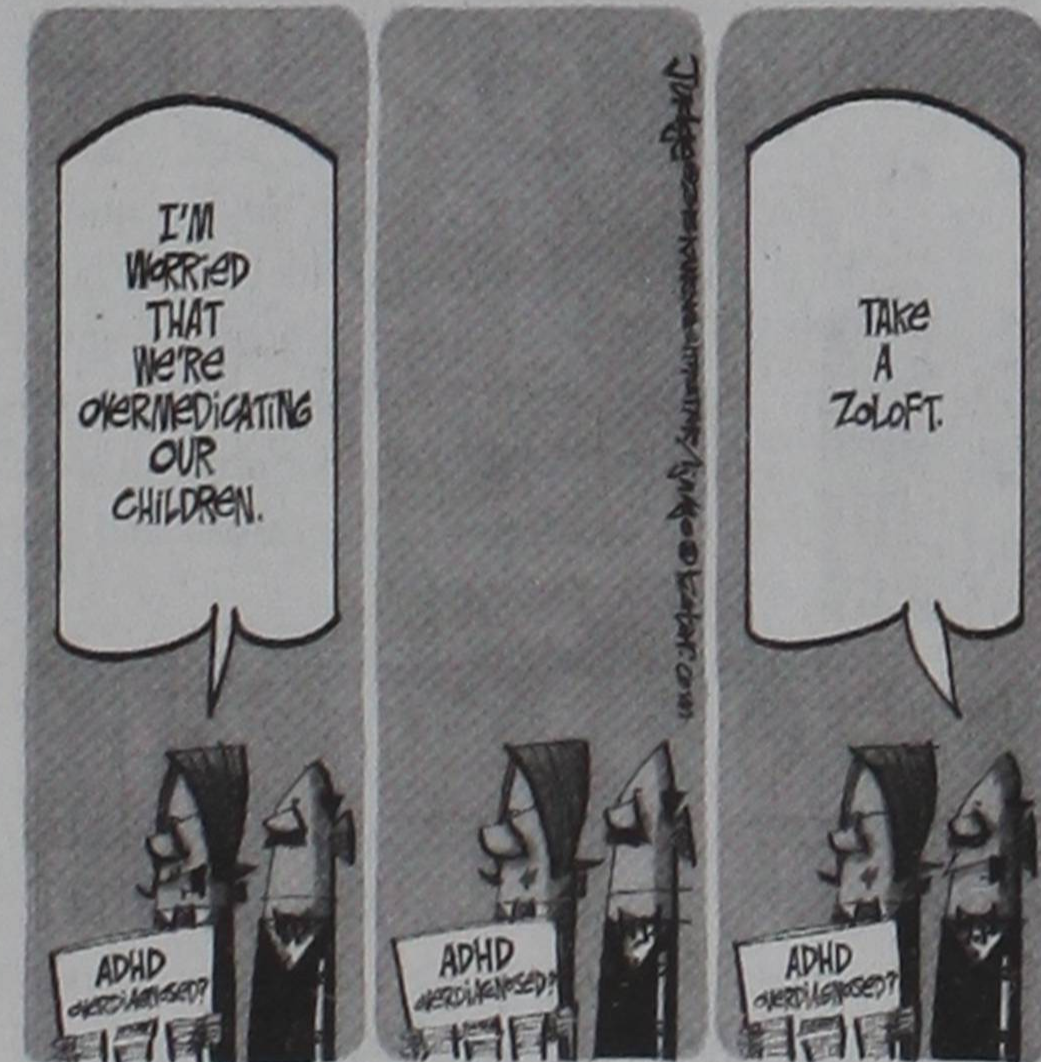
remember victims and increase safety awareness for workers and motorists, TxDOT will join the Federal Highway Administration and other transportation partners April 15-19 to observe the 14th annual National Work Zone Awareness Week.

TxDOT's 13-county Childress District is designating April 15-19 as "Go Orange Week." To raise awareness for work zone safety, we encourage schools, businesses, families and citizens to participate by choosing one day to wear orange to show support for the men and women who work along our roadways.

Work zones can be hazardous for both motorists and highway crews. In 2012, 134 people were killed in highway construction and maintenance zones in Texas, up from 118 the previous year. Since 1938, 271 TxDOT employees have lost their lives while performing their jobs in work zones. More than four out of five, or 85 percent, of those killed in work zones are drivers or their passengers. Speeding and inattention are the most common causes cited. Rear-end collisions account for one in three crashes. The Childress District had 8 crashes in work zones with thankfully no fatalities in 2012.

We're all in this together, so when you see orange on the side of the road, remember you're driving through someone's workplace.

April focuses on abuse prevention

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, a time to focus on the protection and care of our most vulnerable and trusting resources – our children.

Child Abuse Prevention Month has been observed each April since its first presidential proclamation in 1983. Since that time, individuals and organizations have joined during April to raise the public's awareness of child abuse and its prevention.

Over 264,000 Texas children are reported as abused or neglected and nearly 67,000 confirmed victims in 2010, according to Child Protective Services, a division of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. April is child abuse prevention month in Texas and in the nation.

"It's a time to focus on ways not only to protect children but also to prevent abuse from ever occurring," said Wendell Teltow, Execu-

tive Director for Prevent Child Abuse Texas. "This is our opportunity to make a difference in young lives."

Neglect is the most frequent form of child abuse, according to the state agency charged with protecting children.

"Yes, children die simply because they're put in situations where they are not supervised," said Teltow. "But parents are not alone. We need to raise the public's awareness of these distressing statistics," says Teltow, "and to encourage people to become involved in the prevention of child abuse. One small, but public way of showing your support, is wearing a blue ribbon during April. Remember, children are helpless, you are not".

According to Prevent Child Abuse America forty-three percent of American parents report spanking or hitting their child, 37 per-

cent report insulting or swearing at their child, and two percent report having kicked, bit or punched their child. More than 3 million children were reported to child protective service agencies as alleged victims of child abuse or neglect each year, and approximately 1 million of these reports are confirmed.

Prevent Child Abuse Texas is a statewide nonprofit organization dedicated to the prevention of child abuse and neglect in all its forms. Its network works in a collaborative manner with community, state, and national groups to turn information into action by developing sound child and family oriented community-based prevention programs, public awareness activities, educational initiatives, and training programs. 

Fake promises of lower taxes

And the spam goes on. It will never stop. It is an easy way for crooks to get our money. Either of these spams can cause a loss of worry and loss of our money. Be careful.

As the economy improves, property prices are rebounding... and so are property taxes. Most municipalities mail tax assessments each spring. Scammers are often close behind, posing as government programs that claim to lower your taxes for a fee.

How the Scam Works: You get a letter in the mail that appears to come from a government agency. It's really a private business, and it promises to get your property taxes reduced by disputing your tax assessment. For this, the business charges from \$30 to hundreds of dollars. A typical letter reads: "The XYZ County tax authorities may have made an error when they recently assessed your property. The mistake means you may be over taxed by 2,000... For 10 minutes and a one-time fee of less than \$100, it's well worth the potential savings of \$2,000."

As always, several variations of the scam exist. Sometimes, scammers simply pocket the fee. Other times, it's more a case of misleading advertising. The businesses file the paperwork on your behalf and/or provide you with a government report. However, in most cases, the business is simply doing something homeowners can do themselves for free. Finally, some scammers use filing a property tax assessment dispute as a pretense to collect personal information for use in identity theft.

Ways to Spot a Property Assessment Scam: Reputable businesses are available to help you dispute your tax assessment, but watch out for the following warning signs. It may be a scam if the business:

Poses as a government agency. Requires an upfront fee instead of billing you after the service is rendered. Guarantees it can lower your property assessment and/or taxes. You can file a dispute, but the local government needs to approve it. Requests a certified copy of your property deed and charges you more than a few dollars for it. Asks for your Social Security number or other personal information.

Fake Employment Agency
Don't be fooled by a new wave of fake phone calls. Scammers are posing as an employment agency and fooling job hunters into parting with personal information. How the Scam Works: You receive a call from a business named WN Positions. The caller is supposedly an employment agency wanting to interview you in response to a job survey you allegedly completed online. The caller sounds very natural, like a real customer service agent, and it takes you a few moments to realize it's actually a pre-recorded robo-call.

The teleprompter asks you questions typical of a preliminary job interview, such as your name, educational background and salary requirements. Then, it goes on to ask about whether you want to return to school and/or advance in your education. After the survey, a live person comes on the phone. The caller tells you that the business is not a hiring agency but rather one that "helps connect people with education opportunities." When prompted, the caller claims WN Positions is BBB Accredited (it's not!) and even provides an email address.

It is unclear if the calls are a true phishing scam or just a shady way to collect sales leads. Either way, be careful and don't give any personal information. One recipient reported receiving numerous calls from unknown numbers after talking to the WN Positions representative. As always, watch out for variations of this scam. Currently, the calls appear to come from North Carolina and Connecticut exchanges, but that is likely to change. Also, some callers say they are recruiting for positions at Wal-Mart, but they are likely to reference other large corporations too. Even the business name "WN Positions" may change.

How Do I Protect Myself from Phone Scams
Scam phone calls are common. Even if you list your number with the Do Not Call Registry or Canada's Do Not Call List, you are still likely to receive them. Here's how to protect yourself: Hang up, don't press any buttons and don't call the scammer back. We all like to have the last word, but returning the phone call may just give the con artist information he can use. Never give out personal information such as credit card numbers, bank account numbers, dates of birth, or social security numbers to unfamiliar callers. Never give a caller remote access to your computer. If you do want to make a purchase, always ask for the salesperson's name, business, phone and address (and verify this information!) before handing over money. Legitimate businesses understand that you want more information about their company and are happy to comply. File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission to help track down scammers.

Be careful out there and be suspicious of any emails that you don't recognize or request.

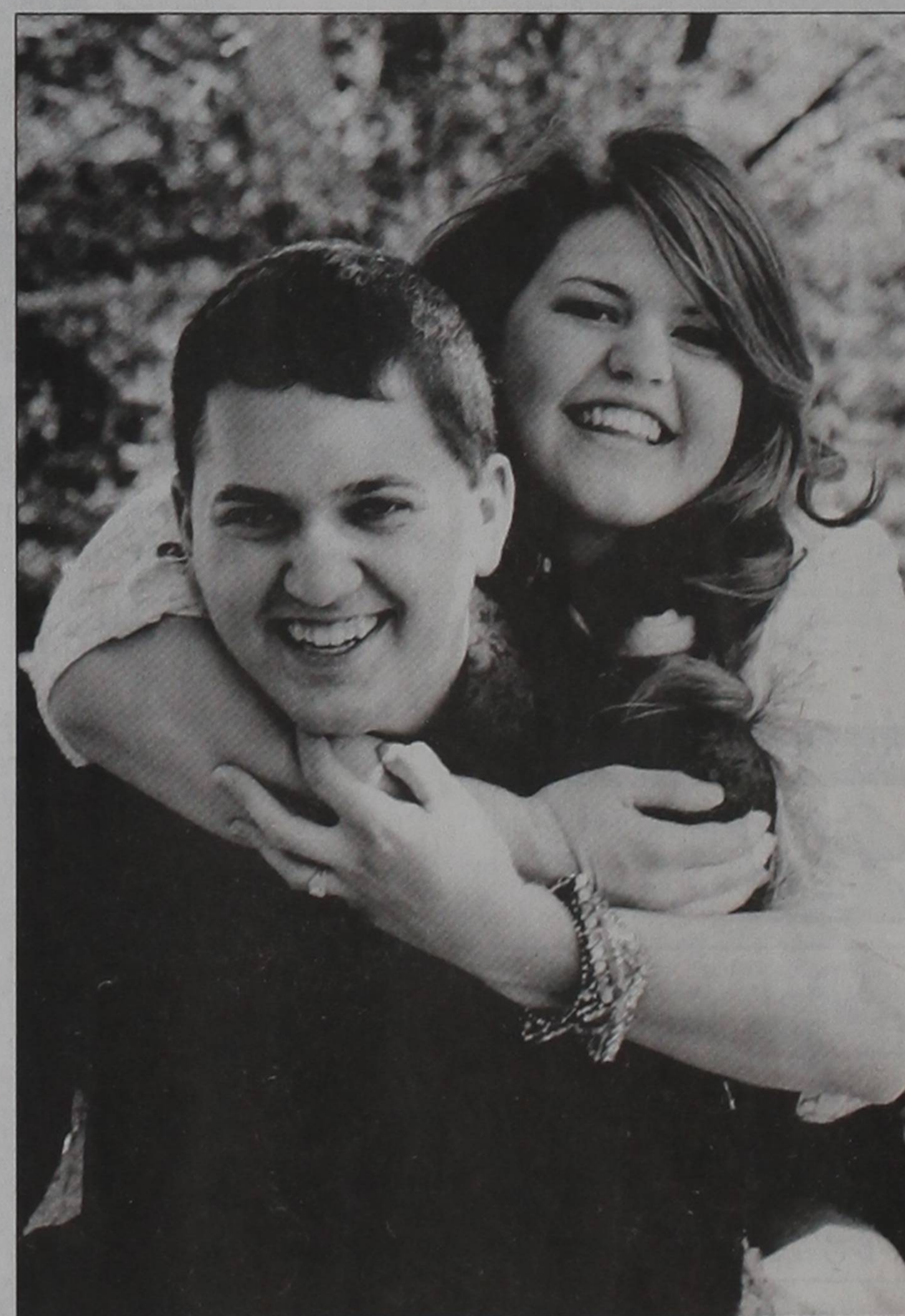

"It is a great privilege each year for me to nominate some of our area's best and brightest high school students to attend our Service Academies. These young men and women represent the next generation of leaders in our military and our country," said Thornberry.

Nominees who are accepted by the academies receive a free education. In return, they agree to serve in the military for a minimum of five years after graduation.

USDA seeks applications to promote job creation

TEMPLE – Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today that applications are being accepted from qualified non-profit and public organizations (intermediaries) to provide loans to support rural businesses and community development groups.

Funding, which is intended to spark business expansion and create jobs will be made available through USDA's Intermediary Relending Program (IRP). The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) remains focused on carrying out its mission, despite a time of significant budget uncertainty. Today's announcement is one part of the Department's efforts to strengthen the rural economy.

"This program is a part of the Obama Administration's ongoing effort to leverage private investments with public funds to create jobs and expand economic opportunity for rural entrepreneurs," Vilsack

said. "Intermediaries serve as a critical component to boosting local economies."

"The IRP creates strategic partnerships with local governments and organizations to expand capital markets that will improve rural businesses and increase economic development," said Paco Valentin, Texas State Director of USDA Rural Development.

The Intermediary Relending Program is USDA Rural Development's primary program for capitalizing revolving loan funds. USDA lends money to economic development intermediaries (nonprofits and public bodies) who in turn re-lend the funds as commercial loans to rural businesses (ultimate recipients) that might not otherwise be able to obtain such financing.

The repayment of the ultimate recipients' loans allows the intermediary to continue to make more loans to new recipients,

supporting sustainable economic development. Since President Obama took office, the program has created or saved an estimated 20,000 jobs. Funds are used to assist with financing business and economic development activity to create or retain jobs in disadvantaged and remote communities. Intermediaries are encouraged to work with state and regional representatives and in partnership with other public and private organizations that can provide complimentary resources.

"Food Safety: It's Our Business" will be offered May 22-23 at the Activities Building, 901 Hurley in Claude. Registration deadline is May 1.

By law, food establishments

are to have at least one staff member with a valid certification, said Leicia Redwine, AgriLife Extension family and consumer science agent in Armstrong County.

AgriLife Extension officials from Gray and Armstrong counties are offering a two-day food manager certification training course. Completion of this course allows establishments to meet the state requirement.

Included with the training will be materials and the state food

manager certification examination. Cost of the course is \$125. For those individuals wanting to test only, the cost is \$65, Redwine said.

Foodborne illnesses affecting an establishment are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills, Redwine said. 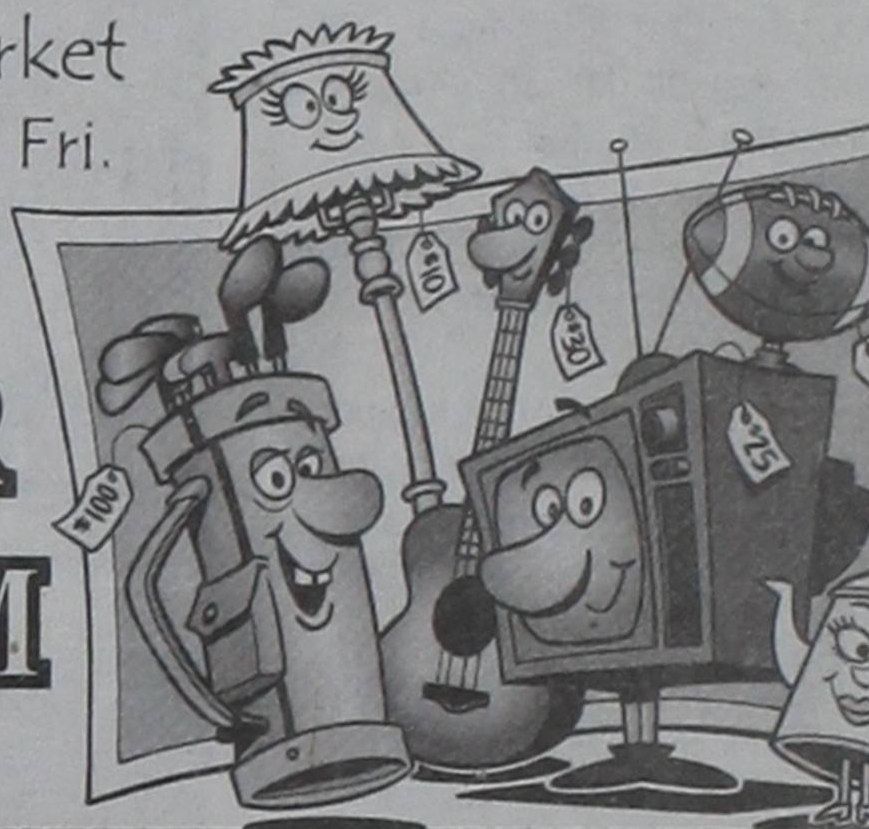

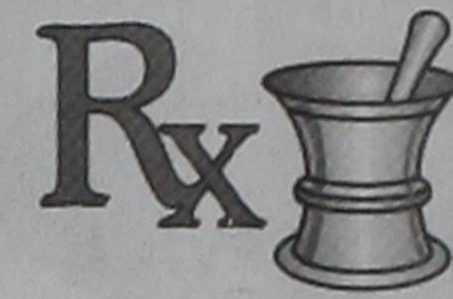

Alzheimer's Drug Shows Promise in Trials

A new experimental drug (ORM-12741) is showing promising results as a new medication to help reduce memory loss among individuals struggling with moderate Alzheimer's disease. A three month clinical trial was conducted involving 100 individuals diagnosed with Alzheimer's. By the end of the study, individuals who took the new medication showed improvement on the tests of their memory. Scores decreased by 33 percent among the 50 individuals who were given a dummy pill rather than the new medication. Test scores highlighted an apparent memory benefit, without prompting severe side effects.

Alzheimer's disease (AD) is the most common form of dementia. It is a progressive brain disease that robs people of their memory and the ability to perform even simple everyday tasks. Current available medications aim at controlling its debilitating symptoms. ORM-12741 is the first medication to target and activate a specific receptor in the brain, called alpha-2C. This receptor is thought to play a role in the brain's response to fight stress that can trigger dementia.

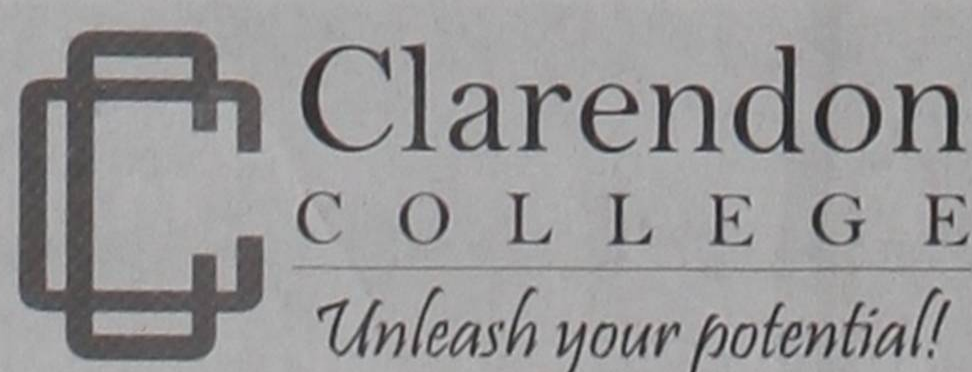

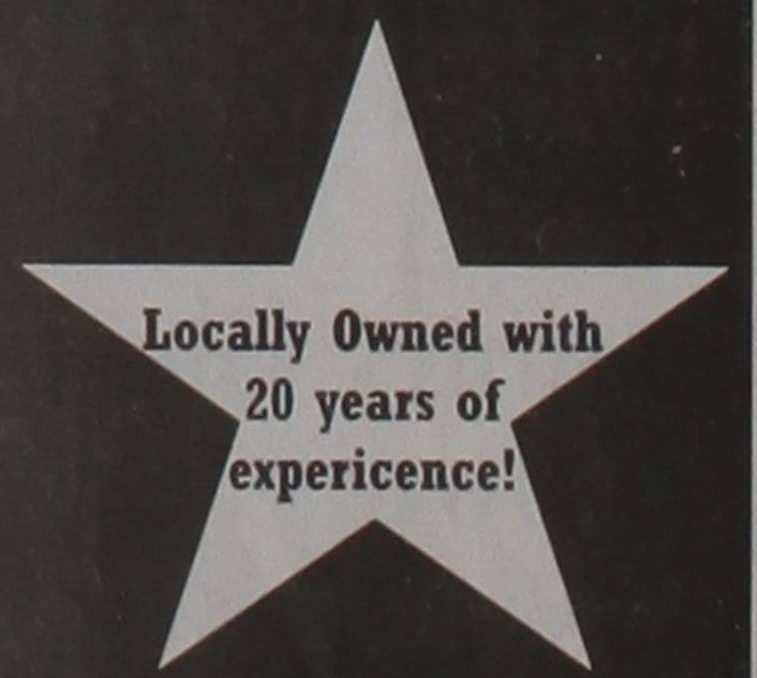

State agencies submit prairie chicken plan

AUSTIN – The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and other state wildlife agencies in New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado have submitted the 3rd draft of a range-wide plan to conserve the lesser prairie chicken to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which is considering whether to list the bird as a threatened under the federal Endangered Species Act.

The multi-state plan includes habitat management goals and voluntary conservation practices to be applied throughout the lesser prairie-chicken's range (<http://kars.ku.edu/geodata/maps/sgpchat/>), actions which could help preclude the need to list the bird.

"While we do not need a chicken on every acre, we do need to have the right acres in the right areas to conserve the species, and we are getting there in Texas through voluntary landowner agreements and related efforts," explained Ross Melinchuk, TPWD deputy executive director for natural resources.

"It is noteworthy that 44 landowners across the Texas

Panhandle and Rolling Plains have enrolled 427,685 acres in voluntary conservation agreements to help conserve this species, a nearly four-fold increase since 2010," Melinchuk said.

Under the Candidate Conservation Agreement with Assurances, landowners voluntarily help conserve and restore habitat for the bird on private land in Texas and other states. In exchange for management practices such as prescribed grazing, brush management, and prescribed burning, landowners receive assurances that they will not be required to meet any new regulations should the bird be listed under the Endangered Species Act.

Funding for the multi-state plan came from a grant from the USFWS with support from the Great Plains Landscape Conservation Cooperative and the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (WAFWA) Grassland Initiative.

WAFWA collaborated with the Lesser Prairie Chicken Interstate

Working Group, made up of biologists from the five state wildlife agencies and other partners, to develop the range-wide conservation plan.

The lesser prairie chicken is a grassland grouse species native to parts of the five states. It has been a candidate for listing since 1998. The USFWS proposed to list it as threatened last December, and is expected to issue a final rule in September.

Throughout the multi-state planning process, which started last April, the state wildlife agencies have reached out to the public, seeking feedback on two previous draft plans, and they've been encouraged to see support for a state-led effort to conserve the species.

"Historically, state conservation

agencies saw drought conditions like the ones we are observing now back in the 1930s, and biologists thought the species had become extinct," said Bill Van Pelt, the WAFWA's grassland coordinator. "However, we believe that with habitat conservation efforts available through various Farm Bill programs, plus landowner enrollments in conservation agreements, we are seeing lesser prairie chickens maintained on the landscape and even expanding into new areas in some parts of their range."

Clarendon Church of Christ DOES THE NEW TESTAMENT HAVE RULES AND REGULATIONS?

I have heard well-meaning people say the New Testament doesn't have rules and regulations. These people say that Jesus didn't make any rules but just taught and lived the way we should. Maybe there is a technical or definitional problem with what is being called a rule or regulation. Look at this passage. (Matthew 28:19-20) "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, "teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Now, when Jesus said to, "Go...make...baptize...teach..." others, it is a command is it not? When He told His disciples to teach others to "observe all things that I have commanded you," wasn't that a rule? Isn't a command something that must be done? If so, how can anyone say there are no rules or anything to be followed? Now if one wants to say that commands and rules aren't technically the same, fine. But, one can't say that Jesus didn't give requirements. I understand that we aren't keeping "the Law" or Moses' law. But, that doesn't mean that the Savior didn't leave us requirements that must be followed. If they are mere suggestions and we aren't to be held accountable to following them, why did the Lord bother? Was it just busy work or are we responsible for doing them?

(Matthew 7:21) "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven." That seems pretty clear there that lip service won't do compared to following the will of God. How does one follow the will of God unless Jesus gave it to us? If you don't want to call it a rule or regulation, call it Skeeter or Bubba if you like, it's still a requirement that one must comply with to go to Heaven. Here's a rule, regulation, qualification, requirement, etc., call it whatever you like: (Matthew 10:32-33) "Therefore whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven. "But whoever denies Me before men, him I will also deny before My Father who is in heaven." Does that mean that you are required to confess Jesus to man to get to go to Heaven or doesn't it? Don't call it a regulation if it bothers you, but it seems to be a rule or regulation. Heaven is a regulated place. Not everyone will go because they didn't follow the rules, commands, etc. of Jesus.

Lastly, here's a passage to think on: (John 14:15) "If you love Me, keep My commandments." Isn't the word "keep" a doing word? Jesus said to KEEP HIS COMMANDMENTS. Isn't that basically the Savior saying that He has some rules that must be kept if you love Him? I think people want to dodge the issue that there are things God expects us, no, commands us to do. Think about it.

CHS builds physics projects

Students at Clarendon High School the last few weeks have been building balsa wood structures that hold weight. In the first project students were instructed to make a bridge 25-30 cm long that had a mass less than 40 grams (1.4 ounces). A bucket containing weights was hung from the bridge until it failed, and the weight-held-to-mass-of-bridge ratio was calculated.

This year's winner was Diego Santos, whose 0.86 ounce bridge held 72 pounds before collapsing. Marie Urfels and Deborah Howard placed second, with Zhanae Bassett and Savannah Topper coming in third.

In the second project students built a tower 32-34 cm tall (a little over one foot) and then the tower was placed on the "crusher." Weights were added until the tower collapsed.

Sarah Luttrell and Maci White won this year's contest. Their 0.62 ounce tower held over 108 pounds of weight before collapsing. Corey Barker and Mitchell Parry won the total weight held category this year. Their one ounce tower held up 166 pounds before giving way. The tower would have actually supported the

weight of one of its builders. Dusty Rice and Leslie Stone came in third in the tower building with a project that held 128.5 pounds.

Students had fun constructing their projects, and the debate over whose projects would win was lively. Perhaps some engineering is in the future for some of these students.

CJH students compete in GEAR contest

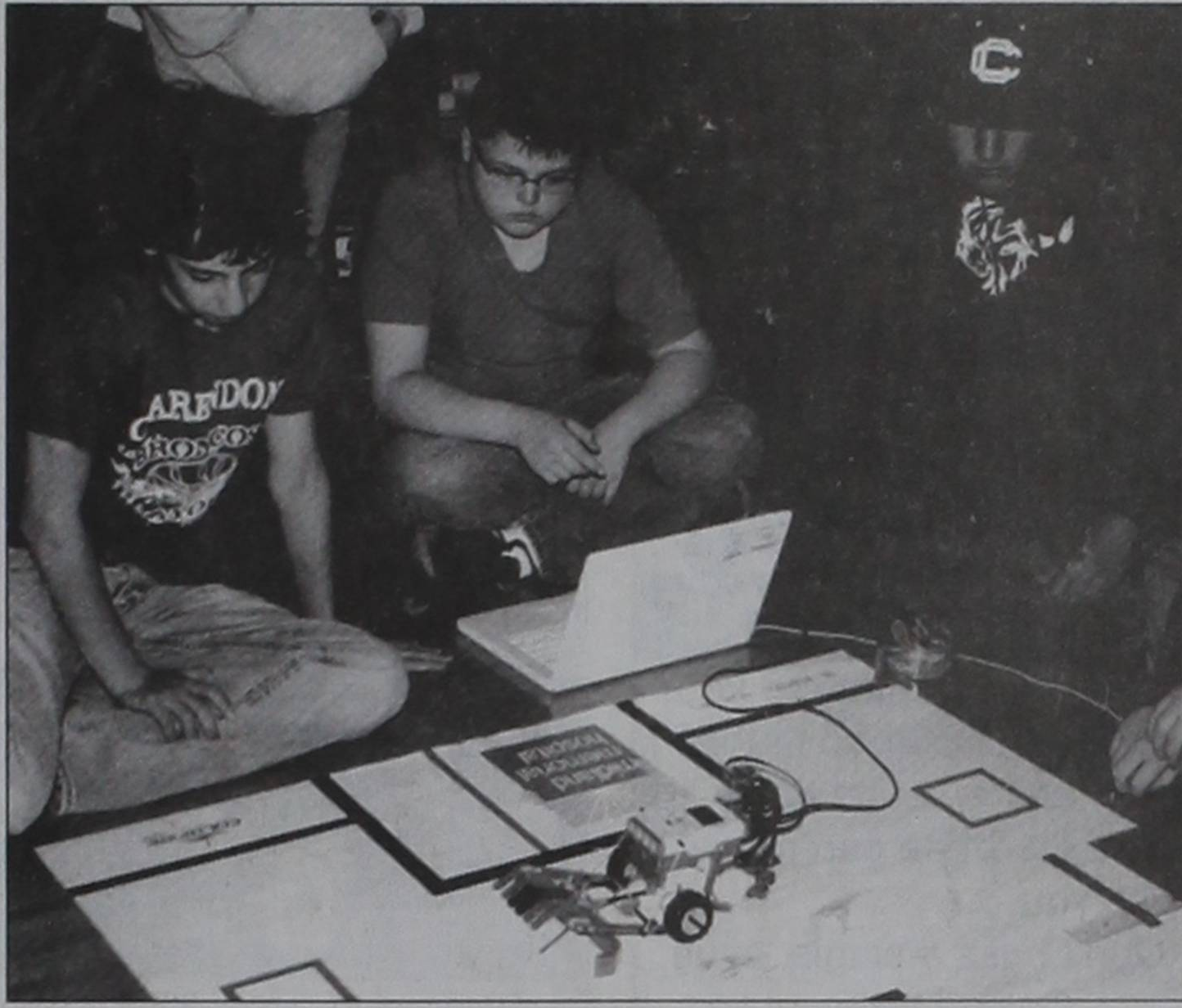
Clarendon Junior High GT students are participating in the GEAR (Get Excited About Robotics) program.

CISD Head Start and Pre-K sign up

Clarendon Head Start and Pre-Kindergarten will be taking applications for the 2013-2014 school year on Wednesday, May 1 and Thursday, May 2, 2013 from 12:30 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. both afternoons. You may make an appointment by calling the Elementary Office at 874-3855.

Children who will turn 4 years old on or prior to September 1, 2013 or who are 5 years old and not enrolled in Kindergarten (Pre-Kindergarten class only) and meet qualifications will be considered for the Head Start and Pre-Kindergarten classes. Head Start is a tuition free class for children who meet federal guidelines. Parents must fill out an application to see if they meet eligibility standards.

Pre-Kindergarten is a fee based class for children whose families are willing to pay the \$1,600 tuition. This class is open to 4 year old and/or 5 year old students who are not enrolled in Kindergarten. The tuition fee is divided into eight \$200.00 payments.

You must bring your child's birth certificate, income verification, immunization record, Social Security card, Documentation of disability (if applicable), and proof of public assistance.

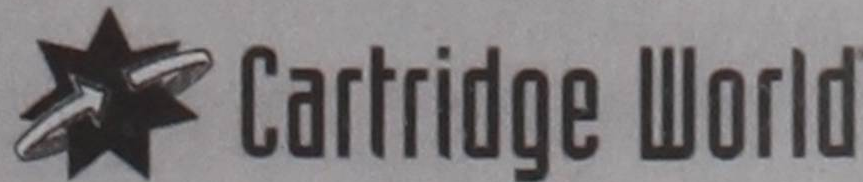

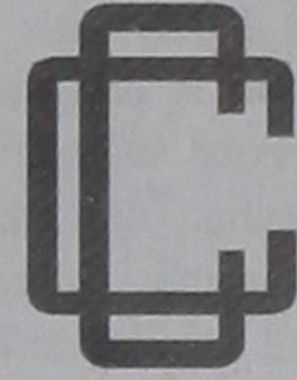

Proactive measures can prevent wildfires

As Wildfire Awareness Week kicks off Monday, Texas A&M Forest Service is reminding residents of simple precautions they can take to prevent dangerous blazes.

About 90 percent of wildfires in Texas are attributed to preventable causes such as debris burning, outdoor campfires and welding. A little common sense—such as making sure your debris burn site is away from structures and overhanging branches—can prevent a wildfire from igniting. Other tips include:

- Never burn leaves on a windy day.
- Monitor local burn bans by contacting your county judge's office.
- When barbecuing, never leave

a grill unattended.

- Clear away grass, leaves and other debris within a 10-foot perimeter of any burn pile, campfire or barbecue grill.

- Keep water nearby when doing anything outdoors that creates a spark.

- If you see a fire, call 911.

Residents also can take precautions to increase their home's chances of survival if a wildfire ignites, said Bruce Woods, Mitigation and Prevention department head for Texas A&M Forest Service.

"What you plant, where you place your plants and how you maintain the landscaping can help protect your home, and simple improvements can significantly

decrease a home's ignitability," Woods said.

Some tips include:

- Create a break in vegetation with a rock path or other non-flammable material to slow the spread of wildfire.

- Keep your lawn mown and leaves raked.

- Remove leaves and needles from your roof and gutters.

- Clear vegetation to create at least 30 feet of "defensible space" around your home to allow firefighters to safely protect it.

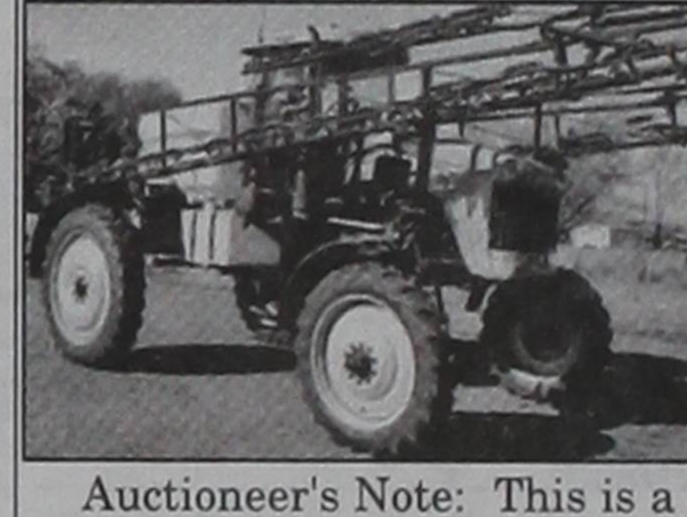

AgriLife Extension to offer food manager certification training

DUMAS — A professional food manager certification training course will be offered April 22-23 at the Moore County Annex, 310 East First Street in Dumas, by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Moore County.

The cost is \$125 and includes training, materials and a national food manager certification examination. The certification will be valid for five years, according to Sue Owens, AgriLife Extension family and consumer sciences agent in Moore County.

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the U.S., with one in six Americans becoming sick each

year. And 128,000 of those will be hospitalized, while 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

The Texas Department of State Health Services requires every food establishment to have one certified food manager on site, Owens said.

The "Food Safety: It's Our Business" program is designed to prepare food service managers to pass the certification examination and provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food, she said.

The benefits of improved food safety include: increased customer satisfaction, improved relationships with health officials, and prevention of bad publicity and lawsuits due

to foodborne illness. Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices, Owens said. By attending the course, food service managers will learn about: Identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling;

Preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food; Teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees; Complying with government regulations; Maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings; and Controlling pests.
