West Nile Virus is found in local area

The Clarendon Code Compliance/Animal Control Department received notification by the Texas Department of State Health Services of confirmed cases of West Nile Virus infections in our area.

Donley County had one reported equine case, Armstrong County also had one reported equine case, and Carson County had nine reported human cases.

It is highly recommended to keep grass and weeds cut as short as possible, as these areas are prime breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Make certain you have no puddles or other standing water sources. Cover swimming pools when not in use. Equine owners should have their animals vaccinated as soon as possible.

Make good use of insect repellents when outdoors - especially in the early morning or late evening hours. Wear protective clothing, such as long-sleeve shirts and pants, when outdoors -Especially in the early morning or late evening hours.



Deadline next week for city's election

It looked like it was all over Monday when the publicized filing deadline for the city's special election came and went with only three candidates filing for three vacant seats on the Clarendon Board of Aldermen. But then the Texas Secretary of State's office said the deadline is next week.

Larry Jeffers, Wayne Cole, and Doug Kidd were the only candidates who had filed as of 5 p.m. Monday; and if that had been the deadline, the three would have been declared elected.

City Hall checked with state officials Tuesday to ensure all the deadlines and benchmarks had been properly met, and that's when the discrepancy was discovered. Since it is a special election, the deadline to file as a candidate is actually next Wednesday, September 4, at 5 p.m.

Potential candidates can still file for the three positions. Jeffers and Cole signed up to run for two terms that expire in May 2014, and Kidd signed up for the term to expire in May 2015.

District Court hears pleas in four cases

The 100th Judicial District Court heard four pleas in local cases resulting in three convictions and one deferred adjudication when it met in Clarendon on Friday, August

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

A total of \$6,500 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas. In addition to the fines, the defendants were required to pay a total of \$2,032 in court costs and \$280 restitution.

David Wade Deatherage, a 30-year-old resident of Clarendon, pleaded true to allegations listed in the State's Motion to Revoke and was convicted and sentenced to eight years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

On August 18, 2011, Deatherage originally pleaded guilty to the third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated 3rd or more that occurred on May 12, 2011, in Donley County.

The State filed the motion to revoke on May 28, 2013, alleging six violations of community supervision.

Without a negotiated plea in place, Deatherage pleaded true to all of the violations contained in the State's motion. After the plea of

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
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

DOJ seeks to stop Texas Voter ID, redistricting maps

The US Department of Justice announced on Thursday that it will again seek to dismantle Texas' voter ID law, this time with a lawsuit that suppress voting rights." alleging the measure violates Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. The department also said on Thursday that it will seek to have Texas' redistricting maps declared unconstitutional.

Section 2 of the 1965 act prohibits voting laws that discriminate based on race, color or membership in a minority group. Thursday's decision by the U.S. Department of Justice comes after a U.S. Supreme Court ruling in June that allowed implementation of the state law that requires voters allegations of racism. to furnish a valid photo ID before casting a ballot. Prior to that ruling, the department and, separately, a Texas' request for preclearance. The high court's ruling eliminated the


Labor Day Scramble to be held at CCC

The nine-hole scrambles will continue each Friday night beginning at 6:00 p.m. and the pool will remain open through September 2 before closing for the season.





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
The Clarendon Lions Club held its regular Tuesday noon meeting August 27 with Boss Lion Ashlee Estlack wielding the gavel.

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
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Higher Dose of Alzheimer's Drug

The FDA recently approved a high-dose version of Exelon (rivastigmine transdermal patch) to help treat symptoms of late stage Alzheimer's disease. Exelon has already been available in a lower strength to treat mild to moderate symptoms. A transdermal patch is a unique medication system that delivers a constant amount of medication through the skin and into the bloodstream for 24 hours. This is a helpful way to reduce the amount of oral pills, bothersome side effects such as nausea, and the difficulty with swallowing that is associated with later stages of Alzheimer's disease. Exelon works by reducing the breakdown of a chemical in the brain that is believed to improve memory in Alzheimer's disease.

Alzheimer's disease is a specific type of memory loss disorder that affects behavior and daily activities that gets worse with time. While there is no cure at this time, there are many therapies available to help improve the symptoms of the disease. Risk factors for getting Alzheimer's disease are an age greater than 65 years, and if someone in the family had the disease.

That's the title of a book that Ann Coulter wrote a couple of years ago and I highly recommend its reading. If you want to see, in part, why our country is getting so bad, read her book.




Hedley Owls open season in Higgins By Fred Gray




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
