Patten, Hernandez resign from city board

City Hall was rocked Tuesday when two members of the Clarendon Board of Aldermen submitted letters of resignation.

The resignations mean the city will have to hold a special election in November to fill the two vacancies on the board.

Alderman Jesus Hernandez, in a signed statement, said simply that he resigned and did not give a reason. Alderman Abby Patten's letter to the board cited her recent admission to law school in Oklahoma and the need to focus on her studies and being unable to attend meetings as her reasons for stepping down.

"Therefore, I would like to take

this time to thank you for allowing me to serve with you for the time I did and present my resignation to the board," Patten wrote.

The resignations came after two meetings in which the Board of Aldermen struggled to get quorums. The regular meeting on May 28 had to be canceled when Patten, Hernandez, and newly elected Alderman Debbie Roberts Hillis did not show up.

A week later on June 4, a called meeting lasted only seven minutes. Patten and Hernandez were again absent, and Hillis stayed long enough to pass three resolutions needed for the Clarendon Economic

Development Corporation to pursue a downtown revitalization grant.

When Mayor Larry Hicks asked if Hillis could stay for some of the other business on the June 11, she replied that she was sorry but that she was really busy. Newly elected Alderman Sandy Skelton then asked Hillis if there was going to be a pattern of a failure to get a quorum whenever Patten had class. Hillis said Skelton would have to ask Patten that question.

The board was scheduled to have another regular meeting this Tuesday, June 11, but with Alderman Will Thompson out of town at a conference and the two resignations,

that meeting was canceled.

On the agenda for the canceled meeting, Mayor Hicks was planning to address the board regarding a recent interview of himself and City Secretary Machiel Covey by an investigator with District Attorney Luke Inman's office. Covey and Hicks say the investigator quizzed them over whether they believed members of the board were violating the Open Meetings Act by meeting outside of posted meetings in a "walking quorum."

According to the Texas Attorney General's website, the law does not define a "walking quorum" but a Texas appellate court defined it

as "serial meetings of less than a quorum" and describing the term as "an overlapping series of meetings or telephone conferences [when] a quorum of members was not in the same room at the same time."

A call to Inman's office by the Enterprise was unanswered Tuesday.

Hicks said the investigator told them the DA's office had received a complaint about Clarendon aldermen having a walking quorum. Covey said she told the investigator that she had heard reports from citizens that this was going on but that no one was willing to come forward publicly and she said she believes the

CEDC presents 15th storefront grant

A formerly vacant building will be open for business this month, thanks in part to a grant from the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation.

Brownlee Custom Boots and Big Texas Hair & Highlights has been renovating the front portion of the building located north of the Mulkey Theatre at 106 S. Kearney. The proprietor, Elaine Brownlee, builds handmade boots and will also operate a hair salon in part of the building.

Brownlee last week received the CEDC's 15th façade grant for \$132,611, representing half of the cost of new signage on the building. Brownlee said she learned about the grant program, which pays for eligible storefront improvements in the city's Central Business District, from CEDC Executive Director Chandra Eggemeyer and said it was very helpful.

"I am very thankful to have it," Brownlee said. "For someone trying to start on a budget, it is a major help, and I would recommend it to other businesses."

The building previously received a façade grant about four years ago, which improved its curb appeal, but it was still only used as storage as it had been for about four decades. Brownlee, however, wanted to be in that location.

"It's in a prime location next to the Mulkey, which is being heavily promoted, and there are a lot of wonderful people on this block," Brownlee said, referring specifically to neighbors down the street, longtime Clarendon bootmaker Jim Owens and leathergoods artisan Jamie Bebout at Straight Off The

Ranch.

Brownlee has been making boots for about two years, learning the trade in Henrietta before her husband took a job on the High Card Ranch near Clarendon in April. She said they and their young son love it here, and she looks forward to taking boot orders and doing repair work as well as scheduling hair appointments.

In addition to new signage, Brownlee has spent a great deal of time refinishing the walls and ceiling in the building as well as sealing the hardwood floor. The property owner also invested in electrical and plumbing upgrades to

accommodate the new tenant.

Since the Façade Grant Program began in 2008, the CEDC has awarded \$17,769.54 to property owners on a three-block stretch of Kearney Street. The Façade Grant Program provides 50-50 matching grants, up to a maximum of \$2,000 per project, for improvements done to commercial storefronts; and under the new guidelines, the program now considers properties located in the city's entire Central Business District, an area defined by city planning maps created in 2002. Generally, that includes properties facing Kearney Street from First to Fifth streets as well as properties

facing Sully Street from First to Fifth and properties on the west side of Gorst Street from Second Street (US 287) to Fourth Street.

Projects eligible for consideration could be anything from a coat of paint to new signage to sidewalk improvements to a complete rehabilitation of a storefront. Property owners interested in Façade Grant funds must get approval before beginning their projects.

Alert system able to notify residents of emergencies

Donley County residents are being urged to sign up for a new notification system that could save lives in the event of a local emergency by using text messaging, telephone calls, or e-mails.

The "Resolve To Be Ready" system can be utilized for severe weather, wildfires, or other disasters to notify people of where the danger is and what steps to take.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said fewer than 200 people are currently signed up on the system, and he wants to see that number increase. Blackburn said the system would have been very beneficial during past wildfires so that residents in the path of a fire could be easily and quickly notified.

The system has been put together by area emergency managers and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) in an effort to provide all jurisdictions in the region the ability to contact their residents quickly when disasters are imminent. The goal was to create a sustainable call-out system that would enable local emergency management officials to rapidly notify their residents in mass when conditions (weather or otherwise) jeopardized their jurisdictions.

Commonly referred to as a reverse calling system, "Resolve To Be Ready" came to fruition when the PRPC applied for and received a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to cover 75 percent of the cost of building and implementing a regional notification system. The Amarillo Area Foundation generously provided \$100,000 to support a large portion of the non-FEMA funded system costs, with the PRPC providing another \$24,000 in support. Together, these grant funds and contributions have now made it affordable for every jurisdiction in the region to maintain notification capabilities.

Clarendon College has been using the same system to keep its students aware of severe weather threats as well as class cancellations.

Any information entered into the system belongs to the individual that provided that information. Nobody else can see it or use it for any other purpose other than for notifications. The system simply knows to send a call or text message to the cell phone, email address or home phone number entered by a registering resident. With the reliance on cell phones growing, it's more important than ever that critical information be conveyed in a mobile environment.

As a first step toward personal preparedness, residents should "Resolve To Be Ready" by logging onto www.R2BeReady.com to register their contact information, along with the contact information of their family members, into this new system. That way, they can stay informed of conditions that may affect their safety.

Everyone is now a target

"Everybody's a target; everybody with communication is a target."—A senior intelligence official previously involved with the Utah Data Center

The recent revelation that the National Security Agency (NSA) is collecting the telephone records of millions of Verizon customers, with the complete blessing of the Obama administration, should come as no surprise to anyone who has been paying attention over the past decade.

As I document in my new book *A Government of Wolves: The Emerging American Police State* (available now at Amazon.com), what we are witnessing, in the so-called name of security and efficiency, is the creation of a new class system comprised of the watched (average Americans such as you and me) and the watchers (government bureaucrats, technicians and private corporations). What too many fail to realize, consumed as they are with partisan politics and blinded by their own political loyalties, is that the massive bureaucracies—now computerized—that administer governmental policy transcend which party occupies the White House.

This explains why the civil liberties abuses carried out by the Bush Administration have not been corrected by the Obama Administration. Rather, they have been expanded upon. Take, for instance, the warrantless wiretapping program conducted during the Bush years, which resulted in the NSA monitoring the private communications of millions of Americans—a program that continues unabated today, with help from private telecommunications companies such as AT&T. The program recorded 320 million phone calls a day when it first started. It is estimated that the NSA has intercepted 15 to 20 trillion communications of American citizens since 9/11.

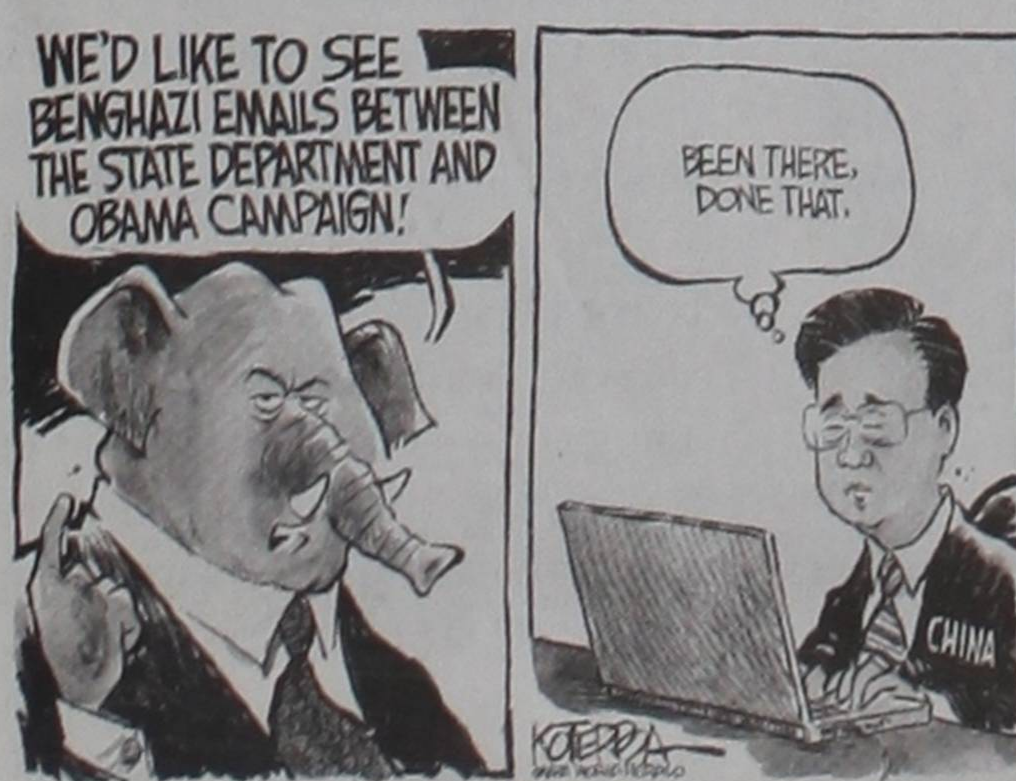
To our misfortune, the Obama White House has proven to be even worse than the Bush White House when it comes to invading the privacy rights of Americans. As Yale law professor Jack Balkin notes, "We are witnessing the bipartisan normalization and legitimization of a national-surveillance state. [Obama has] systematically adopted policies consistent with the second term of the Bush Administration." Unfortunately, whereas those on the Left raised a hue and cry over the Bush administration's constant encroachments on Americans' privacy rights, it appears that the political leanings of those on the Left have held greater sway than their principles. Consequently, the Obama administration has faced much less criticism for its blatant efforts to reinforce the surveillance state.

Insisting that terrorists "will come after us if they can and the only thing that we have to deter this is good intelligence to understand that a plot has been hatched and to get there before they get to us," Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.), who chairs the Senate intelligence committee, is defending the NSA's actions, as well as the secret court order requiring Verizon to turn over its phone records to government agents. It's a tired, overused line that preys on Americans' fear of another terrorist attack and offers phantom promises of security while ensuring neither safety nor greater freedom. Even the vague and unsupported claim put forth by House Intelligence Committee Chairman Mike Rogers (R-Mich.) that the NSA surveillance program "helped thwart 'a significant case' of terrorism in the United States 'within the last few years'" fails to justify a program of this magnitude, which makes everyone a target and turns us all into a nation of suspects.

Clearly, the age of privacy in America is coming to a close. We have moved into a new paradigm in which surveillance technology which renders everyone a suspect is driving the bureaucratic ship that once was our democratic republic. It will not be long before no phone call, no email, no Tweet, no web search is safe from the prying eyes and ears of the government. People going about their daily business will no longer be assured that they are not being spied upon by federal agents and other government bureaucrats.

Thus, the question looms before us. Can freedom in the United States continue to flourish and grow in an age when the physical movements, individual purchases, conversations, and meetings of every citizen are constantly under surveillance by private companies and government agencies?

Whether or not the surveillance is undertaken for so-called "worthy" (read: politically expedient) reasons such as preventing another terrorist attack, does not surveillance of all citizens gradually poison the soul of a nation and render us all data collected in government files? Does not such surveillance completely eviscerate our right to be free from unreasonable searches and seizures as guaranteed by our Constitution?

Don't give citizenship to illegals

According to news coming out of Washington, DC, the immigration bill currently under consideration may be in trouble, thanks to a House Republican split. This time, it's a good thing. Electric company warns about phone scammers

Hey, gang, we need to watch for storms and be especially careful if we're hit to watch for scammers. There will be many scammers trying to take advantage of us. When you read this, I will be on my way back from Houston, Lord willing.

SWEPCO Warns of Phone Scam

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) is alerting customers in its service area to a telephone scam involving demand of payment by prepaid money cards to avoid disconnection of service.

The scam involves a telephone call in which the caller claims to represent SWEPCO or its parent company, American Electric Power (AEP). The customer is told that a certain amount of money must be paid immediately or electric service will be shut off. The scammer usually suggests that the customer purchase a prepaid money card and then provides instructions for using that card to pay the amount supposedly due on the account.

SWEPCO advises all customers to be aware of the scam. The company does not suggest the purchase of money cards as a way to pay electric bills. Information on legitimate options for paying bills is available at www.SWEPCO.com or by calling the company's Customer Solutions Center, toll-free, at 1-888-216-3523. Customers can call the Customer Solutions Center with any questions or to verify the status of their account.

Tips for after the storm

Any time that there is a storm or other disaster, there may be companies who do not have your best interests in mind - those who will take advantage of an already

difficult situation. "Unfortunately, unscrupulous companies will pop up and try to make some easy money when people's guards are down," said Janna Kiehl, BBB CEO. "Sometimes, the only way to tell the difference between a legitimate company and a con is to call the BBB." Phone (806) 379-6222.

Well established companies with a proven track record will not just be interested in taking your money; they will be here to help long term. Immediately after a storm, you're guard may be down and you will want to get things back to normal in a hurry. Be patient and ask if temporary repairs can be made. "It will take some time for companies to make all the repairs needed," said Kiehl.

Tips to protect yourself and your family from being taken advantage of: For companies knocking on your door: Ask to see the company's license from the City Clarendon Code Enforcement department or contact Donley County Sheriff's Office and let them check them out. The sheriff's office number is (806) 874-3533

For roofing companies and door-to-door solicitors, ask these questions: Do they have a physical location in the Panhandle? Ask for an itemized statement with all costs listed. Will the company be there after the sale if there is a problem? If you don't receive straight answers to your questions, close the door. For major permanent repairs, take time to shop around for contractors, get competitive bids and get a report from the BBB. If a company helped you make temporary repairs, you may or may not want to use them for permanent repairs. Check with your insurance company about policy

coverage and specific filing requirements.

Don't be pressured into using someone you're not comfortable with. Be

wary of door-to-door workers who claim your home is unsafe. If you are concerned about possible structural damage in your home, have an engineer, architect, or building official inspect it. Note: Many legitimate companies will go door-to-door after a disaster looking for your business. The best way to tell the difference between a legitimate company and a con is to call the BBB. Prepare a written agreement with anyone you hire. It should outline the work to be done, the materials to be used, and the price breakdown for both labor and materials. Review it carefully before signing. Never sign a blank contract! Never pay for all repairs in advance, and don't pay cash. Call the BBB for a list of accredited businesses in the industry you are shopping in.

Don't give in to attempts to pressure you into making a decision today. After a storm, make temporary repairs if possible and wait for the company to do business with that's right for you.

Hiring a Tree Service After a Disaster and other storm tips

Better Business Bureau reminds those who experience storm damage to take certain precautions when hiring a tree service. Some of the most common "after-disaster" scams involve damage done to trees. BBB offers the following tips to

homeowners who suffer tree damage in the wake of recent storms in the area:

Check with your insurance company about policy coverage and specific filing requirements.

In this uncertain time after a storm, avoid letting your emotions get the better of you. Don't be pressured into making an immediate decision. Check on companies that show up at your door by calling the BBB at 379-6222. Take time to shop around and get 3-4 estimates. Ask if certified arborists, who have professional training and certifications, are on staff. An experienced arborist is particularly important on projects involving large trees or removal of substantial branches on established trees. Check for certification by the International Society of Arboriculture, or by a local certifying body such as a state arborist association.

Make sure each tree service you are considering has current liability insurance and workers compensation insurance. All certificates of insurance should be sent from the tree service's insurance agency directly to you. Otherwise, it could be a fraudulent certificate. Require a written contract agreement with anyone you hire. Be sure their name, address, license number, if applicable, and phone numbers are included in the contract. Read and understand the contract in its entirety and don't sign a blank contract. A copy of the signed contract should be given to you at time of signature. Do not assume that tree stump removal is included in the contract if it is not specified. Never pay for a tree removal or tree trimming project of any kind until you are 100% satisfied with the work. Pay by check or credit

card only when the job is complete. Paying by credit card provides some recourse should the job not be completed as stated in the contract.

Ask how the job will be done, and if they will perform the work according to industry standards. If they mention "topping a tree," "lion's-tailing" or "using climbing spikes to prune a tree," the company does not follow industry standards. "Topping" is drastically cutting back the major limbs of a tree to reduce its size. "Lion's tailing" is an extreme stripping out of most of the interior branches of a tree. Such practices can injure or kill your tree. Sometimes these techniques will be presented as a way to save money by removing more of the tree at one time. However a tree pruned by one of these methods usually requires more expensive restoration work in the future in order to save it.

Beware of a tree service that: Has no printed materials, letterhead, bid forms, etc. Is vague about his formal credentials as an arborist. Offers an unusually low price... at first. Only accepts cash payments, and/or asks for payment up front. Pressures you for an immediate decision. Offers you a discount to find other customers. Disaster victims should never feel forced to make a hasty decision or to choose an unknown tree service. Start With Trust. For reliable information, lists of BBB Accredited Businesses by industry and BBB Business Reviews you can trust, visit <http://txpanhandle.bbb.org/> or call 806-379-6222.

Be safe out there. Don't let a scammer get your hard earned money. If you think you have been scammed, call the Donley County Sheriff's office.

investigation was not going forward due to a lack of proof.

Covey said all current board members have submitted certificates indicating that they have completed the required training on the Open Meetings Act.

Normally vacancies are filled by appointment by the board. But following Tuesday's resignations, City Hall contacted the Texas Secretary of State's office and was informed that since there are two vacancies at the same time on the five-member board, the city must have an election to fill the unexpired portions of the terms. The soonest the election can be held is November, and the terms of Patten and Hernandez expire in May 2014.

Covey estimates a special election will cost the city \$3,600.

In the meantime, the board can continue to function with only three aldermen and the mayor if all four people can be present. With Patten's resignation, the city is also operating without a mayor pro-tem, a position which was on the last three agendas to be elected from the board.

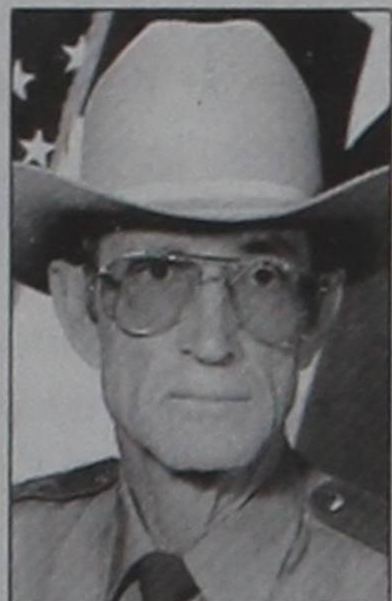

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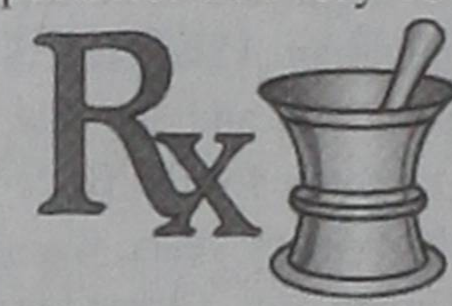

Respiratory Medication May Reduce Wheezing

The results of a new study published in the New England Journal of Medicine provides a possible solution to how wheezing in premature infants can be reduced. Wheezing in premature babies has been linked to infection with respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). In this study with over 400 premature babies in the Netherlands, monthly injections of palivizumab (Synagis), an effective RSV medication, showed a reduction in wheezing and less RSV infection. The babies who received treatment had 61% less days of wheezing during the first year of life compared to the babies that did not receive treatment. Reported side effects were mild redness and swelling at the injection site.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, RSV is the leading cause of serious respiratory infections in children less than one year of age. Premature infants, young children, and the elderly are at increased risk of being infected. RSV is spread from an infected person by the virus-containing particles in every cough and sneeze that is released into the air.

Technological innovation and the economic downturn has changed the way that U.S. consumers shop. Consumers have become more destination shoppers, making more considered purchases and doing their homework before heading to the store. Three-quarters of all U.S. adults read a newspaper in print or online in the past week; over 170 million adults. For shoppers, newspaper advertising is an opt-in medium in an opt-out world.

95% of U.S. adults report that the recession has impacted their shopping in some way. 76% report doing fewer shopping trips. Adults also plan purchases more (67%). Actual purchases continue to be predominantly made in stores (79%) though shopping information channels have dramatically expanded.

59% of adults rank newspapers first as the media used to help plan shopping or make purchasing decisions in the past 7 days. 80% of newspaper readers report looking at advertising when reading the paper.

41% say newspapers are the medium used most to check out ads, more than all electronic media combined. (TV, radio, Internet)

77% of newspaper readers took an action as a result of a print newspaper ad in the past 30 days. 59% clipped a coupon, 52% bought something advertised and 45% visited a store.

60% of newspaper readers followed up a newspaper ad online in some way. 44% went to a website after seeing a print newspaper ad and 28% conducted an online search after seeing a newspaper ad.

82% of readers used a preprinted insert in the past 30 days. On average, adults keep inserts 4.4 days. 59% used to compare prices, 55% used to compare one circular to another, 52% saved until visiting the store and 43% used to make an unplanned purchase.

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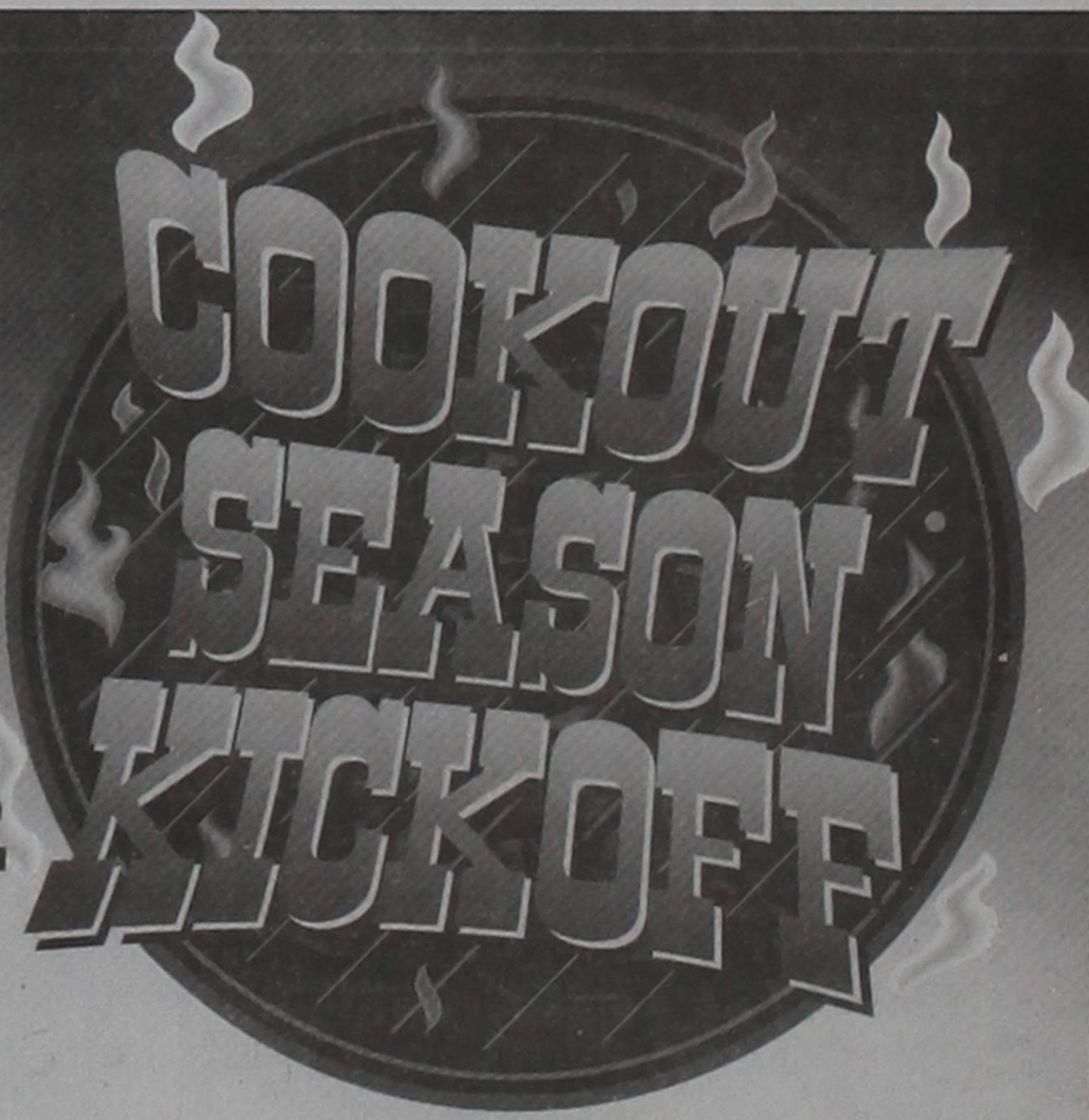
