Sanders resigns as **HISD** superintendent

Hedley School Superintendent Bill Sanders has announced his resignation from that post effective at the end of this month.

Hedley school trustees met in a called session Tuesday to accept Sanders resignation. Sources tell the Enterprise that Sanders resigned for personal reasons. In his letter, Sanders said the following: "There is much to be thankful for around here, and I am optimistic about your future."

School officials say they expect to hire an interim superintendent to fill Sanders' position.

CC Regents begin presidential search

Clarendon College Regents took the first steps in their search for a new president for the Panhandle's oldest institution of higher learning.

During their regular meeting last Thursday, board members reviewed a list of qualifications discussed by a previously appointed search committee and reviewed a brochure that will be printed for potential applicants.

Advertisements are being placed locally and in the Chronicle of Higher Education, and applications are being accepted.

CC President Phil Shirley plans to retire at the end of this calendar year. Regents had previously anticipated a January 1, 2014, start date for the new president, but last week regents agreed the start date could be extended to June 1 for the right candidate.

A Donley County man was involved in a two-vehicle accident near Perryton Monday morning, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

November election to fill city's vacancies

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen is unable to make decisions and cannot hold official meetings following the resignation of three of its five members last week.

City officials say November will be the earliest that a special election can be held to fill the vacancies. The Texas Secretary of State's office had last week informed City Hall that the law does allow the governor to call an earlier emergency election, but legislative activities in the State Capitol were slowing the city's request for such action, making November the likely date.

Aldermen Abby Patten and Jesus Hernandez resigned their offices last Tuesday, June 11, and Alderman Debbie Roberts Hillis followed with her resignation Wednesday afternoon, June 12. It takes three members of the board to have a quorum.

Hernandez did not give a reason for resigning in his signed statement last week. Patten's letter to the board said it had been a pleasure serving and cited her recent admission to law school in Oklahoma and the need to focus on her studies and being unable to attend meetings as her reasons for stepping down.

"Therefore, I would like to take this time to thank you for allowing me to serve with you for the time I did and present my resignation to the board," Patten wrote.

Hillis, who just won a full term in office last month, said in her resignation letter that she had planned on serving out her term and hopefully into the future. "But due to the recent false allegations filed by an unknown resident and several other issues," she wrote, "I will no longer subject my family or myself to this sort of underhandedness."

Mayor Larry Hicks said the three resignations came as a surprise.

"We were not expecting resignations from three aldermen within a 24 hour period," Hicks said. "We did receive some good news from the Attorney General's office in that the Mayor, City Secretary and the two remaining aldermen can legally meet in the meantime to participate in planning, drafting a budget for the coming year, and dealing with other city business; however, no formal action can be taken on any matter until new aldermen are seated."

Hicks also said the situation would not affect the daily operations of the city, and he said City Hall expects to finish the current fiscal year on September 30, 2013, with revenues over expenses.

Alderman Will Thompson was optimistic about the city's future.

"I would like to wish my former fellow council members the best as they move on from the city council," Thompson said. "Their departures do present a challenge in the short term, yet we can take this opportunity to focus on building a better future for Clarendon and recommit our energies to that goal. We all realize the issues facing our community such as water, city infrastructure and economy. However, we are not with-

Time to move forward with new leaders

A visit to Clarendon's City Hall by the District Attorney's investigator. Three resignations of city aldermen. And the complete paralysis of the city's legislative process. It's been an interesting month, but now it's time to figure out how to move forward.

As plans continue to take shape for an election this fall to fill the vacant board positions and get the

city council functioning again, it is important to consider the qualities we want in future aldermen. First and foremost, Clarendon deserves aldermen who are committed to following the letter and spirit of the law to conduct the editor's people's business out in the open.

by roger estlack For the past year, it seemed that there was more happening outside of the council chamber than inside official meetings. Decisions appeared to be predetermined, and some folks - including your editor - believed that the Texas Open Meetings Act was being side-stepped. All elected officials are supposed to be trained in the requirements of that law, but some still don't understand it fully. In addition to setting forth the guidelines for posting agendas, conducting meetings, properly holding executive sessions, and other requirements, the law prohibits officials from meeting to conduct official business outside of public meetings.

The law also bans members from meeting in numbers of less than a quorum - through successive meetings, phone calls, or electronic messages - for the purpose of circumventing the act. That's called a "walking quorum." In laymen's terms, Alderman Z cannot call or go see Alderman Y about an issue, formulate a plan, and then call or visit Alderman X in an effort to coordinate their actions or to plan to vote as a block.

In addition to being unfair to the public, violations of the Open Meetings Act can have serious consequences including fines up to \$500 and up to six months in jail. Current and future city aldermen and other local elected officials need to be aware that this newspaper will expose them if they violate the law.

The second quality potential aldermen need is the ability to put aside personal feelings and act only in the best interests of the City of Clarendon and its people. The past behavior of the board can most kindly be described as unprofessional. Some would go so far as to say dysfunctional. Your editor has been attending city council meetings for 18 years, and never has the actions of the board been so driven by personal vendettas, animosity, and vindictiveness. Those emotions have no place on an elected board. Working only to thwart the efforts of city employees or participating in witch hunts does nothing to move Clarendon forward. Instead, those actions sully our town's reputation and stymie progress.

We need aldermen with a vision of what Clarendon can become rather than always harping on the negative. We need men and women who can let the past be the past and focus on the future. We need leaders who want to take Clarendon to new heights instead of holding it down or undermining it. We need people of integrity who will stick with the job with which they have been entrusted and work to bring about solutions to our problems. It's fine to disagree on some things but not when disagreement devolves into dysfunction.

And we need people who understand some key things. First, we can't fix this city's issues by always trying to spend less money. The "poor boy" way doesn't work. You want better streets? Someone has to pay for it. We've got a street project underway on Third and Sixth streets. Let's make sure it's done right; and remember, progress can sometimes be an inconvenient mess while it's happening.

Second, someone needs to be in charge and that person's authority needs to be clear. It just doesn't make sense to have a million-dollar operation with 20 employees and try to run it with a five-member committee meeting twice a month. It's not 1980 anymore. We need a boss, we need a good code compliance officer, and we need to act professionally. Some people will get their toes stepped on, but it will be okay and Clarendon will be the better for it.

And finally, we need leaders and citizens who will concentrate on the good things about Clarendon and seek to build upon our assets. There are a lot of positive things happening here - some are the result of actions taken by our former city administrator, some are due to the efforts of our Economic Development Corporation, some are the result of just plain old hard work and determination of our citizens, businesses, and city employees, and some are the blessings of divine Providence.

Clarendon controls its own destiny; and if we can put aside petty politics, there is no limit to what we can accomplish. Instead of looking at what other communities have and pining for it, we need to bring those things here. We need to work for more jobs, more amenities, more businesses, and a better quality of life. Together, we can do that. But to make it happen, we all have to start rowing this boat in the same direction and stop working against each other.

Don't fret about geezers; we're fine

As a recent inductee into the Geezer that we can, if Brigade, I must admit that I've been a little concerned that Social Security, a program into which I've paid tens of thousands of dollars over the years, would go belly up, and I would be forced to either live in a tent or commit a tiny misdemeanor so Butch and his deputies would rent me a cell at a reasonable price. Not to worry. I'm pleased to report that Social Security will do just fine, both now and into the distant future. Butch can continue to rent his cells to those who need them.

Last month, the Congressional Budget Office released its most recent anticipated projections for debts and deficits. The deficit disciples immediately wailed and gnashed their teeth because the numbers show that our deficits are falling fast, and the ratio of debt to gross domestic product is projected to remain fairly stable over the as the eye can see. next decade or so. While most people think it would be nice to eventually reduce our debt, those who have made their careers around proclamations of imminent fiscal doom, this was not a report that they wanted to see, much less become public.

Still, we can still try to find a way to blame the baby boomers for delivering disaster, can't we. Doesn't the tidal wave of retiring baby boomers mean that Social Security and Medicare are doomed? Don't we need to change (cut back) those programs now, like yesterday?

Hmmm. Maybe not.

To be fair, the reports of the Social Security and Medicare trustees released Friday do suggest that America's retirement system needs some significant work. The ratio of Americans over 65 to those of working age will rise inexorably over the decades ahead, and this will translate into rising spending on Social Security and Medicare as a share of national income.

However, the numbers are nearly as overwhelming as one might think. If one looks closely, the numbers suggest

we so choose, maintain our social insurance as we know it with only minor adjustments.

Eureka! the dead, Start with Social Security. & fred The retirement program's

trustees do project rising spending as the population gets older, with total payments rising from 5.1 percent of G.D.P. now, to 6.2 percent in 2035, at which point they stabilize. This means, by the way, that all the talk of Social Security going "bankrupt" is nonsense; even if nothing at all is done, the system will be able to pay most of its scheduled benefits as far

Still, it does look as if there will eventually be a shortfall, a few score years into the future, and the usual Republican suspects insist that we must move right now to reduce scheduled benefits. But I've never understood the logic of this demand. The risk is that we might, at some point in the distant future, have to cut benefits (and let the old people eat pet food); to avoid this risk of future benefit cuts, we are supposed to act pre-emptively by cutting future benefits. What problem, exactly, are we solving here?

What about Medicare? For years, many people have warned that Medicare is a much bigger problem than Social Security, and the latest information from the program's trustees still shows spending rising from 3.6 percent of G.D.P. now to 5.6 percent in 2035. But that's a smaller rise than in previous projections. Why?

The answer is that the long-term upward trend in health care costs — a trend that has affected private insurance as well as Medicare — seems to have flattened out significantly over the past few years. Nobody is quite sure why,

but there are indications that some of the cost-reducing measures contained in Obamacare, are actually starting to "flatten out the curve" just as they were supposed to. And because there are a number of cost-reducing measures in the law that have not yet kicked in, there's every reason to believe that this favorable trend will continue.

Even better, there is plenty of room for future savings, mainly because recent research confirms that Americans currently pay far more for medical care than the citizens of other advanced countries pay; and the price premium can and should be brought down to a more affordable level. When it is, Medicare's financial outlook will improve.

What are we facing here? The latest numbers show the combined cost of Social Security and Medicare rising by a bit more than 3 percent of G.D.P. between now and 2035, and that number could easily come down with more effort on the health care front. Of course, 3 percent of G.D.P. is a big number, but it's not an economy-crushing number. The United States could, if we really wanted to, close that gap entirely through modest tax increases, with no reduction in benefits at all, and still have one of the lowest overall tax rates in the advanced world. The result would be senior citizens that are happy, happy, happy.

But haven't all the great and good Republicans been telling us that Social Security and Medicare as we know them are unsustainable, that they must be totally revamped - and made much less generous? Why yes, they have; they've been telling us that we must slash spending right away or we'll face a Greek-style fiscal crisis. They were wrong about that, and they're wrong about the longer run, too. The truth is that the long-term outlook for Social Security and Medicare, while not great, actually isn't all that bad. We'll be just fine. Don't hurt us further.



Importance of Congress' oversight

Recent polls suggest that trust in the federal government remains near a historic low, while frustration with government remains high. These sentiments have been fueled by the terrorist attack in Benghazi, the Justice Department's investigation of reporters, and the IRS scandal. Coming on the heels of these troubling headlines are leaks about national security programs aimed at preventing terrorist attacks.

However, it would be wrong to lump all of these controversies into a single bucket. There are important differences.

Mistrust of government in the United States is nothing new. America's Founding Fathers were well aware of man's fallibility and the dangers inherent in governmental power. They chose to make the national government one of limited powers, with all other powers left to the states. They also chose to divide the federal power among three branches, creating a system of checks and balances where no one branch could dominate the others.

Among the powers allocated between the branches in our Constitution are those related to national security. Article II makes the President the commander in chief of the Armed Forces. But, Article I, Section 8 gives Congress the responsibility to "declare war . . . and make rules concerning captures on land and water", "to raise and support armies", "to provide and maintain a navy", "to make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces", a host of duties relating to the militia, and "all laws which are necessary and proper for carrying to execution the foregoing powers."

Of course, part of our modern challenge is for the Congress, made up of two chambers and 535 individuals, to exercise those constitutional duties in an age where new domains of warfare are in space and in cyberspace and where a mere handful of committed individuals can kill thousands of innocent people.

Congress can never exercise the duties of the Commander in Chief. But Congress must fulfill its constitutional role in defending the nation even as threats can emanate from anywhere in the world and even when attacks can move at the speed of light.

Programs that must necessarily issue



in World War II was one of the keys to Allied success. But, secrecy does not-and should not-necessarily mean sinister things. This is where strong, structured, and steady oversight comes into play.

The United States is unique among nations in the role Congress plays in oversight of intelligence and military activities. As technology has developed, oversight by the legislative and, where appropriate, the judicial branches has required new mechanisms in order to keep the checks and balances designed by the Founders. Sometimes, that oversight must occur in a classified setting because our enemies are always watching, seeking any advantage, and adjusting their tactics and strategies

accordingly. The President and his advisors point out that Congress and the FISA court were overseeing the leaked NSA programs. I can attest that is true. The oversight mechanisms and procedures by both Congress and the courts have evolved over time and not all Members of Congress were fully briefed. But the intelligence committees, of which I am a member, as well as congressional leadership were briefed on how the programs operate, have a standing invitation to watch them operate, and receive regular reports, not just on the successes, but also on any mistakes that

are made. Congress passed the laws under which the programs operate and oversee how those authorities are being used. This structure works, and it serves as a check to make certain that the authority is not used for some unintended purpose and is not abused. And when Congress disagrees with how the Administration carries out a policy or a matter of law, we have and will continue to act by changing the law, restricting funding, or giving the matter closer scrutiny through hearings and briefings. This robust system of national

security oversight stands in stark contrast to the IRS scandal where Congress has labored for years to get the truth about what was happening. The stonewalling arrogance of the IRS is a marked departure from the nonpolitical professionals at NSA. The IRS scandal affirms that unchecked power can, and often will, be abused. But it is up to Congress to develop and insist on responsible oversight mechanisms and procedures on behalf of the people we represent to prevent or uncover that abuse. In the national security arena, we are actively developing those mechanisms to make sure that our efforts are effective, but more importantly to ensure that Americans trust that their civil liberties are protected.

Two years ago, Congress passed a law requiring quarterly reports for counterterrorism operations involving Specials Operations Forces. Last year, we required by law regular reports on major cyber operations. This year, the House Defense Authorization Act sets up an oversight structure for sensitive military operations, defined as lethal or capture operations outside of an active war zone. The law would require the Administration to explain to Congress the legal authorities and targeting procedures it uses, promptly brief Congress after each such operation, and then provide quarterly overviews of all such activity. Having that kind of defined structure written into law does not micromanage military decisions, but it does give Congress the information it needs to do its job.

This country was founded with a healthy skepticism of government, and it is important that it remains part of our collective DNA. The Boston bombing and the continued threats from overseas remind us, however, that more is involved than a simple balancing of privacy and security. We must continue to work to understand the threats we face. We must continue to develop and improve the programs we have to meet those threats. And in order to protect our security and our essential freedoms, we must ensure that the founding principles of separation of powers and checks and balances are applied appropriately as threats and technology change.


Water Pill Reduces Blood Pressure Best in Kidney Disease

According to a new study, spironolactone may help lower high blood pressure that is associated with a severe form of chronic kidney disease. In the most severe (end-stage) chronic kidney disease, the kidneys cannot function properly. This consequently causes the heart to work much harder to pump blood throughout the body. The increased pumping indirectly causes high blood pressure to occur. This is sometimes called resistant hypertension. Eleven subjects in the study wore a monitor that recorded the individual's blood pressure throughout twenty-four hours. At the end of sixteen weeks, blood pressure was significantly lower and potassium levels were moderately higher in those taking spironolactone with resistant hypertension and end-stage renal disease.

Spironolactone (Aldactone) belongs to the aldosterone inhibitors class. In kidney failure, aldosterone levels in the body become very high, which can severely damage the heart, liver, and kidneys. It can be used to treat resistant hypertension.
